- 6. <u>Warming Center Update</u>: For the 2022-2023 winter weather season, the City of Tacoma has partnered with funded shelter providers to ensure that unsheltered individuals have access to indoor shelter options. These efforts have expanded the City's shelter capacity by 145 beds. For more information on inclement weather response visit: www.cityoftacoma.org/inclementresources.
 - The Rescue Mission will operate an inclement weather shelter at Holy Rosary Church from November 21, 2022, until the end of March 2023, this shelter provides an additional 50 seasonal beds; anyone wishing to access these beds should go to the main Rescue Mission campus. The Holy Rosary site has served an average 38 people sleeping over night during the 67 days they have been in operation.
 - The Rescue Mission (425 South Tacoma Way) and Catholic Community Services' Nativity House (702 S. 14th Street) will be providing overflow shelter beds for a total of up to 60 individuals during acute inclement weather events (when the forecast is for 35 degrees with wind/rain or 32 degrees and colder). The Nativity House has been activated 33 days so far this season and have averaged an additional 23 people staying at Nativity House during the inclement weather.

- Life Enrichment Group (415 S. 13th Street) will be offering 20 overflow beds for young adults 18-24 years of age, in the event of acute inclement weather. This location has not yet had to operate their overflow capacity.
- Lighthouse Activity Center (5016 'A' Street) in the event of acute inclement weather, will be open during the day from 8:30 AM 5:30 PM for all community members. There is no data for attendance currently.
- 7. <u>City-funded Temporary and Emergency Shelter Performance</u>: The City posts weekly information about its Temporary and Emergency Shelter locations including current census, number of available beds and exits to housing. This information can be found at: https://www.cityoftacoma.org/UserFiles/Servers/Server-6/File/cms/NCS/City%20Authorized%20Emergency%20Shelter%20Sites/Weeklydataupdate.pdf and is updated weekly.
- 8. <u>Encampment Outreach</u>: The City's Homeless Engagement and Alternatives Liaison (HEAL) Team (formerly the Homeless Outreach Team) performs encampment outreach throughout the week to provide individuals opportunities to connect to shelter, behavioral health, substance use and employment services. For the week of February 13 17, 2023, staff visited sixteen locations. This resulted in fifty individuals being contacted and five individuals being placed in shelter.
- 9. Emergency Rental Assistance: The Pierce County Rental Assistance program stopped on August 1, 2022; however, applications will be processed normally until all funds have been distributed, this includes both Pierce County and City of Tacoma funds. This closure will not affect applications already in process. Since 2021, the City has provided 1,113 households with \$8,359,460 in rental assistance (this is an increase of 3 households and \$9,903, in assistance over last report). The City has now fully expended its ERA 1 award and its set aside for utility assistance from ERA 2 funds. When we launched this program in 2020, we set a goal of having at least 45% of the households served headed by a person of color, to date, 65% of the households served are headed by a person of color. The City's Rental Assistance Fund at the Greater Tacoma Community Foundation has received 31 gifts totaling \$33,335.

SUBJECT: Participatory Budgeting (Districts 4 and 2)

DATE: February 15, 2023

Staff from the Office of Management & Budget (OMB) and the Media & Communications Office are providing an update on the status of the District 4 Participatory Budgeting project – currently on its second phase of five – and the District 2 Participatory Budgeting project.

District 4 Participatory Budgeting Project

The community leadership team and City staff are currently in phase two (of five) for the District 4 Participatory Budgeting project (focused on 98404 and 98418, as decided by the community leadership team). In phase one, a dozen East Tacoma residents gathered to create a community leadership team. They led the creation of the project's guidelines, timeline, and outreach plan for the project.

Now in phase two (which started in the early fall of 2022), the community leadership team and staff are working with the community to collect ideas on how East Tacoma residents would like to spend \$1,000,000 to improve their neighborhood. Idea ballots are in English, Spanish, and Vietnamese. Residents can also submit their ideas online (in English

[https://engagepiercecounty.mysocialpinpoint.com/pbtacoma] and Spanish [https://engagepiercecounty.mysocialpinpoint.com/pbtacomasp]).

The group has attended large events like Salishan Night Out, Día de los Muertos, McKinley Street Fair, and Tet. The team has worked with students at Lincoln High school. Ballot boxes have been distributed around the Eastside in locations such as Parable, Eastside Community Center, Vien Dong, Tacoma libraries, and other local businesses, collecting 477 ideas so far in three languages. Idea collection will continue until the end of February.

After the idea collection phase ends, City staff will spend approximately two months working with the community leadership team to turn top ideas into feasible project proposals. This requires working with several City departments and partner organizations such as Metro Parks and Tacoma Public Schools. City staff have been briefed through informational sessions and workshops with City staff in preparation for the proposal phase. After proposals have been created and vetted, residents will vote on which proposal should be funded \$1,000,000. Voting will likely occur online in May and in-person if the community leadership team so chooses. The timeline for implementation will be dependent on the nature of the project. Projects such as park improvements (which have been suggested in the past) or street improvements may require more time.

District 2 Participatory Budgeting Project

Preparation has begun for the District 2 project. Multiple District 2 residents have shown interest in being on the community leadership team and official recruitment will begin in the coming months. This process will be more heavily supported with the addition of a Participatory Budgeting Analyst at the Office of Management & Budget. Staff is currently in the final stages of hiring the Participatory Budgeting Analyst, with a projected start date in March 2023. This position will lead the implementation of District 2 and coordinate the projects across the remaining districts.

