- 7. Inclement Weather Update: For the 2023 2024 cold weather inclement weather season, the City of Tacoma will partner with funded shelter providers to expand shelter bed capacity. Similar to the City's approach during the 2022 2023 cold weather season, the City will be working to add seasonal beds that will be available throughout Winter and early Spring. Additionally, the City will also partner with providers to increase shelter capacity specifically during acute cold weather events (when the forecast is for 35 degrees with wind/rain or 32 degrees and colder). - 8. Encampment Outreach: The City's Homeless Engagement and Alternatives Liaison Team (formerly the Homeless Outreach Team) performs encampment outreach throughout the week to provide individuals opportunities to connect to shelter, behavioral health, substance use, and employment services. For the week of October 9 13, 2023, staff visited twenty one locations. This resulted in twenty two individuals being contacted and referred to community services and ten individuals accepting shelter.
- 9. <u>City-funded Temporary and Emergency Shelter Performance</u>: The City posts weekly information about its Temporary and Emergency Shelter locations including current census, number of available beds, and exits to housing. - 10. <u>Aspen Court Transition</u>: **Aspen Court (8620 South Hosmer)**, operated by Low Income Housing Institute (LIHI), began the process of transitioning from shelter to permanent supportive housing August 1, 2023. LIHI is working with the current residents to transition out of the Aspen Court and into permanent housing or other temporary solutions by December 31, 2023. **After this date, LIHI will begin renovation work on the building to convert the building from use as an Emergency Shelter to Permanent Supportive Housing**. Since opening in December 2021, LIHI has served 253 individuals, with 85 of the clients having been connected to permanent housing. **In August 2023, there were 95 residents at the site, as of this week there are 75 residents on site; which is a decrease of two residents since the last report on October 12, 2023. LIHI has increased Case Management and Temporary Financial Assistance during this period and will bring in additional supportive services to help with the transition. Neighborhood and Community Services continues to meet with LIHI weekly to assess operational needs and will be continuing to support LIHI during this transition.**

SUBJECT: September 2023 Neighborhood Council Liaison Report

#### **SUMMARY:**

The purpose of this memo is to provide a summary of topics and concerns discussed at the eight neighborhood councils and the Community Council of Tacoma during the month of April 2023. These items have been identified by the City Manager's Office liaison to each council as important or useful to bring to the City Council and City Manager's attention.

#### **TOPICS and CONCERNS:**

#### **Central Tacoma Neighborhood Council:**

The Central Tacoma Neighborhood Council met on September 7. City Council candidate, Chris Van Vetchen attended this meeting and presented on his candidacy and platform. Jamika Scott, another candidate is slated to attend the next meeting. The council requested updates on street projects and received updates from Tacoma Public Library, the City Manager's Office, and Metro Parks. There was a request for a response concerning the main library closure for the next 6 months due to construction and the absence of a temporary branch in the interim. No councilmembers attended this meeting.

#### **East Side Neighborhood Council:**

The East Side Neighborhood Council (ENACT) met virtually on September 18 and 16 people attended. The ENACT Safety Committee noted that the curb painting had made the community feel safer and that it was easier for folks to cross the roads. TPU provided an overview of the status of Westrock, and Public Works discussed a progress on a variety of projects and grants. ENACT also received an update on the participatory budgeting process and residents flagged that some people are upset that a project for Lincoln High School was included in the options, noting that they felt the project does not have community-wide benefit. Residents also flagged concerns regarding debris from vehicle accidents and claimed that the debris is not removed properly. No councilmembers attended this meeting.

#### **New Tacoma Neighborhood Council:**

The New Tacoma Neighborhood Council met on September 13. The council received liaison reports from the City Manager's Office, Sound Transit, and the Tacoma Public Library. The council also discussed possibilities for future meeting locations and ways to increase community outreach as well as increase attendance on a regular basis.

#### **Northeast Tacoma Neighborhood Council:**

The Northeast Tacoma Neighborhood Council met on September 21. The council received two presentations at this meeting. The first came from Christian Montemayor, Senior Patrol Leader, of the Boy Scouts of America Troop 398. He spoke about the Eagle Scout Project Proposal for the Northeast Tacoma Healthy Kids Coalition. The second presentation came from Tacoma Public Utilities (TPU) and focused on the Impact of the WestRock Closure on TPU. Liaisons from Tacoma Police Department, Tacoma Public Utilities, Tacoma Public Library, and Port of Tacoma

were in attendance and provided reports. Councilmember Rumbaugh was also in attendance and interacted with questions from attendees.

#### **North End Neighborhood Council:**

The North End Neighborhood Council (NENC) met on September 11. The NENC continues to have a virtual and in-person option for attendance and about 25 people attended in total. A community member presented information about the proposed local historical district moratorium and shared copies of the City's mailing flyer, encouraging residents to attend the hearing and rebuff the moratorium. Another community member expressed a concern that they believe the city denied a recent historic district request because the neighborhood is more than 51 percent white. A separate community member shared that he has created an advocacy group to support expanding Tacoma's tree canopy and was collecting signatures for a petition requesting City Council action on a variety of tree canopy issues. The Tacoma Public Library presented on Tacoma Reads and Speaker Laurie Jinkins provided a report on the legislative session. Speaker Jinkins discussed work on housing, workforce development, reproductive and gender affirming care, behavioral health care, and climate action. Councilmember Hines was in attendance.

#### **South End Neighborhood Council:**

The South End Neighborhood council met virtually on September 11. 13 residents were in attendance. No council members were in attendance. Only the City Manager's Office (CMO) liaison was present, but Neighborhood and Community Services (NCS) sent in reports about homeless shelters and homeless outreach. Residents raised and addressed a variety of concerns. Specifically, the issue of gang graffiti, encampments near buildings, parking of RVs, and cleanup of buildings that burned in the area. Status updates were also provided for transit expansion in the area, Blueberry Park restoration, PicturePacAve, the green space project, and the Tacoma Tree Foundation. No councilmembers were in attendance.




