ACTION REQUESTED

1. As a reminder, since the **March 11, 2014 Council meetings have been canceled**, there won't be a Weekly Report next Thursday, March 6th.

TOPICS OF INTEREST

- 2. This month the Public Works Department has begun their work on the Pedestrian Crossings Improvement Project. This project will provide for the identification, evaluation and construction of pedestrian crosswalks, and associated facilities, at intersections citywide. Community priorities for intersections and their specific upgrades will be identified through a series of public meetings, with prioritization of the locations being improved based on the community input and transportation engineering criteria. Improvements will be distributed geographically with a budget allocation for design and construction of approximately \$300,000 per Council District, and an additional allocation of \$1 million within the downtown area to improve connections between adjacent neighborhoods, Council Districts, and desired public and business services. Please see the attached memorandum from Public Works Director Kurtis Kingsolver for additional information on public outreach efforts, funding and schedule.
- 3. Neighborhood and Community Services is excited to provide the **attached listing of the 2014 community clean-up dates, times and locations**. These community clean-ups were requested by community members through an application process. Last year, the City and community groups partnered to remove over 450 tons of trash from neighborhoods throughout the City. If you have some free time on a Saturday, please feel free to join us and help the community as we clean up our neighborhoods. Please note we will provide an updated listing as necessary.

STUDY SESSION/WORK SESSION

 The City Council Study Session of Tuesday, March 4, 2014, will be held in Room 16 of the Tacoma Municipal Building North, at Noon. Discussion items will be: (1) Legislative Updates; (2) Hilltop Subarea Plan and Environmental Impact Statement; (3) Other Items of Interest; (4) Agenda Review; and (5) Closed Session – Labor Negotiations.

At Tuesday's Study Session, **Government Relations Officer Randy Lewis will** provide Council a Legislative Update.

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> As a second item on Tuesday's Study Session, Planning and Development Services staff will provide a **brief update on the progress to date on the Hilltop Subarea Plan and Environmental Impact Statement**.

GRANT APPLICATIONS

- 6. The City applied for the following grant:
 - Tacoma Mall Regional Growth Center Subarea Plan and EIS Funding to develop a subarea plan and Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) for the Tacoma Mall Regional Growth Center, pursuant to the requirements of Vision 2040. The approach is modeled after the successful South Downtown Subarea Plan/EIS effort. The scope of work will include the following tasks: project management; data review; public outreach; existing conditions report; area-wide transportation and stormwater strategy; draft plan and EIS; and, implementation report.

<u>Summary</u>

The Pedestrian Crossings Improvement project provides for the identification, evaluation, and construction of pedestrian crosswalks, and associated facilities, at intersections citywide. Community priorities for intersections and their specific upgrades will be identified through a series of public meetings. The prioritization of the locations to be improved will be based on community input and transportation engineering criteria. Improvements will be distributed geographically with a budget allocation for design and construction of approximately \$300,000 per Council District and an additional allocation of \$1,000,000 within the downtown area to improve connections between adjacent neighborhoods, Council Districts, and desired public and business services.

While the primary motivation for the project is the installation of marked crosswalks, other improvements will be installed to enable and enhance the marked crossings. These include curb ramp and sidewalk construction, curbing and drainage improvements, limited paving, pedestrian activated beacons and accessibility upgrades to existing traffic signals.

Funding and Schedule

This work will be primarily supported through a \$2,500,000 General Fund allocation, with the potential for additional contributions through the identification of joint projects with the Community and Economic Development Department and the Neighborhood and Community Services Department. Staff will also investigate opportunities to extend the effectiveness of other programs, such as the Hazardous Sidewalk Replacement program and the implementation of the City's ADA Transition Plan, by using the economies of scale offered by this large contract.

The location identification and evaluation process is expected to begin in early 2014, with construction of most improvements expected from summer/fall 2014 through mid-2015, pending weather.

Process

A prioritization process will be used to identify the improvements to be completed with the available funding and create a Transportation Master Plan companion document outlining the policy and prioritization process for future pedestrian crossing improvement requests. The proposed process is as follows:

1. <u>February</u>: Notify Neighborhood Councils, Business Districts, and other key stakeholders (Transportation Commission, Bike/Pedestrian Technical Advisory Group, Commission on Disabilities, etc.) of the upcoming project and request they evaluate their area's needs with respect to needed pedestrian improvements.

- 2. <u>March</u>: Conduct one public meeting in each council district to gather crossing improvement needs from key stakeholders.
- 3. <u>February/March</u>: Contract with a consultant to assist in evaluating and prioritizing the identified pedestrian crossing improvements at intersections based on developed criteria, such as:
 - a. Outcomes from the community engagement and stakeholder review process;
 - b. Proximity to schools, bus stops, libraries, parks and other public centers;
 - c. Pedestrian and vehicular volumes, as available;
 - d. Crossing location (principal/principal arterials, principal/minor arterials, etc.);
 - e. Vehicular and vehicular/pedestrian collisions;
 - f. Existing facilities (traffic signal, crosswalks, etc.);
 - g. Proximity to accessible routes and bike/trail systems; and,
 - h. Time/effort/cost to implement the given improvement.

Issue a Request for Qualifications for Design-Build teams; review teams and shortlist.

4. <u>April/May</u>: Present the draft prioritized list of the citywide pedestrian crossing improvements at a public meeting in each council district (as needed, based on the response from the March outreach).

Summarize process, outcomes and schedule at an Infrastructure, Planning, and Sustainability Committee (IPS) meeting.

- 5. <u>May/June</u>: Request design-build proposals to complete the recommended improvements in an expedited manner. The design-build approach will provide several advantages over the typical design-bid-build process, including:
 - a. Design and construction will be completed by one team (design consultant and contractor) requiring less procurement time;
 - b. The design-build team assumes more risk and the City assumes less;
 - c. Design and construction will be completed concurrently allowing construction to begin sooner; and,
 - d. The design-build team is responsible for quality and oversight resulting in less City staff time for construction management and inspection.
- 6. <u>July/August</u>: Design-build team selection and award process:
 - a. Evaluate and rank proposals;
 - b. Interview selected teams; and,
 - c. Select design-build team and obtain City Council approval.

With your approval, we will move forward with this project. Please let me know if you have any concerns about how this work is structured, schedule, or the expected outcomes.
