ITEMS OF INTEREST

2. Planning and Development Services reports that on April 9, 2024, the Tideflats Subarea Plan Draft Environmental Impact Statement (EIS) was released for public review and comment. After significant and ongoing collaborative planning efforts between the City of Tacoma and its partners, including the Puyallup Tribe of Indians, the Port of Tacoma, Pierce County, and City of Fife, the City is seeking input on the Draft EIS to support the Subarea Plan decision-making process. Agencies, Tribes, and community groups are invited to provide comment during the 45-day public comment period ending on May 23, 2024, 5:00 p.m. Comments may be submitted via email, through an online comment portal, or at the public comment meeting on April 25, 2024, 6:00 p.m.

Information on how to participate in the comment period, as well as the Notice of Availability and Draft EIS documents are available on the project homepage at <u>www.cityoftacoma.org/tideflatsplan</u>. The Draft EIS evaluates the range of <u>Alternatives</u> that were recommended by the Steering Committee and approved by the City Council, to provide information on the probable impacts to population/employment and housing, land use, air quality, plants and animals, cultural resources, utilities, and public services. All public comments will be considered during the development of the Subarea Plan and Final EIS. - 5. <u>City-funded Temporary and Emergency Shelter Performance</u>: The City posts weekly information about its Temporary and Emergency Shelter locations including current census, number of available beds, and exits to housing. This information can be found at: <u>https://cityoftacoma.org/UserFiles/Servers/Server_6/File/NCS/weeklydataupdate.pdf</u>.
- 6. <u>Encampment Outreach</u>: The City's Homeless Engagement and Alternatives Liaison Team (formerly the Homeless Outreach Team) performs encampment outreach throughout the week to provide individuals opportunities to connect to shelter, behavioral health, substance use, and employment services. For the week of April 1-5, 2024, staff visited eight locations. This resulted in twenty-nine (eleven new, and eighteen repeat) individuals being contacted and referred to community services. Three individuals accepted shelter.
- 7. Forging Path Community Meeting: Tacoma Rescue Mission (TRM) has been operating this shelter since November 2022 with funding provided by the American Rescue Plan Act and City of Tacoma General Fund. The City is preparing to expand shelter operations to utilize the south side of the property for a micro-shelter site. This expansion will add 66 units to the location that was discussed as part of the initial community conversations.

Neighborhood and Community Services will be hosting an onsite meeting to discuss the expansion and project timeline in mid-April. Mailers have gone out to surrounding properties shortly and the details of the meeting are below:

- Community Meeting Thursday, April 18, 2024, 6:00 p.m. - 7:00 p.m. Forging Path Community 3561 Pacific Avenue, Tacoma, WA 98418
- 8. <u>TEMS 4 Transition</u>: **Tacoma Emergency Micro-Shelter (TEMS) 4 (69th and Procter)**, operated by Low Income Housing Institute (LIHI), is currently preparing to transition to **Forging Path Community at 3561 Pacific Avenue, operated by Tacoma Rescue Mission**. LIHI and TRM will continue to work with the current residents on their stability and housing plans during transition and will assist residents to complete the move to Forging Path Community. Once the transition is complete, the City will decommission the site and the Housing Division will issue a "Request for Proposal," for affordable housing on the property. Since opening in December 2021, LIHI has served 222 individuals, with 74 of the clients having been connected to permanent housing.

On April 8, 2024, there were 78 residents at the site and 45 are currently working with case management. Neighborhood and Community Services continues to meet with LIHI and TRM weekly to assess operational needs and will continue to support LIHI during this transition. The City is committed to ensuring that every resident has the option to transition to the new location or has an alternative shelter location, should they wish, by June 30, 2024.

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- 9. Charter Review Committee Meeting Updates:
 - April 4, 2024: The Charter Review Committee (CRC) discussed the April 2, 2024, City Council Study Session where several members provided an update to the Council on the CRC work and discussed the Council comments regarding prioritization. There was not agreement among the CRC members as to whether they should prioritize the recommendations and plan to revisit the issue of prioritization the week of April 22, 2024. The CRC also expressed interest in grouping several recommendations into a single amendment to reduce the overall number of amendments.

The CRC heard from the Police Accountability Subcommittee who informed the CRC that they would not be moving forward a proposal related to collective bargaining, though they would like to keep a recommendation in the section with ancillary recommendations. They also heard a presentation from the Power of the People Subcommittee related to Neighborhood Councils and voted to move their recommendation forward to be drafted by staff. The CRC reviewed one amendment draft and took a final vote to approve the amendment adding internet as a utility.

- April 8, 2024: The CRC heard the Form of Government Subcommittee presentation on their recommendation, particularly focusing on changes from the previous version. The CRC approved moving the amendment to staff for drafting. The CRC discussed changes to the schedule, including additional Wednesday meetings and the order in which they preferred to discuss the amendments. The CRC reviewed two amendments relating to Tacoma Public Utilities (TPU) and took final votes to approve the amendment modifying the TPU Board and the amendment relating to audit requirements for shared services.
- The next CRC met virtually on April 10, 2024 at 5 p.m., please note the meeting notes will be reflected in the April 25, 2024, Weekly Report. This letter is to submit public comment on the Puget Sound Clean Air Agency's preliminary determination that proposed Order No. 12348 should be approved, subject to the conditions in the proposed Order.

This permit for Darling Ingredients Inc. is to replace rendering equipment that was previously destroyed in a fire. The Tacoma City Council has long heard from community about air quality concerns related to the rendering plant, making its future operation practices of great interest to our constituents. Discussions with eastside and northeast community members about the former plant will quickly bring up memories of air pollution and pungent smells that lowed the quality of life for nearby residents. These air quality issues have historically been especially concerning to McKinley Hill residents, who live in low and very low equity areas of our City just south of Tacoma's tideflats.

While we understand the economic benefits of an accessible rendering plant near our commercial businesses, the City of Tacoma imbeds equity in all policies and seeks to ensure minimal negative side effects from future development in our city. This is of special importance when those impacts could exacerbate historic inequities. Whatever is approved at this point in time will impact generations of Tacomans, their health, and their quality of life. To that end, we urge you to utilize your regulatory authority to require the maximum mitigations allowable under state law when approving the redevelopment of this rendering plant. This is especially important to address the need to reduce smells and pollution and other practices impacting air quality.

It was heartening to see the Agency's proposed Order of Approval contains numerous new conditions that aim to ensure compliance with the applicable regulations. The proposed Order includes a

requirement for the facility to establish a complaint response program, including a public complaint phone line. We encourage any conditions you can place that can strengthen the requirements to be responsive to community concerns when they are reported. The proposed Order also requires periodic inspections for compromises in the integrity of the cooking system and its associated ductwork or in the building envelope, and unrepaired compromises may constitute violations. Additionally, the proposed Order requires periodic testing for emissions of volatile organic compounds, carbon monoxide, nitrogen oxides, particulate matter, sulfur oxides, and hydrogen sulfide. These conditions recognize the need to ensure the rebuilt plant is a better neighbor to Tacoma residents in perpetuity. We ask that you fully retain and consider further enhancing these mitigations.

We appreciate the Puget Sound Clean Air Agency's ongoing work to protect public health, improve neighborhood air quality, and reduce our region's contribution to climate change. Thank you for this opportunity to provide public comment.
