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Mental Health & Chemical Dependency Sales Tax

- A sales and use tax authorized for counties and Tacoma in 2005 to support communities in implementing cost containment measures by:
 - Eliminating chronic jail recidivism
 - Assuring substance abuse and mental health treatment for vulnerable
 - Gaining appropriate use of community safety and emergency services
- Must be used for new or expanded programs and services
- Allowed tax uses:
 - Providing chemical dependency or mental health treatment programs and services
 - Therapeutic court programs and services
 - Modifying existing facilities to address health and safety needs for the provision of eligible services (added in 2019)

Programs and Services Include

Components of a coordinated chemical dependency or mental health treatment program or service, including but not limited

- treatment services,
- case management,
- transportation, and

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Tacoma's MHSUD Funding Timeline

2005

Washington authorizes new sales tax for mental health and chemical dependency services, therapeutic courts, and housing.

2012

Tacoma City Council authorizes a 0.1% sales tax

2015

City Council adopts Tacoma 2025

\$10.0M for Mental Health and Substance Services Use Disorder (MHSUD)

2019 - 2020

City dedicates City dedicates \$13.2M to MHSUD

2021 - 2022

City dedicates \$12.4M to MHSUD services

2008 - 2010

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Current Funding Guided by Council Goals

2023 - 2024 Funding Priorities

- Housing and Homelessness- More affordable housing, increase homeownership, decrease in cost-burdened households/prevent homelessness, fewer encampments in Tacoma, reduce negative impacts of encampments, and increase transitional and stable housing.
- Safety Improve perception of safety, and reduce the number of crimes committed.
- Livable Wage Jobs Increase and improve workforce development, increase number of jobs in Tacoma, and increase support for local (small) business surviving through the pandemic.
- Belief and Trust Build trust with police and community, increase (non-police) presence in the community, find ways to engage with community to build belief and trust, and communicate more clearly and more often.
- Health -Increase access to health opportunities and conditions, increase access to healthy food, achieve Climate Action Plan goals, keeping Tacoma's environment clean and healthy, and improving mental and behavioral health
- Access Use an equity lens to improve access to investments, increase language access, and increase access to transportation and mobility.
