#### Dear Mayor and Council Members:

#### STUDY SESSION/WORK SESSION

 The Joint City Council/Public Utility Board Study Session of Tuesday, August 16, 2016, will be held in Room 16 of the Tacoma Municipal Building North, at Noon. The discussion item will be: (1) Click! Updates. Immediately following the Joint Study Session, there will be a regular City Council Study Session with the following discussion items: (1) Council Consideration Request – Peace Community Center Capital Campaign; (2) Council Consideration Request – Plaque on 11<sup>th</sup> Street Murray Morgan Bridge; (3) Other Items of Interest; (4) Committee Reports; (5) Agenda Review and City Manager's Weekly Report; and, (6) Executive Session – Potential Litigation.

Earlier this year, the City Council and the Tacoma Public Utility Board appointed a seven-member **Click! Engagement Committee** to produce a business plan for Click! and to see what it would take to keep Click! operating without a loss to the City. At Tuesday's Joint City Council/Public Utility Board Study Session, an update on the Committee's discussions will be shared along with next steps.

At the City Council Study Session, there will be two Council Consideration Requests shared:

- Peace Community Center Capital Campaign [Council Member Woodards] – Request to allocate \$50,000 from the City Council Contingency Fund for the capital campaign of the Peace Community Center so they can continue to serve disadvantaged students in the Hilltop and benefit the community. The request would be contingent on securing sufficient funds for building renovation and expansion to be complete, and on allowing City staff to negotiate and execute an agreement for services with deliverables for the City's contribution.
- 11<sup>th</sup> Street Murray Morgan Bridge Plaque Commemorating the 1916 Longshore Strike [Council Member McCarthy] – Request for up to \$5,000 from the City Council Contingency Fund for the hanging of a plaque on the Murray Morgan Bridge. The plaque commemorates the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the 1916 West Coast Longshore Strike in Tacoma and the sacrifice made by local longshoremen.

#### ITEM/ISSUE PROPOSED FOR COUNCIL CONSIDERATION:

I ask for your support for the inclusion of the following item on the agenda at the earliest available meeting of the Study Session:

I respectfully ask for City Council concurrence to direct the City Manager to allocate funding in the amount of \$50,000.00 from the City Council Contingency Fund, to support the Peace Community Center's Capital Campaign.

#### **BRIEF BACKGROUND:**

The Peace Community Center has been in operation since 2001 with the mission to support and encourage Hilltop youth historically underrepresented in college to cultivate their academic and leadership skills. Their goals include mentoring students as they advance through grade levels to ensure they graduate from high school and are prepared to pursue a post-secondary degree. Since 2001 they have grown to serve over 600 students a year and graduate 97% of seniors from high school. Additionally, 51% of graduates from 2005-2008 have earned a post-secondary degree, a rate significantly higher than the school district as a whole. They have a proven track record of success and are integral in assisting students to reach their full potential.

The capital campaign's total goal is \$2.3 million, with over half of funding expected from individual contributions. 65% of expenses will be used for building renovation and expansion, 13% for the elementary sustainability fund, 13% for academic coaches, and 9% for fundraising expenses. The projected timeline includes building new classroom space beginning in the Summer of 2016, with building renovations expected to be completed by the Fall of 2017. Academic coach positions would be hired in the Summer of 2017, and the elementary fund would begin being used in the Fall of 2018.

#### FUNDING REQUESTED:

I would request the City Council consider an allocation of \$50,000.00 from the Council Contingency Fund towards the capital campaign so Peace Community Center may continue to serve disadvantaged students in the Hilltop and benefit the community. The funding request is contingent on securing sufficient funds for building renovation and expansion to be completed, and would allow City staff to negotiate and execute an agreement for services with the terms and deliverables for the City's contribution.

