ITEMS OF INTEREST

- 1. City Manager Elizabeth Pauli provides the attached **Purchase Contract Awards** for the week of September 26, 2022.

Come celebrate the completion of the Black Lives Matter mural that sets the stage for community gatherings and healthy civic dialogue into the future on October 7, 2022, 11 am 12 pm at the Tollefson Plaza located on 17th and Pacific. The BLM Mural Project Tacoma recognizes that Black Lives Matter (BLM) and the mural represents the stories, histories, and values of the local Black community; gathered over the course of months through surveys, conversations, and creative participation. Completed in September, 2022, resulting in the completion of this wrap-around mural that surrounds Tollefson Plaza. The City's Human Rights Commission's Racial Justice and Equity Committee proposed creating a mural to signify that Tacoma supports Black lives and the Black Lives Matter movement. This mural encourages Tacoma residents to recognize the hardships suffered by people of color to achieve equity while at the same time continues to challenge us to persevere in unity toward racial justice.

Dionne Bonner was selected as the lead artist for this project in Fall 2021. Her project team included contributions from local artists; Kenya Adams, Gwen Jones, Breyahna Monet, Brian Neal Sr., Tyirell Patterson and Charles Taylor. The BLM mural was funded and coordinated in partnership with the City of Tacoma and the Tacoma Art Museum, including support from the City's Human Rights Commission, Tacoma Arts Commission, and Tacoma Creates

4. <u>City-funded Temporary and Emergency Shelter Performance</u>: The City posts weekly information about its Temporary and Emergency Shelter locations including current census, number of available beds and exits to housing. - 7. Encampment Outreach: The City's Homeless Engagement and Alternatives Liaison (HEAL)
 Team (formerly the Homeless Outreach Team) performs encampment outreach throughout the
 week to provide individuals opportunities to connect to shelter, behavioral health, substance
 use and employment services. For the week of September 19-23, 2022, staff visited six
 locations. This resulted in twenty individuals being contacted and no individuals
 connected to resources as they were not interested in the shelter options available.
- 8. Emergency Rental Assistance Portal Closed August 1, 2022: The Pierce County Rental Assistance program stopped on August 1, 2022; however, applications will be processed normally until all funds have been distributed, this includes both Pierce County and City of Tacoma funds. This closure will not affect applications already in process. Since 2021, the City has provided 1,066 households with \$7,909,651 in rental assistance (this is an increase of 9 households and \$109,747, in assistance over last report). The City has now fully expended its ERA 1 award and its set aside for utility assistance from ERA 2 funds. When we launched this program in 2020, we set a goal of having at least 45% of the households served headed by a person of color, to date, 65% of the households served are headed by a person of color. The City's Rental Assistance Fund at the Greater Tacoma Community Foundation has received 30 gifts totaling \$32,820.
- 9. 2022 Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant: The City of Tacoma, in partnership with Pierce County, has been awarded the 2022 Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant from the Department of Justice totaling \$310,110. The City of Tacoma will use the funding to support the City's transformation efforts and Council Priorities: Community Safety, and Belief and Trust by funding programs that deliver activities that empower local communities to tackle racism and reduce youth violence. Pierce County will utilize the funds toward resources for justice systems and law enforcement activities. These funds will be used for specific activities for the Department of Assigned Counsel, Support Court, Prosecuting Attorney, and Sheriff to provide additional public safety and justice services that address critical needs in Pierce County.
- 10. <u>Senior Meal Delivery</u>: Access to healthy meals and social and emotional support are important to our senior population. The City's contracted partner ensured in person, pickup, and delivery of 294 meals for the week of September 19-23, 2022. Lunches provided are available to Tacoma seniors (age 60 years and older) Monday through Friday on a first come-first serve basis, from 12 PM to12:30 PM.

SUBJECT: Madison District Green Infrastructure Project

Request for Bid Specification No. ES21-0004F

DATE: September 13, 2022

Pursuant to the City of Tacoma March 12, 2020, state of emergency proclamation in response to COVID-19, made in accordance with Tacoma Municipal Code Chapter 1.10., contract awards for purchases must be approved by the City Manager or delegee.

RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY:

The Environmental Services Department recommends a contract be awarded to R.L. Alia Company, Renton, WA, in the amount of \$10,537,286, plus a 20 percent contingency, for a projected contract total of \$12,644,743.20, plus applicable taxes, budgeted from various funds, for construction of the Madison District Green Infrastructure Project. The project is funded in part by the Washington State Department of Ecology Agreement #WQC-2018-TacoES-00100.

STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

- Strengthen and support a safe city with healthy residents.
- Assure outstanding stewardship of the natural and built environment.

