Planning and Development Services Director Peter Huffman is pleased to report that the City of Tacoma is a recipient of the 2017 Healthy Communities Gold Award for our planning efforts on the Tacoma Mall Neighborhood Subarea Plan. The Healthy Communities Award, sponsored by the Tacoma-Pierce County Health Department, recognizes local jurisdictions that employ sincere intent and committed steps to promote healthy communities and improve health equity. The award ceremony will take place at the Pierce County Regional Council General Assembly on February 15, 2018. City staff and the Planning Commission have been working on the Tacoma Mall Subarea Plan since July 2015. ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT WEEKLY UPDATE REPORT

Week of January 22, 2018

Affordable Housing Action Strategy Update:

The Housing Division has convened an internal task force to develop an affordable housing action strategy. The intent of this strategy is to identify actionable and quantifiable steps the City can take to preserve and increase the supply of affordable housing. In addition to Housing Division staff, staff from the City Manager's Office, Planning and Development Services, Neighborhood and Community Services, Office of Equity and Human Rights, and Government Relations Office participate on the task force. A Request for Proposals has been issued to identify a consultant that can assist the task force in developing the action strategy for future consideration by the City Council. Proposals are due on February 2, 2018, with the selection of consultant expected by February 9, 2018.

Horizons Economic Forecast 2018

On January 24th, the Tacoma-Pierce County Chamber presented its annual Economic Forecast.

Dr. Bruce McCain, Key Private Bank, spoke about the national economy and predicted continued growth. He included highlights that hold implications for apprenticeship and workforce programs:

- As baby boomers retire, filling out the labor force is key to a strong economy. There
 is an experience gap making replacing labor a challenge.
- In some cases, technology and automation can substitute for people to address the shortage.
- The existing labor force needs to become more productive if labor force growth cannot keep up.

Dr. Neal Johnson, Sound Resources Economics, provided the outlook for Pierce County. Among highlights of his report, he noted:

- Economic growth for the county is expected to continue through 2018.
- Non-farm employers have added 8,000 10,000 jobs per year from 2014 2017 and another 9,500 jobs are anticipated to be added in 2018.
- Personal income grew by 3.6-percent in 2017, with an estimated increase of 3.2percent projected for 2018.
- Closed sales on housing increased by 9.8-percent in 2017, relative to 2016.
- The county's affordable housing index remained stable during 2017, largely due to low mortgage rates compensating for increased home prices.
- Rental rates for apartments rose 7.4-percent. Population growth exceeded building permits for new housing units, a trend that expected to continue in 2018.
- The commercial and industrial sectors remained strong, however the office sector was "lackluster". Commercial rental rates increased 16-percent from 2016, while office rental rates increased 2.2-percent.

- Retail sales continue to increase, with a 6.1-percent increase projected for 2018. The strongest sector was drug and convenience stores.
- The Northwest Seaport Alliance faces stiff competition from other west coast ports. Container traffic for year-end 2017 was projected to be 13.6-percent share as opposed to 14.2-percent in 2016.
- Projected continued economic growth through at least 2020.

The Public Works Department is providing information at the request of Council Member Beale regarding the history of the Rail Crossing Improvement Project.

The Rail Crossing Improvement Project involves reviewing existing conditions at five rail crossings:

- East C and East D Streets in the Dome District
- Titlow Beach & 6th Avenue and South 19th & Narrows Marina in the West End
- McCarver Street at Ruston Way in Old Town

The project scope includes soliciting feedback from the public regarding the crossings, evaluating the concerns raised and developing alternatives, where appropriate. To facilitate this, there are two rounds of public outreach planned. This first round is to collect feedback on existing conditions and the second outreach meeting is designed to review the alternatives the team develops in response to public comments, based on an expert review of rail crossing conditions. The final report will summarize the outreach and alternatives and provide rough order-of-magnitude for capital improvements and maintenance costs. Typical alternatives may include implementation of a quiet zone, wayside horns, new/relocated vehicular/pedestrian gate arms, realignment of walks, signage, grade separations and signal timing improvements.

The concept for the original rail crossing study began after receiving multiple requests from the Dome District for a quiet zone at both the East C and East D Street crossings. Public Works hired a consultant to look at the process for creating a railroad crossing quiet zone. A report was generated in 2013. The scope of the project was then expanded to include the McCarver crossing, the Titlow crossing and the 19th Street crossing. The rail crossings at South 56th Street and South 74th Street were not included in the scope of the current project, as those crossings went through a safety analysis process and public review meetings during the planning and design of the Point Defiance Bypass Project managed by the Washington State Department of Transportation for the new Amtrak route.
