ITEMS OF INTEREST

- 1. Public Works Director Jeffrey Jenkins provides the attached **July 2025 Capital Projects Planning Memorandum**.
- 2. Tacoma Interim Police Chief Jackson provides the attached **Weekly Crime Report**.
- 3. Summer Late Nights: Summer Late Nights began on Monday, June 23, 2025, at 10 locations across Tacoma. Programming will run through Friday, August 29, 2025. The ten-week drop-in program offers safe spaces for middle and high school students to hang out and receive dinner every weeknight. Local providers are contracted by the Tacoma Parks Foundation to offer a variety of engaging activities each week including open gym, art, and music activities. Over 1,500 young people from Tacoma are expected to participate with over 15,000 drop-in visits anticipated. - 4. <u>City-funded Temporary and Emergency Shelter Performance</u>: The City posts weekly information about its Temporary and Emergency Shelter locations including current census, number of available beds, and exits to housing. This information can be found at: https://cms.tacoma.gov/ncs/weeklydataupdate.pdf and is updated weekly.
- 5. Encampment Outreach: For the week of July 21-25, 2025, the HEAL team visited 27 locations. This resulted in 63 (36 new, and 27 repeat) individuals contacted and referred to community services; 4 individuals were placed in shelter. This information can be found at: HEAL Team Engagement Dashboard | Tacoma Open Data.
- 6. <u>Tacoma Rescue Mission Men's Expansion Project:</u> Tacoma Rescue Mission (TRM) has begun to prepare for their capital project to expand the single men's wing shelter at their downtown location. TRM has already began part of the project to improve their current facility and site preparation for expansion. TRM has scheduled to **break ground on September 6th, 2025**, the for expansion part of their work and expect to **finish with the total project in Summer of 2026**.

- 7. <u>HEAL's New Staffing Schedule</u>: Effective Monday, August 14th, the *Homeless Engagement Alternatives Liaison* (HEAL) Team will be **shifting from four to five days a week of outreach** throughout the City of Tacoma. This new schedule benefits the City by reacting to the shutdown of multiple shelters within Tacoma.
 - This schedule will also enable the HEAL Team to expand the outreach needs of the City and reach those in need of HEAL support. The team will continue to connect individuals experiencing homelessness with resources, shelter, and other vital services. They also will continue to address concerns from citizens and business owners related to homelessness and coordinate with other city departments and service providers.
- 8. <u>Brotherhood RISE, Freedom Project, Shelter Standdown:</u> The micro shelter site (23rd and MLK Jr Way), operated by Brotherhood RISE, is currently preparing to standdown. Since opening in June 2023, the shelter has served 53 individuals, with 36 of the clients have confirmed being connected to permanent housing.
 - On July 28, 2025, there were 5 residents at the site and every person is currently working with case management. Neighborhood and Community Services has been meeting with Brotherhood RISE weekly to assess operational needs and will continue to support the shelter during this transition. The City is committed to ensuring that every resident has the option to transition to the new location or has an alternative shelter location should they wish by or before July 31, 2025. Neighborhood and Community Services has meet with Brotherhood RISE weekly to assess operational needs and will work with Public Works on decommission of the site starting in August.



The Public Works Department is pleased to provide the attached update to our capital projects planning document. The purpose of this document is to provide additional information regarding funding, costs, and schedules for active capital projects within Public Works. Updates include changes to project schedules and funding, the addition of new projects, and deletion of projects that are complete. The document lists projects in categories according to work phase with projects in design listed first, followed by projects in advertisement, construction, and closeout. The update also includes Public Works support services for Tacoma Rail projects, Neighborhood and Community Services projects, Community and Economic Development projects, and others.

This project list is a result of the residents of Tacoma approving the Street Initiatives (Proposition No. 3 and Transportation Benefit District Proposition A) in November 2015 to fund additional maintenance and improvements to transportation infrastructure. The project funding sources include Propositions A and No. 3, other City funds, grants, gas tax, and City utility funds. Several of the projects are currently funded for design only with construction funding sources to be determined.

Please note this is a planning document that is subject to change as new funding becomes available and as progress is made on capital projects, whether it be in design and/or construction. 



On behalf of the Tacoma City Council, we're writing to express our strong support for the proposed federal legislation to amend the Puyallup Tribe of Indians Settlement Act of 1989.

As a party to the original Settlement Agreement, Tacoma has shared a longstanding and meaningful relationship with the Puyallup Tribe. One grounded in mutual respect, partnership, and a shared commitment to the future of our region. This legislation is an important and timely step that honors that legacy.