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

#### HOW DO ACADEMIC COACHES PROMOTE STUDENT SUCCESS?

Academic Coaches work with high school students, meeting with them 1:1 weekly to review grades, attendance in school, problem solve issues, and make sure students have strategies to be successful in the classroom. This model follows a best practice curriculum with proven results to help students achieve academic goals.



When students are struggling, their Academic Coach is their advocate and helps students problem-solve issues. If students or families need additional resources, their Academic Coach gives referrals to other service agencies.

Currently Academic Coach positions are staffed with AmeriCorps members who serve at the Center for 10 1/2 months and have caseloads of 15-25 students. With three full-time Coaches, we plan to grow the caseloads to 35-40 students.

### WHAT WILL THE ROLE OF AMERICORPS MEMBERS BE IN THE FUTURE?

High school AmeriCorps members will continue to support academic growth by helping with activities like tutoring, field trips, and enrichment. We also plan to redistribute some AmeriCorps positions currently working with high school students to other programs in our organization to increase the amount of students we serve annually.

#### HOW WILL YOU SUSTAIN NEW PROGRAM AND FACILITY COSTS?

Funds raised during the campaign for program improvements and expansion will help leverage academic results with students, which will lead to involving new investors and inspiring current donors to give more. The Board of Directors has a five-year funding plan to increase individual and foundation philanthropy to meet the operational expenses well after the campaign concludes.

#### HOW WILL YOU PRESERVE A LOW COST PER STUDENT?

By hiring on-going, full-time Academic Coach positions, we will serve 50% more students in the Hilltop Scholars High School program. While the overall program costs will increase, our expanded services will increase the number of students served, therefore keeping the cost per student at a similar amount as it is today. Furthermore, the AmeriCorps members that currently serve in our high school program will be reassigned to our elementary or middle school programs, allowing us to expand the number of students enrolled in those programs.

#### ITEM/ISSUE PROPOSED FOR COUNCIL CONSIDERATION:

The following item will be scheduled on the agenda of the earliest available Study Session:

I respectfully ask for City Council consideration of a resolution using up to \$5,000 of City Council contingency funding to place a plaque on the 11<sup>th</sup> St. Bridge (also known as the Murray Morgan Bridge) commemorating the 1916 west coast Longshore strike in Tacoma, and dedicated to the six workers killed in this strike, including two local longshoremen.

#### **BRIEF BACKGROUND:**

This plaque commemorates the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the 1916 west coast longshore strike in Tacoma and the sacrifice made by local longshoremen. The plaque will be placed on the 11<sup>th</sup> Street Bridge and will be dedicated to the six workers who gave their lives in the fight for fair working conditions and coast-wide unity. Two of the workers were killed during the strike in Tacoma. On June 1, 1916 every longshore Local from Bellingham to San Diego "hung the hook" until they received a coast wide contract. Altogether 12,500 men including 1,100 Tacomans, participated in the strike. The 11<sup>th</sup> Street Bridge was the main conduit between downtown Tacoma and the port, and daily confrontations took place on or near the bridge. The employers brought in scabs to load and unload ships, and the longshoremen built a barricade of hay bales at the west end of the bridge to stop cargo coming in or going out. During the strike, union picket James Costello was stabbed and killed by scabs, and union picket Alexander "Scotty" Laidlaw was mortally wounded by a special deputy. Fights occurred in all 29 West Coast ports. For 197 days the longshoremen supported by the entire Tacoma labor movement, defended the 11<sup>th</sup> Street bridge from scabs and authorities. They were the only West Coast Local that that never surrendered. Working people along the West Coast remember the events that occurred in 1916 on the 11<sup>th</sup> Street Bridge which made great progress towards securing fair working conditions.

**FUNDING REQUEST:** I request up to \$5,000 from the Council Contingency Fund for the hanging of the plaque on the 11<sup>th</sup> Street Bridge. There is currently \$299,500 in Council Contingency Fund remaining for this biennium, which doesn't include this request or the \$50,000 proposed expenditure for the Peace Community Center Capital Campaign.
