ITEMS OF INTEREST

- 2. In response to regional drought conditions, I am providing a copy of a memorandum sent to General Government department directors related to the **need for City departments to reduce water consumption by at least 10 percent and not irrigate between the hours of 8:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m.** Recently, the cities of Tacoma, Everett and Seattle have moved to Phase 2 of their Water Shortage Response Plans and are asking customers to voluntarily reduce water usage until the rains can restore reservoir water levels.
- 3. City Treasurer Teresa Sedmak and Finance Director Andy Cherullo provide the attached **memorandum regarding the refunding savings and ratings upgrade for the Convention Center and Parking System**. The City refunded approximately \$25.5 million of the 2004 Convention Center and Parking System bonds on August 14th. This refunding produced a cash savings of \$2.697 million over the next ten years.
- 4. Attached is the **August 26, 2015 Public Utility Board meeting** agenda. Please note item U-10800, execution of an interlocal agreement between the City of Tacoma and local governments in King County to support salmon recovery in the Green River, is scheduled for your consideration on September 15th.

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STUDY SESSION/WORK SESSION

 The City Council Study Session of Tuesday, August 25, 2015, will be held in Room 16 of the Tacoma Municipal Building North, at Noon. Discussion items will be: (1) Innovative Grants Program; (2) Gun Safe T Campaign; (3) Other Items of Interest; (4) Committee Reports; (5) Agenda Review and City Manager's Weekly Report; and, (6) Executive Session – Director of Utilities Performance Review.

At Tuesday's Study Session Program Development Specialist Carol Wolfe will present an overview of the enhanced Innovative Grant Program funded in the 2015-2016 biennium and the outcomes of the 2015-16 application process. The Neighborhood Small Innovative Grant program was reinstated in the 2015-2016 budget after being put on hold during the 2013-14 budget cycle. The two year break from soliciting new projects allowed staff to address a backlog of 86 projects totaling \$495,584 and to identify necessary program improvements reflecting the findings and priorities from the 2012 Neighborhood Council Program review.

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Program improvements include the following elements:

General Fund Supported at \$320,000

10% of total allocation set aside for maintenance.

One application cycle with \$36,000 allocated to each Neighborhood Council for the biennium.

Increased flexibility for project eligibility as uses are not restricted to capital improvements.

Increased impact with 18 month project deadlines.

Minimum and Maximum project amounts have been eliminated to better reflect total project costs.

A simplified application with an emphasis on abutting neighborhood and community support, maintenance plans and identified life cycle costs.

Restrictions on multiple funding allocations to one project or group.

Program guidelines call for equitable distribution of funding within each Neighborhood Council area.

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> As a second item at Tuesday's Study Session, Neighborhood and Community Services Department staff will provide the City Council with an **update on the Gun Safe T Education Campaign**. According to the National Center for Injury Prevention & Control, 18 children and young adults (24 years of age and under) are killed by firearm injuries each day in the U.S. The Gun Safe T campaign was launched in June 2014 for the purpose of **building awareness and creating opportunities to bring safety education on the use, storage and surrender of firearms to Tacoma youth and the community**.

GRANT APPLICATIONS

8. The City has applied for the following grant applications:

2015 Washington State Criminal Street Gang Prevention & Intervention Grant Program – Funding for the Tacoma Gang Reduction Project to implement the Office of Juvenile Justice & Delinquency Prevention's Comprehensive Gang Model. The project will continue to carry out the City Council's priority of reducing youth violence and gang activity by using the key findings identified in the 2011 gang assessment. The City is requesting \$16,625 with no match required.

Washington Transportation Improvement Board Funds – The South 38th Street Streetscape Project is part of the Lincoln District Revitalization Program being implemented by the City. The project will improve South 38th Street from South J Street to South Fawcett Avenue and will include new asphalt pavement, concrete sidewalks and crosswalks, street and pedestrian signals, and landscaping. The <u>City is requesting \$2,392,262</u> with a City match of \$1,731,662, which is earmarked in the current biennium.

