#### ACTION REQUESTED

#### STUDY SESSION/WORK SESSION

 The City Council Study Session of Tuesday, August 9, 2016, will be held in Room 16 of the Tacoma Municipal Building North, at Noon. Discussion items will include: (1) Community Needs Assessment; (2) Other Items of Interest; (3) Committee Reports; (4) Agenda Review and City Manager's Weekly Report; and, (5) Executive Session – Potential Litigation. In September 2015, the Neighborhood and Community Services (NCS) Department requested proposals for a qualified consultant to conduct a **Community Needs Assessment to help prioritize human and social needs and guide the development of future funding strategies.** BERK Consulting was awarded the contract and over the last eight months has conducted community outreach and engagement with service providers, partner agencies and service recipients to gather information. The focus areas of the assessment align with the new NCS business model of:

- Homelessness and Household Stability
- Human and Social Wellness
- Workforce Development

At Tuesday's Study Session, NCS staff and BERK consulting will present the findings of the Community Needs Assessment.

#### COUNCIL AGENDA

5. On Tuesday's City Council agenda will be the First Reading of Ordinance No. 28376, adopting the proposed 2016 Annual Amendment to the Comprehensive Plan and Land Use Regulatory Code ("2016 Annual Amendment"), as recommended by the Planning Commission. The Planning Commission completed its review of the 2016 Annual Amendment through a public process including public hearings on May 4<sup>th</sup> and 18<sup>th</sup>. Pursuant to TMC 13.02, the City Council conducted a public hearing on July 19<sup>th</sup> and reviewed the public testimony at a study session on July 26<sup>th</sup>. Additional information appears in the attached memorandum from Peter Huffman, Planning and Development Services Department Director.

#### COUNCIL REQUESTS/INQUIRIES

6. During the July 12<sup>th</sup> Citizens Forum, where concerns over the lack of enforcement for the fireworks ban were expressed, a citizen commented that Police Officers who confiscated fireworks had to take them to a special location for disposal before they could respond to other calls for service. In response, the Police Department reports that Police Officers are directed to bring fireworks to the main Police Station upon confiscation, consistent with other evidentiary or property handling protocols. However, officers have the discretion during their shift as to when to bring the fireworks to the station based upon necessity, for example: amount and type of fireworks confiscated. At a later date and time, the Department's Explosives Ordinance Disposal staff gather the fireworks from the station and takes them to the landfill's approved explosives locker for disposal.

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#### **GRANT APPLICATIONS**

- 7. The City has applied for the following Grant:
  - Department of Homeland Security Emergency Management Performance Grant Program – The Fire Department has applied for the 2016 Emergency Management Performance Grant funds to enhance and sustain all-hazards emergency management capabilities within the City of Tacoma. All activities funded must be utilized for prevention, protection, response, and recovery elements of emergency management. The <u>City</u> <u>applied for \$115,991, with a City match of \$115,991 required, which has</u> <u>been earmarked in the current budget and will need to be included in</u> <u>future budgets.</u>



SUBJECT: 2016 Annual Amendment to the Comprehensive Plan and Land Use Regulatory Code

**DATE:** August 3, 2016

On Tuesday, August 9, 2016, the City Council will conduct the 1<sup>st</sup> Reading of Ordinance for adopting the proposed 2016 Annual Amendment to the Comprehensive Plan and Land Use Regulatory Code ("2016 Annual Amendment"), as recommended by the Planning Commission. The Planning Commission completed its review of the 2016 Annual Amendment through a public process including public hearings on May 4 and 18. Pursuant to TMC 13.02, the City Council conducted a public hearing on July 19 and reviewed the public testimony at a study session on July 26.

The ordinance will include the following five exhibits that depict the text of the proposed amendments contained in the 2016 Annual Amendment package:

- Exhibit A: Future Land Use Map Implementation
- Exhibit B: Multi-family Design Standards
- Exhibit C: Wireless Communication Facilities
- Exhibit D: Short-term Rentals
- Exhibit E: Plan and Code Cleanups

At the July 26 study session, staff introduced suggested changes to the Planning Commission's recommendations, in response to the public comments received at the City Council's public hearing. Staff will prepare the recommended amendments for 1<sup>st</sup> Reading of Ordinance. These changes pertain only to Exhibit B and would:

- 1. Delete proposed minimum residential lot sizes in the Commercial Zoning Districts (lot size standards will be evaluated as part of the upcoming, broader commercial zoning update);
- 2. Clarify the applicability threshold for when the roofline standards are required; and
- 3. Clarify which standards apply strictly to stand-alone multi-family residential and which apply to mixed-use with a residential component.

In addition, the Council requested additional information on proposed amendments to the public notification requirements, as contained in Exhibit E: Plan and Code Cleanups. A map is attached that depicts the difference between a 400-foot and a 1,000-foot taxpayer notification area. As proposed, public notification for the following actions would be expanded from 400 feet currently, to 1,000 feet in the proposed ordinance:

- Environmental Impact Statements;
- Conditional Use Permits, on sites larger than 1 acre;
- Master Plan Conditional Use Permits;
- Major Modifications to Conditional Use Permits, for public facility sites and master plans;
- Residential Subdivisions with 10 or more lots;
- Site-specific Rezones, for public facility sites;
- Area-wide Rezones and Land Use Designation amendments.


As staff described at the study session, the notification distance for permit applications is measured from the entire lot, whereas the notification for rezone applications are measured from the full boundary of the proposed zoning change.
