ITEMS OF INTEREST

The 2022 Amendment package includes four applications: 1) NewCold land use designation change, 2) South Sound Christian Schools land use designation changes, 3) work plan for South Tacoma Groundwater Protection District code amendments, and 4) minor plan and code amendments. The City Council will conduct a study session and public hearing on June 7, 2022, to consider adopting the 2022 Amendment on June 21, 2022. - 5. Tacoma Public Utilities Director Jackie Flowers and Environmental Services Director Mike Slevin co-hosted a hybrid listening session on May 26, 2022. Based on customer feedback, Jackie Flowers and Mike Slevin provided a new opportunity for customers to learn and give feedback about the ratemaking process for the City of Tacoma's utilities. Please see the attached meeting summary.
- 6. The Community and Economic Development Department hosted its first quarterly Workshop on "How To Do Business With the City of Tacoma" on Wednesday, June 1, 2022. Please see the attached event summary.

- City-funded Temporary and Emergency Shelter Performance: The City posts weekly information about its Temporary and Emergency Shelter locations including current census, number of available beds and exits to housing. This information can be found at: https://cms.cityoftacoma.org/NCS/City%20Authorized%20Emergency%20Shelter%20Sites/Weeklydataupdate.pdf and is updated weekly.
- 10. Competitive Funding 2023-2024: The Neighborhood & Community Services Department released a Notice of Funding Availability for 2023-2024 contract funding on June 1, 2022. The solicitation may be accessed at www.cityoftacoma.org/bids. Funding is limited to Mental Health and Substance Use Disorder funds and programs will need to demonstrate an alignment to that funding source as part of the application process. NCS plans to conduct a similar process for General Funds later in the year as the 2023-2024 budget is finalized. NCS and Purchasing staff will host two pre-proposal trainings for interested applicants on June 2, 2022, and June 8, 2022.
- 11. Encampment Outreach: The City's Homeless Engagement and Alternatives Liaison (HEAL) Team (formerly the Homeless Outreach Team) performs encampment outreach throughout the week to provide individuals opportunities to connect to shelter, behavioral health, substance use and employment services. For the week of May 23-27, 2022, staff visited five locations. This resulted in twenty-seven individuals being contacted and four individuals connected to resources.
- 12. Rental Assistance: The rental assistance portal is open! Residents may find more information at https://www.piercecountywa.gov/7142/Rental-Assistance. The program provides up to 12 months of back assistance dating back to March 2020 as well as three months future assistance and serves households up to 80% of Pierce County Area Median Income. Applicants may also qualify for utility assistance through the program. Since 2021, the City has provided 937 households with \$6,733,952 in rental assistance (this is an increase of 21 households and \$103,412, in assistance over last report). The City has now fully expended its ERA 1 award and its set aside for utility assistance from ERA 2 funds. Households needing utility assistance are still able to access that assistance through the portal and are supported by available funding from Pierce County. When we launched this program in 2020, we set a goal of having at least 45% of the households served headed by a person of color, to date, 65% of the households served are headed by a person of color. The City's Rental Assistance Fund at the Greater Tacoma Community Foundation has received 30 gifts totaling \$32,820.
- 13. <u>Senior Meal Delivery</u>: Access to healthy meals is important to our senior population and the City has adjusted contracted services during the COVID-19 pandemic to ensure seniors can still access food while senior centers are not operating. **The City's contracted partner ensured pickup and delivery of 258 meals for the week of May 23-27, 2022.**

STUDY SESSION/WORK SESSION

14. The City Council Study Session of Tuesday, June 7, 2022, will be conducted as a hybrid meeting. This meeting will be broadcast on TV Tacoma and live streamed on Facebook.

Discussion items will include: (1) Comprehensive Plan and Land Use Regulatory Code Proposed Amendments; (2) Vision Zero and Speed Limit Reduction Plan Update; (3) City of Tacoma's Six-Year Forecast for General and Supported Funds; (4) Other Items of Interest: Council Consideration Request – Infant Formula; (5) Committee Reports; (6) Agenda Review and City Manager's Weekly Report.

