This webinar was the first in a hopeful series of webinars that allow US and European cities to share ideas and examples to learn from each other and improve programming and may include future engagement opportunities.

For the week of October 21 - 25, 2024, staff visited 22 locations. This resulted in 82 contacts by the HEAL Team (34 new, and 48 repeat). Ten individuals were placed in shelter.

SUMMARY AND PURPOSE

A resolution authorizing a Council contingency fund expenditure of \$20,000 to support an urban wood reuse program assessment and action strategy.

COUNCIL SPONSORS

Deputy Mayor John Hines, Council Member Sarah Rumbaugh, and Council Member Kristina Walker

Council Contingency Fund Request: We ask for your support for a Council contingency fund expenditure of \$20,000 to support the development of an urban wood reuse program assessment and action strategy. This work would help enable the City of Tacoma's Urban Forestry Team to set up the first formal urban wood reuse program within the city. The City would contract the work with Cambium Carbon, a unique and innovative company that evaluates and assists in the creation of local regenerative wood supply chains. With assistance from Cambium Carbon, the City would be able to design a program that diverts wood from the landfill for its highest and best use, as well as integrating wood reuse into a holistic urban forestry management strategy.

In early 2023, the City began a small pilot program that enabled the diversion of waste from hazardous trees within historically underserved communities by coordinating a partnership between the City's on-call tree work contractor and a hyper-local mill. This program has shown a great deal of promise, but expansion requires a more robust understanding of the wood waste stream and biomass processing solutions. With a better understanding of how to expand this work, Tacoma would be well-positioned to navigate tree removal in a way that helps ensure removed trees are kept out of our waste stream.

The specific objectives of the study are designed to evaluate the wood waste stream, engage with key stakeholders, develop an ecosystem map, provide a complete economic and market analysis of biomass processing solutions, and submit a proposed collective action strategy. This work will take an estimated 18 weeks from the official start date to be completed and Environmental Services staff have confirmed capacity to manage the contract.

• The City's Solid Waste Management Division intends to match the Council contingency fund with an additional \$20,000 to cover the full cost of the work, as it aligns with their goals for waste reduction.

This work would help advance key components of the City's Climate Action Plan, Urban Forest Management Plan, and Green Economic Development Strategy.

- The Climate Action Plan notes the need to develop and enhance Tacoma's local circular economy and foster the reuse of materials.¹ Establishing a wood reuse program is also in alignment with Climate Action Plan goals to reduce carbon emissions and increase deconstruction and salvage efforts.
- The Urban Forest Management Plan, adopted by the City Council in 2019, includes several targets and actions related to urban wood reuse, such as: establishing protocols for tree debris management, wood utilization, and wood waste diversion for routine tree maintenance, removals, and storm response, as well as reusing wood waste from high-risk tree removals as biomass, woodworking, firewood, and other uses.²
- Tacoma's Green Economic Development Strategy calls for increasing efforts to create new jobs and tap new markets for work that has environmental benefits.³ The development of an urban wood reuse program assessment and action strategy would help contribute to laying the groundwork for action that helps to advance this strategy.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT/ CUSTOMER RESEARCH

During the two-year public engagement process (2017 through 2019) to develop the City's Urban Forest Management Plan, community members shared a robust concern for trees and climate related goals. While their primary concerns were supporting mature tree protection, there was a recognition that trees, like all living things, one day reach the end of their productive life. When trees need to be removed for public safety or to allow for construction, the community called for the City to put trees to their highest and best use, to continue to hold their embodied carbon and remove downed trees from the wood stream. Deputy Mayor Hines and Council Member Walker have also been in contact with local wood companies regarding their desire to expand programs that support the reuse of wood.

2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES

Equity and Accessibility: This study will be vital for creating the design and partnerships that are needed to launch a wood waste reuse program, which will contribute to improving Tacoma's circular economy, decreasing the wood waste stream, and addressing carbon emissions reductions. In addition, such a program would help expand business opportunities across the city, potentially creating new sources of revenue and jobs for the local economy.

Economy/Workforce: Equity Index Score: Moderate Opportunity

Increase the number of infrastructure projects and improvements that support existing and new business developments.

Livability: Equity Index Score: Moderate Opportunity

SUMMARY AND PURPOSE:

A resolution appointing and reassigning the following individuals to the Mayor's Youth Commission of Tacoma Leadership Team to fill unexpired terms, to expire June 30, 2025.

- Reassigning Norah Gawryczik from the Justice & Safety Committee Vice Chair position to the Justice & Safety Committee Chair position;
- Appointing Deron Carston to the Justice & Safety Committee Vice Chair position;
- Appointing Caleb Rotchstein to the Social Health Committee Chair position;
- Appointing Aeris Clark to the Social Health Vice Committee Chair position; and
- Appointing Jayce Hartman to the Education, Arts, & Culture Committee Vice Chair position.

