TOPICS OF INTEREST

1. The agenda for the Public Utility Board meeting on January 29, 2014 is attached for your information.

STUDY SESSION/WORK SESSION

2. The City Council Study Session of Tuesday, January 28, 2014, will be held in Room 16 of the Tacoma Municipal Building North, at Noon. Discussion items will be: (1) Pierce County Community and Technical Colleges Legislative Initiatives; (2) Tacoma Link Expansion; (3) Other Items of Interest; (4) Agenda Review; (5) Closed Session – Labor Negotiations; and (6) Executive Session – Pending and Potential Litigation.

At Tuesday's Study Session, the **Pierce County Coordinating Council**, representing the five local technical and community colleges, **will provide an update on their legislative initiatives**.

As a second item at Tuesday's Study Session, the Council is scheduled to conduct further review of the Tacoma Link Light Rail Expansion, with the intent of identifying the alignment(s) it prefers be advanced into required State and Federal environmental review processes (State and National Environmental Policy Acts). Planning and Development Services Director Peter Huffman forwards a letter of recommendation from the Planning Commission concerning the Link Expansion. The Commission suggests that the Council's preferred route alignments should offer the best opportunity to maximize economic development, incentivize transit-oriented development, minimize the disruption to the urban fabric and urban lifestyles, be consistent with the *Draft Hilltop Subarea Plan*, and ensure the ease of accessibility, especially for the physically challenged. In addition, I am providing the attached letter from the Tacoma Transportation Commission related to their recommendations for the expansion, which was recently sent to the Infrastructure, Planning and Sustainability Committee.

Honorable Mayor and Members of the City Council,

On behalf of the Planning Commission, I am forwarding our recommendations regarding the current phase of the Tacoma Link Light Rail Expansion Project.

Sound Transit is currently in the process of defining and evaluating route alignments along the North Downtown Central Corridor (Hilltop via the Stadium District), which has been identified as the preferred corridor for the potential expansion of Tacoma Link. The City Council is scheduled to make a recommendation in January-February 2014 to Sound Transit on which alignments should be studied for further environmental review. We recommend that the following criteria and factors be keenly weighted in your contemplation and decision-making:

- 1. The selected alignments should offer the best opportunity to maximize economic development, stimulate urban revitalization, and incentivize transit-oriented development along the corridor.
- The selected alignments should result in the least amount of disruption to the urban fabric in Greater downtown (i.e., land use, urban design, and infrastructure), the urban lifestyles (i.e., commercial, educational, cultural and recreational activities), and capital investments already made for the Tacoma Link Light Rail.
- 3. The selected alignments should be consistent with the *Draft Hilltop Subarea Plan*, which is slated for adoption in April 2014 as a new element of the *Comprehensive Plan* and a genuine reflection of the community's vision and development goals for the Hilltop area. The subarea plan envisions a multimodal transportation system, including the Tacoma Link Light Rail on a two-way alignment on MLK Jr Way that provides high-quality transit service for the entire district. The potential transit investment would also be a powerful catalyst for economic development and generate a positive influence on livability and revitalization in Hilltop. [Goal M-4, Figure 5-21, and Action M-13, Mobility Chapter, Draft Hilltop Subarea Plan, December 2013]
- 4. The practicality of access, or the ease of accessibility, to transit stations, especially for the physically challenged, can affect the ridership in a more profound manner than normally expected. It should be carefully examined along with other ridership-influencing factors, such as the walking distance, topography, density and intensity of the area, and roadway and traffic conditions.

The Tacoma Link Expansion is one of the most significant transportation investment projects to be realized in the South Puget Sound Region in the foreseeable future. The Planning Commission received a briefing from Sound Transit staff on the project on January 8, 2014. Based on the information received, the Planning Commission decided to focus our deliberation of recommendations, not on specific route alignments that should be selected for environmental review purposes, but on the principles and criteria for the selection of alignments. We respectfully submit the above recommendations for your timely consideration.

