A. Call to Order

Chair Karnes called the special meeting to order at 5:00 p.m. A quorum was declared.

Chair Karnes read the Land Acknowledgement.

B. Approval of Agenda

Vice-Chair Steele moved to switch discussion items 1 and 2 and approve the agenda as amended. Commissioner Dorner seconded the motion. The motion passed with the following votes:

C. Public Comments

Public commenters expressed support for keeping the S. 19th Street Light Rail extension route on the One Tacoma maps; and expressed their opposition to proposed amendments to remove the S. 19th Extension from the One Tacoma Plan maps. In support of their demands to maintain the light rail extension on S. 19th, community members provided the following comments:

 Commenters expressed concern that the Planning Commission was considering map changes to remove the light rail alignment on S. 19th Street without notifying and engaging with communities in Hilltop and Central Tacoma that would be affected.

- Commenters expressed concern that this action by the Planning Commission would break promises to the community that the next light rail extension would serve the Hilltop community and communities along S. 19th Street.
- Commenters noted the specific institutions, destinations, and services along S. 19th Street that would be served by the future light rail, providing greater community access.
- Commenters noted that changing the light rail alignment from S. 19th to 6th Ave would likely have a disproportionate impact on communities of color and reinforce underinvestment in the Hilltop and along S. 19th Street.
- Commenters noted the specific communities that would benefit from the S. 19th alignment, with representation from local ministries, service unions, teacher's unions, and other community members providing testimony.
- One commenter provided clarification that the S. 19th Street alignment is a representative alignment in the Sound Transit system plan and that additional public process will be conducted.

E. Discussion Item

2. One Tacoma Comprehensive Plan Update – Recommendation

Stephen Atkinson, Principal Planner, and Carrie Wilhelme, Transportation Planner, presented the final amendments to the draft One Tacoma Plan and Transportation and Mobility Plan, with a focus on transit-related amendments.

The Commission discussed each potential amendment and determined appropriate modifications.

Vice-Chair Steele moved to approve the amendment to maintain S 19th as the representative alignment for the Sound Transit light rail extension to TCC, as shown on all relevant Comprehensive Plan maps. Commissioner Marlo seconded the motion.

The motion passed with the following votes:

Vice-Chair Steele moved to approve the amendment to the Transportation and Mobility Plan Project List description and remove the following sentences: "The system could operate on either the 6th Avenue or S 19th Street corridor with a connection along Mildred Street. To ensure long-term planning and completion of the scope of the Tier-1 Frequent Transit Network, the corridor not selected for construction by Sound Transit will be added to the City's project list as a future light rail corridor." Commissioner Marlo seconded the motion. The motion passed with the following votes:

Commissioner Dorner moved to approve the new policy amendment to support priority of exclusive use of city right-of-way for at-grade, elevated, or underground rail transit as recommended by the TOD Task Force. Vice-Chair Steele seconded the motion. The motion passed with the following votes:

Commissioner Dorner moved to approve the new policy amendment to encourage Sound Transit to explore options for improving connectivity for 1-line and the Downtown Tacoma central business district as recommended by the TOD Task Force. Commissioner Swinford seconded the motion. The motion passed with the following votes:

Commissioner Marlo moved to approve the new policy amendment to encourage Sound Transit to explore options for improving regional connectivity between Tacoma Dome, Tacoma Mall, and nearby mixed-use centers as recommended by the TOD Task Force. Vice-Chair Steele seconded the motion. The motion passed with the following votes:

Commissioner Marlo moved to approve the new policy amendment to preserve all city-owned rail right of way within city limits as recommended by the TOD Task Force. Commissioner Rash seconded the motion. The motion passed with the following votes:

Vice-Chair Steele moved to approve the new and revised policies pertaining to the Tacoma Dome Link Light Rail station area planning, to support businesses facing displacement, encourage pursuit of a community benefit agreement, encourage a mixed-use terminal station, and to support mitigation measures for impacts to historic resources. Commissioner Dorner seconded the motion. The motion passed with the following votes:

1. Minor Code Amendments - Recommendation
