9. **Encampment Outreach:** The City's Homeless Engagement and Alternatives Liaison (HEAL) Team (formerly the Homeless Outreach Team) performs encampment outreach throughout the week to provide individuals opportunities to connect to shelter, behavioral health, substance use and employment services. **For the week of January 20 - 24, 2025, staff visited 16 locations. This resulted in 36 contacts by the HEAL Team (15 new, and 21 repeat). Five individuals were placed in shelter.**
10. **Inclement Weather Response Plan:** On Sunday, January 12, 2025, staff activated the City's inclement weather response. The response was extended through Saturday, February 8, 2025, given forecasted overnight low temperatures below 35 degrees with rain or wind and overnight lows below 32 degrees. During the inclement weather response, the City has increased additional shelter capacity by 60 beds:
  - **Catholic Community Services' Nativity House** (702 South 14th Street) will provide an additional 20 beds serving adults 18 and over.
  - **Beacon Young Adult Shelter** (415 South 13th Street) will provide an additional 20 beds for young adults ages 18-24.
  - **Saint Vincent de Paul** will provide up to 20 hotel vouchers for hotel rooms scattered throughout the City that can support all households as needed.

The City's Inclement Weather Policy is activated when overnight temperatures are forecast to reach 35 degrees with wind or rain or when overnight low temperatures are forecast to be 32 degrees or lower regardless of other weather. **For the 2024 - 2025 winter weather season, Valeo is operating a 53 bed shelter at 813 MLK Jr. Way through March 31, 2025.**

Referrals, for these sites, come through several partnerships including shelter providers, outreach providers, and the City's Homeless Engagement and Alternatives Liaison Team.

11. **Point in Time Count Temporary Pause on Encampment Removals:** **The City of Tacoma is prioritizing outreach and identification of encampments for the 2025 Point in Time Count during the weeks of January 20th and 27th.** To facilitate this effort, during these two weeks, the City will temporarily pause non-emergent encampment removals from public property. **This pause does not apply to emergencies, removals from private property, or situations requiring immediate action.**

This approach is consistent with the City's practice during the 2024 Point in Time Count. The City has communicated this plan to County partners and will also inform the Tacoma-Pierce County Coalition to End Homelessness. Removals will resume after the count.

12. Senior Services Transition Update: In partnership with Parks Tacoma, the City of Tacoma has expanded senior services in Tacoma to more places (four locations vs. two locations), to facilities that are more easily accessible using public transportation options.

- **People's Community Center** (1602 MLK Jr. Way 98405)
- **Eastside Community Center** (1721 East 56th Street, 98404)
- **STAR Center** (3873 South 66th Street, 98409)
- **Center at Norpoint** (4818 Nassau Avenue Northeast, 98422)

The transition of senior services to Parks Tacoma began on **January 2, 2025**. The primary expansion is at Eastside Community Center and People's Community Center. Community members are visiting or trying out Parks Tacoma services with an **average daily attendance of 19 at People's Community Center and an average daily attendance of 17 at Eastside Community Center during the week of January 20 - January 24, 2025**.

Through use of Council Contingency Funds, the Lighthouse Activity Center is remaining open through January 31, 2025, with lunch, socialization and opportunities to interact with Parks Tacoma and City staff. Lighthouse **average daily attendance was 26 during the week of January 20 - 24, 2025**. Franke Tobey Jones and City of Tacoma staff continue encouraging participation at Parks Tacoma locations and listening to feedback that will inform services and the transition.

City-funded transportation is now transporting only to the Parks Tacoma locations of Eastside Community Center and People's Community Center. **Transportation is available by calling Brotherhood RISE at (253) 331-5146 before 3:00 p.m., the day before to schedule a pickup.**

## **STUDY SESSION / WORK SESSION**

13. **The City Council Study Session of Tuesday, February 4, 2025, will be conducted as a hybrid meeting.** This meeting can be attended in-person at the Tacoma Municipal Building, Council Chambers, located at 747 Market Street on the 1<sup>st</sup> floor or be heard by dialing (253) 215 – 8782 or through Zoom at: [www.zoom.us/j/89496171192](http://www.zoom.us/j/89496171192) and entering the meeting ID 894 9617 1192; passcode 89659 when prompted. This meeting will be broadcast on TV Tacoma and Facebook.