COUNCIL SPONSORS:

Mayor Victoria Woodards

BACKGROUND:

In 2019, Resolution 40502 established the formal structure of the Mayor's Youth Commission of Tacoma and appointed the inaugural leadership team. Each year since then, the Mayor's Youth Commission elects a 10-member Leadership Team from the general membership to serve a one-year term: a Chair and Vice-Chair of the entire Commission, as well as a Chair and Vice-Chair of each of the four committees. The Leadership Team is confirmed by the City Council. The Leadership Team meets twice each month and hosts a General Assembly meeting once per month.

The Mayor's Youth Commission convened on June 15, 2024, to elect a new Leadership Team to represent all members of the Commission. Council confirmed the seven appointments Commission members elected during their July 2, 2024 meeting.

One Leadership Team member resigned after being appointed, bringing the total number of Leadership Team vacancies to four. The Commission held their first General Assembly meeting of the year on October 12, 2024 and held elections to fill Leadership Team vacancies.

At this time, four individuals are being recommended to the City Council for confirmation.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT/CUSTOMER RESEARCH:

Recruitment for Commissioners was led by the sitting Leadership Team members, with support from the City Commission Liaison, Deputy Mayor Hines, and Mayor Woodards.

The Leadership Team organized a citywide recruitment and attendance campaign where they created SMART goals, identified priority areas to target, established outreach methods, delegated responsibilities, and set interim deadlines to hold themselves and each other accountable for following through.



The City's Commission Liaison, Deputy Mayor Hines, and Mayor Woodards conducted classroom visits at multiple Tacoma public high schools, including Mount Tahoma, Foss, Lincoln, and the School of the Arts. These class visits reached thousands of students and gathered contact information from students who expressed interest in the Mayor's Youth Commission. Leadership Team members used this contact information to execute an attendance campaign in the days leading up to the first General Assembly meeting.

2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES:

Education: Equity Index Score: High Opportunity

Increase the number of quality after-school-learning opportunities distributed equitably across the city.

Engagement: Equity Index Score: Moderate Opportunity

Increase the number of residents who participate in civic volunteering and voting. To that end, elected officials, boards, commissions, and volunteer leadership will reflect more of the diversity of the Tacoma community.

Youth engagement will increase the percentage of residents who believe they can have a positive impact in their communities, and develop trust in the public institutions of Tacoma.

Explain how your legislation will affect the selected indicator(s).

The Mayor's Youth Commission provides opportunities for out-of-school time enrichment, and engagement with City and community leaders. The Community Based Commission engages middle and high school students in a reciprocal opportunity for young people to participate in local government, impacting many of the Civic Engagement indicators.

This resolution fills vacancies on an existing City Commission. There is no fiscal impact.

EVALUATION AND FOLLOW UP:

Each year, the outgoing Leadership Team submits an Annual Report to the City Council that highlights what they have accomplished and outlines their ongoing goals/projects to be continued by the next Leadership Team. This serves as an opportunity for the Council to evaluate their work and engage in discussions with the Commission on continued actions.

STAFF/SPONSOR RECOMMENDATION:

Staff recommends the appointment of the four individuals elected by the Mayor's Youth Commission General Assembly body to the Mayor's Youth Commission Leadership Team for the remainder of the 2024-25 service year.

The Public Works Department is pleased to provide the attached update to our capital projects planning document. The purpose of this document is to provide additional information regarding funding, costs, and schedules for active capital projects within Public Works. Updates include changes to project schedules and funding, the addition of new projects, and deletion of projects that are complete. The document lists projects in categories according to work phase with projects in design listed first, followed by projects in advertisement, construction, and closeout. The update also includes Public Works support services for Tacoma Rail projects, Neighborhood and Community Services projects, Community and Economic Development projects, and others.

This project list is a result of the residents of Tacoma approving the Street Initiatives (Proposition No. 3 and Transportation Benefit District Proposition A) in November 2015 to fund additional maintenance and improvements to transportation infrastructure. The project funding sources include Propositions A and No. 3, other City funds, grants, gas tax, and City utility funds. Several of the projects are currently funded for design only with construction funding sources to be determined.