This memorandum requests City departments to reduce water consumption by at least 10 percent in response to regional drought conditions. Recently, the cities of Tacoma, Everett, and Seattle have moved to Phase 2 of their Water Shortage Response Plans and are asking customers to voluntarily reduce water usage by 10 percent until rains can restore reservoir water levels. Achieving a 10 percent reduction could prevent a mandatory ban on lawn and turf watering in the near future.

Tacoma Water recently provided an update on the regional water situation and recommended that public entities lead by example by agreeing to a voluntary 10 percent reduction in water usage and not irrigate between the hours of 8:00 a.m. and 7:00 p.m. For Tacoma Water, this reduction could save between seven to eight million gallons of water per day, which will help extend the water supply into the winter months.

The City has been working closely with Tacoma Water and Metro Parks in the refinement of its Water Conservation Plan (See Response to Phase 2 attached) with jointly developed strategies to allow all entities to achieve the water conservation savings goal while encouraging citizens of Tacoma to reduce water consumption. This plan provides high level strategies that departments are asked to review and implement at the discretion of each director.

The City's Public Works Department completed the attached inventory of irrigation locations by department for the systems it maintains and will implement this plan within the next week. Public Works staff has reached out to other departments that maintain City-owned properties to provide guidelines for reducing water usage. Although staff believes the irrigation reductions will be enough for the City to achieve the conservation goals, department directors are encouraged to review the attached Water Conservation Plan for additional water saving ideas.

City staff is currently working with Metro Parks and Tacoma Water on a joint communications plan that will provide information to the general public.

City of Tacoma Water Conservation Plan Phase 2 Response to Voluntary Stage

Communication Actions

Consult with Tacoma Public Utilities (TPU) to review communication to the Public. All actions from Phase 1 will remain in effect.

City Departments will provide guidelines to staff to reduce water usage. The City recommends taking the following actions:

- Do not irrigate between the hours of 8:00 AM to 7:00 PM.
- Reduce irrigation of turf and allow grass to go dormant where possible.
- Reduce plant bed irrigation to minimums required for survival.
- Continue to irrigate once a week for all plants and trees in their establishment period.
- Reduce use of pressure washers on sidewalks and plazas except as needed for public health and safety.
- Wash vehicles only as needed.

Public Message

Water conservation is very important to the City, and we have had "best management practices" in place for years. After Tacoma Water's announcement of voluntary water reductions on Tuesday, August 11, 2015, staff plan to implement several additional water-saving measures across the City to further conserve our precious resource.

Irrigation will be reduced at all parks owned and maintained by the City, all City owned properties, including but not limited to fire stations, police headquarters and substations, the Tacoma Dome, the Greater Tacoma Convention Center, Solid Waste, Sewer Treatment Plants, sewer pump stations, libraries, and landscaped rights-of-way. Staff will closely monitor landscapes to ensure plants and trees do not suffer long-term damage. Residents also can expect to see more dry grass. The grass will begin to go dormant over the next couple of weeks resulting in slower growth and a change in color from green to gold. The grass will turn green again once the fall/winter rains start.

SUMMARY:

On August 14, 2015, the City successfully refunded approximately \$25.5 million of the 2004 Convention Center and Parking Revenue Bonds.

This refunding produced a cash savings of \$2.697 million (or \$2.414 million on a present value basis) over the next ten years. See the table below for savings by year.

Additionally, Standard & Poor's Ratings Services ("S&P") revised the outlook to positive from stable and affirmed its "A" long-term and underlying rating on Tacoma's Convention Center and Parking Revenue Refunding Bonds.

As stated in S&P's report, the ratings action reflected the following positive credit factors:

 The diverse pledge of repayment revenues, including sales and use taxes and net revenues of the parking system;

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- The parking system's healthy unrestricted cash position; and
- The strong additional bonds test and rate covenant

In addition to its revised outlook and ratings affirmation, S&P's report stated that the rating could be raised within the next two years provided the City maintains or improves liquidity and maintains or improves debt service coverage from its net parking revenues.
