### ITEMS OF INTEREST

- 4. Tacoma Public Utilities is approaching their one month mark since the go live on April **14**, 2022, enhanced MyAccount customer portal. In that month, they have seen the following activity:
  - 150,000 logins (half via web, half via mobile)
  - 21,000 paperless billing enrollments (half via web, half via mobile) keep in mind 2021 saw 5,283 paperless billing enrollments so this is a significant increase
  - 1870 new registrations
  - 1285 service orders (move ins/move outs, etc.)
  - 50,000 payments (75% via web, 25% via mobile)
  - 3000 new bank autopayments
  - 450 payment plans initiated via MyAccount (a nice self-service feature for customers in post pandemic account recovery)

- 6. Police Chief Avery Moore provides the attached Weekly Crime Report.
- <u>City-funded Temporary and Emergency Shelter Performance</u>: The City posts weekly information about its Temporary and Emergency Shelter locations including current census, number of available beds and exits to housing. This information can be found at: <u>https://cms.cityoftacoma.org/NCS/City%20Authorized%20Emergency%20Shelter%20Sit</u> <u>es/Weeklydataupdate.pdf</u> and is updated weekly.

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- Encampment Outreach: The City's Homeless Engagement and Alternatives Liaison (HEAL) Team (formerly the Homeless Outreach Team) performs encampment outreach throughout the week to provide individuals opportunities to connect to shelter, behavioral health, substance use and employment services. For the week of May 2-6, 2022, staff visited nine locations. This resulted in forty-two individuals being contacted and five individuals connected to resources.
- May 25th Community Meeting for New Shelter Location: The City is currently working to stand up shelter at 2135 Martin Luther King Jr. Way in partnership with the Brotherhood RISE Center. The location is expected to serve up to 35 individuals at a time with 24/7 on site staff presence and supervision, case management and access to financial counseling, employment services and self-enrichment activities.

The City will be hosting a virtual community meeting to discuss this location on May **25th** from 6 - 7:30 pm. Information to access this meeting is provided below:

- 10. <u>Rental Assistance</u>: The rental assistance portal is open! Residents may find more information at <u>https://www.piercecountywa.gov/7142/Rental-Assistance</u>. The program provides up to 12 months of back assistance dating back to March 2020 as well as three months future assistance and serves households up to 80% of Pierce County Area Median Income. Applicants may also qualify for utility assistance through the program. Since 2021, the City has provided 907 households with \$6,567,406 in rental assistance (this is an increase of 7 households and \$33,658 in assistance over last report). The City has now fully expended its ERA 1 award and its set aside for utility assistance from ERA 2 funds. Households needing utility assistance are still able to access that assistance through the portal and are supported by available funding from Pierce County. When we launched this program in 2020, we set a goal of having at least 45% of the households served headed by a person of color, to date, 65% of the households served are headed by a person of color. The City's Rental Assistance Fund at the Greater Tacoma Community Foundation has received 30 gifts totaling \$32,820.
- 11. <u>Senior Meal Delivery</u>: Access to healthy meals is important to our senior population and the City has adjusted contracted services during the COVID-19 pandemic to ensure seniors can still access food while senior centers are not operating. **The City's contracted partner ensured pickup and delivery of 247 meals for the week of May 2-6, 2022.**

### **SUMMARY AND PURPOSE:**

A resolution a resolution declaring the City of Tacoma's commitment to ensuring all residents have a safe and affordable place to live by joining House America.

### **COUNCIL SPONSORS:**

Mayor Woodards and Council Members Blocker and Daniels

### **BACKGROUND:**

House America is a federal initiative, led by Housing and Urban Development Secretary Marcia L. Fudge. As Secretary of HUD and Chair of the United States Interagency Council on Homelessness (USICH), Secretary Fudge invites mayors, county leaders, Tribal nation leaders, and governors into a national partnership to use the historic investments provided through the American Rescue Plan to address the crisis of homelessness through a Housing First approach.