Please note this is a planning document that is subject to change as new funding becomes available and as progress is made on capital projects, whether it be in design and/or construction. 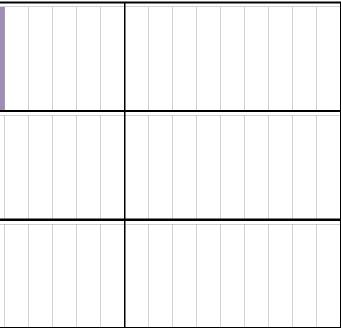

SUMMARY AND PURPOSE:

The State Auditor's Office (SAO) is required to audit the Transportation Benefit District (TBD) every two years. The SAO's office has been working on the 2022 and 2023 TBD audit. The SAO requires that an entrance and exit conference be conducted with the governing body (which is made up of the membership of the City Council). Since the audit has already begun, the attached information provides the City Council information on the scope, level of reporting, estimates of cost and the audit team. At the conclusion of the audit, the City Council will receive the final audit reports and have the opportunity to discuss any matters of interest.

BACKGROUND:

The Transportation Benefit District (TBD) was created as authorized by RCW 35.21.225 and 36.73.020 and City of Tacoma Ordinance #28099, for the purposes of acquiring, constructing, improving, providing and funding transportation improvements within the TBD consistent with any state, regional, or local transportation plans. The City Council approved a \$20 per vehicle tab fee that is received by the TBD. In addition, the TBD receives a 1/10 of one percent sales and use tax that was approved as part of the Voter Approved Street Initiative. The sales and use tax is due to expire in 2025. The TBD is required to be audited by the State Auditor's Office (SAO) every two years.

There are no viable alternatives, the SAO is required to audit the TBD every 2 years.

- Open public meetings compliance with minutes, meetings and executive session requirements

Financial statement audit for January 1, 2022 through December 31, 2023

We will provide an opinion on whether your financial statements are presented fairly, in all material respects, in accordance with the applicable reporting framework. The audit does not attempt to confirm the accuracy of every amount, but does search for errors large enough to affect the conclusions and decisions of a financial statement user.

Engagement Letter

We have provided an engagement letter that confirms both management and auditor responsibilities, and other engagement terms and limitations. Additionally, the letter identifies the cost of the audit, estimated timeline for completion and expected communications.

Levels of Reporting

Findings

Findings formally address issues in an audit report. Findings report significant results of the audit, such as significant deficiencies and material weaknesses in internal controls; misappropriation; and material abuse or

Exit items address control deficiencies, non-compliance with laws or regulations, or errors that have an insignificant effect on the audit objectives. These issues are informally communicated to management.

Audit Costs

The cost of the audit is estimated to be approximately \$11,500.

Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable, rather than absolute, assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement. Since we do not review every transaction, our audit cannot be relied upon to identify every potential misstatement. Because of the inherent limitations of an audit, together with the inherent limitations of internal control, an unavoidable risk exists that some material misstatements may not be detected, even though the audit is properly planned and performed in accordance with the standards identified above.

A financial statement audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers relevant internal controls in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of internal control. Accordingly, we will express no such opinion.

Although our audit is not designed to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of internal control over financial reporting, we are required to report any identified significant deficiencies and material

weaknesses in controls. We are also required to report instances of fraud and noncompliance with provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements that could have a direct and material effect on the accuracy of financial statements.

A financial statement audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

All misstatements identified by the audit will be discussed with management. Material misstatements corrected by management and all uncorrected misstatements will be communicated at the exit conference, as required by professional auditing standards.

Our responsibility is to express in a written report an opinion on the financial statements based on the results of our audit. We cannot guarantee an unmodified opinion. We may modify or disclaim an opinion on the financial statements if we are unable to complete the audit or obtain sufficient and appropriate audit evidence supporting the financial statements. If our opinion is other than unmodified, we will fully discuss the reason with you prior to issuing our report. Further, in accordance with professional standards, we may add emphasis-of-matter or other-matter paragraphs to our report to describe information that, in our judgment, is relevant to understanding the financial statements or our audit.

We will also issue a written report (that does not include an opinion) on issues identified during the audit related to internal control over financial reporting and on compliance with the provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a material effect on the financial statements as required by *Government Auditing Standards*.

The Transportation Benefit District prepares other information to accompany the financial statements, which is required by accounting standards or is done at its discretion. We will perform limited procedures on this information for the purpose of identifying inconsistencies with the financial statements. However, we will not express an opinion on its fair presentation.

Accountability Audit

We will perform an accountability audit of compliance with applicable state laws, regulations, and policies, and of controls over the safeguarding of public resources for the fiscal years ended December 31, 2023 and December 31, 2022. The audit will be conducted in accordance with provisions of RCW 43.09.260 and the Office's audit policies, which include policies specific to these types of audits and general audit policies. Our general audit policies apply to all our engagements and incorporate the requirements of *Government Auditing Standards*, as applicable, on topics such as communications with auditees, independence, audit evidence and documentation, and reporting.

An accountability audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about compliance and controls in areas selected for audit. In keeping with general auditing practices, we do not examine every transaction, activity, policy, internal control, or area. The areas examined and procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of fraud, loss, abuse, or noncompliance.

