### **SUMMARY:**

A resolution accepting 14 grants from the Freight Mobility Strategic Investment Board, Highway Safety Improvement Program, Puget Sound Regional Council, Washington State Department of Transportation, and the Washington State Transportation Improvement Board, in the total amount of \$25,296,455, and depositing said sum into the various Capital Project funds, to fund various Public Works projects including roadways, pedestrian facilities, trails, bikeways, signal/crossing upgrades, and the Sound Transit Tacoma Link Extension project.

### STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

• Strengthen and support a safe city with healthy residents.

These projects will improve the safety and well-being of citizens by rehabilitating roadways and providing pedestrian and bicycle facilities, constructing trails, adding or upgrading Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) components, and upgrading traffic signals and pedestrian crossings.

#### BACKGROUND:

The City aggressively applied for grants for numerous infrastructure projects. In 2016, Public Works projects were selected to receive approximately \$20 million in grant funds. A grant was also received for the Sound Transit Tacoma Link Expansion project and is part of the City's contribution to the project as described in the Term Sheet between the City of Tacoma and Sound Transit regarding partner funding for the project.

Fourteen grants have been received for the following twelve projects:

The attached table provides background information including brief project summaries, grant descriptions and City match requirements for the 14 grants. Four of these grants are included as prioritized projects for funding in the Washington State Department of Transportation Pedestrian, Bicycle and Safe Routes to School Programs and will be funded following legislature approval of the State budget.

#### **ISSUE:**

City infrastructure requires rehabilitation and improvement on an ongoing basis. Grants are available through various State and Federal sources to provide funding for infrastructure projects. Staff applies for funding as it becomes available to provide improved roadways, ADA access, and active transportation opportunities for Tacoma residents.

### **ALTERNATIVES:**

The alternative would be to not accept the grants. The financial cost of not implementing the legislation is the loss of \$25,296,455 of Federal and State grant funding for projects.

# **RECOMMENDATION:**
