- For Transportation, Fire, Parks, and School



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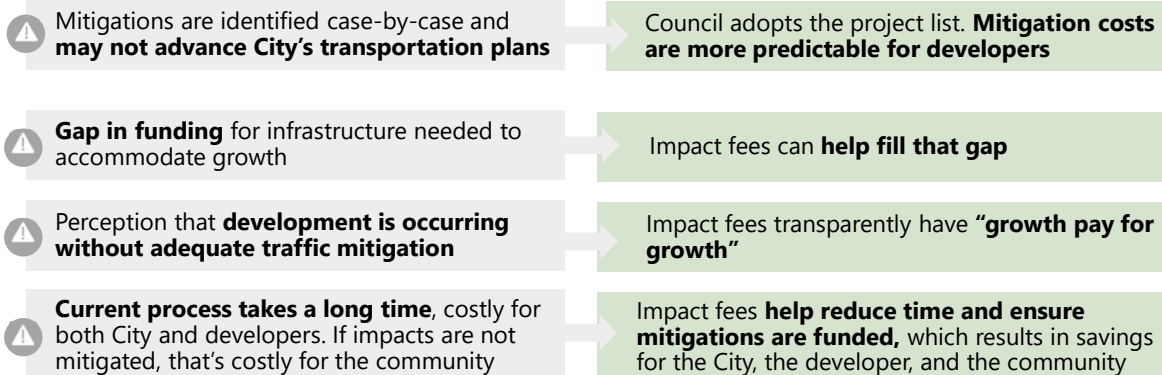

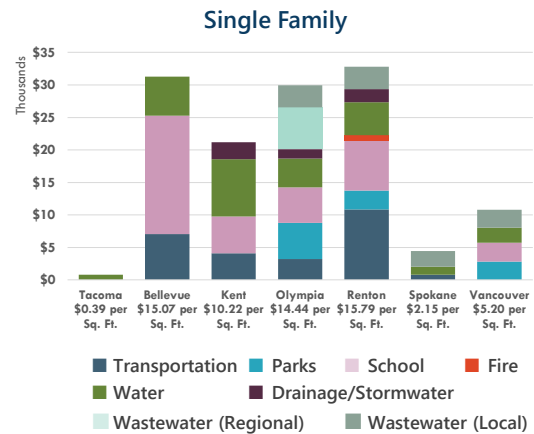

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PROGRAM CONSIDERATIONS



- Tacoma**
 - Adoption of **Home-in-Tacoma** created a framework for providing more middle housing options in the City.
- Washington State**
 - 2023 Legislative cycle resulted in **three new laws** that require more multimodal planning, impact fee programs to recognize the lesser impacts of smaller housing types, and expanded projects that can be funded by impact fees to include trails.
- Nationally**
 - Sheetz v. County of Eldorado** brought impact fees into the limelight. It emphasized the need to fully document a clear nexus between the rate charged and individual developments' impacts.

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PROGRAM CONSIDERATIONS





Simpler methodology is easier to explain



Better data → fewer appeals



Thorough legal review, especially for new methodologies
