- City-funded Temporary and Emergency Shelter Performance: The City posts weekly
 information about its Temporary and Emergency Shelter locations including current
 census, number of available beds, and exits to housing. Updates are reported weekly,
 and this information can be found at:

- 6. Encampment Outreach: The City's Homeless Engagement and Alternatives Liaison (HEAL)
 Team (formerly the Homeless Outreach Team) performs encampment outreach throughout the
 week to provide individuals opportunities to connect to shelter, behavioral health, substance
 use and employment services. For the week of December 30, 2024 January 3, 2025, staff
 visited 12 locations. This resulted in 27 contacts by the HEAL Team (13 new, and 14
 repeat). Ten individuals were placed in shelter.
- 7. Senior Services Transition Update: In partnership with Metro Parks Tacoma, the City of Tacoma has expanded senior services in Tacoma to more places (four locations vs. two locations), to facilities that are more easily accessible using public transportation options. Beginning January 2, 2025, the following Metro Parks locations are now offering services in partnership with the City of Tacoma:
 - People's Community Center (1602 Martin Luther King Jr. Way, 98405)
 - Eastside Community Center (1721 East 56th Street, 98404)
 - STAR Center (3873 South 66th Street, 98409)
 - Center at Norpoint (4818 Nassau Avenue Northeast, 98422)

Through use of Council Contingency Funds, Lighthouse Activity Center is remaining open through January with lunch, socialization and opportunities to interact with Metro Parks and City staff. Daily attendance at Lighthouse has ranged between 26 and 42 people. During the first week, the City has observed more seniors visiting or trying out Metro Parks' services. City-funded transportation is now transporting only to the Metro Parks locations of Eastside Community Center and People's Community Center.

Metro Parks, Franke Tobey Jones and City of Tacoma staff continue encouraging participation at Metro Parks locations and listening to feedback, and staff anticipates continuing to make adjustments at the Metro Parks facilities throughout the transition period to meet needs expressed by senior participants.



SUMMARY AND PURPOSE:

Enforcement Priorities and Stating the City Council's Support for Full Decriminalization of

these Activities - January 28, 2025

DATE: January 8, 2025

SUMMARY AND PURPOSE:

A resolution directs the City Manager to implement the following:

- 1. That the investigation, arrest, and prosecution of anyone engaging in entheogen-related activities, including but not limited to the planting, cultivating, gathering, transporting, distributing, possession, or using entheogens by adults, should be among the City of Tacoma's lowest law enforcement priorities.
- 2. This Resolution does not:
 - a. Permit driving under the influence of entheogenic plants or fungi;
 - b. Permit the possession or distribution of entheogens in schools or parks;
 - c. Authorize or enable commercial manufacturing or sales of entheogenic plants or fungi;
 - d. Permit conduct that puts public safety at risk or causes a public nuisance that violates the law; or
 - e. Prohibit or discourage the investigation, arrest, or prosecution of crimes in bullets a-d.
- 3. The Council states its support for continued research for alternative treatment modalities and our support for structured medical models. The Council further states its support for the full decriminalization of entheogen-related activities at the federal level.

COUNCIL SPONSORS:

Mayor Woodards, Council Members Bushnell, Diaz, and Scott.

BACKGROUND:

The Sponsor's Recommendation is Based On:

Entheogen is a term that encompasses any living, fresh, dried, or processed plant or fungal material, including teas or powders, that may contain currently scheduled or analog psychoactive indolamines, tryptamines, or phenethylamines, including, but not limited to, psilocybin mushrooms, ayahuasca tea, mescaline, and iboga. A variety of jurisdictions in the United States, including Seattle, Port Townsend, Olympia, and Jefferson County, have supported decriminalization of entheogens, and Colorado, Oregon, and Washington D.C. have decriminalized some or all entheogens through successful ballot initiatives.

Depression, severe anxiety, problematic substance use, post-traumatic stress, end-of-life anxiety, grief, isolation, intergenerational trauma, and other physical and mental conditions are plaguing many communities, and scientific and clinical studies show the benefits of entheogens in treating these conditions. U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) sanctioned clinical trials show positive results that demonstrate the safety and efficacy of psilocybin assisted therapy. The FDA designated psilocybin assisted therapy as a breakthrough therapy for treatment resistant depression in 2018 and major depressive disorder in 2019. Human cultures around the world recognize entheogens as sacred and have used them as part of their cultural, spiritual, and religious practices for generations.



City Council Action Memorandum

Communities face unprecedented mental health crisis, unprecedented suicide rates, especially among veterans and marginalized groups, and a deepening opioid addiction crisis. Tacoma can contribute to removing stigmas through public education and supporting community mental health efforts. Decriminalization of entheogens does not undermine the seriousness of the opioid epidemic and impact of harmful substances on the lives of individuals, families, and communities.

Our 2025 state legislative agenda includes the policy position: *Psilocybin Substances*: The City encourages the legislature to consider decriminalizing psilocybin substances in light of the growing research indicating potential medical uses for the substances and the number of local jurisdictions and states that are decriminalizing the substance.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT/ CUSTOMER RESEARCH:

Community members have brought this request to Tacoma City Council Members. Veterans, advocates, and other Tacoma residents have attended community forums and requested the City Council adopt a resolution like this one.

2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES:

Equity and Accessibility: (Mandatory)

This is the Minority Health Disparity Gap, and we've known about it for a long time. Regarding mental health, Black adults (including those identifying as mixed-race Black) are more likely to have feelings of sadness, hopelessness, and worthlessness than white adults, while Black and mixed-race youth are more likely to attempt suicide than white youth. Veterans returning from combat often experience waves of emotions in response to surviving traumatic events, such as being attacked or seeing others wounded or killed. Some veterans have trouble concentrating, relive traumatic events, or have thoughts of death or suicide. They may also use drugs, drink too much, or have trouble sleeping. For many veterans, these thoughts, feelings, and behaviors are reactions to difficult experiences that fade as they adjust to civilian life. But for some, they could be signs of serious mental health problems².

Civic Engagement: *Equity Index Score*: Moderate Opportunity

I ask for your support for a Council contingency fund expenditure of \$10,000 to support the 76th Annual Golden Gloves Boxing Tournament in Tacoma.

LEGISLATIVE INTENT

Council Contingency Fund Request: I am proposing a Council contingency fund expenditure of \$10,000 to support the 76th Annual Golden Gloves Boxing Tournament, presented by the Tacoma-Pierce Athletic Commission (TAC). This event is the longest-running amateur boxing tournament west of the Mississippi River and helps raise vital support for the TAC's Golden Gloves Boxing program and the Tacoma Boxing Club, located in South Tacoma. The TAC's Golden Gloves program and Tacoma Boxing Club are designed to encourage a positive lifestyle for at-risk youth and help provide low-income athletes across South Tacoma and citywide with access to financial assistance and support for engaging in boxing and athletic activity. The Tacoma Boxing Club offers conditioning exercises and boxing classes after school, five days a week.

- TAC is a non-profit organization dedicated to amateur sports and believes that young people learn important life lessons inside the boxing ring, including how to win graciously and how to accept defeat with the same maturity; being held accountable; what it means to work for something and attain it; to experience the self-empowering benefits of focus and determination; to not give up when the going gets tough; to live life with purpose, keeping their "eyes on the prize" for their future in any of their undertakings; and perhaps the greatest lesson is that of self-respect, which leads to respect for others.
- TAC has assisted many Tacoma and Pierce County athletes in national and international championships, including Olympic Gold Medalist Kay Hall, Boxing Gold Medalists Sugar Ray Seales and Leo Randolph, Bronze Medalist David Lee Armstrong, golfer Mark Sivara, gymnast Roni Barrlos, and track star Aaron Williams. Baseball star Ron Cey and football's Ahmad Rashad (then Bobby Moore) began their careers in Boys and Girls Clubs programs aided by the TAC.

The City of Tacoma's support would be acknowledged through the use of the City logo on advertising and promotion materials, as well as public recognition during the event. The event will not only raise awareness and support for helping low-income athletes and at-risk youth, but it is also expected to draw hundreds of spectators, athletes, and coaches from the surrounding region, generating income

for hotels, restaurants, and other local businesses. The publicity generated by the event can also serve as a powerful marketing tool for Tacoma, attracting further tourism and investment opportunities. In addition, this event will help strengthen Tacoma's reputation as an inclusive, vibrant, sportsminded community.

FUNDING REQUESTED: \$10,000

DESIRED RESOLUTION DATE: January 21, 2025

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

The 76th Annual Golden Gloves Boxing Tournament is being promoted across Tacoma and past tournaments have been beloved community events. All proceeds from the event go to help TAC support local athletes in need and the Tacoma Boxing Club's ability to assist low-income athletes.

2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES

Equity and Accessibility: This event will help expand TAC and the Tacoma Boxing Club's ability to assist Tacoma athletes, enabling more low income and at-risk youth from South Tacoma and across the city to reap the rewards of participating in boxing and sports. Through the Golden Gloves program and Tacoma Boxing Club, young people gain opportunities to meet and work with great role models who authentically care about them inside and outside of the gym. In addition, this work helps foster youth violence prevention by providing mentally and physically rewarding alternatives to gang activity, as well as a place in a community that encourages positive behavior and hard work at school. In addition, sports help young people learn vital life skills, including how to manage stress, set goals, and navigate multitasking and problem-solving. Physical activity also promotes well-being and health, which in turn improve sleep quality, memory skills, and mood.
