**Dear Mayor and Council Members:**

### **ITEMS OF INTEREST**

1. Mayor Victoria Woodards provides the attached **Council Action Memorandum** for a Resolution setting the **2023 Council Member appointments to various committees, boards, and commissions**.
2. City Manager Elizabeth Pauli provides the attached **memorandum in response to the City Council's Resolution No. 40889, adopted on December 14, 2021, extending the operation of the Transit-Oriented Development Advisory Group (TODAG) through the end of 2022, and requesting the City Manager develop recommendations for the potential continuation of TODAG in 2023 and beyond**. This memo communicates TODAG's recommendations to the City Manager concerning the "new TODAG," and the City Manager's recommendations to the City Council.
3. On January 10, 2023, the City Council will consider a resolution to set a public hearing on the **Infrastructure, Planning, and Sustainability (IPS) Committee's recommendations regarding a potential moratorium within the South Tacoma Groundwater Protection District (STGPD)**. In support of the City Council's consideration, **Planning and Development Services staff will be presenting a summary of the IPS Committee's process and recommendations. The attached letter from Council Member Kristina Walker, Chair of the IPS Committee, provides the background on the Committee's deliberations and recommendations to modify the Planning Commission's proposed moratorium**. 4. The **City of Tacoma was recently selected to receive the Planning Award for its Vision Zero Action Plan from the Institute of Transportation Engineers (ITE WA) Washington**. ITE WA State Section celebrated their first annual project awards selection with five award categories: Complete Streets, Transportation Systems Management and Operations, Safety, Planning, and Traffic Engineering. Awards were given to organizations that demonstrated exceptional project work to develop an innovative and multi-faceted program that will have a significant effect on transportation.

6. Police Chief Avery Moore provides the attached **Citywide Year End Crime Briefing for 2021 – 2022**.
7. Warming Center Update: For the 2022-2023 winter weather season, the City of Tacoma has partnered with funded shelter providers to ensure that unsheltered individuals have access to indoor shelter options. These efforts have expanded the City's shelter capacity by 145 beds.
  - **The Rescue Mission** will operate an inclement weather shelter at **Holy Rosary Church** until the end of March 2023, this shelter provides 50 beds; anyone wishing to access these beds should go to the main Rescue Mission campus.
  - **The Rescue Mission (425 South Tacoma Way) and Catholic Community Services' Nativity House** (702 S. 14<sup>th</sup> Street) will be providing overflow shelter beds for a total of up to 75 individuals during acute inclement weather events (when the forecast is for 35 degrees with wind/rain or 32 degrees and colder).
  - **Life Enrichment Group (415 S. 13<sup>th</sup> Street)** will be offering 20 overflow beds for young adults 18-24 years of age. In the event of acute inclement weather.
  - **Lighthouse Activity Center (5016 'A' Street)** in the event of acute inclement weather, will be open during the day from 8:30 AM – 5:30 PM for all community members. 8. City-funded Temporary and Emergency Shelter Performance: The City posts weekly information about its Temporary and Emergency Shelter locations including current census, number of available beds and exits to housing. This information can be found at: [https://www.cityoftacoma.org/UserFiles/Servers/Server\\_6/File/cms/NCS/City%20Authorized%20Emergency%20Shelter%20Sites/Weeklydataupdate.pdf](https://www.cityoftacoma.org/UserFiles/Servers/Server_6/File/cms/NCS/City%20Authorized%20Emergency%20Shelter%20Sites/Weeklydataupdate.pdf) and is updated weekly.
9. Encampment Outreach: The City's Homeless Engagement and Alternatives Liaison (HEAL) Team (formerly the Homeless Outreach Team) performs encampment outreach throughout the week to provide individuals opportunities to connect to shelter, behavioral health, substance use and employment services. **For the week of December 27 - 30, 2022, staff visited six locations. This resulted in twenty – nine individuals being contacted and four individuals accepting resources.**
10. Senior Meal Delivery: Access to healthy meals and social and emotional support are important to our senior population. The City's contracted partner ensured in person, pickup, and delivery of **197 meals for the week of December 27 - 30, 2022. Lunches provided are available to Tacoma seniors (age 60 years and older) Monday through Friday on a first come - first serve basis, from 12 PM to 12:30 PM.**