Upon completion of our audit, we will issue a written report describing the overall results and conclusions for the areas we examined.

Data Security

Our Office is committed to appropriately safeguarding the information we obtain during the course of the audit. We have entered into a data sharing agreement with the Transportation Benefit District to ensure compliance with legal requirements and Executive Directives (Executive Order 16-01, RCW 42.56 and OCIO Standard 141.10) in the handling of information considered confidential.

Responsibilities specific to this engagement

Additionally, we will:

- Provide Transportation Benefit District Board with advanced notification if we identify issues that require further audit work and increase audit costs.
- Participate in weekly progress meetings to discuss the status of the audit plans for future weeks. At those meetings, we will provide information on the areas we will work in and the audit objectives we will be addressing.
- Interact with staff professionally and respectfully and communicate needs and issues in a timely manner.
- Provide written correspondence during the course of the audit through email to the audit liaison, Polly Wainaina, Senior Finance Manager, and Susan Calderon, Assistant Finance Director.
- Provide advance notice when a scheduled meeting is to be cancelled.
- Allow the District seven days to provide a written response to any findings.
- Conduct an entrance and exit conference for the Transportation Benefit District.

Reporting levels for audit issues

Issues identified through the auditing process will be communicated as follows. Failure to appropriately address audit issues may result in escalated reporting levels.

- **Findings** formally address issues in an audit report. Findings report significant results of the audit, such as significant deficiencies and material weaknesses in internal controls; misappropriation; and material abuse or non-compliance with laws, regulations, contracts or grant agreements. You will be given the opportunity to respond to a finding, and this response, or a synopsis of it, will be published in the audit report. Professional auditing standards define the issues we must report as findings with regard to non-compliance with a financial statement effect and internal controls over financial reporting.
- **Management letters** communicate control deficiencies, non-compliance, misappropriation, abuse, or errors with a less-than-material effect on audit objectives. Management letters are referenced, but not included, in the audit report.
- **Exit items** address control deficiencies, non-compliance, abuse, or errors that have an insignificant effect on audit objectives. These issues are informally communicated to management and are not referenced in the audit report.

Client's Responsibilities

Management is responsible for the accuracy and completeness of information provided to the auditor and will provide the Office of the Washington State Auditor with:

- Unrestricted access to people with whom the auditor wishes to speak.
- All information that is requested or relevant to auditor requests.
- Notification when any documents, records, files, or data contain information that is covered by confidentiality or privacy laws.
- Adequate workspace and conditions, including interacting with auditors professionally and respectfully and promptly communicating about any issues and concerns.

Moreover, our audit does not relieve management or the governing body of their responsibilities. Management's responsibilities, with oversight from the governing body, include:

- Selecting and applying appropriate administrative and accounting policies.
- Establishing and maintaining effective internal controls over financial reporting, compliance, and safeguarding of public resources.
- Designing and following effective controls to prevent and detect fraud, theft, and loss.
- Promptly reporting to us knowledge of any fraud, allegations of fraud or suspected fraud involving management, employees or others, in accordance with RCW 43.09.185.
- Ensuring compliance with laws, regulations and provisions of contracts and grant agreements.
- Preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAP).

Responsibilities at the conclusion of the audit

At the conclusion of our audit, the Transportation Benefit District will provide us with a letter to confirm in writing certain express and implied representations made during the course of the audit. This letter includes representations regarding legal matters. A separate letter may be needed from the Transportation Benefit District's legal counsel.

Management and the governing body are also responsible for following up and taking corrective action on all audit findings, including, when applicable, preparing a summary schedule of prior audit findings and a corrective action plan on the Transportation Benefit District's own letterhead.

Responsibilities specific to this engagement

Additionally, the Transportation Benefit District will:

- Provide final financial statements for audit to our Office
- Provide our Office with documentation of the financial statement review and approval before they were submitted for audit.
- Obtain a clear understanding of accounting standards applied in your financial statements and fully understand any adjusting journal entries recommended by the Office of the Washington State Auditor before approving the entries.
- Revise financial statements and schedules only if agreed to in writing by our Office.

Estimated Audit Costs and Timeline

We estimate the cost of the audit work to be \$11,500, plus travel costs, and other expenses, if any. Invoices for these services will be prepared and presented each month as our audit work progresses.

We anticipate our reports will be published on our website **www.sao.wa.gov** and be available to you and the public as outlined below. These estimates are based on timely access to financial information and no significant audit reporting issues. The estimated cost and completion date may change if unforeseen issues arise or if significant audit issues are identified necessitating additional audit work. We will promptly notify you if this is the case.

This correspondence provides responses to follow-up questions received by staff from City Council Members during the presentation on the Proposed 2025-2026 Biennial Operating Budget on October 22nd for Community & Economic Development (CED), Planning & Development Services (PDS), and Neighborhood & Community Services (NCS).

