

WorkForce Central: Who We Are


- One of 12 local workforce boards in WA; one of 550 across the US

- Codified in federal law: Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act of 2014





Our Leadership

Our Workforce

- Educational Attainment (25-64 yrs old = 446,627 people)
 - 8.4% no HS diploma/equivalent 37,551
 - 27.5% only HS graduate 122,700
 - 27.3% some college, no degree 121,788
 - 11.6% associate degree 51,733
 - 17.2% bachelor's degree 76,611
 - 8.1% postgraduate degree 36,244
 - Disconnected Young Adults: 15,300 (14.8% of 16-24 population – not working and not in school)

Our Workforce Continued:

- 418,620 individuals are in the labor force (civilians)
 - 395,820 are employed
 - 22,800 are unemployed (5.4%)



The challenge

- 9,000 online job postings in Pierce County
- ...but unemployment is at 5.4%
- ...and there are 15,300 Disconnected Young Adults (16-24)
- ...and there are 37,551 adults without a HS diploma or equivalent (25-64 yrs)
- ...and there are
- ...and more economic growth is expected
 - Six key sectors: Construction, Health Care, Advanced Manufacturing, Transportation/Warehousing/Logistics, ICT/Cybersecurity, Military & Defense





Advanced Manufacturing

- One of Pierce County's six key industries
- Broad spectrum of job titles and duties
 - Computer-Controlled Machine Tool Operators (Machinists), Aircraft Structure Assemblers, Welders, Mechanical Engineers, Aerospace Engineers
- Employs 17,141 people
 - Average wage = \$59,632

Advanced Manufacturing jobs: Something for everyone

- On-the-job training (Apprenticeship)
 - CNC programmers, Aircraft Structure Assemblers, Industrial Machinery Mechanics, Welders
- Associate Degree or Postsecondary Award
 - Mechanical Drafters, Electrical Engineering Technicians
- Bachelor's Degree
 - Aerospace Engineers, Mechanical Engineers, Industrial Engineers



Advanced Manufacturing: Average wages in Pierce County

- Aerospace Product and Parts Manufacturing: \$84,183
- Petroleum and Coal Products Manufacturing: \$81,507
- Industrial Machinery Manufacturing: \$60,144
- Metalworking Machinery Manufacturing: \$59,295

Sector Reports – Other KEY FINDINGS



Too many otherwise qualified candidates lack the essential/soft skills they need to succeed.

(Examples: Communication, Teamwork, Organization, Problem-Solving.)



Sector Reports – Other KEY FINDINGS

Need to connect with K-12 system

Access to young adults right after they complete high school.

Too many young adults we lose for about 10 years after high school graduation.