**Beginning January 3, 2023, to-go meals will no longer be available, but senior centers will be open to all residents 60 and over from 8 AM to 3 PM Monday through Friday and meals will be available on site.**

On our first agenda item, Joint Municipal Action Committee Chair Elizabeth Bonbright and Vice Chair Council Member Kristina Walker will provide a **progress report from the Joint Municipal Action Committee’s (JMAC) work in 2022 which focused on building a more resilient and anti-racist community.**

On our second agenda item, staff from Public Works, Environmental Services and the Tacoma Pierce County Health Department will present on the **Infrastructure, Planning, and Sustainability’s recommendations regarding the consideration of a moratorium in the South Tacoma Groundwater Protection District (STPGD).**

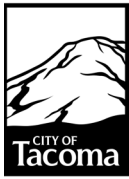

**SUBJECT:** **Status and Future of the Transit-Oriented Development Advisory Group (TODAG)**

This memo is in response to the City Council’s Resolution No. 40889, adopted on December 14, 2021, which extended the operation of the Transit-Oriented Development Advisory Group (TODAG) through the end of 2022 and requested the City Manager to develop recommendations for the potential continuation of TODAG in 2023 and beyond. This memo transmits the TODAG’s recommendations to the City Manager concerning the “new TODAG” and the City Manager’s recommendations to the City Council.

### **Background**

The TODAG is a citizen-based advisory group established by the City Council per [Resolution No. 40303](#) of April 16, 2019, to help inform the design and development of significant transit projects throughout the City including the Dome District, one of the region’s most transit-rich areas. The TODAG was assigned to review and make appropriate recommendations on the following three major projects: Sound Transit's Tacoma Dome Link Extension (TDLE), Pierce Transit's Pacific Avenue Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) project, and the City's Puyallup Avenue Transit/Complete Streets Improvement Project.

Resolution No. 40303 assumed an operating schedule of 24–30 months for the TODAG as a “pilot program,” but did not provide a specific sunset clause. It was not clear if the TODAG shall continue to operate upon the scheduled conclusion in October/November 2021. On December 14, 2021, the City Council adopted [Resolution No. 40889](#) directing the City Manager to take the following actions:

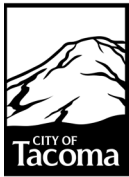
1. Extend the TODAG’s operation through December 31, 2022;
2. Develop recommendations as to whether the TODAG should be made a permanent advisory group, and if so, what its scope of work, membership and other relevant operating parameters should be; and
3. Fill all vacant positions of the TODAG in 2022 with the intent to add diversity and enhance equity in the current membership.

### **TODAG’s Recommendations**

Attached is the Issue Paper, titled “Reshaping and Rescoping the TODAG,” developed by the TODAG and finalized on October 24, 2022. As documented in the Issue Paper, the TODAG evaluated five potential options for how the TODAG could be reshaped and identified the following two options as its primary recommendations to the City Manager:

- Option C – Joint Subcommittee (of Planning and Transportation Commissions).
- Option E – Permanent Advisory Group (City Manager appointed).

The TODAG also recommended that, regardless of whichever "reshaping" option is chosen, the scope of work for the “new TDOAG” should be expanded to citywide TOD projects, its membership should be fairly representative of the community and relevant fields of expertise, and it must be supported with adequate level of funding and staffing resources.



### **City Manager's Report and Recommendations**

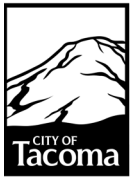
The first action requested by the City Council, per Resolution No. 40303, was to extend the TODAG's operation through the end of 2022. I am happy to report that the TODAG did conduct five bi-monthly meetings in 2022. They reviewed and commented on the TDLE and BRT projects, and developed the attached Issue Paper.

The third action requested by the City Council was to fill all vacant positions of the TODAG in 2022 with the intent to add diversity and enhance equity in the current membership. Staff established initial contacts with numerous individuals interested in filling the vacant seats of "Pacific Avenue Corridor Businesses and/or Residents," "Hilltop," and "East Tacoma," but was not able to solidify commitment from those individuals. Staff found that it was particularly challenging to get new individuals to commit to join the group after it had completed so much of its original charge and with the limited time left before the group's current timetable concluded.

