STUDY SESSION/WORK SESSION

- 2. The City Council Study Session of Tuesday, February 4, 2014, will be held in Room 16 of the Tacoma Municipal Building North, at Noon. Discussion items will be: (1) Legislative Update; (2) Other Items of Interest; (3) Agenda Review; (4) Closed Session Labor Negotiations; and (5) Executive Session City Manager's Performance Review.
 - At Tuesday's Study Session, Government Relations Officer Randy Lewis will provide the Council with a legislative update.
- 3. The updated **Tentative City Council Forecast** and **Consolidated Standing Committee Calendars** are attached for your information.

COUNCIL REQUESTS/INQUIRIES

- 4. At the January 21st Study Session during the **STAR Project** overview presentation, Council Members requested **recommended best practices to address the areas where the City scored low**. Sustainability Manager Kristin Lynett provides the attached memorandum in response.
- 5. At last Tuesday's Study Session, during the **Tacoma Link Expansion discussion**, Council Member Mello requested confirmation that it would be possible to have a stop at South 4th Street in the event the Link expansion was on Stadium Way. Public Works Director Kurtis Kingsolver responds that there are two items that will need to be considered in order to provide a stop near 4th:
 - The first pertains to ADA access. In order to provide ADA access the incline of Stadium Way cannot exceed 2%. In the area around 4th, the City constructed Stadium Way so that the incline is less than 2%.
 - The second item pertains to whether or not an in-lane stop will be allowed or will traffic back up so much that it will back up onto I-705. Although it is very likely the system can be designed to accommodate both the new Link car as well as traffic, without traffic counts and a complete traffic analysis this cannot be confirmed. This item will be evaluated as part of the environmental review.

In addition, during the Link expansion discussion, Council Member Campbell suggested a hill climb or improved pedestrian access from South 4th to the St. Helens district. It should be noted, that as part of the Environmental Review, Sound Transit will be evaluating potential stop locations as well as pedestrian access. Although current plans have not considered any improvements to South 4th, the City can request options, keeping in mind that funds will ultimately need to be identified over and above what has already been identified if improvements are made. There will need to be adequate ADA access if we do improvements over and above sidewalk replacement. This could include building switch-backs, an elevator or possibly some sort of escalator. In either case, it's likely these improvements will be costly as well as expensive to maintain. It's also likely Sound Transit will want the City to provide all maintenance costs, etc.

If needed the Council will have an opportunity to have a follow up discussion and ask questions at Tuesday's Committee of the Whole meeting.

GRANT AWARDS

- 6. The City was awarded the following grant:
 - Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response Grants Program

 The Fire Department requested funding to hire and employ 20 firefighters for a two-year time period beginning with the award of the grant. The award will fund commissioned personnel in the Operations Bureau of the Tacoma Fire Department. The City has been awarded \$3,446,180, with no City match required. The award is conditioned with no layoffs of commissioned Fire Department personnel during the two-year performance period.

At the January 21, 2014 City Council Study Session, Council Members requested additional information related to the STAR Project. Requests and responses are as follows:

• Council Members requested recommended best practices from the STAR technical manual be identified to address the areas where the City scored low.

The best practices and leading communities referenced below have not yet been screened or evaluated for relevancy or practicality in Tacoma. Nor have these actions yet been prioritized for implementation. They are meant to be examples of actions Tacoma could consider taking. Once our community visioning has taken place and City-wide Strategic Plan has been developed, departments will recommend actions from their STAR gap and best practices analyze for incorporation into workplans and budgets. Higher level STAR objectives and outcomes will be incorporated into our public engagement prioritization process. <u>Built Environment-</u> Educate the public about standards, effects of excessive exposure, and mitigation techniques for ambient noise or ambient light

The Noise Pollution Clearinghouse offers educational resources regarding noise issues, while the International Dark-Sky Association provides educational resources for community light issues.

Flagstaff, AZ and New York City, NY are cited as cities leading way.

<u>Climate and Energy</u> -Develop a committee that includes climate scientists, adjacent jurisdictions, regional coalitions, state and federal agencies, and/or non-governmental organizations for the purpose of understanding and addressing shared vulnerabilities

Lewes, DE: Through a process that included 5 local workshops, the City of Lewes created an integrated hazard mitigation and climate change adaptation action plan that will enable to the City to better address future climate impacts.

