Dear Mayor and Council Members:

### ITEMS OF INTEREST

1. Tacoma Creates Funding Applications Now Open: **Tacoma Creates is now accepting applications for its seventh year of funding.** This community-supported initiative helps expand access to cultural experiences across Tacoma, with a focus on reducing barriers and serving youth. **Funding will support programs and events presented July 1, 2026, through June 30, 2027, by nonprofit organizations whose primary purpose is to advance and/or preserve arts, culture, heritage, and/or science.** This funding can also support eligible organizations' classes for Beyond the Bell, Club B, and Summer Late Nights. The two funding categories are listed below:

- **Comprehensive Organizational Support** – Applications due March 9, 2026; up to \$400,000 per year
- **Impact Funding** – Applications due March 23, 2026; up to \$60,000 per year

Prospective applicants are encouraged to attend one of three free workshops in February explaining the application process and how to develop a strong proposal. **Detailed organizational eligibility criteria, application guidelines, and information about workshops and other application support opportunities are available at [www.TacomaCreates.org](http://www.TacomaCreates.org).**

2. SafeTREE Routes to School Project: **This grant-funded project aims to plant approximately 425 trees across four suggest walking routes in South End, South Tacoma, and Eastside neighborhoods.** This project leverages trees as a solution to support safer and cooler routes for students and families walking, biking, and rolling to school (and around their neighborhoods)! Additional elements of the project include urban forestry lessons taught in these schools by our EnviroChallenger program, watering support for planted trees, and limited investments in existing mature trees along walking routes for safety.

The City will partner with Tacoma Tree Foundation to conduct outreach, coordinate homeowner participation, and develop other opportunities for engagement like community tree planting events, multilingual activities, and tree walks.

SafeTREE Routes to School Project cont. Project success will be driven by cross-departmental collaboration among City programs, including Urban Forestry, Safe Routes to School, EnviroChallengers, Depave, and Language Access. Together partners will grow tree canopy while maximizing community impact. This project is one of five Tacoma projects funded through Washington State Department of Natural Resources' 2024 Community Forestry Assistance Grants. Collectively, these projects support tree planting, urban forestry management, and tree education initiatives citywide and were proposed by partners including Parks Tacoma, Tacoma Tree Foundation, South End Neighborhood Council, and Washington State University.

The official public kick-off tree planting event is happening on February 21, 2026, 9:00 a.m. - 2:00 p.m., starting at Mann Elementary School (event flyer attached). Details and sign up information is available at: <https://tacomatreefoundation.org/calendar/safetree26>.







**I ask for your support for a Council Contingency Fund request of \$30,000 to fund the Oasis Youth Center’s HIV and STI self-testing for LGBTQ+ youth ages 14 and older in Pierce County.**

**LEGISLATIVE INTENT:**

Oasis Youth Center seeks to expand access to on-demand, staff-guided HIV and STI self-testing for LGBTQ+ youth ages 14 and older in Pierce County. This request will provide funds to administer 300 tests.

Pierce County is considered a high STI-incidence jurisdiction, with rates of Chlamydia, Gonorrhea, and Syphilis exceeding those of many other counties in Washington State and nationally. In 2024, Pierce County reported the second-highest number of cases of Chlamydia, Gonorrhea, and Syphilis (all stages) in the state, with young people ages 15–24 accounting for the majority of Chlamydia cases. Despite this elevated need, existing HIV and STI testing services are often not accessible or culturally appropriate for youth—particularly LGBTQ+ youth and youth in crisis—due to barriers such as transportation, cost, age restrictions, stigma, and lack of affirming providers.

Oasis Youth Center will provide on-demand, staff-guided HIV and STI self-testing within its existing drop-in and support service environment. Youth will be able to access oral HIV tests, rapid fingerstick HIV tests, and STI self-collection kits (including Chlamydia, Gonorrhea, and Syphilis) in a safe, trusted, and affirming setting. Trained Oasis staff will guide participants through test administration and specimen collection, support accurate interpretation of results, and provide immediate linkage to follow-up care, treatment, and supportive services as needed. Additionally, staff with phlebotomy certifications can assist youth with the lancet poke if needed.

This approach reduces common barriers to testing by eliminating the need to travel to external clinics with limited hours, minimizing stigma, and ensuring youth receive supportive guidance throughout the process. The desired impact is increased testing uptake among LGBTQ+ youth, earlier detection of HIV and STIs, timely linkage to treatment, and improved long-term sexual health outcomes for young people in Pierce County.

**COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT/ (CUSTOMER RESEARCH):**

Oasis Youth Center shaped this proposal through ongoing, direct engagement with the youth it serves. Feedback gathered through drop-in services, support groups, youth leadership programming, and one-on-one advocacy consistently identified sexual health testing as a critical unmet need. Youth shared that traditional clinic-based services are often inaccessible due to transportation barriers, age restrictions, fear of discrimination, concerns about confidentiality, and discomfort navigating adult-oriented services. Transgender and gender-diverse youth in particular reported challenges finding providers who are knowledgeable, respectful, and affirming.

Oasis also drew on its long-standing partnerships with local public health and community-based organizations, as well as county-level STI surveillance data, to inform the program's design. This combined quantitative data with lived experience to ensure the proposed solution responds to both documented public health trends and the real-world experiences of youth most affected by inequitable health outcomes.

**2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES:**

**Equity and Accessibility:**

This legislation will reduce racial and other inequities by expanding access to HIV and STI testing for communities disproportionately impacted by both poor health outcomes and systemic barriers to care. LGBTQ+ youth—particularly youth of color, transgender and nonbinary youth, and youth experiencing housing instability—face higher rates of HIV and STIs while encountering discrimination, stigma, and exclusion within traditional health care systems. By funding on-demand, staff-guided HIV and STI self-testing in a trusted community setting, this legislation removes key structural barriers that contribute to these disparities.

**Livability: Equity Index Score: Moderate Opportunity**

Improve health outcomes and reduce disparities, in alignment with the community health needs assessment and CHIP, for all Tacoma residents

Increase positive public perception of safety and overall quality of life.

Explain how your legislation will affect the selected indicator(s)?

The program advances racial equity by offering free, accessible, and affirming services, eliminating cost and transportation barriers that disproportionately affect youth of color and low-income youth. Staff-guided self-testing reduces reliance on clinic-based models that often require parental involvement, government-issued identification, or prior medical access—requirements that can exclude undocumented youth, youth in foster care, and youth estranged from family support systems. For transgender and gender-diverse youth, the program provides culturally responsive guidance and minimizes exposure to discriminatory or uninformed medical environments. Enacting this legislation will produce positive equity and inclusion outcomes by increasing early detection of HIV and STIs, reducing untreated infections, and improving linkage to affirming care for underrepresented communities. It strengthens trust between marginalized youth and health systems by embedding services within a youth-centered, LGBTQ+-affirming organization. In doing so, the legislation promotes equitable health outcomes, supports public health goals, and affirms the dignity, safety, and autonomy of young people most affected by existing disparities.

Council Contingency Funds will be used to provide \$30,000 for this program.


