Pursuant to the City of Tacoma March 12, 2020, state of emergency proclamation in response to COVID-19, made in accordance with Tacoma Municipal Code Chapter 1.10., contract awards for purchases must be approved by the City Manager or delegee.

RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY:

The Office of Health and Safety recommends a contract be awarded to Liberty Mutual Group Inc doing business as Eberle Vivian, Inc., Kent, WA, in the amount of \$2,000,000, plus applicable taxes, for an initial contract term of three years with the option to renew for two one-year terms, for third-party administration of workers' compensation claims administration services.

STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

- Strengthen and support a safe city with healthy residents by ensuring its workforce is taken care of following an occupational injury or illness.
- Encourage and promote an efficient and effective government, which is fiscally sustainable and guided by engaged residents.

BACKGROUND:

The City of Tacoma (City) has been self-insured for day to day operations of the City workers' compensation program since 1977, and historically this program was administered internally. As a result of the 2005 Risk Management Breakthrough Change Initiative recommendations, and as part of the City Manager's plan of reorganization, the City transferred its workers' compensation claims administration to a third party. As the existing contract will expire later this year, the City issued a Request for Proposals (RFP) for these services.

ISSUE: The Workers' Compensation Division of the Office of Health and Safety oversees the third-party administrator services and the Workers' Compensation Program. This service and program ensure employees' claims are handled in a timely manner resulting in less time loss and increased productivity.

ALTERNATIVES: The alternative to awarding this contract would be to return to City staff administering the program. As this has been outsourced, the City is not staffed to do so. Additionally, adding staff would stand in contrast to the City Manager's reorganization plan.



COMPETITIVE SOLICITATION:

RFP CM21-0483F was opened April 14, 2021. Ten companies were invited to participate, in addition to normal advertising of the project. Three proposals were received. Eberle Vivian, Inc. received the highest score.

Pursuant to the City of Tacoma March 12, 2020, state of emergency proclamation in response to COVID-19, made in accordance with Tacoma Municipal Code Chapter 1.10., contract awards for purchases must be approved by the City Manager or delegee.

RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY:

The Environmental Services Department recommends a contract be awarded to Pivetta Brothers Construction Inc, Sumner, WA, in the amount of \$3,108,836.81, plus a 15 percent contingency, for a cumulative total of \$3,575,162.33, plus applicable taxes, budgeted from various department funds, to replace aging wastewater, stormwater, and water distribution pipes in the vicinity of South J and I Streets from South 13th Street to Division Avenue.

STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

- Strengthen and support a safe city with healthy residents.
- Assure outstanding stewardship of the natural and built environment.

This project will replace aging wastewater, stormwater, and water distribution pipes. Roadways impacted by the proposed underground utility replacement work will be restored with permanent asphalt pavement patch. This work supports a safe city with healthy residents, and assures outstanding stewardship of the natural and built environment of this neighborhood.

BACKGROUND:

Existing underground utilities in this neighborhood have provided many years of reliable essential services and are in need of replacement. These utilities have reached the end of their design life and are at risk of failure.

ISSUE: Replacement of existing wastewater, stormwater, and water distribution pipes in this neighborhood will reduce the risk of failure that may cause interruptions in essential City of Tacoma (City) services, and represents the lowest life cycle cost solution.

ALTERNATIVES: Taking no action and accepting the risk of future pipe failures will result in unanticipated interruptions to essential City services provided to this neighborhood.



COMPETITIVE SOLICITATION:

Request for Bids Specification No. ES21-0547F was opened October 12, 2021. The project was advertised in normal publications. Nine submittals were received.

Pivetta Brothers Construction Inc submitted a bid that resulted in the lowest evaluated submittal after consideration of Equity in Contracting (EIC) requirements. The table below reflects the amount of the base award.

CONTRACT HISTORY: New contract.

SUSTAINABILITY: Replacement of these pipes will minimize the risk of failure thereby reducing the potential for discharge of untreated wastewater into Puget Sound; resulting in positive environmental impacts.

EIC/LEAP COMPLIANCE: The recommended contractor is in compliance with the EIC Regulation requirements per memorandum dated October 22, 2021. The EIC requirements for this project are six percent for Minority Business Enterprise (MBE), three percent for Women Business Enterprise (WBE), and five percent for Small Business Enterprise (SBE). The EIC utilization levels of the recommended contractor, Pivetta Brothers Construction Inc, are six percent for MBE, six percent for WBE, and six percent for SBE. The Local Employment and Apprenticeship Training Program (LEAP) requirements are Local Employment Goal of fifteen percent and Apprentice Utilization Goal of fifteen percent.

SUMMARY & PURPOSE:

A Resolution to add an application to increase districts where electric fences are allowed to the 2022 Land Use Regulatory Code Amendment process for consideration and technical analysis.

BACKGROUND:

This Council Member's Recommendation is Based On:

This resolution directs the City Manager to have staff and the Tacoma Planning Commission evaluate a code change to increase the number of districts where electric fences are allowed through the 2022 Land Use Regulatory Code Amendment process.

Throughout the City, businesses have raised concerns of increased theft and safety issues that have added severe expenses. The intention of this resolution is to propose code that would allow the use of electric fences as a secondary security method to protect assets like parking lots. The fencing would be installed on the inside of a traditional fence, and would work as a secondary deterrent for theft. Currently, electric fences are prohibited in all zoning districts except for industrial. Consideration of code changes should be limited to zoning in downtown, commercial, and mixed use districts. It does not include residential zoning. Sample language and development standards for consideration can be found in Exhibit A attached to the resolution.

The proposal to change where electric fences will require a change to TMC 13.06.090.K.3, which requires review by the Tacoma Planning Commission. The project cycle of the 2022 Annual Amendment to the One Tacoma Comprehensive Plan and/or the Land Use Regulatory Code ("2022 amendment") runs from January 2021 through June 2022. The *One Tacoma Plan* is the blueprint for achieving the community's vision for future growth and the Land Use Regulatory Code (Title 13 of the Tacoma Municipal Code) is a key tool to implementing the goals and policies of the Plan. These documents are reviewed and amended, generally, on an annual basis in accordance with the State Growth Management Act in order to maintain their effectiveness. The Planning Commission will make recommendations to the City Council for final review and approval in 2022.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT/ (CUSTOMER RESEARCH):

Tacoma business owners have contacted City Council members requesting code be changed to allow for electric fences. These business owners have already faced losses due to theft and are seeking alternative ways to reduce further losses that threaten their business.

2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES:

Equity and Accessibility:

Small, locally owned businesses are less able to absorb the cost of property theft and other crime on their property. The recent increases in property crime, vandalism, and thefts targeting businesses threaten our local economy.

Economy/Workforce: *Equity Index Score*: Select Index Score.

Increase the number of Tacoma households that have livable wage jobs within proximity to the city. Decrease the number of vacant properties downtown and in the neighborhood business districts.

Livability: *Equity Index Score*: Select Index Score.

Increase positive public perception of safety and overall quality of life.

Council Members have head from local businesses that have been victims of theft and other crime that threaten their ability to maintain their businesses in the City. Expanding options for these business owners to secure resources their businesses rely on will increase the perception of safety and quality of life, and also will reduce the likelihood the businesses will shut down or leave the City.

The 2022 amendment cycle runs from January 2021 through June 2022, with final recommendations being brought to the City Council for approval.

COUNCIL MEMBER RECOMMENDATION:

The recommendation is to include this application to the Land Use Regulatory Code Amendment in the 2022 process in order to expedite considering solutions for local businesses impacted by theft and other public safety concerns.

DATE: November 24, 2021

I ask for your support for an ordinance relating to Public Ways; amending, retitling and renumbering Chapter 9.16 to add two new sections to prevent obstruction and damage to sidewalks from the loading, unloading and transport of goods, and amending the penalty provision to align with Tacoma's Uniform Enforcement Code.

LEGISLATIVE INTENT:

Ordinance Request:

The Tacoma Municipal Code does not have protections for City sidewalks from obstruction and damage caused by loading, unloading and transportation of goods using machinery. The City's sidewalks are part of its transportation system and therefore it is important they are maintained in a safe usable condition. Sidewalks represent a major investment by the citizens of Tacoma. Inaccessible and damaged sidewalks can pose a hazard to pedestrians so maintaining conditions of sidewalks help reduce the likelihood of someone getting injured.

This policy proposal is intended to preserve critical infrastructure for the following reasons:

- The City holds developers accountable to building sidewalk infrastructure, which is expensive to initially build and to replace. Putting preservation standards in place will respect and make the most of this investment of private funds.
- The City also makes substantial investment in sidewalk infrastructure with public funds. We owe it to tax payers to preserve these investments for the public good.
- Recent large investments by the City are intended to be economic development enhancements in lower opportunity neighborhoods, such as the Lincoln District Revitalization project and Links to Opportunity in the hilltop. Preserving these investments is an economic driver and will ensure investments in low opportunity communities have long-term positive impacts.
- Access to sidewalks is an equity issue. Lower opportunity neighborhoods already have fewer sidewalks than higher opportunity neighborhoods. We must preserve what is currently available.

This ordinance would include language on loading and unloading on sidewalks and on damage to sidewalks from loading, unloading or transportation. Suggested edits to Chapter 9.16 of the TMC can be seen in the attached document, "Exhibit A".