Phase 1 of the District 2 process will consist of visits to District 2 schools, business districts, and other groups. City staff have compiled a list of potential community members to contact. A meeting with Council Member Rumbaugh will be scheduled once a final list is compiled, and she will have an opportunity to ask questions and provide additional names if desired.

DATE: February 22, 2023

Through the Washington State Department of Commerce Small Business Innovation Grant (SBIF), Community & Economic Development (CED) is leveraging \$1 million to support Tacoma's micro businesses, with an emphasis on BIPOC and woman owned businesses as well as businesses located within areas of low-to-very-low economic opportunity, through two programs: Technical Assistance Program (\$500,000) and the Restoration Grant (\$500,000).

Technical Assistance Programs

CED is partnering with three organizations specializing in technical assistance for micro businesses. From March 2023 – May 2023, Devland, Kay Tita, and Spaceworks Tacoma will roll out three new one-time programs focusing on direct intermediate to advanced level technical assistance for small and microbusinesses (with a focus on BIPOC and woman-owned businesses and businesses located in areas of low-to-very-low economic opportunity) in the areas of financial and digital literacy and readiness.

Devland "GROW"

The GROW program is targeting micro enterprises looking to advance their businesses through lean and efficient operations. Participants will gain support generating key finance and business plan documents along with digital marketing and content creation support from Devland's content builder team. This approach is offered with workshops but focused on real-time engagement helping micro-entrepreneurs hit key milestones.

Kay Tita Digital Sales Access Program (DSAP)

DSAP will serve up to 65 Tacoma-based businesses with training that will help business owners grow their operations by providing them with a free POS system and training to increase their e-commerce capacity, social media marketing, digital literacy, and financial awareness.

Spaceworks Tacoma

Spaceworks will provide training, technical assistance, and financial resources to 35 graduates of its incubator programs to grow their digital marketing efforts. This includes web design, social media content creation, product photography, video creation, paid advertising, e-commerce platforms, and accounting and invoicing software.

Restoration Grants (update to January 12, 2023 report)

The grant application that launched January 11 and closed February 2 received 129 applications totaling \$1,381.056. Fewer applications came in for Property Damage Repair than anticipated and more came in for Market Enhancement. After vetting and selection, moving forward for funding verification are:

Property Damage Repair, up to \\$3k - 42 recipients for a total \$100,181 **Market Enhancement, up to \\$20k - 25** recipients for a total of \$398,837

LEGISLATIVE INTENT:

Council Contingency Fund Request:

South Sound Together (SST) is a community-minded group of business leaders seeking to promote South Puget Sound as a good place for business and a great place to live. By bringing together key leaders from across the region and leveraging our investment of time and resources, South Sound Together aims to advance community and economic goals and tell the region's story. South Sound Together was formed in 2015 and has undertaken several initiatives to showcase South Sound as a good place for business and a great place to live since that time, including the 'Live Like the Mountain's Out' campaign. The initiative's ongoing goals include engaging in partnerships and building community and positively impacting the lifestyle and economy of South Sound.

The initiative was originally housed within the Tacoma News Tribune. In 2020, South Sound Together transitioned operations from The News Tribune, recommitted to community projects, and registered as a nonprofit corporation in Washington State.

A \$12,000 Mt. Rainier Sponsorship/Membership would provide the City with:

- A seat on the South Sound Together 2023 Board (to be filled by the Community & Economic Development Director or their delegate)
- Sponsorship of a non-profit to join the South Sound Together Board for a year
- Help steer the direction of the 2023 projects
- Inclusion in all presentations, promotions, and marketing, including South Sound Together social media and the South Sound Proud website
- Feature in an issue of South Sound and South Sound Business Magazines
- 44 individualized sponsorship messages on KNKX

I ask for your support for a Council Contingency Fund expenditure for \$4,800 to fund two Commission on Immigrant and Refugee Affairs' Members and a Council Member Participation in the 2023 Welcoming Interactive Conference.

LEGISLATIVE INTENT:

Council Contingency Fund Request:

The Office of Equity and Human Rights staff will be in attendance at the Welcoming Interactive taking place on April 26th-28th in San Jose, California. The Welcoming Interactive is an annual inperson conference that takes place with Welcoming America. The Welcoming Interactive is typically held on the East coast and for the first time, they will offer this conference on the West coast.

In 2022, the Director of the Office of Equity and Human Rights, as well as the staff liaison for the Commission on Immigrant and Refugee Affairs attended the Welcoming Interactive to broaden the understanding of how to better align the City of Tacoma's immigrant and refugee inclusion efforts with cities and initiatives from around the country.

The commission has identified areas of opportunities for the Council to consider that will help CIRA better serve as a liaison between the community and the city and support innovative welcoming and belonging strategies by sending two commissioners and one Council Member to the annual conference. The objective is to learn from other municipalities and community groups about strategies that will help create a more inclusive community. The intention to send staff, commissioners, and a Council Member is to dedicate that time to focus on immigrants and refugees in a place where it is the primary and centric focal point. At the Welcoming Interactive, staff, commissioners, and one Council Member will be asked to convene daily to discuss learnings and chart potential next steps including the idea of developing a Welcoming Plan and ways to elevate Welcoming Week celebration and events. This funding would cover costs associated with flight, hotel, registration, per diem, ground transportation, and any miscellaneous fees.