Pertaining to the second request of the City Council to develop recommendations concerning the "new TODAG," I would respectfully submit the following thoughts:

- Upon careful review of the TODAG's Issue Paper, input from the Transportation Commission and Planning Commission, and consultation with some Council Members and my staff, I have come to the conclusion that the concept of increased coordination between the Planning Commission (PC) and the Transportation Commission (TC), through a joint subcommittee (or similar structure), is the most effective, efficient and feasible format for carrying on the duties and responsibilities of the TODAG regarding citywide policy-level issues around transit-oriented development and meeting the needs of the community, the City Council and the accountable City departments.
- The budgetary constraints make it challenging to provide appropriate staffing support for Citizen's Committees, Boards, and Commissions (CBCs). Instead of creating a new CBC, it would be more efficient and feasible to establish a joint subcommittee, task force or work group within the organizational structures of existing CBCs.
- The City Council may direct the PC and the TC to establish the membership, assignments and expected outcomes of the subcommittee. I will make sure appropriate staffing support for the subcommittee is provided.
- A PC/TC joint subcommittee provides a unique opportunity to institutionalize and further enhance the coordination and collaboration between the PC and the TC and between the supporting departments.
- A PC/TC subcommittee provides a platform that can streamline the presentation and outreach process for the agencies working on the TDLE, BRT and Puyallup Avenue Project; for example, they don't need to repeat the same presentations to the PC, the TC and the "new TODAG." The joint subcommittee can also more effectively consolidate comments and recommendations from the PC and the TC on these projects and present them to the City Council in a coordinated and cohesive manner.
- A PC/TC subcommittee can also be assigned to work on other issues of common interest to the PC and the TC, such as the Impact Fees Study, the Transportation Master Plan Update, and the continued development of TOD related policies, programs, and review guidelines. Another great opportunity for the subcommittee to weigh in is the upcoming State mandated 2024 Periodic





Update of the Comprehensive Plan that requires close collaboration between the PC and the TC and among several City departments.

- The subcommittee should be operating on an ad-hoc, as needed basis, and its effectiveness subject to periodic assessments by the PC and the TC.
- With regards to specific transit, infrastructure and planning projects, where the direct, focused input of local residents, businesses, key agencies and partners is needed, I feel that it is most effective to continue utilizing project-specific advisory committees where appropriate. Different than the policy-level scope of the PC/TC subcommittee discussed above, this project-level advisory approach allows the local individuals most directly impacted to be engaged on those particular projects, with a focus on the critical early planning and conceptual project design phases. With support from departments including Planning & Development Services and Public Works, this model has been used successfully in the past, such as with the Amtrak Station Citizen Advisory Committee, and continues to be used for key projects, such as the Pacific Avenue Corridor Subarea Plan (“Picture Pac Ave”).

#### **Next Steps**

If the City Council concurs with my recommendations, we will prepare a resolution for the Council’s consideration within the next few weeks.

Mayor Woodards and Members of the City Council,

The Infrastructure, Planning and Sustainability (IPS) Committee of the City Council has completed our review of the Planning Commission's recommendation to enact a targeted moratorium within the South Tacoma Groundwater Protection District, as directed by the City Council on September 20, 2022. The IPS Committee, on November 30, 2022, approved amendments to the Planning Commission proposal, described below. The Committee recommends that the City Council set a public hearing date to consider the proposed moratorium, as amended by the IPS Committee.

To develop these recommendations, the IPS Committee held three meetings between October 26 and November 30, 2022, to review the Commission's findings as well as to gain additional perspectives from community members. Specifically, on November 16 the Committee conducted a panelist discussion with representatives from the South Tacoma neighborhood as well as representatives from both local, potentially affected businesses, and the Tacoma-Pierce County Chamber of Commerce. This discussion was essential to informing our recommendation and addressing a gap in the Planning Commission process – namely, the lack of business and industry input in the Commission's process.

The amendments to the Planning Commission proposal are as follows:

1. Use Categories: The IPS Committee did not find sufficient risk to groundwater resources from the establishment or expansion of vehicle service and repair or industrial vehicle service and repair uses to warrant a moratorium. Therefore, the moratorium should apply only to metal recycling/auto wrecking and underground storage tanks.
2. Expansion of Existing Uses: The IPS Committee found that a moratorium that is too restrictive on the expansion of existing uses could have the counter effect of prohibiting improvements that provide environmental benefit or reduce the risks and impacts of existing uses. Therefore, the moratorium should allow for reasonable facility and site development that improves environmental outcomes while avoiding the introduction of new risks to the City's groundwater resources.