On our first agenda item, staff will be discussing the **proposed amendments to the Comprehensive Plan and Land Use Regulatory Code for 2022** ("2022 Amendment"), as recommended by the Planning Commission.

On our second agenda item, Public Works staff will present a **recommendation to lower the speed limit in residential districts to 20 MPH and in select neighborhood business districts to 25 MPH**. Lowering the speed limit supports the City's Vision Zero effort to eliminate traffic fatalities and serious injuries by 2035.

On our third agenda item, staff will provide the **City's six-year financial forecast for the general and supported funds**. This forecast will help staff assess the City's financial position ahead of the 2023-2024 biennial budget process.

Request for Bids - Specification No. PW22-0059F

DATE: May 16, 2022

Pursuant to the City of Tacoma March 12, 2020, state of emergency proclamation in response to COVID-19, made in accordance with Tacoma Municipal Code Chapter 1.10., contract awards for purchases must be approved by the City Manager or delegee.

RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY:

The Public Works Department recommends a contract be awarded to American Construction Co, Inc, Tacoma, WA, in the amount of \$669,500, plus a 10 percent contingency, for a cumulative total of \$736,450, plus applicable taxes, budgeted from various departmental funds, for removal and replacement of a dock and float system along the Thea Foss Waterway.

STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

- Strengthen and support a safe city with healthy residents.
- Assure outstanding stewardship of the natural and built environment.

This dock replacement is to provide safe, long-term access to the transient moorage station located at the project site.

BACKGROUND:

The existing dock was constructed in 1975 and is in need of being replaced. The existing structure consists of a floating dock supported by steel guide piles. The dock is accessed by a hinged gangway that is supported by a 350 square foot timber pier. There are currently no functioning utilities as a part of this dock configuration. These structures are used by both pedestrian and boat traffic for recreational activities.

ISSUE: This project will remove and replace approximately 225 linear feet of dock floats and install a new steel gangway ramp utilized for transient moorage along the Thea Foss Waterway.

ALTERNATIVES: The alternative to this project is not remove the dock and floats system and keep the older deteriorating structure in place.

COMPETITIVE SOLICITATION:

Request for Bids Specification No. PW22-0059F was opened March 22, 2022. No companies were invited to bid in addition to normal advertising of the project. Three submittals were received.



City of Tacoma

American Construction Co, Inc submitted a bid that resulted in the lowest submittal after consideration from our Construction Management Group. The table below reflects the amount of the base award.

Pre-bid Estimate: \$544,964

The recommended award is 23 percent above the pre-bid estimate.

Based on the estimated working days, staff believes this project will result in 1,920 labor hours.

CONTRACT HISTORY: New contract.

SUSTAINABILITY: This project will improve the City's infrastructure and the safety of residents during motorized and non-motorized activities.

EIC/LEAP COMPLIANCE: There was no EIC requirement. The Local Employment and Apprenticeship Training Program (LEAP) requirements are Local Employment Goal of 15 percent.



Tacoma Creates Participatory Budgeting Update

A recent <u>news release</u> announces the cultural projects that were selected by community members in the Eastside and South Tacoma, through a participatory budgeting project led by the Public Health Centers for Excellence at Tacoma-Pierce County Health Department in partnership with Tacoma Creates. People of all ages who live, work, go to school, or have kids who go to school in Tacoma's 98404 or 98409 ZIP codes were invited to vote on proposed cultural projects supported by \$100,000 in Tacoma Creates funding. The Eastside and South Tacoma are among Tacoma-Pierce County Health Department's Communities of Focus.

Three proposals for each community were developed by local advisory boards from the Eastside and South Tacoma respectively, from thousands of ideas submitted by community members.

Public voting was open from April 1 – May 13, 2022. Over five thousand community members of all ages across the Eastside and South Tacoma voted to select the cultural projects they most want to see in their communities: a Multicultural Festival Series in the Eastside and a South Tacoma Heritage Festival.