The University of Washington created a report entitled *Preparing for Climate Change – A Guidebook for Local, Regional and State Governments.*

Economy & Jobs - Adopt an economic localization plan to increase local production for local consumption and export

An economic localization plan should determine how economic development efforts, planning initiatives, and zoning regulations can support local production for local consumption, sustainable economic growth, and continued viability for local businesses. The plan should develop strategies to capitalize on opportunities for increasing local ownership, meeting local demand for goods and services, and resource sharing for small businesses. It should also identify strategies to strengthen existing business networks, create new urban-rural linkages, and increase commerce between businesses with high value chain linkages.

Kirkland, WA, Newark, NJ, and Portland, OR are cited as communities leading the way.

The Institute for Local Self Reliance provides an extensive collection of policies, bills, regulations, and ordinances related to banking, broadband, energy, independent businesses, and waste, as well as examples and tools to overcome barriers to economic localization.

Education, Arts, & Community - Adopt a policy to encourage diversity in local government appointments to advisory boards and commissions

Vancouver, BC, New York City, and Toronto, ON are cited as communities leading the way.

The National League of Cities has a collection of resources and case studies to help cities integrate immigrants into their communities.

The Urban Diversity Forum provides information about diversity practices across Canada, including municipal diversity policies, police and minority relations, and immigrant settlement.

Equity & Empowerment-Increase the percentage of registered voters over time

Create a mock youth voting program to teach children about democracy, elections, and the importance of voting.

Partner with business, civic, and neighborhood organizations to increase voter registration and turnout, such as a "Get Out the Vote" campaign.

<u>Health & Safety</u>- Adopt a health in all policies statement or policy commitment for local decision-making

This commitment extends to land use, design, transportation, and other aspects of the built environment that impact the ability for residents to walk or bicycle to destinations.

Richmond, CA is cited as a community leading the way.

<u>Natural Systems</u>- Use incentive programs to encourage local businesses and private owners to grow and sell native or desirable plants and animals and not sell invasive species or other harmful plants and animals

Examples of this range from relatively common practices, such as a directory of natural landscapers or community awards to businesses demonstrating best practices, to more robust efforts, such as property tax abatement for appropriate use or applying tax increment financing (TIF) dollars toward site restoration.

 Council Member Campbell also requested best practices information on addressing food desserts.

Provide incentives for healthful retail food outlets to locate in underserved areas or mobile vendors that only sell fresh food.

Examples of incentives include:

- permit expediting;
- preferred vending locations for mobile vendors that only sell unprocessed or raw fruits and vegetables;
- tax incentives for grocery stores and healthy corner stores locating in low-income areas or food desserts;
- zoning incentives, such as additional density or reduced parking, for grocery stores and healthy corner stores locating in low-income areas or food desserts; and/or
- grants, loans, or loan guarantees for healthy mobile vendors and corner stores.

New Orleans, LA: New Orleans' Fresh Food Retailer Initiative (FFRI) is a citywide program to encourage grocery stores to locate in low-income, underserved neighborhoods in Orleans Parish. The program, partially funded by Disaster Community Development Block Grants (D-CDBG), provides forgivable and interest-bearing loans to support construction and operational costs for new and expanding grocery stores that sell fresh foods.

New York, NY: New York City's Department of Health and Mental Hygiene has created a Green Cart Program that provides micro-loans and technical assistance for mobile vendors that sell fresh, unprocessed fruits and vegetables.

- The American Planning Association's (APA) Planning and Community Health Research Center
 has a wealth of information about food systems planning, including information about improving
 access to healthy, affordable foods and supporting urban agriculture, farmers markets, and other
 healthy food retail through a variety of land use, zoning, planning, programmatic, and policy
 strategies.
- Public Health Law & Policy (PHLP) is an independent nonprofit organization that provides practical solutions to public health problems. Key resources related to healthy food access and the prevention of childhood obesity include the Model Healthy Food Zone Ordinance and Establishing Land Use Protections for Farmers' Markets report.
