















## **FORT LEWIS AND AFRICAN AMERICANS**

- 1917 Established.
- **1941** South Fort Lewis received 110 wood-frame temporary mobilization buildings as a separate camp for Black soldiers.

- July 26, 1948 President Harry S. Truman (1884-1972) issued Executive Order 9981, ending racial segregation in the military. Integration became a reality by 1950.
  - **1950** Fort Lewis housed 20,000 soldiers, 30% of whom were African American.
  - **1970** Nearly one-third of Pierce County's Black population were military personnel at Fort Lewis.