Finally, the IPS Committee recognizes that a moratorium is only a temporary action, and the ultimate path to address community concerns regarding groundwater protection is to conduct the South Tacoma Groundwater Protection District code review and amendment process in a comprehensive and timely manner. With that in mind, we recommend that the City Council take up the moratorium proposal as soon as possible to ensure that we incur no further delays to the overall code review. Therefore, we support the introduction of a resolution on January 10, 2023 to set a public hearing on the IPS Committee's proposal for February 7, 2023.

In addition, staff has proposed, and we concur with, the scheduling of a staff-led community meeting on February 2, 2023 to provide information on the proposed moratorium, answer community questions, and ensure that community members are aware of their opportunity to provide comments to the City Council.

Please do not hesitate to contact myself, Vice Chair Hines, or staff regarding the IPS Committee's amendments or our committee process.

As Chair, I would like to extend my gratitude to my fellow Committee members, as well as our staff team, for their tremendous support through the IPS Committee process, and to our panelists, Heidi Stephens, Tim Smith, Andrea Reay, and Todd Ward for sharing their perspectives and insights on the Commission's proposal.

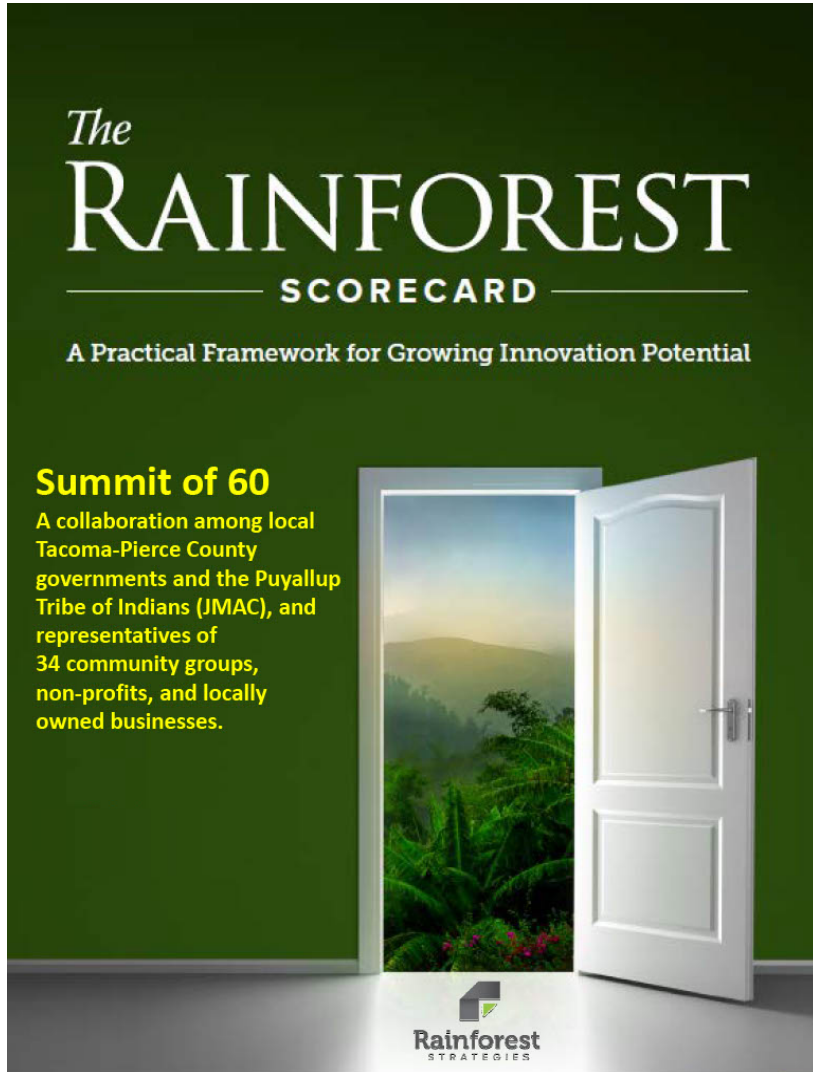

- Vital start-up grants provided by City of Tacoma, Pierce County, and Tacoma Public Schools via ARPA & ESSER funds
- Now in its second year, 4 school sites recently received childcare licenses, which gives parents access to the state subsidy

