### **ITEMS OF INTEREST**

In 1993, the City entered into the original Agreed Order (AO) with the Department of Ecology (DOE) concerning the **coal gasification site** located just south of the SR 509 cable stay bridge over the Thea Foss Waterway, and below the I-705 spur. DOE originally named the City, along with several others, as potentially liable parties under the Model Toxics Control Act for contamination which was discovered at the site during construction of the I-705 spur. Since the original AO was intended only for the purpose of source control, the work performed under the order did not achieve complete regulatory closure for the site. Environmental

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Services and Public Works Departments have submitted a new AO for the purpose of completing the site investigation and to develop a final cleanup action plan for the site. I have attached the background memorandum for additional information.

Public Works Director Kurtis Kingsolver provides a **list of transportation infrastructure projects made possible by the voter approved street initiatives** Proposition No. 3 and Transportation Benefit District Proposition A in November 2015. This list provides funding, costs and schedules of all active capital projects within the Public Works Department. The purpose of this memo is to provide background for the subject Agreed Order with the Department of Ecology (DOE) being routed for your signature.

This Agreed Order (AO) concerns the coal gasification site located just south of the SR 509 cable stay bridge over the Thea Foss Waterway, and below the I-705 spur. DOE originally named the City, along with several others, as potentially liable parties (PLPs) under the Model Toxics Control Act for contamination which was discovered at the site during construction of the I-705 spur. The City owns public property and maintains public rights-of-way within limited portions of the site, including South 22nd and 23rd Streets and Dock Street, as well as a previously developed park and pier (now removed) near the head of the waterway.

In 1993, subsequent to the DOE's PLP determination, the City entered into the original AO for the site which was aimed primarily at identifying and eliminating ongoing sources of contamination migrating to the Thea Foss Waterway prior to in-water sediment remediation work being conducted. Since the original AO was intended only for the purpose of source control, the work performed under the order did not achieve complete regulatory closure for the site. The purpose of the attached AO is to complete the site investigation and to develop a final cleanup action plan for the site.

The financial impacts to the City are difficult to fully assess at this time. However, because the basis of the City's Model Toxics Control Act (MTCA) liability is its ownership of public property and maintenance of public rights within limited portions of the site, we believe the City's role, and cost obligation should be limited. Other liable parties who will be signing the AO (i.e., Puget Sound Energy and PacifiCorp) are planning to take the lead role in implementing the work required by the order, and the City will be providing any comments related to this work to the DOE during the review process. A discussion of final cost sharing for the work required at the site will be conducted following completion of the investigation and approval of the cleanup action plan by the DOE. If needed, a subsequent agreement will be developed and routed for approval to address any additional financial obligation to the City.

Public Works is pleased to provide this extensive project list that is a direct result of the citizens of Tacoma approving the Street Initiatives (Proposition No. 3 and Transportation Benefit District Proposition A) in November 2015 to fund additional maintenance and improvements to transportation infrastructure. This voter approved revenue generates over \$17 million annually. I appreciate City Council's approval of an additional \$3 million annually from the General Fund to further Streets Initiative work. These new funding sources, combined with the Council approved \$3 million annually, provide \$20 million for ten years for maintenance and infrastructure improvements.

The majority of these revenues, approximately \$15 million per year, will fund maintenance on residential streets. The other revenues of \$5 million annually are dedicated to fund capital improvements for arterial streets, freight routes, and active transportation infrastructure. Public Works is leveraging the \$5 million to generate additional funds through state and federal grants. The magnitude of the City's new funding sources to provide grant match funding is considerable. Our original goal was to generate an additional \$90 million over a ten year period. In 2016, Public Works was awarded grants for 14 projects totaling \$25.3 million; and in 2017, nine projects received grants totaling \$26.5 million. The total commitment to date in grant match funds from Propositions A and No. 3 is \$9.7 million, generating \$51.8 million in grant funds. The attached capital projects planning document provides details for projects in various stages of design and construction for the years 2018 and 2019. Project funding sources include Propositions A and No. 3, other City funds, grants, gas tax, and City utility funds. Several of the projects are currently funded for design only with construction funding sources to be determined. This planning document also includes Public Works support services for Tacoma Rail projects, building demolition and board-ups for Neighborhood and Community Services, and Community and Economic Development projects.

The purpose of this document is to provide additional information regarding funding, costs and schedules for all active capital projects within Public Works. Please note this is a planning document that is subject to change as new funding becomes available and as progress is made on capital projects, whether it be in designs and/or construction. Updates will be provided quarterly.