Through the American Rescue Plan, communities now have historic resources—70,000 emergency housing vouchers, \$5 billion in HOME grants, \$350 billion in State and Local Recovery Funds through the Department of the Treasury, and significant investments to preserve and protect housing on tribal lands - to help more Americans obtain the safety of a stable home. Communities also have resources through the CARES Act, the Consolidated Appropriations Act of 2021, and other state, tribal, and local resources to re-house people experiencing homelessness and create additional dedicated housing units to address homelessness. House America provides communities with the focus, resolve, and technical know-how needed to deploy these resources to maximize impact.

The City of Tacoma will partner with HUD to use American Rescue Plan resources, alongside other federal, tribal, state, and local resources to re-house households experiencing homelessness through a Housing First approach, and to add new units of affordable housing into the development pipeline by December 31, 2022. Tacoma will set a goal of 96 units of new, permanent supportive housing in the pipeline by the end of 2022. This initiative and the affordable housing goal will be monitored by Community and Economic Development.

### **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT/ CUSTOMER RESEARCH:**

Affordable Housing and Supportive Housing for our community experiencing homelessness continues to be a priority of the Council and the City. There is still a need to develop more affordable housing options that can support individuals experiencing homelessness find the resources they need to stabilize themselves and find permanent housing stability. This initiative will target new housing options to help make that transition possible and increase housing availability for our community.

### **2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES:**

### **Equity and Accessibility:**

We know that often those who experience homelessness in Tacoma are those already facing other barriers, those being our communities of color and those who may suffer from chronic conditions. Supportive housing not only provides stable housing but, also wrap around services to help address chronic issues and chart a path forward for success.

### Economy/Workforce: Equity Index Score: Moderate Opportunity

Increase the percentage of people relocating to the city and affordability of housing compared to neighboring jurisdictions.

Decrease the number of vacant properties downtown and in the neighborhood business districts.

### Livability: Equity Index Score: Moderate Opportunity

Increase positive public perception of safety and overall quality of life.

Improve health outcomes and reduce disparities, in alignment with the community health needs assessment and CHIP, for all Tacoma residents

By providing supportive housing we can build more units of housing specific to our houseless neighbors that will help support them on their transition to stable housing. This will improve their lives and health outcomes and will also help move others off the streets into other shelter options and improve overall livability. Housing projects will also help to utilize vacant property and add to the affordable housing stock overall of Tacoma.

Subject: Update on Utility Account Recovery

### Summary:

In February, letters explaining that the disconnection moratorium would end March 31 were sent to residential and commercial utility customers with outstanding utility accounts. In addition, 30,260 installment plan letters were sent in March. Since that time, additional emails, where possible, and door hangers were also used to reach these customers.

The majority of door hanger distribution was completed by internal Customer Services field staff over a three-week period ending May 7. We originally attempted to complete door hangers with an external vendor that was unable to secure sufficient staffing in the current job market. A second contractor will deliver 1,989 door hangers for Water only customers located outside of Tacoma city limits.

On May 9, 808 customer accounts were sent for disconnection after not responding to our request to set-up an installment plan or provide a payment. In addition to the communications listed above, these customers were also sent a disconnection notice on April 26. The disconnection action resulted in many customers reestablishing their payment agreement and/or making deposit payments and having service restored. Unfortunately, we don't yet have a reporting mechanism that provides us real-time numbers of reconnections.

TPU is now shifting focus to customers with the largest outstanding balances. On May 10, Customer Services issued 1,925 Disconnection Notices, including:

- 384 multi-service accounts, with the largest balance being \$106,531.01
- 1,450 single-service accounts, with the largest balance being \$78,424.03
- 91 Water only accounts, with the largest balance being \$7,450.25

These accounts will be eligible for disconnection if no action is taken before May 23. We continue to ask these customers to respond so we can assist with reestablishing a payment agreement and completing an assistance assessment. We have many tools available to help customers maintain services while available community assistance is being secured.

Below is a permitting update on the Bridge Industrial project (LU21-0125).

### Status:

The Critical Area Development Permit and the State Environment Policy Act (SEPA) review are in "revisions required" status. No decisions have been issued regarding the project.