Community & Economic Development (CED)

1. Race Conscious Homebuyer Program

During the October 22nd meeting, Council Member Walker asked for an explanation of how the homebuyer program works.

Staff Response

Referrals are being accepted from the <u>Tacoma Pierce County Habitat for Humanity</u> and <u>Young</u> <u>Black Homeowners</u> through December 2024 or until all funding has been committed.

This program can provide up to \$60,000 as a down payment for a home. Assistance is provided as a no interest 25-year loan. This loan must be repaid:

- At the end of the 25-year term;
- If the home is sold; or
- If the borrower does not occupy the home as their primary residence.

Program General Home Eligibility Requirements:

- The home must be located inside the city limits of Tacoma
- Applicant must be at or below 80% area median income (see table below)

- Applicant must be a first-time homebuyer (an individual nor the spouse or domestic partner of that individual may have owned a home in the three-year period prior to purchasing a home under this program)
- Applicant must complete at least five homebuyer education workshops

To meet the homebuyer education requirements, one (1) Washington State Housing Finance Commission (WSHFC) homebuyer course and four (4) additional City-sponsored homebuyer courses must be completed. Additional details on the required courses can be found below:

- WSHFC homebuyer course, <u>virtual</u> or <u>in-person</u>, for information, <u>click here</u>
- City sponsored course: Tacoma Urban League/Tacoma-Pierce County Habitat for Humanity Pathways to Homeownership courses. Sign-up by visiting the <u>Habitat for</u> <u>Humanity Events page</u> and selecting a Keys to Homeownership event, or, visit<u>The</u> <u>Tacoma Urban League</u> at 2550 S Yakima Ave, Tacoma, WA 98405 on Tuesdays between 2:00PM and 4:30PM
- City sponsored course: Young Black Homeowners Workshops- Workshops will take place once a month at Edison Square, 5415 S Tacoma Way, WA 98409. Updates and details on workshops are found on <u>Young Black Homeowners Tacoma Homebuyer Education</u> <u>Webpage</u>

Households interested in accessing down payment assistance should enroll in the required homebuyer courses as early as possible and obtain documentation verifying completion of each course.

2. Down Payment Assistance (DPA) Program

During the October 22nd meeting, Council Member Walker asked for an explanation of who administers the City's Down Payment Assistance (DPA) Program.

Staff Response

The City of Tacoma has contracted with the Tacoma Community Redevelopment Authority (TCRA) to administer the DPA Program. City Staff completes the application review and underwriting; the loans are issued by the TCRA.

3. Homebuyer Education Programs

During the October 22nd meeting, Council Member Walker asked for an explanation of who Administers the City's Homebuyer Education Programs.

Staff Response

These programs are administered by independent service providers that are identified through a request for proposal (RFP) process. The Tacoma Community Redevelopment Authority selects providers based on responsiveness of the proposal to the RFP criteria and program goals.

Planning & Development Services (PDS)

4. South Tacoma Groundwater Protection District, South Tacoma Neighborhood Plan, and other South Tacoma planning activities

During the October 22nd meeting, council Member Walker asked for an explanation of how the South Tacoma Groundwater Protection District, South Tacoma Neighborhood Plan, and other South Tacoma planning activities interact, overlap, or are coordinated.

Staff Response

There are multiple, concurrent planning efforts going on in South Tacoma. Planning and Development Services (PDS) is coordinating these efforts but recognizes that it can be difficult to track what each of them are, what issues are being addressed in each one, and how they relate to each other. PDS has regular internal and external stakeholder meetings to support this critical coordination and ensure the projects are not duplicating efforts while informing each other appropriately.

To demonstrate this coordination, earlier this year, the City held a series of three "Spotlight South Tacoma" community meetings. Those meetings brought together PDS staff, along with other City staff from Public Works, Environmental Services, Tacoma Water, Office of Strategy, and others, together with partners from South Transit, MetroParks Tacoma, and Tacoma-Pierce County Health Department to talk about the various projects and efforts in South Tacoma and gather input from the community. The graphic below was created to support the Spotlight South Tacoma community meetings and identifies many of these projects. As the City approaches some key milestones in the next couple of months—the initial drafts of the updated South Tacoma Groundwater Protection Code and the South Tacoma Way Neighborhood Plan—staff will be working with Media and Communications staff to put together a revised, simplified message about the relationship between these projects.