This work supports a safe city with healthy residents and assures outstanding stewardship of the natural and built environment through reconstruction of failing roadways with pervious asphalt streets, increased pedestrian mobility via a new shared use walking and bike path, improved curb ramps and sidewalks, alleviation of localized flooding issues, and the installation of new street trees picked by residents of the neighborhood.

This project, through a partnership with the Public Works Department and Tacoma Water, will also replace aging wastewater and water main pipes within the project area. This will reduce the risk of a wastewater sewer system failure, which could result in untreated wastewater overflow, as well as avoiding water main failures that would create costly repairs and service impacts to Tacoma Water customers.

BACKGROUND:

The Environmental Services Department received a grant and a Clean Water State Revolving Fund (SRF) loan from the Washington State Department of Ecology and has partnered with the Public Works Department and Tacoma Water to replace the failing streets, resolve drainage problems, and replace the aging utilities in the Madison District.

In addition to replacing approximately 18 blocks of residential roadway, 15 of which will be permeable pavement, the project will also install a new shared use walking and bike path as part of a larger plan to increase walkability in the Tacoma Mall area. This path will eventually become a part of the planned Loop Road that will extend throughout the Tacoma Mall neighborhood.

ISSUE: Existing roadways in the Madison District are in poor or failing condition and experience recurring drainage issues. The project aims to mitigate these issues by replacing failed roadways with pervious streets, improving water quality, and providing better pedestrian mobility within the neighborhood.

ALTERNATIVES: The City could choose not to move forward with this project and not improve the failed residential streets or provide a solution to the current flooding issues. This would put the City in a position of accepting the risks of continued roadway failures and localized flooding. Additionally, it would require the forfeiture of the \$6,600,032.94 in combined grant and SRF funding from the Department of Ecology, potentially impairing the City's standing on future grant applications.

COMPETITIVE SOLICITATION:

Request for Bids Specification No. ES21-0004F was opened July 26, 2022. There were six submittals received. R.L. Alia Company submitted a bid that resulted in the lowest evaluated submittal. The table below reflects the amount of the base award.

CONTRACT HISTORY: New Contract

SUSTAINABILITY: The use of pervious pavement will divert flows from the City's surface water collection system and infiltrate it to the groundwater table as would naturally occur in undeveloped conditions. Additionally, the replacement of existing wastewater pipes will reduce the risk of failure, thereby reducing the potential for discharge of untreated wastewater into the Puget Sound, resulting in a positive environmental impact.

SUBJECT: July/August 2022 Neighborhood Council Liaison Report

SUMMARY:

The purpose of this memo is to provide a summary of topics and concerns discussed at the eight neighborhood councils and the Community Council of Tacoma during the months of July and August 2022. These items have been identified by the City Manager's Office liaison to each council as important or useful to bring to the City Council and City Manager's attention.

TOPICS and CONCERNS:

Central Tacoma Neighborhood Council

The July 7, 2022, meeting was cancelled due to the Fourth of July holiday week. There was no cancelation or report submitted for August 2022 Neighborhood.

Community Council of Tacoma

There was no cancelation or report submitted for July or August 2022.

East Side Neighborhood Council

During the July 21, 2022, meeting, the Neighborhood Council Liaison from the Tacoma Police Department provided updates on Chief Moore's plan to address violent crime and encouraged residents to view the plan. Board members encouraged residents to continue to dial 9-1-1 in emergencies, and many expressed their support for the crime plan. The Neighborhood Council expressed concern over the number of illegal fireworks in the neighborhood this Fourth of July holiday. The City's Neighborhood and Community Services Department presented on the wide variety of programs the Department supports beyond homelessness services - funding 160 programs in total. The Chair inquired about the number of citations given out for illegal use of fireworks. Liaisons from Tacoma Fire and Tacoma Police Department will provide this information and follow up with the Chair.

There was no cancelation or report submitted for August 2022.

New Tacoma Neighborhood Council

During the July 13, 2022, meeting the following issues were covered; New Council Member application process, the Chief Moore's Violent Crime Plan, restoring historic clocks in Tacoma, restoring art in Japan Town, and the Hilltop Street Fair on August 27th (several of the NTNC attendees are prominent in the planning this yearly event).

There was no cancelation or report submitted for August 2022.

Northeast Tacoma Neighborhood Council

The July 2022 meeting was cancelled. There was no cancellation or report submitted for August 2022.

North End Neighborhood Council

The July 4, 2022, meeting was moved to the July 11, 2022, to accommodate the Fourth of July Holiday. No report was submitted for this meeting.

The August 1, 2022, meeting was held in person at the University of Puget Sound's Welcome Center and on Zoom. Neighborhood Council member announced that the Proctor Arts Festival will be celebrated after a two year hiatus, August 6, 2022 10 to 5pm. Additionally the Proctor Neighborhood Plan is starting up—to get involved or gather more information a handout was available as well as this website www.nenc.org.