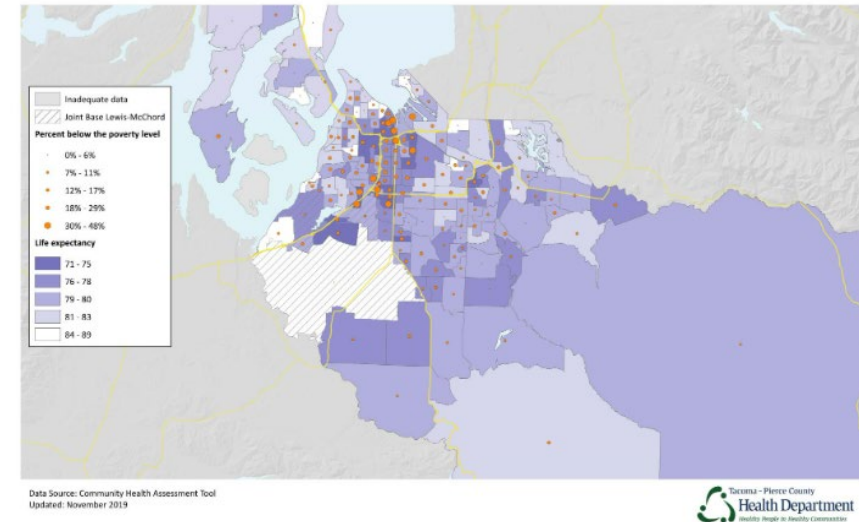




# Equity Action Collaborative

- 125,000 Pierce County residents speak a language other than English at home

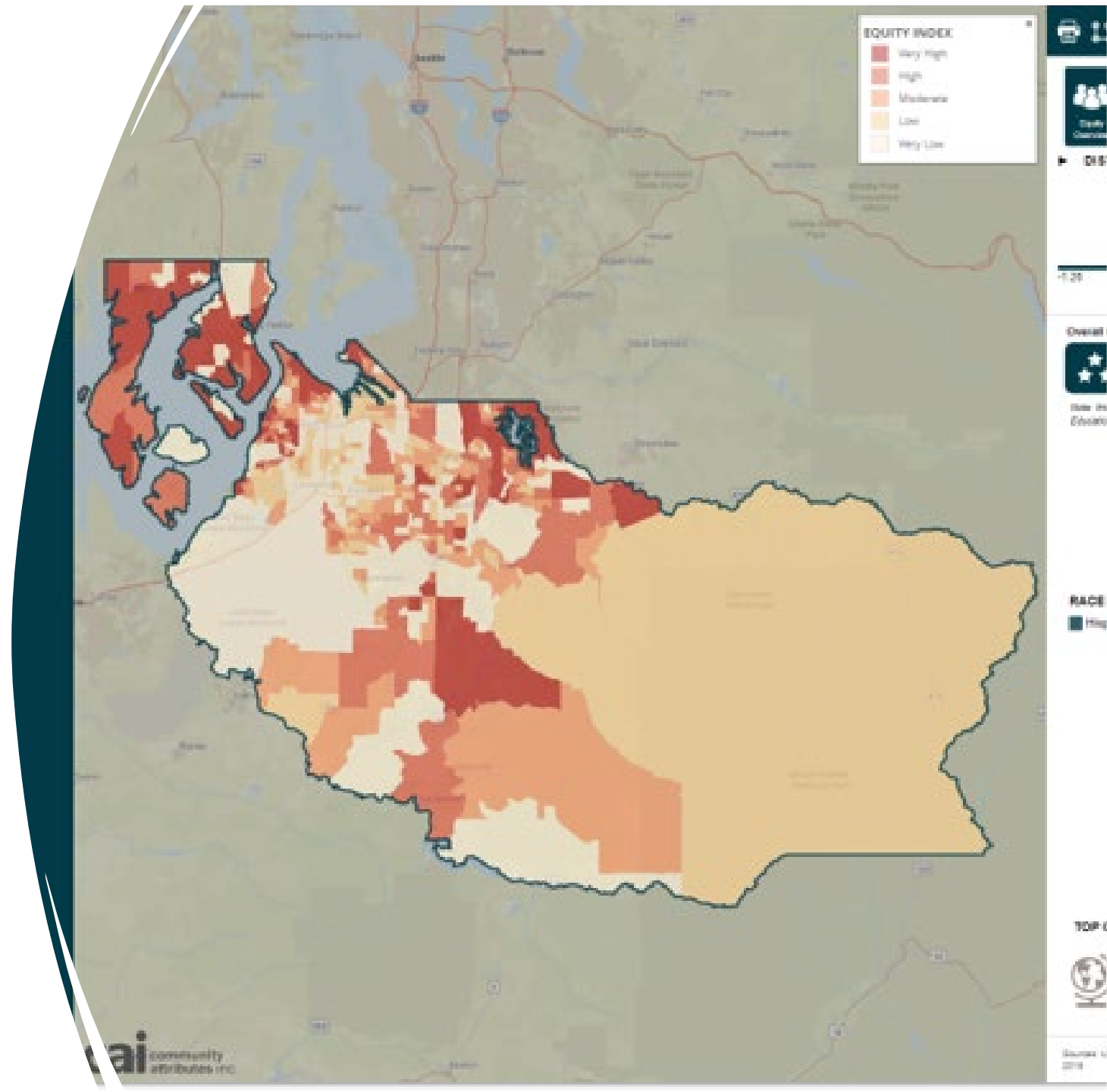
# Anti-Racism Policy

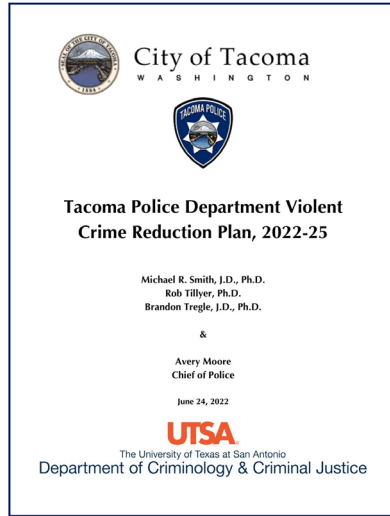


# Ending Homelessness

- Pierce County Council adopted this comprehensive plan in March 2022
- Aims to document the scale of need and design a system to end homelessness in Pierce County
- Goals include:
  - Creating a unified homeless response system, including central decision-making authority of funding and services
  - Expanding the permanent housing system to meet the need