Regarding these two key PDS projects, here is a simplified breakdown of the focus of each:

- South Tacoma Groundwater Protection District (STGPD) Code Update the focus is on the entire groundwater protection district, which covers most of South Tacoma and extends beyond it. The focus is on codes relates to groundwater protection, including regulations for high impact uses, storage of hazardous materials, stormwater infiltration for aquifer recharge, impervious surfaces, and trees and urban forestry standards. This effort will result in zoning and code changes that affect new development in the STGPD.
- South Tacoma Way Neighborhood Plan the focus is on and around the 56th & South Tacoma Mixed-Use Center. The focus is on implementation actions to support the Comp Plan vision, covering a wide variety of community development topics, including those related to all five of the main categories listed above (Mobility & Accessibility, Economy, Livability & Affordability, Identity, and Sustainability, Health & Wellbeing). This effort will not include zoning or code changes.

5. Home in Tacoma Impacts

During the October 22nd meeting, Council Member Daniels asked for an explanation of how we project the impacts of Home in Tacoma.

Staff Response

The primary tool used to evaluate the impacts of the Home in Tacoma proposals was the creation of an Environmental Impact Statement (EIS). The EIS, which was led by a consultant team, evaluated the potential significant impacts of the project on a broad variety of topics, including environmental health, traffic, infrastructure and public services, cultural and historic resources, and consistency with regional and local planning policies. The Draft EIS was issued in February 2024, with a month-long comment period. The Final EIS, which was issued in August 2024, anticipates both positive and negative impacts from the project and identifies a range of actions the City could pursue to reduce negative impacts and promote the project goals. The EIS, along with other studies, including a Health Impact Assessment, Financial Feasibility Analysis, Market Study, and Site Plan Testing Report, was used by the Planning Commission to inform their recommendations. Here are links to the FEIS documents:

PDS regularly tracks permitting and economic trends, both in Tacoma and in the region, to help plan for budget, fees, and staffing out over multiple biennia. We certainly expect more permits and more complicated reviews, because of the new development being allowed (and the economic analysis done as part of Home in Tacoma), the additional regulations that are part of the package (particularly the landscaping and tree requirements), and the challenging coordination necessary to address more compact and/or dense middle-housing developments (particularly with infrastructure). The majority of the PDS staffing impact is expected to be in the residential review group, as the department expects that group to see 2x-3x more permits (from about 150 to 300-450). As a result, PDS is expanding the scope of our residential review group to take on much of this new middle housing development so that the department can build on the successes of that group in providing enhanced and quicker service for residential customers. PDS started bolstering that group in the mid-biennial budget process and are planning to retain (but not yet fill) some vacant positions into the next biennium so that the department can react if permitting activity exceeds expectations and additional resources are needed. For these same reasons, PDS also plans to initiate a fee study later in 2025.

Neighborhood & Community Services (NCS)

6. Senior Services

During the October 22nd meeting, Mayor Woodards asked for some clarification regarding the transition of senior services from NCS to Metro Parks Tacoma.

Staff Response

Linda Robson with MCO sent the Mayor an email on October 24, 2024, at 4:24pm outlining the talking points for the senior transition, including the dates Metro Parks Tacoma would be at the centers.

Metro Parks Tacoma will be visiting seniors at the Beacon and Lighthouse locations on the following dates/times:

Beacon

- Monday, November 4 from 10 AM to noon
- Monday, December 9 from 10 AM to noon
- Wednesday, December 11 from 10 AM to noon

Lighthouse

- Wednesday, November 6 from 10 AM to noon
- Tuesday, December 3 from 10 AM to noon
- Thursday, December 12 from 10 AM to noon

Initial discussions with seniors and with Council Members have pointed to transportation, meals, and fees as priority issues to address in this proposed transition, as well as access to unprogrammed time and space for seniors to simply connect with one another. As of late October 2024, NCS is actively negotiating the specifics of the senior services partnership, including these priority issues.

The City of Tacoma and the Neighborhood and Community Services (NCS) Department are committed to pursuing smart, strategic partnerships with other agencies and local jurisdictions that benefit all parties with more cost-effective and higher quality services for our Tacoma-area community members. To that end, NCS is in active discussions with Metro Parks Tacoma to partner and combine senior services, programming, and activities.

Metro Parks Tacoma currently operates four community centers and provides senior programming at those locations for Tacoma-area seniors who are over the age of 50. This partnership is expected to achieve several key goals:

- Enhance the activity and program offerings to Tacoma-area seniors with a wider variety of classes, workshops, activities, etc.
- Expand the reach of senior services in Tacoma to more people (age 50+ vs. age 60+ currently)
- Expand the reach of senior services in Tacoma to more places (four locations vs. two locations) at facilities that are more easily accessible using public transportation options
- Future uses will be in alignment with Council priorities and could include affordable and/or supportive housing or facility space for critical City operations
- This partnership also offers the potential for some operational cost savings and significant longterm facility maintenance savings.