The Metro Parks liaison shared that their biennial budgeting cycle has begun and that the community will start to see opportunities to share ideas and opinions during the budgeting process, beginning in September. Additionally, it was reported that there may be a Levy Lid lift for parks restoration on the November ballot.

The Tacoma Police Department reviewed the new Violent Crime Plan, sharing the three phases and it's evidence-based and data driven approach. They highlighted the hotspot policing, high crime times, and continuous evaluation and improvement embedded in the plan.

The Tacoma Urban Forestry Team provided a presentation that covered the importance of tree canopy, urban health and the partnership with community. Information on how to apply for tree planting, rain gardens and more was made available.

South End Neighborhood Council:

During the July 5, 2022, meeting, the Neighborhood Council received Presentation by Speaker Jinkins regarding the 2022 Legislative Report.

Tacoma Police Department presented on the uptick of violent crimes; their primary focus is to reduce the number of victims of violent crimes and identify suspects. Chief Moore's Violent Crime Plan is under way and focused on deterrence and community engagement.

Neighborhood and Community Services reported on the updated 311 reporting and See-Click-Fix platform. Senior Centers are back in service, as of early June, at Beacon Activity Center on Mondays and Thursdays, at Lighthouse on Thursdays and Fridays. There is no specific programming on Wednesdays. Additional updates on City Authorized Emergency Shelter Sites were provided, including 82nd and Pacific and 35th and Pacific. Tacoma Rescue Mission will prioritize people that currently have tents.

Concerns around fireworks and associate noise were discussed. There was a question regarding a possible ordinance or some type of collaboration with the tribe to reduce the firework noise. 311 was offered to report disabled vehicles on streets for removal.

During the August 8, 2022, meeting, the Neighborhood Council received a presentation from Historic Preservation regarding the Lincoln Historic Property Survey. Liaison reports by Tacoma Police Department regarding Chief Moore's new Violent Crime Plan addressed hot spot policing, the place-based strategy, and the new Citizen's Academy. Tacoma Fire Department announced their CPR and Narcan distribution classes. Neighborhood and Community Services shared the new See-Click-Fix platform by 311 and provided an update on the 82nd and Pacific site being primarily geared towards veterans, and they anticipate being on site until June 2023. Construction of the new 35th and Pacific Authorized Encampment will start in September, for 50 individuals

max. City Manager Office Liaison covered the new Council Member interview process, and the Grit City trees program.

South Tacoma Neighborhood Council

July 20, 2022, Tacoma Fire Department covered tips on how to prevent arsons. Tacoma-Pierce County Health Department shared information on COVID-19 prevention and Monkey Pox. The Neighborhood Council announced that it planned to return to in-person meetings in August. Metro Parks covered upcoming events and cooling stations. Concerns surrounding trash pickup in the business districts and neighborhoods were discussed.

For the August 19, 2022, meeting, Pierce Transit spoke about their Youth Ride Free program, which has expanded to other counties of service. Tacoma Health Department spoke on COVID and Monkeypox and the rarity of cases and symptoms. The meeting was cut short as they met on an unpaid Zoom account that limited meeting time to 40 minutes. The September meeting will be in-person at the STAR Center, it is unclear if there will be a Zoom option.

West End Neighborhood Council

During the July 20, 2022, meeting, the Neighborhood Council heard form Gregory Tanbara from Tacoma-Pierce Co Health Dept. The report included a high-level overview of Covid cases and uptick in Covid related deaths in Pierce County, as well as an update on the rarity of Monkey Pox and the various vaccines available. Questions regarding the Tacoma Smelter Plume and the associated arsenic and lead contamination in soils were also discussed—and resources were given.

The Tacoma Police Dept. Liaison gave an update on the Violent Crimes Plan-- and introduced the new North/West End Community Officer, Mike Lim.

Marty Stump, Chief Planning Officer, Kristi Evans, Program Manager and Mary Anderson, Operations Manager from Metro Parks presented on Titlow Park. Included in their report, an overview of the Park Master Planning, North Hidden Beach Bridge and Utility Infrastructure, and the Lagoon Restoration Railroad project. Additionally they covered the Culvert Removal & RR Trestle, as well as Regional Stormwater Treatment. Residents asked if there was any plan to repair Titlow tennis courts, due to the dangerous condition they are in.

Speaker of the House, Laurie Jenkins, 27th Legislative district, presented on the 2022 Legislative Report. Speaker Jenkins focused on families and helping them make some economic headway after the pandemic. The focus of the presentation, Serving Washingtonians Better, Speaker Jenkins addressed the need for more nurses and counselors in schools, stabilizing school funding and addressing staffing shortages. Topics ranged from the expansion of free meals to outdoor learning.

There was no August report submitted due to Zoom related access issues.