# Enhancing Public Safety



- Tacoma Police Department presented its Violent Crime Reduction Plan
- JMAC members discussed potential alignment of "soft" approaches to public safety that complement commissioned law enforcement efforts
  - Transit ambassadors, park rangers, library social worker, and TPS' new security structure
- Also highlighted the City's Vision Zero work
  - Pierce County adopted Vision Zero in 2022

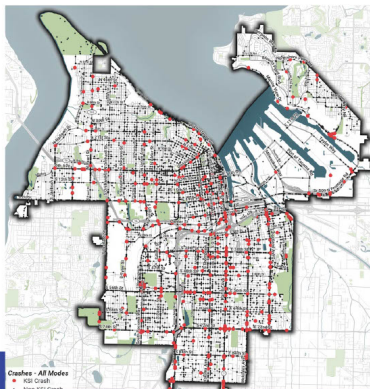


Crash Data

- Sharing best practices and resources via Minority- and Women-Owned Business Enterprise (MWBE programs)

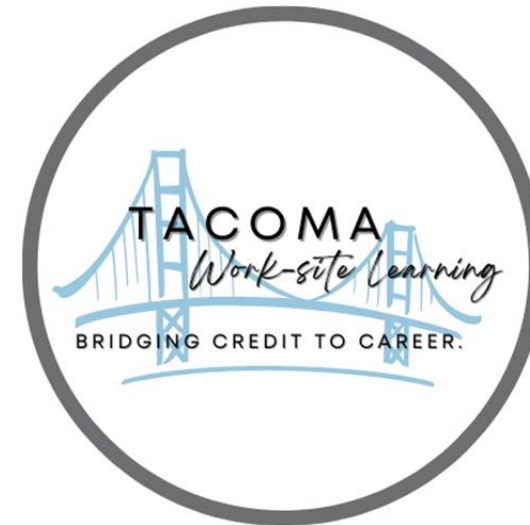