Discussion items will include: (1) **Tacoma Dome Link Extension Draft Environmental Impact Statement Publication Update**; (2) **South Tacoma Groundwater Protection District Public Hearing Preparation**; (3) **Other Items of Interest – Tree Preservation for Non-Development Sites**; (4) **Committee Reports**; (5) **Agenda Review and City Manager's Weekly Report**; (6) **Closed Session – Labor Strategy**.

On our first agenda item, **staff from Sound Transit will provide an update on the [Tacoma Dome Link Extension \(TDLE\)](#). The TDLE will add nearly 10 miles of mostly elevated light rail tracks between Federal Way and Tacoma, including four new light rail stations in the South Federal Way, Fife, East Tacoma/Portland Avenue and Tacoma Dome areas.** The project is currently expected to begin service in 2035. Sound Transit just reached a key milestone on the project, issuing the Draft Environmental Impact Statement (DEIS) for the project and opening a public comment period through February 10, 2025. **The DEIS, project background, information about upcoming public meetings, methods for providing public comment, and lots of additional materials are available on the [TDLE DEIS webpage](#).**

On our second agenda item, staff from Planning and Development Services will prepare Mayor and Council for the **February 4, 2025, public hearing on a proposed six-month extension to the South Tacoma Groundwater Protection District (STGPD) moratorium.** In March 2023, the City Council passed [Ordinance No. 28872](#), establishing a moratorium to temporarily prohibit the establishment of new or the expansion of existing underground storage tanks and metal recycling/auto wrecking facilities within the STGPD while the City and its partners work on the STGPD code update. The update is expected to be completed in 2025. **The moratorium has been extended twice, in March and August of 2024, and is currently set to expire on March 20, 2025. The Public Works Department is pleased to provide the attached update to our capital projects planning document. The purpose of this document is to provide additional information regarding funding, costs, and schedules for active capital projects within Public Works. Updates include changes to project schedules and funding, the addition of new projects, and deletion of projects that are complete. The document lists projects in categories according to work phase with projects in design listed first, followed by projects in advertisement, construction, and closeout. The update also includes Public Works support services for Tacoma Rail projects, Neighborhood and Community Services projects, Community and Economic Development projects, and others.

This project list is a result of the residents of Tacoma approving the Streets Initiative (Proposition No. 3 and Transportation Benefit District's Proposition A) in November 2015 to fund additional maintenance and improvements to transportation infrastructure. The project funding sources include Propositions A and No. 3, other City funds, grants, gas tax, and City utility funds. Several of the projects are currently funded for design only with construction funding sources to be determined.

Please note this is a planning document that is subject to change as new funding becomes available and as progress is made on capital projects, whether it be in design and/or construction. 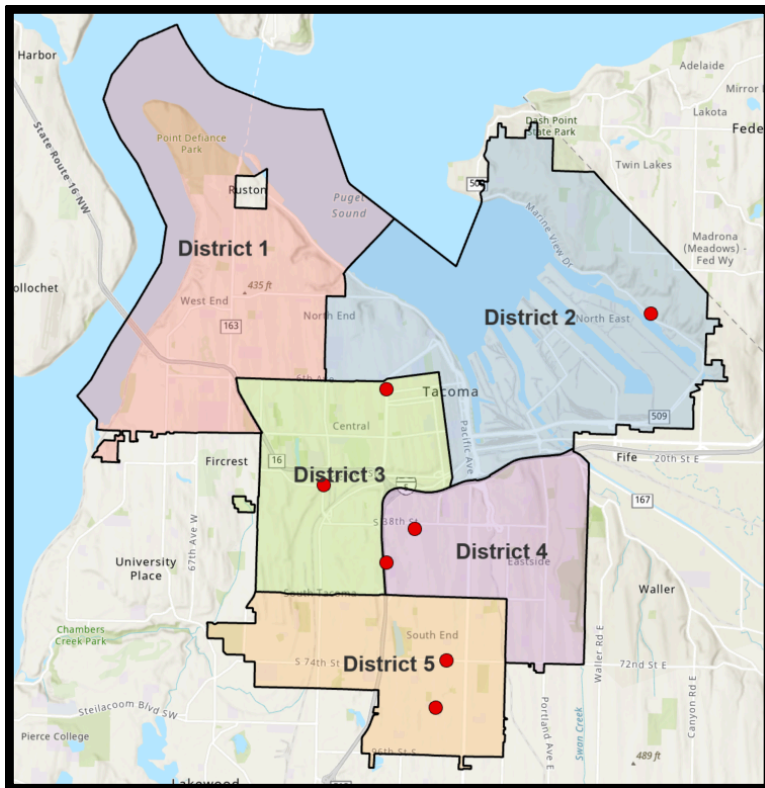