Re: Commission Recommendation on Sound Transit Link Expansion

Dear Chair Mello,

The Tacoma Transportation Commission appreciates the opportunity to provide a recommendation to the Infrastructure, Planning, and Sustainability Council Committee (IPS) on the preferred route alignment for the Sound Transit Link Expansion project. On December 18, 2013 the Transportation Commission held a joint meeting with the Bicycle & Pedestrian Technical Advisory Group (BPTAG); representatives from Sound Transit presented proposed route alignments and staff evaluation for the Tacoma Link Expansion project.

During our January 15, 2014 meeting, the Commission, understanding that the City Council will make a decision on preferred route alignments in the near future, chose to discuss this topic hoping to provide valuable guidance in the City Council's decision.

After a thoughtful discussion of the proposed route alignments and considering input from the BPTAG, the Commission is providing the following recommendations.

- The Commission recognizes the importance of choosing one alignment to evaluate in order to provide for an expedited timeline and access to more grant funding opportunities that will help fund the overall project.
- 2. The preferred route alignment connecting downtown Tacoma and the Stadium Business District is Stadium Way (A1). In the overall scope of the project, this alignment appears to meet most of the community's needs. The Commission recognizes the pedestrian and accessibility challenges provided with this alignment and urges Sound Transit to work with the City to include access mitigation measures to address those challenges.
- 3. The preferred route alignment serving the Hilltop neighborhood is MLK (B1), which does *not* include the couplet. This alignment provides the best opportunity for an affordable and cost-effective project, as well as provides an opportunity for future expansion. Additionally, this alignment coincides with the Hilltop Subarea Plan.

4. The Tacoma Link Expansion must extend to South 19th Street to provide service to the underserved community of the Hilltop neighborhood and Hilltop Business Association. Fiscal responsibility will be important in ensuring that the expansion reaches South 19th Street, a major transportation corridor that connects neighborhoods and serves the whole of the Hilltop.

The Transportation Commission recognizes that the Tacoma Link Expansion is one of the most significant transportation projects in Tacoma. We are a fairly new Commission and are proud to say this is our first official action. We strongly feel this is a positive step towards achieving a multimodal transportation system that efficiently and equitably moves people and goods with optimum safety, maximizes the conservation of energy and economic development, and minimally disrupts the desirable features of the environment. We respectfully submit these recommendations for your consideration.

Oil Transport and Emergency Preparedness

The City of Tacoma's preparations for a potential oil train derailment build upon our existing preparedness for a large-scale flammable liquid spill or fire. Those existing capabilities include:

- 1. A hazardous materials plan that includes procedures for rail incidents
- 2. A hazardous materials team on duty at all times.
- 3. A cache of firefighting foam for suppressing large-scale petroleum-based fires
- 4. Two trailers staged at our Training Center, each containing 800 feet of spill-containment booms.
- 5. Annual training for all firefighters on hazardous material incidents
- 6. Routine training exercises with Tacoma Rail
- 7. Routine training exercises with U.S. Oil
- 8. Ability to request immediate assistance from U.S. Oil, Joint Base Lewis McChord, and Seattle Fire for additional firefighting foam.

In the event of a significant train derailment within our jurisdiction, the City of Tacoma's Emergency Coordination Center (ECC) would be activated to ensure coordination among the various City departments. For example, Environmental Services would provide their sewer expertise and cleaning to help prevent a spill from reaching Puget Sound. The ECC would also coordinate the City's efforts with the appropriate state agencies, such as the Washington State Department of Ecology.

Should a significant trail derailment occur outside of the Fire Department's service area, we anticipate that our resources would be requested through existing mutual aid or inter-local agreements. (In February 2011, Fireboat *Commencement* and Engine 17 assisted West Pierce Fire & Rescue for a freight train derailment on the banks of Puget Sound about 13 miles south of Tacoma.)

Currently, two to three oil trains pass through our jurisdiction destined for the Port of Tacoma. Those trains range from 100 to 110 railcars, with each railcar containing approximately 28,000 gallons of oil. In light of this significant increase in rail traffic and the potential for further increases, the Fire Department is working to improve our awareness of the quantity and frequency of shipments. We are also working to enhance our existing preparedness by developing training and exercises specifically tailored to the hazards of crude oil being shipped from the Bakken region, which may be more flammable than traditional heavy crude oil according to the safety alert issued earlier this month by the U.S. Department of Transportation.