7. Violence Reduction and Prevention

During the October 22nd meeting, Council Member Walker asked for an explanation of whether funds been given out to local organizations working towards violence reduction and prevention.

Staff Response

The recommended funding awards for RFP NC24-0136F are outlined below for Council's review and reference. On the top left is the amount available and requested in each bucket. Toward the bottom right will be a listing of the total amount allocated in each bucket. These recommendations were presented to Community Vitality and Safety Committee on September 26, 2024. Contract amounts over \$500,000 will come before the full Council for approval.

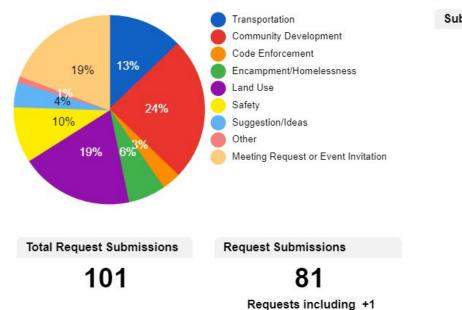

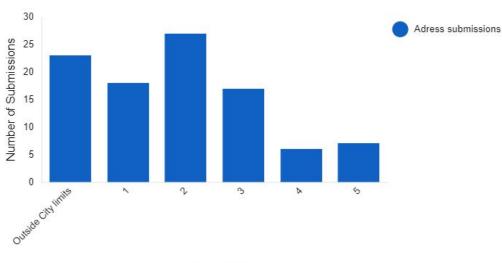

I ask for your support for an ordinance to amend Title 1 of the Municipal Code to include a Climate and Sustainability Commission.

LEGISLATIVE INTENT

Ordinance request: I ask for your support for an ordinance to amend Title 1 of the Municipal Code to include a Climate and Sustainability Commission. The intent of this ordinance is to enshrine the existing Sustainable Tacoma Commission (STC), which was created by resolution only, in the Municipal Code with some minor updates.¹ This ordiance is a result of the City's 2024 Charter review process, discussions with the STC, and resolution 41497, which directed the Infrastructure, Planning, and Sustainability (IPS) Committee to evaluate potential changes to the STC.²

- The IPS Committee discussed this ordinance request on August 28, 2024, and expressed unanimous support for advancing an ordinance to the full City Council for consideration. The IPS Committee also expressed support for addressing climate and environmental sustainability issues.
- This ordinance aligns with the City Council's declaration of a climate emergency in 2019 and understanding that climate change is an existential threat to human society.³ The City Council has also expressed robust support for actions that help address climate issues, including adopting a resolution in 2021 to strengthen the City's commitment to decarbonization.⁴

Background: The City Council created a fifteen member Charter Review Commission (CRC) in 2023 to review the existing Charter of the City of Tacoma and make recommendations for amendments that would improve the City's work. The CRC launched their meetings in January 2024 and provided opportunities for public comment during their discussions. In May, the CRC published their final report and presented their recommendations to the City Council.⁵

• The CRC's recommended Charter amendments included one aimed at bolstering the City's commitments to sustainability and climate goals by adding a Climate Accountability and Sustainability Commission to the Charter. The City Council voted in July not to move this amendment forward to the November ballot and instead redirected it to IPS for further study and review via resolution 41497.⁶ The City Council expressed agreement in resolution 41497 with the CRC's view that "the city needs to effectively track and hold accountable its commitments to sustainability and climate goals."⁷

DESIRED ORDINANCE DATE: November 19, 2024

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Extensive public engagement took place regarding the proposed Charter amendments. The CRC met between January and May, and they held two extended public comment meetings with opportunities to provide input in English, Spanish, Vietnamese, and Khmer. On May 6, the CRC presented its final report to the City Council. The City Council reviewed the proposal from the CRC and held a public hearing on July 2, where many community members expressed support for a Climate and Sustainability Commission. Council Member Kristina Walker and City staff have engaged with the STC and received their feedback on the proposal. The STC has expressed support for moving the Commission into the Municipal Code, and the overwhelming majority of its members requested the name "Climate and Sustainability Commission" due to its broad terms and straightforward acronym.

2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES

Equity and Accessibility: Climate and sustainability concerns are felt across Tacoma, as our entire region faces unprecedented heat, extreme downpours, wildfire smoke, and other impacts from climate change. However, climate issues are having disparate impacts on the health and well-being of Tacoma's historically underserved communities. The Climate and Sustainability Commission would work in alignment with the Office of Environmental Policy and Sustainability to help bring community accountability, transparency, and vigilance to the long-term implementation of Tacoma's Climate Action Plan and sustainability initiatives.

Civic Engagement: *Equity Index Score*: Moderate Opportunity

I ask for your support for a resolution directing the City Manager to create a Business Safety and Resilience Program to launch by July 1, 2025, followed by an ordinance establishing a new section in Title 1 of the Municipal Code for this program.