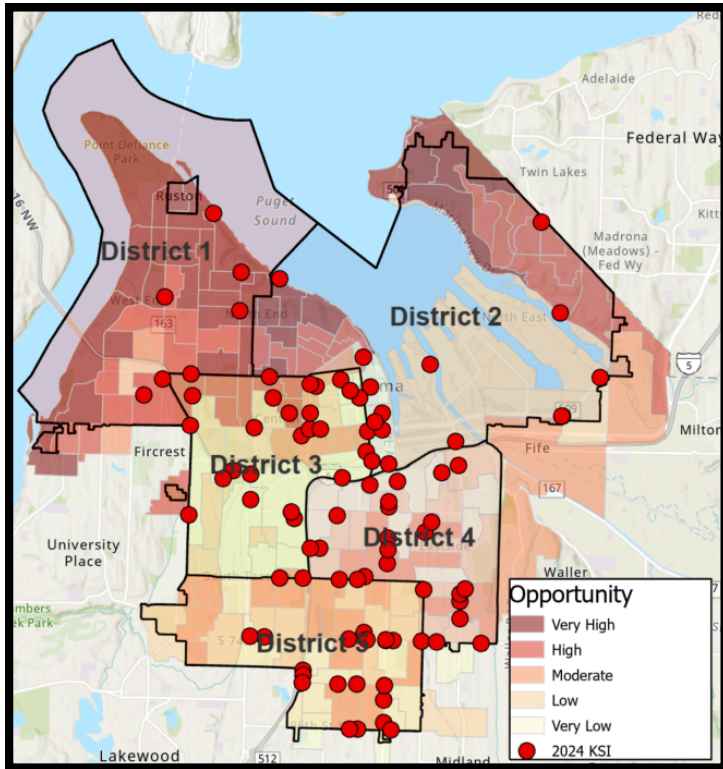

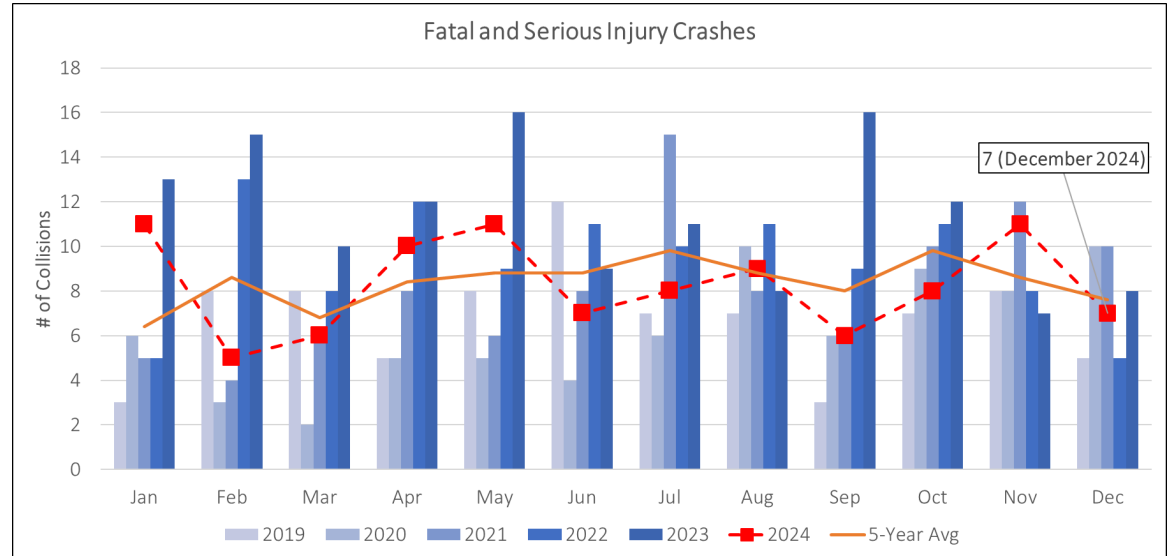

**DATE:** January 27, 2025

**OVERVIEW:**

At the February 4, 2025 study session, Planning and Development Services (PDS) staff will provide an overview of the South Tacoma Ground Water Protection District (STGPD) moratorium, as well as the status of the ongoing code review and update, in preparation for a public hearing scheduled for February 4, 2025.

**BACKGROUND:****STGPD Work Plan**

On June 28, 2022, the City Council adopted [Amended Substitute Resolution No. 40985](#), approving the Work Plan for the STGPD code amendments, and directed the Planning Commission to conduct a public process to develop findings of fact and recommendations as to whether a moratorium on heavy industrial uses and storage of hazardous materials within the STGPD was warranted.

**Adoption of the Initial Moratorium – March 7, 2023**

The Planning Commission completed its review and deliberations of the matter through a public process and forwarded to the City Council the Planning Commission's Findings of Fact and Recommendations Report on consideration for a moratorium within the STGPD, along with a letter of recommendations, both dated August 17, 2022. The Planning Commission concluded that a broad moratorium could result in detrimental, inequitable and/or disproportionate impacts to diverse businesses and uses that are of various types, purposes, characteristics, operations and maintenance needs, and risks to the environment; and recommended instead that a targeted moratorium was warranted for the following uses within the STGPD:

- Underground storage tanks
- Metal recycling/auto wrecking
- Vehicle service and repair
- Vehicle service and repair – industrial

Staff presented these recommendations to the City Council at a study session on September 20, 2022. In response, the City Council referred the recommendation to the Infrastructure, Planning, and Sustainability (IPS) Committee for further consideration. Following that referral, the IPS Committee, on November 30, 2022, forwarded an amended moratorium proposal to the City Council.

1. **Use Categories:** The IPS Committee did not find sufficient risk to groundwater resources from the establishment or expansion of vehicle service and repair or industrial vehicle service and repair uses to warrant a moratorium. Therefore, the moratorium should apply only to metal recycling/auto wrecking and underground storage tanks.
2. **Existing Uses:** The IPS Committee found that a moratorium that is too restrictive on the expansion of existing uses could have the counter effect of prohibiting improvements that provide environmental benefit or reduce the risks and impacts of existing uses. Therefore, the moratorium should allow for reasonable facility and site development that improves environmental outcomes while avoiding the introduction of new risks to the City's groundwater resources.

On March 7, 2023, following a public hearing and substantial public input, the City Council passed [Ordinance No. 28872](#), enacting a moratorium within the STGPD as recommended by the IPS Committee. The moratorium in Ordinance No. 28872 became effective March 20, 2023, and was enacted for an initial period of up to one year, to expire on March 20, 2024, and applied to the following uses:

- Underground storage tanks
- Metal recycling/auto wrecking

#### **STGPD Work Plan Update – December 20, 2023**

On December 20, 2023, the Planning Commission recommended updating the STGPD Work Plan to adopt a more comprehensive approach, considering current and upcoming initiatives related to the STGPD code update. This recommendation came in response to significant changes and resource allocations since the original Work Plan adoption.

#### **March 2024 Moratorium Extension**

On March 5, 2024, the City Council passed Ordinance No. 28958, extending the existing moratorium for another six months, with the new expiration date set for September 20, 2024. This extension followed updates to the STGPD Work Plan and the identification of ongoing research needs.

#### **August 2024 Moratorium Extension**

On August 27, 2024, the City Council passed Ordinance No. 28977, extending the moratorium once again for another six months, expiring on March 20, 2025.

#### **January 2025 IPS Committee Meeting**

On January 22, 2025, staff presented the initial findings and recommendations from the ongoing code review to the IPS Committee. This presentation also included an update on recent engagement activities, current initiatives, and next steps in the code update process aimed at enhancing groundwater protection efforts in Tacoma.

#### **CONSIDERATION OF FURTHER EXTENSION**

Staff is requesting an additional extension of the moratorium to continue prohibiting the establishment of new or the expansion of existing underground storage tanks, metal recycling,

and auto wrecking facilities within the STGPD. This extension will allow the current level of these uses and activities to be maintained for an additional six months, facilitating the completion of necessary research initiatives and ensuring comprehensive evaluation of the STGPD code and other relevant policies and regulations.

If the six-month moratorium extension is approved, staff will proceed with implementing the updated Work Plan for the STGPD code amendments. It is anticipated that no further extensions will be needed, as staff research is nearing completion. A draft code is expected to be ready by spring 2025. Once the Planning Commission has reviewed and provided its recommendations on the draft code, the City Council will review the proposed revisions and make a decision at future meeting, likely in late spring or early summer of 2025.