### **Next Steps:**

Public and agency comments have been transmitted to the applicant and to the City's subject matter experts for response and follow up. Multiple substantive comments were received from members of the public, environmental groups, and reviewing agencies, including the Environmental Protection Agency and the Tacoma-Pierce County Health Department (TPCHD). All comments must be reviewed and responded to where appropriate. Comments may be summarized and aggregated; some responses will be incorporated into the final decision documents.

Staff will complete their preliminary review of comments within the next two to three weeks. An initial response from the applicant is expected during that time as well.

Additional studies and information will be required from the applicant to determine further steps in the review (i.e., does the City retain the preliminary SEPA determination, what mitigation will be required) prior to decisions on both the Critical Area Permit and the final SEPA determination. These are likely to include an air quality analysis, climate change information, revised traffic information, hydrogeology studies, and more. This is in addition to permit revisions already requested (e.g., biodiversity information, tree study). Further, City staff will coordinate with TPCHD staff on how to incorporate a Health Impact Assessment into SEPA review. The City has not yet transmitted an official list of resubmittal items, pending staff review of comments; however, the applicant may start preparation of some in its own response to comments.

Under state law the City is required to act on permits in a timely manner, typically within 120 days of processing time (not including time staff are waiting on resubmittal from the applicant). Given the scope of this project, review is likely to take longer.

### **Communication:**

Planning and Development Services staff is working with Media and Communications Office staff to provide graphics and videos regarding the permitting process. See attached for a high-level overview graphic. This will be expanded with additional permit types and work flows, and will be animated for users within the coming weeks. In addition, the City maintains a website for this project, which includes answers to frequently asked questions.

### **Public Information Meeting:**

The public information meeting was held on April 14, 2022, from 6:00 p.m.to 8:45 p.m. The agenda included a presentation from staff, a statement from a South Tacoma Neighborhood Council Member, and

a presentation by the developer. Public comment followed. There were approximately 130 attendees, and it should be noted that most reviewing staff (both from the City and from outside agencies) also attended. Between February 8, 202, and April 21, 2022, the City received nearly 600 comment letters/emails. Oral comments echoed the written public comments.

Emergency Rule No. 6 – Format for Public Meetings and Capacity of Council Chambers 1 2 WHEREAS, on March 12, 2020, the City Manager and the Mayor of Tacoma, pursuant to Chapter 1.10 of the Tacoma Municipal Code and Chapter 3 38.52 of the Revised Code of Washington ("RCW"), proclaimed that an emergency exists caused by COVID-19 ("Proclamation") in the City of Tacoma; 4 and 5 WHEREAS, pursuant to the Proclamation, the Mayor is authorized to issue rules reasonably related to the protection of life, and such rules must be confirmed 6 at the earliest practicable time by the City Council; and 7 WHEREAS Second Amended Emergency Rule No. 1, effective August 10, 2021, and confirmed by the City Council on August 3, 2021, set the maximum 8 occupancy of the Council Chambers to 50%, or 72 persons, excluding Council 9 Members and City staff; and 10 WHEREAS Emergency Rule No. 5, effective February 23, 2022, and confirmed by the City Council on February 22, 2022, allows all public meetings of 11 the entire City Council and Public Utility Board to be held in a hybrid format that includes an in-person component and a remote option, and requires that all other 12 public meetings of the City of Tacoma be held in remote/virtual format only; Now, 13 therefore, BE IT ORDERED BY THE MAYOR OF THE CITY OF TACOMA: 14 Effective Monday, June 13, 2022, Second Amended Emergency Rule No. 1, 15 relating to Capacity of Council Chambers, and Emergency Rule No. 5, relating to Format for Public Meetings, are terminated. 16 Effective Monday, June 13, 2022, the City Council and Council Standing 17 Committees, and the Public Utility Board shall hold their public meetings inperson and may include a hybrid format that includes a remote option. These 18 public meetings include regular and special meetings of the City Council and 19 their Standing Committees, the Public Utility Board, and any other public meeting of the entire City Council or Board, or Council Standing Committees. 20 Public meetings with a remote component that are held by the City Council or 21 Public Utility Board will be held in compliance with applicable State guidelines. 22 23 24 25 26