The proposed amendment would allow the Puyallup Tribe to directly manage and invest the \$22 million Permanent Trust Fund established under the original Act. When the Act was first passed, federal law didn't yet provide a way for tribes to manage their own trust funds. That changed with the American Indian Trust Fund Management Reform Act of 1994, and this legislation would simply bring the Settlement into alignment with those reforms.

The Puyallup Tribe has proven time and again its ability to lead with vision and care both for its members but for the broader community. From economic development to environmental stewardship to cultural investment, the Tribe has shown what responsible, forward-looking governance looks like. This amendment would enable the Tribe to continue that leadership by creating an endowment to support education, health, social services, and other community priorities.

While the original Trust Fund Board was established with good intentions, the realities of time, cost, and changing economic conditions have made it harder for the fund to fully deliver on its promise. The proposal before you offers a practical, modern solution. One that reflects the trust the Tribe has earned through decades of partnership and accountability.

We are proud to stand with the Puyallup Tribe in support of this legislation, and we're grateful for your continued leadership on issues that matter to Tribal Nations and the communities they serve.

Thank you for your attention to this important matter. We look forward to staying in close communication with your office on behalf of the people of Tacoma.

I ask for your support for a Council Contingency Fund expenditure of \$15,000 for a "Grit of Destiny: City of Tacoma" documentary to showcase the cultures, histories, and aspirations of Tacoma.

LEGISLATIVE INTENT:

Tacoma is more than a city—it's a living mosaic of cultures, histories, and aspirations. Across its neighborhoods, from the Eastside to the waterfront, the people of Tacoma are writing a powerful story of identity, resilience, and transformation. As Tacoma nears its 150th anniversary, it stands as a city defined by resilience, creativity, and a deep sense of purpose. "Grit of Destiny" is a documentary that chronicles Tacoma's journey—from its industrial roots to its rise as a diverse, culturally rich, and forward-looking city. This film will demonstrate that Tacoma is a viable location for film production and the contractor aims to use it to attract national and international creative producers to Tacoma.

This resolution directs the City Manager to negotiate a contract with Syed K Jamal, or an affiliated business, for this project. The contractor will create a documentary to spotlight real voices—artists, elders, small business owners, students, and community leaders, capturing the energy and diversity that make Tacoma thrive. Through their stories and lived experiences, this documentary will explore how the city is evolving from the ground up. A centerpiece of the story will be the inaugural *Festival of Light* at the Eastside Community Center, a vibrant celebration of intercultural unity, creative expression, and community leadership. The event represents Tacoma's emerging role as a city that leads with both soul and substance while embracing global cultures. The documentary will be presented both online and during a screening, organized by the contractor.

Syed K Jamal, as the contractor, will credit the City of Tacoma in all promotional materials related to the funded project. Where possible, the City of Tacoma logo should be used. The contractor, as author of the Artwork, shall retain all copyrights to the Artwork, provided that the contractor grants the City perpetual irrevocable license to reproduce, distribute, publicly perform, display and create derivative works of the work, but only for noncommercial education, public information, and other governmental purposes. Deliverables should be complete by end of year 2026.

FUNDING REQUESTED: \$ 15,000

DESIRED RESOLUTION DATE: August 19, 2025

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT/ (CUSTOMER RESEARCH):

Council Members have received this request from Syed K Jamal. The contractor will request community organizations such as the Chamber of Commerce, APCC, Visit Pierce County, Travel Tacoma, Park Tacoma and others to showcase it on their channels and social media. Because the contractor's goal is to attract national and international creative producers to Tacoma, this film could become a part of Tacoma's visual presentation at events like WAVES in India, Cannes in France, and film markets across several regions in Europe and Asia.

2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES:

Equity and Accessibility:

Tacoma is a vibrant and culturally diverse City, with approximately 45% of it's population being BIPOC or two and more races. Local history records and archives can be an important tool for preserving and celebrating community identity. However, a closer examination reveals that historic preservation can have a complex and multifaceted relationship with racial justice. Preservation efforts can perpetuate racial inequality by prioritizing the histories and cultural heritage of dominant groups, while erasing or marginalizing the experiences of communities of color. On the other hand, preservation can also be a powerful tool for promoting racial justice, by providing a platform for marginalized voices and stories to be heard and celebrated.

Economy/Workforce: *Equity Index Score*: Moderate Opportunity Increase positive public perception related to the Tacoma economy.

Civic Engagement: *Equity Index Score*: Moderate Opportunity

Representation at public meetings will reflect the diversity of the Tacoma community Increase the percentage of residents who believe they are able to have a positive impact on the community and express trust in the public institutions in Tacoma.
