Title 17 Amendments - Animal License Fees

DATE:

SUMMARY:

The proposed budget for 2017/2018 includes a revenue enhancement that increases the City's animal license fees requiring an amendment to Title17 in the Tacoma Municipal Code (TMC).

STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

The increased revenue of approximately \$200,000 in 2017/2018 will fund an additional Animal Control Officer that will allow expansion of animal control services from the current 5 days a week to 7 days a week. This will strengthen and support a safe city and provide Tacoma residents with additional access to animal control services when needed.

BACKGROUND:

All Tacoma residents who have cats and/or dogs are required to register their pet with the City. The Tax & License Division of the Finance Department works in coordination with the Tacoma-Pierce County Humane Society and the Tacoma Police Department for animal control and licensing services. The City's animal license fees have not been increased since 2002.

ISSUE:

The 2017/2018 revenue enhancement increases the animal license fees in TMC Chapter 17.05.

The license fee for Senior Citizens who own a dog or cat that has been spayed or neutered will remain at the current \$5 annual fee. The effective date of the new fees is January 1, 2017.

ALTERNATIVES:

The fees could remain at their current levels; however, there would be no additional funding to offset the costs of hiring an additional animal control officer. The proposed revenue enhancement included in the 2017/2018 budget requires the attached TMC amendments.

RECOMMENDATION:

The proposed revenue enhancement included in the 2017/2018 budget requires the attached TMC amendments.

FISCAL IMPACT:

Over the next two years, the increased fees are estimated to generate approximately \$200,000 that will allow the Police Department to hire an additional Animal Control Officer, extending animal control services to 7 days a week. In addition, the City is exploring other service enhancements in partnership with Tacoma-Pierce County Humane Society that would offer reduced spay/neuter costs to owners with unaltered pets or microchipping of animals.
