Dear Mayor and Council Members:

ITEMS OF INTEREST

- Public Works Director Ramiro Chavez provides the attached Capital Projects planning update which provides additional information regarding funding, costs, and schedules for active capital projects with the Public Works Department.

- 4. <u>City-funded Temporary and Emergency Shelter Performance</u>: **The City posts weekly information about its Temporary and Emergency Shelter locations including current census, number of available beds, and exits to housing**. - 5. Encampment Outreach: The City's Homeless Engagement and Alternatives Liaison Team (formerly the Homeless Outreach Team) performs encampment outreach throughout the week to provide individuals opportunities to connect to shelter, behavioral health, substance use, and employment services. For the week of July 15 19, 2024, staff visited 18 locations. This resulted in 63 (25 new, and 38 repeat) individuals being contacted and referred to community services. Three individuals accepted shelter.
- 6. <u>Inclement Weather Response Plan</u>: For the 2024 summer inclement weather season for heat and smoke, the City of Tacoma is partnering with Tacoma Libraries, outreach teams (contracted and non-contracted), and volunteers to ensure that unsheltered individuals have access to water, masks, information about cooling centers, and sheltering throughout the City. The City has ensured that there is sufficient water available at the stability site for pickup and that our partners are prepared to supply resources accordingly.

Thresholds for inclement weather activations:

- > 85 degrees or higher and/or Air Quality over 101, the City will supply both unsheltered and sheltered individuals with water and masks depending on need.
- For 90 degrees or higher and/or Air Quality over 151, the City will continue to supply resources, open cooling, and air quality centers for daytime relief and/or possible nighttime relief for smoke. The City pauses non-emergent encampment removals from public property and City rights-of-way during inclement weather events that meet this threshold.

The City is working with other providers to expand shelter capacity during acute inclement weather events. When temperatures reach the threshold of 85 degrees an additional 100 beds (total) will be made available as listed below:

- Catholic Community Services' Nativity House (702 South 14th Street) will be providing an additional 80 overflow shelter beds.
- ➤ Valeo Vocation will be providing 20 overflow beds for young adults 18-24 years of age at the Beacon Young Adult Shelter (415 South 13th Street).
- 7. TEMS 4 Transition: Tacoma Emergency Micro-Shelter (TEMS) 4 (69th and Proctor), operated by Low Income Housing Institute (LIHI) has completed the transition to Forging Path Community at 3561 Pacific Avenue, operated by Tacoma Rescue Mission. The City of Tacoma began to transition shelter and hygiene units on June 3, 2024, from South 69th and Proctor to Forging Path Community at 35th and Pacific Ave and completed transition of residents on July 23, 2024. A total of 46 residents moved between the two locations. The City is moving the remaining vacant micro-shelter units and preparing to decommission the site at 69th and Proctor. Once decommission is complete, the Housing Division will issue a "Request for Proposal," for affordable housing on the property. Since opening in December 2021, the 69th and Proctor site served 222 individuals, with 80 of the clients having been connected to permanent housing.

STUDY SESSION / WORK SESSION

8. The City Council Study Session of Tuesday, July 30, 2024, will be conducted as a hybrid meeting. Discussion items will include: (1) Good Jobs, Great Cities Program Update; (2) Home in Tacoma Project Phase 2: Planning Commission Recommendations; (3) Other Items of Interest: Council Action Memorandum – Consolidating and Clarifying City Council Recommendations for Certain Proposed City Charter and Municipal Code Amendments; (4) Committee Reports; (5) Agenda Review and City Manager's Weekly Report.

On our first agenda item, staff will share the efforts of the Mayor's Office over the last year in partnership with the National League of Cities and U.S. Department of Labor initiative "Good Jobs, Great Cities," which focused on programs that would spur innovative and scalable city-supported energy, and advanced manufacturing jobs ahead of the final convening on August 5, 2024. The presentation will cover initiatives pursued, action plans, and next steps following the conclusion of the cohort.

