REPORTS BY THE CITY MANAGER

City Manager Elizabeth Pauli reported that the Pierce County Department of Emergency Management is coordinating the response to current cold weather forecasts and sharing information about available resources for homeless individuals, Pierce County staff estimates there are currently forty open beds in the shelter system, there are no plans to open additional inclement weather shelters at this time, the need for additional shelters will be reevaluated this week, and Pierce County is hosting a daily meeting with service providers and outreach teams to assess the community needs and to respond as needed. She concluded by stating the City's Homeless Engagement Alternatives Liaison Team is actively visiting encampments every day this week to encourage individuals to seek available shelter, the City is connecting with all of the City-funded shelter providers to assess their needs and offer supplies as needed, and the Lighthouse Activity Center continues to operate near capacity.

COMMENTS AND COMMITTEE REPORTS OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Economic Development Committee

There was no report.

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Council Member Hines expressed appreciation for his colleagues in the Government Performance and Finance Committee in providing the update for in-person meetings and for Claire Goodwin for her assistance in researching and compiling the information.

Council Member Bushnell addressed a comment made during Public Comment and stated there should be no disparaging remarks when people are giving comment, and stated that comments should be respectful, relevant, and on topic.

Mayor Woodards stated that she, along with Council Members Blocker and Walker, received a letter and signatures from several organizations asking the City to fully fund a non-police crisis response team, and that the letter contains six immediate demands, four demands for the 2023-2024 biennial budget, and over 500 signatures. She concluded by announcing that early Monday morning there was an apartment complex fire in the McKinley neighborhood, four units were completely destroyed displacing 13 residents, the American Red Cross is helping to shelter the displaced families, firefighters were on the scene and had the fire under control within an hour, there were no serious injuries, and the City is ready to support those families however needed; and expressed appreciation for firefighters and public safety officers who responded to the call and helped those families.

Deputy Mayor Ushka expressed appreciation for the Tacoma Fire Department for their promptness in responding to the apartment complex fire; announced that Parable is opening today to accept donations for the families that were affected; the Eastside Neighborhoods Advisory Council of Tacoma is meeting tonight, at 6:30 p.m., through Zoom, and will provide more information on how to support those that are displaced, and are coordinating with the American Red Cross; and there are GoFundMe accounts set up specifically for these families.
