Dear Mayor and Council Members:

ITEMS OF INTEREST

- 1. City Manager Elizabeth Pauli provides the attached approved **Purchase Contract Awards** for the week of May 2, 2022.
- 2. Mayor Victoria Woodards provides the attached **Council Consideration Request** for a Resolution declaring the City of Tacoma's commitment to ensuring all residents have a safe and affordable place to live by joining **House America**.
- 3. The City's Public Works Department was awarded an additional \$1,222,500 for the construction of the estimated \$6.5 million Prairie Line Trail Phase II project. This will increase the total Federal Highway Administration funds for the construction phase from \$4,400,000 to \$5,622,500 and decrease the required City match dollars funded via the Streets Initiative; however, the original match funds will remain allocated to the project to cover projected construction cost escalation. The original grant was awarded in 2021, to fund construction of a shared use path in Tacoma's Brewery District between South 21st and 25th Streets along the former BNSF rail line commonly referred to as Hood Street. This is the final phase of the Prairie Line Trail connecting the Brewery District, UW Tacoma and the Thea Foss Waterway. Construction is scheduled to be completed by the end of 2023.

- <u>City-funded Temporary and Emergency Shelter Performance</u>: The City posts weekly information about its Temporary and Emergency Shelter locations including current census, number of available beds and exits to housing. This information can be found at: <u>https://cms.cityoftacoma.org/NCS/City%20Authorized%20Emergency%20Shelter%20Sit</u> <u>es/Weeklydataupdate.pdf</u> and is updated weekly.

8. <u>Mental and Behavioral Health Crisis Response Team Request for Information Issued</u>: In follow up to recommendations outlined in the Alternative Response Study and as a part of the City's ongoing anti-racist transformation efforts, the City has published a Request For Information (RFI) this week. As outlined in past Transformation updates, this RFI will help the City research options for developing a Mental and Behavioral Health Crisis Response Team as an alternative to police as primary responders while helping us to identify providers that may be able to meet the intent of the study recommendations. **The RFI will be open for responses through May 31st**. A link is available here.

Responses to the RFI will inform changes to the delivery of mental and behavioral health crisis resources and homelessness crisis resources in response to calls for service (such as those received by 911 and the upcoming 988 crisis line). These additional response options will complement those already existing throughout the city (such as the HEAL team providing homelessness outreach, TFD CARES, etc.), providing alternatives to police and fire first responders in appropriate situations. As outlined in prior communications, exploring existing resources and potential providers is particularly important due to the limited supply of Designated Crisis Responders needed to implement the specific model of Mental/Behavioral Health Alternative Response suggested by the consultants. Notable examples of similar models implemented elsewhere in the country include Denver STAR and Eugene Oregon's CAHOOTS.

- 9. Real Property Services Real Estate Officer Greg Muller provides the attached **Public Hearing Briefing memorandum** scheduled for May 10, 2022, regarding the declaration of surplus and sale of 2.74 acers.
- 10. Encampment Outreach: The City's Homeless Engagement and Alternatives Liaison (HEAL) Team (formerly the Homeless Outreach Team) performs encampment outreach throughout the week to provide individuals opportunities to connect to shelter, behavioral health, substance use and employment services. For the week of April 25-29, 2022, staff visited four locations and conducted five phone referrals. This resulted in twenty-five individuals being contacted and nine individuals connected to resources.
- 11. <u>Mitigation Site at 82nd and Pacific Expected to open May 9th</u>: **The mitigation site at 82nd and Pacific operated by FOB Hope is expected to start intakes on Monday, May 9, 2022**. The site has 25 units and can house up to 35 individuals. The site will serve singe adults and couples and has a priority preference to serve veterans. The site will accept other individuals experiencing homelessness if no veterans are awaiting service. The provider will be working from a pre-established waitlist to begin intakes. This mitigation site is located on TPU-owned property and is available for use as a temporary shelter location through August of 2023.
- 12. <u>Temporary Shelter Operations at Lighthouse Closed</u>: The temporary inclement weather shelter at Lighthouse Activity Center (5016 A Street) which opened on December 26, 2021, closed on April 30, 2022. The temporary shelter served over one hundred fifty clients during operation. Of the nineteen residents that were on site at time of closure, seventeen successfully transitioned to other shelter locations and two chose to relocate on their own.

- 13. <u>Rental Assistance</u>: The rental assistance portal is open! Residents may find more information at <u>https://www.piercecountywa.gov/7142/Rental-Assistance</u>. The program provides up to 12 months of back assistance dating back to March 2020 as well as three months future assistance and serves households up to 80% of Pierce County Area Median Income. Applicants may also qualify for utility assistance through the program. Since 2021, the City has provided 900 households with \$6,533,748 in rental assistance (this is an increase of 5 households and \$96,868 in assistance over last report) and 1,971 households with \$2,453,007 in utility assistance (this is an increase of 8 households and \$21,548 in assistance over last report) The City has now fully expended its ERA 1 award and is expending ERA 2 funds. When we launched this program in 2020, we set a goal of having at least 45% of the households served headed by a person of color, to date, 65% of the households served are headed by a person of color. The City's Rental Assistance Fund at the Greater Tacoma Community Foundation has received 30 gifts totaling \$32,820
- 14. <u>Senior Meal Delivery</u>: Access to healthy meals is important to our senior population and the City has adjusted contracted services during the COVID-19 pandemic to ensure seniors can still access food while senior centers are not operating. **The City's contracted partner ensured pickup and delivery of 243 meals for the week of April 25-29, 2022.**

On our third agenda item, staff from the Public Works department will provide the **draft annual amendments of the Six-Year Transportation Improvement Program** required by RCW 35.77.010. The program is updated annually, and a copy must be filed with the State Secretary of Transportation by July 1, 2022.

Pursuant to the City of Tacoma March 12, 2020, state of emergency proclamation in response to COVID-19, made in accordance with Tacoma Municipal Code Chapter 1.10., contract awards for purchases must be approved by the City Manager or delegee.

RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY:

Tacoma Venues & Events (TVE) requests approval to increase Contract CW2234042, to STAFF PRO, INC. dba Allied Universal Security Services, Tacoma, WA, by \$2,250,000, plus applicable taxes, for provisions of security and guest services for Tacoma Dome & Greater Tacoma Convention Center. This increase will bring the contract to a cumulative total of \$10,350,000, plus applicable taxes.

STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

- Strengthen and support a safe city with healthy residents.
- Foster a vibrant and diverse economy with good jobs for all Tacoma residents.
- Cultivate a vibrant cultural sector that fosters a creative, cohesive community.

STAFF PRO, INC. dba Allied Universal Security Services provides 24-hour security and peer security services for the Tacoma Dome and Greater Tacoma Convention Center. This work employs hundreds of local and regional residents and enables TVE to provide safe and secure events in support of creating a vibrant cultural sector in the community.

BACKGROUND:

November 1, 2016, TVE entered into a Contract with STAFF PRO, INC. for provisions of security and guest services for Tacoma Dome and Greater Tacoma Convention Center which was a result of Specification No. PF16-0328F with a termination date of December 31, 2020 and an initial total compensation not to exceed (NTE) the amount of \$8,100,000.

Effective January 1, 2021, TVE and STAFF PRO, INC. entered into an Amendment to extend the contract termination date to December 31, 2022. The not to exceed amount was mistakenly not correspondingly increased.

ISSUE: The initial NTE value has been expended and the contract cannot continue for the full extension through 2022 without increasing the NTE value accordingly. Retaining STAFF PRO, INC. services is critical to the safety and security of events at the Tacoma Dome and Greater Tacoma Convention Center.

ALTERNATIVES: The NTE value could not be increased, effectively canceling STAFF PRO, INC.'s contract and requiring TVE to issue a subsequent Request for Proposal for services. This would place TVE in breach of the agreement with STAFF PRO, INC. and be extremely disruptive to operations at the Tacoma Dome and Greater Tacoma Convention Center.

COMPETITIVE SOLICITATION:

Request for Proposals Specification No. PF16-0328F was opened October 9, 2016. Seven companies were invited to bid in addition to normal advertising of the project. Six submittals were received. STAFF PRO, INC. submitted a bid that resulted in the best score evaluated submittal after consideration of Equity in Contracting (EIC) participation goals. The table below lists the respondents along with their final scores.

CONTRACT HISTORY: Contract CW2234042 was originally awarded to STAFF PRO, INC. as a result of Request for Proposals Specification No. PF16-0328F, in November of 2016. The original contract term was four years with one two-year option with a not to exceed contract value of \$8,100,000.

Effective May 1, 2017, contract was amended to update name of City facility from Public Assembly Facilities to Tacoma Venues and Events and to include rental of City office space to the vendor.

Effective January 1, 2020, contract was amended to update term of rental agreement negotiated in amendment 1.

Effective December 31, 2020, contract was amended to execute optional two-year extension and update pricing.

Amendment 4, dated April 1, 2022, seeks to increase the contract value by \$2,250,000 to allow compensation for services rendered through the end of the contract term.

SUSTAINABILITY: Sustainability was considered in line with requirements of the time when the solicitation was issued.

EIC/LEAP COMPLIANCE: Not Applicable. The bid was issued prior to EIC requirements but did include five percent of final score for Small Business Enterprise considerations.





LEGISLATIVE INTENT:

Resolution/Ordinance Request:

House America is a federal initiative, led by Housing and Urban Development Secretary Marcia L. Fudge. As Secretary of HUD and Chair of the United States Interagency Council on Homelessness (USICH), Secretary Fudge invites mayors, county leaders, Tribal nation leaders, and governors into a national partnership to use the historic investments provided through the American Rescue Plan to address the crisis of homelessness through a Housing First approach.

Through the American Rescue Plan, communities now have historic resources—70,000 emergency housing vouchers, \$5 billion in HOME grants, \$350 billion in State and Local Recovery Funds through the Department of the Treasury, and significant investments to preserve and protect housing on tribal lands - to help more Americans obtain the safety of a stable home. Communities also have resources through the CARES Act, the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2021, and other state, tribal, and local resources to re-house people experiencing homelessness and create additional dedicated housing units to address homelessness. House America provides communities with the focus, resolve, and technical know-how needed to deploy these resources to maximize impact.

The City of Tacoma will partner with HUD to use American Rescue Plan resources, alongside other federal, tribal, state, and local resources to re-house households experiencing homelessness through a Housing First approach, and to add new units of affordable housing into the development pipeline by December 31, 2022. Tacoma will set a goal of 96 units of new, permanent supportive housing in the pipeline by the end of 2022.

Supportive housing not only provides stable housing but, also wrap around services to help address chronic issues and chart a path forward for success.