On our second agenda item, staff from Planning and Development Services, along with the Planning Commission Chair, members of the project consultant team, and staff from the Tacoma-Pierce County Health Department, will provide an overview of the Planning Commission's final recommendations on the Home in Tacoma (HIT) Project Phase 2.

The Planning Commission's recommendations, which were finalized in June 2024, reflect a new residential zoning structure, including rezoning most of the City's residential areas to three new Urban Residential zones that would allow low- and mid-scale density; a bonus program to support affordability and retention of existing structures; reduced parking requirements, including expanded Reduced Parking Areas; new design standards for residential development; new tools to support home ownership; and expanded landscaping standards, including tree retention and minimum planting requirements. The Public Works Department is pleased to provide the attached update to our capital projects planning document. The purpose of this document is to provide additional information regarding funding, costs, and schedules for active capital projects within Public Works. Updates include changes to project schedules and funding, the addition of new projects, and deletion of projects that are complete. The document lists projects in categories according to work phase with projects in design listed first, followed by projects in advertisement, construction, and closeout. The update also includes Public Works support services for Tacoma Rail projects, Neighborhood and Community Services projects, Community and Economic Development projects, and others.

This project list is a result of the residents of Tacoma approving the Street Initiatives (Proposition No. 3 and Transportation Benefit District Proposition A) in November 2015 to fund additional maintenance and improvements to transportation infrastructure. The project funding sources include Propositions A and No. 3, other City funds, grants, gas tax, and City utility funds. Several of the projects are currently funded for design only with construction funding sources to be determined.

Please note this is a planning document that is subject to change as new funding becomes available and as progress is made on capital projects, whether it be in design and/or construction. SUMMARY AND PURPOSE:

A resolution consolidating and clarifying motions directing certain Charter Review Committee recommendations and proposed Council Member Charter amendments through various policy development processes for further study and evaluation.

COUNCIL SPONSORS:

Mayor Victoria Woodards

BACKGROUND:

Over the last couple months during discussions on the Charter Review Committee recommendations there have been several items that the Council has indicated an interest in addressing through other processes rather than a Charter amendment. This resolution records and clarifies motions made at the Council meeting on July 9, 2024, directing recommendations through other policy development processes for additional study and evaluation.

Below are the recommendations directed to other processes. This resolution will define which other process these conversations would fall under and provide clarification to items directed broadly to undefined processes.

3 - Referendum

This item was referred to the Government Performance and Finance Committee for additional study and evaluation.

5 - Charter Review

This item was referred to an alternative process for additional study and evaluation during the July 9, 2024, Council Meeting. This item will be addressed by the City Council through Committee of the Whole. Ensuring our volunteers receive training and education and are given the resources and time to complete a thorough review will enhance support for decision making for future Charter reviews. This additional time will allow them to do fiscal and legal analysis to better understand the impacts of implementation, and work more closely with the City Council to understand the issues facing the City. This change can be accomplished through legislation, and it will give us the flexibility to align the process with the needs of our community. The first Committee of the Whole to begin the review of this will commence in 2024.

6 - Neighborhood Council

This item was referred to an alternative process, the 5-year Neighborhood Council Review, which is currently underway in 2024 by Neighborhood and Community Services as required by Tacoma Municipal Code Section 1.45.090 "Review and revision". This review would bring recommended changes to the Council for consideration in 2024.

8 – Policing Accountability

This item was referred to an alternative process for additional study and evaluation during the July 9, 2024, Council Meeting. This item will be addressed by the Council through their liaison to the Community's Police Advisory Committee (CPAC) in partnership with the committee. We understand and support the critical importance and intense public interest in police accountability and the public's demand for transparency and justice and are committed to taking action to bring sustainable oversight practices to Tacoma. We as a council believe that addressing this complex issue requires more ongoing, meaningful dialogue and collaboration with CPAC, who have been doing vital work on this topic and must be included in the solutions moving forward. Changes may need to be bargained per state law and taking the time to work together through good faith negotiations and have difficult conversations with CPAC and Local 6 will allow for sustainable accountability. The City Council is committed to bringing forward a bargainable and sustainable policing accountability solution with Local 6 before the end of 2025.

