RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY:

Neighborhood and Community Services (NCS) requests approval for the award of 11 contracts to multiple agencies as listed in Appendix A for contracts providing community and human services for a cumulative total amount of \$14,576,540.18, plus applicable taxes. The total contracted amounts represent 11 contracted agencies operating 27 programs. These contracts are budgeted from the Mental Health & Substance Use Disorder (MHSUD) sales tax, General Fund, and the Credible Messenger grant and include a combination of programs that both competed and did not compete for funding.

STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

- Strengthen and support a safe city with healthy residents.
- Ensure all Tacoma residents are valued and have access to resources to meet their needs.
- Encourage thriving residents with abundant opportunities for life-long learning.

BACKGROUND:

NCS contracts with local providers who align with Tacoma 2025, Council Priorities, and the Department Goals to provide resources to various populations in the community.

Due to factors such as ongoing projects/commitments, the critical nature of services, alignment with Council priorities, and/or programs that recently competed for funding, NCS did not require currently funded programs in the following areas to compete for 2023-2024 funding:

- City initiatives and inter-local agreements (Crystal Judson Family Justice Center, Health Department, Mental Health Co-Responder, TACID)
- Food Insecurity
- Senior Centers
- Shelters, including set-aside funding for temporary and inclement weather shelter operations
- Youth and Young Adult Violence Reduction (specifically programs that were funded as part of a recent funding process)

All other programs were required to apply for funding for the 2023-2024 biennium. An RFP for 2023-2024 Mental Health and Substance Use Disorder (MHSUD) funding (NC22-0106F) was conducted in Q2 and Q3 of 2022 (details in the Competitive Solicitation section below). An RFP for 2023-2024 General Fund contracts (NC22-0333F) was released on September 29, 2022, and closed on November 1, 2022. Contracts from NC22-0333F will be awarded and completed in Q1 of 2023.

ISSUE: NCS utilizes service providers in the community to provide human services related to areas such as homelessness, housing, domestic violence, education, seniors, youth development, and youth and young adult violence reduction. As stated above, the process for awarding contract funding happens via both competitive funding processes and directly negotiated contracts. Awarding and executing contracts prior to the start of the year is critical for ensuring that services continue to be provided in the community without a gap in services.

ALTERNATIVES: City Council may request Staff and the Human Services Commission conduct a secondary review of the recommendations or provide further guidance on funding allocations, should the proposed funding recommendations not be approved. This may result in a delay in services to start 2023.

COMPETITIVE SOLICITATION:

Request for Proposals Specification No. NC22-0106F was opened July 5, 2022. Seven hundred and thirty-two organizations were invited to bid, in addition to normal advertising of the project. Forty-eight submittals were received. Programs submitted applications answering questions on how their programs met the critical needs of the community, cultural responsiveness, effective practices, system impact, accessibility, and how the program aligns with Tacoma 2025, Council Priorities, and Department Goals.

The Human Services Commission (HSC) reviewed all eligible applications under RFP NC22-0106F and presented funding recommendations based on whether programs are appropriately aligned with Tacoma 2025, Council Priorities, and Department Goals. All funding recommendations are contingent on City Council approval of the 2023--2024 budget and City Council's approval of NCS contracts over \$500K. Funding was recommended for programs that support complementary services, health and health care, housing, homeless prevention, youth development, and youth and young adult violence reduction.


Programs were invited to participate in virtual oral presentations in front of the HSC. The HSC rated each program individually and during a consensus meeting made recommendations for funding based on each program's merits and ability to achieve funding priorities (which included complementary services, health and health care, homelessness, housing services, youth and young adult violence reduction, and youth development. HSC raters received equity training, reliability training, and resource information to assist with making data informed decisions).


NCS presented the funding recommendations for NC22-0106F at the September 8, 2022, Community Vitality & Safety (CVS) Committee meeting. The breakdown of all applicants and their scores are included in the Competitive Solicitation section below. Applicants who were recommended for funding - and whose total agency contract amount for 2023-2024 exceeded \$500K - are included in the table in Appendix A with the "RFP" solicitation method.