LEGISLATIVE INTENT

Resolution Request: I ask for your support for a resolution directing the City Manager to create a Business Safety and Resilience Program to launch by July 1, 2025. This program and its administrative costs would be funding by up to 1.5% of the City's revenue from business license fees in 2025 and up to 3% of the City's revenue from business license fees in 2026. In addition, the resolution would direct the City Manager to develop an ordinance creating a new section in Title 1 of the Municipal Code establishing that the Business Safety and Resilience Program and its administrative costs would be funded each year by up to 6% of the revenue generated by the City's business license fees starting in 2027.

The Business Safety and Resilience Program would aim to provide consistent financial and technical assistance to local businesses to assist in reenergizing and strengthening neighborhoods and business districts in ways that help spur and sustain a thriving local economy. Such a program would seek to activate safe and welcoming spaces for businesses, along with creating physical, social, and cultural improvements that foster economic development. Examples of the types of projects that could fall under the Business Safety and Resilience Program may include efforts to enhance physical infrastructure, mitigate threats from climate change, cleanup litter and graffiti, address façade improvements and building preservation, and improve the pedestrian environment. The projects may be preventative or geared toward emergency response.

• When applicable, the Business Safety and Resilience Program would work with the Chamber of Commerce and community partners, such as the local business districts or groups, the Asia Pacific Cultural Center, Korean Women's Association, The Black Collective, Tacoma Urban League, and Mi Centro. The parameters of financial assistance for the Business Safety and Resilience Program must meet the constitutional requirements for the use of public funds.

- The Business Safety and Resilience Program would be available to all businesses in Tacoma, regardless of size, to ensure that our city maintains a diverse business ecosystem and continues to attract a broad swath of types of employers.
- Supporting business safety and resilience would help advance the City's Economic Development Strategy by revitalizing neighborhoods and business districts, activating underutilized locations, helping to retain businesses, and enabling our community members to connect with a diverse range of quality jobs.¹ In addition, actions that help business mitigate climate threats are in alignment with our Climate Action Plan.² The Business Safety and Resilience Program would also align with the One Tacoma Comprehensive Plan, which commits to creating complete neighborhoods that have safe and convenient access to the goods and services needed in daily life.³

DESIRED RESOLUTION DATE: November 19, 2024

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

To better understand current local business needs, the City collaborated with the Tacoma-Pierce County Chamber of Commerce and EMC Research on an Economic Development Business Climate Survey in Tacoma.⁴ The survey aimed to collect comprehensive data to help ensure that the City's economic development work is focused on addressing the needs of local businesses.

- The survey results showed that local businesses are facing challenges managing crime and public safety issues. In addition, the survey showed that nearly 80 percent of local businesses want greater access to City grants and loans for support.
- The survey included interviews with more than 170 businesses with a physical location in Tacoma. The survey was also offered in English, Spanish, Vietnamese and Korean to ensure accessibility.

2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES

Equity and Accessibility: Creating a Business Safety and Resilience Program would help ensure that Tacoma offers consistent opportunity and advancement for local businesses in need. By helping to activate and enhance safety in neighborhoods and business districts, as well as remove barriers to economic opportunity and foster business resilience, Tacoma can build a robust economy that helps enable wealth creation for all.

SPONSOR RECOMMENDATION

FISCAL IMPACT

We do not have exact data on the amount of revenue business license fees will generate in the future, as the number of business licenses provided by the City each year can fluctuate. However, we have recent data and projections that we can use to estimate the fiscal impact. Specifically, business license fees generated \$13 million in 2023 and were budgeted to generate \$16.9 million in 2024, \$15.8 million in 2025, and \$15.5 million in 2026. The average amount of these four years is \$15.3 million.

• Based on an average amount of \$15.3 million, the estimated fiscal impact for 2025 is up to \$229,500 and, for 2026, it is up to \$459,000. This data also allows for a general estimate that increasing up to 6% of the business license fees for the 2027-2028 biennium budget would have a fiscal impact of about \$2 million per biennium. In addition, staff time would be required to create and administer the program.

The balanced 2025-2026 Proposed Budget includes the use of these revenues to support Proposed General Fund Expenses. Therefore, the impact of the dedication of revenues in 2025 and beyond will mean a reduction in expenses in the General Fund (including services such as public safety, public works, libraries, etc.). In order to balance the budget through ongoing reductions, staff will work to identify ongoing service reductions that take into consideration the full ongoing impact of the proposals (which is projected to be \$1 million per year by 2027). The expense and service reductions to offset this resolution will be developed as part of the amendment process for the 2025-2026 Budget. Council will consider amendments as part of the first reading of the Budget on November 19.