Eastside

In the Eastside, the Multicultural Festival Series netted 65 percent of the vote and will include three cultural celebrations: Lunar New Year, Juneteenth, and Dia de los Muertos. Each family-friendly festival will be one to two days long, and offer a wide array of performances, storytelling, food, art, and activities. The project will be developed and implemented by the Tacoma Refugee Choir, working in partnership with local cultural groups.

The remaining 35 percent of votes in the Eastside were split between two other project proposals: Light Up the City, a series of pop-up light shows and interactive workshops, which would have been developed and implemented by Permaculture Lifestyle Institute, and the Tacoma Eastside Freewall, a dedicated location for mural painters with workshops for youth and young adults, which would have been developed and implemented by Fab-5.

South Tacoma

In South Tacoma, the South Tacoma Heritage Festival netted 56 percent of the vote and will celebrate community diversity while promoting cross-cultural solidarity with a two-day event featuring dance, music, cultural presentations, kids' activities, and more. There will also be science and engineering themed learning opportunities that focus on concepts and techniques as well as career possibilities. The Asia Pacific Cultural Center will develop and implement this project, in coordination and engagement with local grassroots organizations.

The remaining 44 percent of votes in South Tacoma were split between two other project proposals: Rock the Block, a series of friendly competitions to showcase local talent, which would have been developed and implemented by Real Art Tacoma, and a Cross-Cultural Community Mural, a mural-creation process focused on the diverse cultures of South Tacoma, which would have been developed and implemented by Fab-5.

Tacoma Creates Tacoma Creates is a voter-approved initiative to increase access to arts, culture, heritage, and science experiences throughout Tacoma by reducing barriers to access and expanding offerings, particularly for underserved youth. Tacoma Creates is embedded within the City of Tacoma's Office of Arts & Cultural Vitality.

I ask for your support for a Council Contingency Fund request to purchase infant formula to support the Multicultural Childcare Center formula drive in the amount of \$5,000.

LEGISLATIVE INTENT:

Council Contingency Fund Request:

This year, the United States has experienced a severe shortage of infant formula because of the 2021-2022 global supply chain crisis compounded by a large-scale product recall, import restrictions, and market concentration. Unlike other food products, infant formula often does not have an available and acceptable substitute as a source of nutrition for those who rely on it. Without formula, our most vulnerable populations both from an income and health perspective are suffering from these shortages.

As of May 14, nation out-of-stock rates were reported to be 43% up from 31% two weeks prior; and by May 22, they had surged to 70%. The normal rate is typically 10% out of stock on store shelves. In the City of Tacoma, we are not immune to the global supply chain crisis. Many of our local parents have driven across the State to locate infant formula for their baby. The Multicultural Childcare Center has decided to start a drive to support parents that need infant formula.

Though supply chains are beginning to move and slowly return to regular levels, we are still seeing the impacts of the supply chain crisis and will for some time. This funding will help to alleviate the impact to families across Tacoma and provide needed formula now until regular supply chain and stock levels return.

I am requesting to support the Multicultural Childcare Center Infant Formula Drive to address the infant formula needs of our community in the amount of \$5,000.

FUNDING REQUESTED:

\$5,000

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Parents of infants that have been affected by the recall of baby formula and the global supply chain shortage will be affected the most as they will be able to take advantage of these funds.

2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES:

Equity and Accessibility:

The cost of infant formula is at an all-time high right now, and by helping to provide cost-free formula for our low-income and BIPOC families, we can help to alleviate one burden of many that have only been exasperated by the pandemic. Ensuring access to formula will also ensure we are improving the overall health outcomes for these youth and addressing our goals as a community for healthier infants.

Increase positive public perception of safety and overall quality of life.

Improve health outcomes and reduce disparities, in alignment with the community health needs assessment and CHIP, for all Tacoma residents

Explain how your legislation will affect the selected indicator(s)?

Addressing the infant formula shortages will improve health outcomes and reduce disparities in our community, especially for our low-income families. When families cannot access necessary nutrition through formula for their infants, the infants' development will suffer and future health outcomes will be impacted. Providing a vital resource at a time when shelves are empty will help to instill hope and ensure there is a positive perception of our overall quality of life.
