

RESOLUTION NO. 40586

A RESOLUTION relating to Tacoma Creates; authorizing temporary modifications to the Tacoma Creates program and existing Tacoma Creates contracts to respond to the impacts of the COVID-19 emergency on Tacoma's cultural sector.

WHEREAS Tacoma's cultural sector has a significant impact on Tacoma's economy and is particularly challenged by the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, and

WHEREAS the cultural sector will play an important role in bringing the community together when that becomes possible; it is critical to sustain the sector so that it is able to help sustain the community, and

WHEREAS the National Endowment for the Arts, the Washington State Arts Commission, and the City of Seattle and its 4Culture Public Development Authority have all announced economic relief packages that redirect project/programming funding to immediate operational support to sustain the cultural sector, and

WHEREAS the Office of Arts and Cultural Vitality ("OAVC") has prepared a funding proposal that includes immediate short-term support coupled with a plan for recovery to help cultural organizations and workers to stabilize, contribute to social cohesion, and be positioned to assist with recovery, and

WHEREAS OACV is proposing a combination of strategies that redirect existing funding contracts (Tacoma Arts Commission and Tacoma Creates) from programming to immediate operational support and distribute Tacoma Creates



funding to cultural organizations for both short-term response and eventual recovery efforts, and

WHEREAS, in addition, under the proposal, existing Tacoma Arts

Commission contracts with small arts organizations, creative businesses, and
working artists serve to support many freelance artists and creative businesses
that are not captured in Tacoma Creates Funding, and

WHEREAS, though future sales tax collection is anticipated to be impacted by the COVID-19 emergency, Tacoma Creates is currently positioned to immediately infuse up to \$2 million into the local economy with dollars collected to date, and

WHEREAS the inaugural Tacoma Creates funding programs are currently in review process, and a flexible and quick response to disperse this funding is required to mitigate the impact of the COVID-19 emergency on Tacoma's cultural sector, and

WHEREAS the OACV proposal recommends a three-part strategy to provide immediate operational support to engage in efforts related to social cohesion, recovery, and re-imagination in Tacoma's cultural sector, and

WHEREAS the first strategy is to modify existing contracts of the Tacoma

Arts Commission that allow for use of the funding for sustaining operations that

provide public benefit, including appropriate modified reporting requirements, and

WHEREAS the second strategy is to modify existing Tacoma Creates

Expanded Learning contracts that allow for use of the funding for sustaining

operations for teaching artists and cultural sector instructors, including allowing

participation in Kids Camps for First Responders, and which provide public benefit, with appropriate modified reporting requirements, and

WHEREAS the third strategy is to contract with the Greater Tacoma Community Foundation to process up to \$2 million dollars in funding, if available, to Tacoma cultural organizations that are eligible under the established Tacoma Creates criteria and processes, to provide for sustaining operations that provide public benefit, including appropriate reporting requirements; Now, Therefore,

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA:

Section 1. That the City Council finds that cultural sector organizations and independent workers in Tacoma are experiencing severe negative impacts related to the COVID-19 pandemic. Most of the sector's work is based in events and classes, all of which have been cancelled or postponed, creating significant risk of loss of cultural organizations and artists. Individuals in the cultural sector are often self-employed or have additional employment in the service sector, which is also largely shut down. Most Tacoma non-profit cultural organizations operate on thin margins, and most do not have endowments or other safety nets to sustain them. The cultural sector has significant economic impact in the City of Tacoma, and will play an important role in bringing the community together when that becomes possible; therefore, it is critical to sustain the Tacoma cultural sector so it is able to help sustain the Tacoma community overall.

Section 2. That the City Council finds that the three-part strategy proposed by the City's Office of Arts and Cultural Vitality to sustain Tacoma's cultural sector through operational support, which will allow the sector to engage

in efforts related to social cohesion, recovery, and re-imagination, is consistent with the intent, purposes, and regulations of the Tacoma Creates program, will serve an important public purpose, and will provide public benefits commensurate to the proposed expenditures.

Section 3. That the City Council hereby authorizes and approves the modification of existing contracts of the Tacoma Arts Commission to allow for use of the funding for sustaining operations that provide public benefit, with appropriate modified reporting requirements; the modification of existing Tacoma Creates Expanded Learning contracts to allow for use of the funding for sustaining operations for teaching artists and cultural sector instructors that provide public benefit, with appropriate modified reporting requirements; and a contract with the Greater Tacoma Community Foundation to process up to \$2 million dollars in funding, if available, to Tacoma cultural organizations that are eligible under the established Tacoma Creates criteria and processes, to provide for sustaining operations that provide public benefit, including appropriate reporting requirements, all in forms approved by the City Attorney's Office.

Section 4. That the City Manager or designee is hereby authorized to take any additional actions and execute any documents necessary to effectuate this Resolution consistent with its terms.



Section 5. That the City Council finds that this Resolution is necessary, routine, and consistent with Governor Inslee's emergency proclamation issued March 24, 2020, suspending portions of the Open Public Meetings Act for 30 days.