9B – Climate Commission

This item was referred to the Infrastructure, Planning, and Sustainability Committee for additional study and evaluation. The Council shares the Charter Review Commission's view that "the city needs to effectively track and hold accountable its commitments to sustainability and climate goals." The IPS Committee is asked to:

- a) review how a Climate Commission, or otherwise named, might enhance or replace the work of the existing Sustainable Tacoma Commission, and how that commission might be made up;
- b) review establishing a carbon budget, as set forth in the Climate Action Plan and recommended by the Charter Review Commission;
- c) review other ways to empower and accelerate the goals of the Climate Action Plan, including possible code changes, to reach the City's goal of net zero emissions by 2050.

11 - Landmarks Preservation Commission

This item was referred to the Infrastructure, Planning, and Sustainability Committee for additional study and evaluation.

19 - Ranked-Choice Voting

This item was referred to the Government Performance and Finance Committee for additional study and evaluation.

20 - Campaign Finance

This item was referred to the Government Performance and Finance Committee for additional study and evaluation.

C3B - TPU Board Member Stipends

This item was referred to the Government Performance and Finance Committee for additional study and evaluation.

C5 – Initiative Fiscal Notes

This item was referred to the Government Performance and Finance Council Committee for additional study and evaluation. Additional study will evaluate how fiscal notes could be developed for initiatives brought forward by the community on a ballot. This work of the committee will explore a requirement that the City create a process to develop a cost assessment of the initiative language and its impact to the city. This information would then be available to the community through the City's web page.

X – Caste Discrimination

A motion was made to direct the City Manager to include review of caste discrimination for possible inclusion in the City's Code. This item was an ancillary consideration by the Charter Review Committee and a new item that was not included in the recommendations reviewed by the City Council prior to the July 9, 2024, meeting. This item was referred to a Council standing committee as determined by the City Manager and work will be reviewed by the Community Vitality and Safety Committee.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT/ CUSTOMER RESEARCH:

The City Council has had several discussions over the last two months on which amendments could be addressed through other pathways other than a change to the City Charter. During the July 9, 2024, meeting motions were made to direct certain recommendations to other pathways.

2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES:

Equity and Accessibility:

Under the compressed timeline the City Council was not able to fully address all of the Charter recommendations that were considered. By referring them to other processes this will allow them to continue developing the recommendations and may lead to adoption of new recommendations in the future. Many of the recommendations address specific discrimination language, accessibility to serve in public roles, and large programs or policies like the Neighborhood Councils and police accountability. Continued refinement of these recommendations will better address the diverse needs of our community and ensure that equity remains top of mind during the conversations.

Civic Engagement: *Equity Index Score*: Moderate Opportunity

Increase the percentage of residents who believe they are able to have a positive impact on the community and express trust in the public institutions in Tacoma.

Explain how your legislation will affect the selected indicator(s).

While not all items were considered for the ballot at this time, continued conversation and refinement gives the community more opportunity to engage in the conversation and assist the City Council in refining their recommendations on several important topics. This engagement will improve trust between the Council and the Community and show they can have a positive impact on their community.

EVALUATION AND FOLLOW UP:

To ensure accountability and public engagement in the continued evaluation of these items, the City Council will report out at public meetings as these items continue to be developed on a regular basis. By the end of 2024 at the latest each Committee will report on their work and then quarterly beginning in 2025 until related recommendations are forwarded to the full City Council for adoption or tabled indefinitely. Should committee work plans prohibit addressing these items in a timely manner, the Council may shift them between committees.

STAFF/SPONSOR RECOMMENDATION:

We recommend adoption of this resolution which consolidates items that were sent to other processes at the July 9, 2024, Council Meeting by motion and clarifies which process they will be addressed by.

FISCAL IMPACT:
