1	BY REQUEST OF DEPUTY MAYOR THOMS	
2	findings, and amonding Section 6 of Ordinance No. 28420 by avto	
3	findings; and, amending Section 6 of Ordinance No. 28430 by extending the sunset date of said ordinance from October 9, 2017, to December 31,	
4 5	2017, for the declaration of public emergency relating to the conditions of homeless encampments; and declaring an emergency, making	
5 6	necessary the passage of this ordinance and it becoming effective immediately.	
7	WHEREAS, on May 9, 2017, the City Council enacted Ordinance	
8	No. 28430 ("Emergency Ordinance"), declaring a state of emergency relating to	
9 10	the conditions of homeless encampments and authorizing such actions are	
11	reasonable and necessary in light of such emergency to mitigate the conditions	
12	giving rise to such public emergency, and provided for a sunset date of	
13	October 9, 2017, and	
14	WHEREAS, on June 5, 2017, the City Council approved a temporary	
15	emergency aid and shelter plan with a three-phased approach (Mitigation,	
16	Stabilization, and short-term transitional housing) at a projected cost of	
17 18	\$3.4 million, and	
19	WHEREAS the Emergency Ordinance further provided that the City	
20	Council shall review the conditions that have given rise to the public health	
21	emergency to determine if such conditions warrant keeping in place the	
22		
23	extraordinary measures authorized herein to respond to the public health	
24	emergency, and	
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	WHEREAS, the City Council has conducted a review the efforts made to			
1	abate the conditions giving rise to the declaration of the public emergency and			
2 3	based upon such review, finds as follows:			
4	 The City, within two weeks following the declaration of emergency, established a mitigation site at 18th Street and Portland Avenue 			
5	("mitigation site") occupied by 118 individuals, 70 tents, and nine vehicles;			
6				
7	 Occupants of the mitigation site were provided with health and sanitation facilities, together with assessments and screening for housing needs, mental health and substance abuse disorders, needle 			
8 9	exchange services, transportation to shower and laundry facilities, veterans outreach, meals, dental/physical health assessments,			
10	prenatal care and other needed services;			
11	 The City, on June 26th, began transitioning occupants of the mitigation site to the stabilization site located at 1423 Puyallup 			
12 13	Avenue ("stabilization site"), resulting in the relocation of 84 individuals to the stabilization site, the referral of four individuals to			
14	housing options, the referral of one individual to substance use inpatient treatment, and the referral of one individual to mental healt			
15	inpatient treatment;			
16	 As of September 22nd, 90 individuals continued to reside at the stabilization site, 47 individuals developed housing stability plans, 			
17	received housing referrals, or were enrolled in a housing program, and nine individuals transitioned from the stabilization site to housing;			
18 19	• During the week of September 19th through September 21st, the City			
20	turned away one person a day from the stabilization site, 52 individuals were on a waiting list for shelter at the stabilization site, 80			
21	individuals were turned away daily from the Nativity House Shelter,			
22	and two individuals were turned away daily from the Tacoma Rescue Mission;			
23	Although heightened enforcement and services have reduced resident			
24	and area health and safety impacts, conditions continue to exist resulting in homelessness encampments outside of the stabilization			
25	site throughout the City; since the Emergency Ordinance, and as of			
26	September 22nd, 327 homeless encampments have been removed throughout the City;			



1 2 3 4	 Although 84 percent of residents at the stabilization site require and/or qualify for permanent supportive housing, there is a shortage of permanent supportive housing in the region. If the stabilization site were to be shut down, 80-90 residents would be left without housing or shelter options and would experience increased health and safety issues; 			
5 6	The stabilization site continues to remain at near capacity with slow outflow into stable housing;			
7 8	 The City continues to evaluate opportunities to increase short-term transitional housing and partnering with Pierce County and other jurisdictions to address the challenges of addressing homelessness, 			
9	and			
10	WHEREAS the City Council finds and concludes that the continuing and			
11	ongoing threat of significant harm to human health and life arising from the			
12 13	conditions in homeless encampments as described in the Emergency Ordinance			
14	have not yet been abated by the City's actions, resulting in the continued			
15	existence of the public emergency as declared pursuant to the Emergency			
16	Ordinance, and			
17	WHEREAS the City Council further finds and concludes that the current			
18 19	and ongoing conditions warrant keeping in place the extraordinary measures			
20	authorized pursuant to Ordinance No. 28430 to respond to the declared			
21	emergency, and			
22	WHEREAS the City Council further finds and concludes that it is			
23	reasonable and necessary, and in the best interest of the public health, safety,			
24	and welfare, to continue the exercise of its power to declare a public health			
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	emergency under authority of Article XI, Section 11, of the State Constitution,			
1	Chapter 38.52 RCW, Chapter 39.04 RCW, RCW 35.33.081, WAC 197-11-880			
2	and other applicable laws and regulations, and pursuant to Section 2.4 of the			
3 4	Tacoma City Charter, Chapters 1.06, 1.10, and 8.96 of the Tacoma Municipal			
5	Code, and the authorization of such extraordinary measures as are reasonable			
6	and necessary in light of such public health emergency to mitigate the			
7	conditions giving rise the public emergency; Now, Therefore,			
8	BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF TACOMA:			
9 10	Section 1. That the above-stated recitals are adopted as findings and			
11	conclusions of the City Council and are incorporated by this reference as though			
12	fully set forth herein.			
13	Section 2. That Section 6 of Ordinance No. 28430 is hereby amended to			
14	read in its entirety as follows:			
15 16	That this ordinance shall sunset and no longer be in force or effect at			
17	11:59 p.m. on October 9December 31, 2017.			
18	Section 3. That the City Council shall, prior to December 31, 2017,			
19	review the conditions that have given rise to the emergency declaration made			
20	pursuant to Ordinance No. 28430 to determine if such conditions warrant			
21 22	keeping in place the extraordinary measures authorized herein to response to			
23	this public health emergency.			
24	Section 4. That, based upon the facts and conclusions as specified			
25	herein and Ordinance No. 28430, a public emergency exists, making this			
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1	ordinance effective upon passage by an affirmative vote of a least six members		
2	of the City Council.
