Immediately following the Joint Study Session, there will be a City Council Study Session with discussion items as follows: (1) Bloomberg Harvard City Leadership Institute Innovation Project; (2) Other Items of Interest: Council Consideration Request – Funding for Tools to Address Impacts of Exploitation and Sexual Assault; (3) Committee Reports; and, (4) Agenda Review and City Manager's Weekly Report.

At Tuesday's Joint City Council/Metropolitan Parks Board of Commissioners Study Session, the Council and Board will be provided an update on collaborative projects to include: Interagency Coordinating Committee Guiding Principles, Ruston Way Visioning and Heidelberg Sports Village Feasibility Study.

Immediately following the Joint Study Session, there will be a regular Council Study Session where the Mayor will share information on the **Harvard Bloomberg City Leadership Institute and the City's Innovation Project**. COUNCIL REQUESTS/INQUIRIES

9. Public Works Director Kurtis Kingsolver provides responses to questions raised by Transportation Benefit District (TBD) Governing Board Member Thoms at the October 30, 2018, public hearing. The attached memorandum provides the amount of revenue generated by the \$20 vehicle license fee by year since inception of the TBD, and how streets to be maintained are selected using collaborative processes and partnership opportunities.

GRANT APPLICATIONS

- 10. The City has applied for the following grant application:
 - Boating Facilities Program Funding request from the State Recreation and Conservation Office to replace approximately 225 lineal feet of the dock floats utilized for transient moorage by recreational boats along the Thea Foss Waterway. The current dock has deteriorating concreate decking on a wood framed structure and does not meet ADA requirements. Per the Washington State Department of Natural Resources Waterway Permit, this facility is required to be repaired or replaced by January 31, 2021. The City match requirement of \$230,250 (could be less if City is awarded another grant applied for).

Gertie's Ghost

A monumental sculpture commissioned by the Sound Transit Art Program to be located on the grassy area on the Northwest side of the grassy area at Pacific and South Tacoma Way is slated for completion by the end of this year. Artists Sean Orlando and David Schulman aka Engineered Artworks were selected in a competitive process in 2013 by a local panel of stakeholders including arts commissioners and community members. At long last, this sculpture, affectionately called Gertie's Ghost will become a gateway to this entrance to the city. The foundations are currently being installed to receive the sculpture that reflects iconic bridge forms, archways and industrial elements of our city while also resembling a giant emerging octopus in reference to the Pacific Octopus that graces the seas below Tacoma's most famous Narrow's Bridge.

Artists selected for the East 64th Street Complete Street improvement project.

Elishiba Johnson and Kristin Ramirez were selected as the artists for the East 64th Streetscape project between Pacific Avenue and McKinley Avenue. The artists will be creating permanent public artwork(s) along the streetscape to enliven this multi-modal transportation corridor running through this residential neighborhood. In addition, the artist will work with the design team to affect the aesthetic design of the streetscape and identify opportunities for discrete or integrated artworks to be incorporated into the streetscape design in future phases. The project will be informed by a meaningful community engagement process that reflects the needs of the community, creates identity, and communicates an authentic sense of place. The selected artists have experience working with diverse cultural communities and demonstrated success creating aesthetically strong artwork that results from community engagement.

17th Annual Tacoma Arts Month Wrap-up


Another successful Arts Month wrapped up this year reflecting the richness and diversity of talented contributions that make up our community. Over 400 attendees celebrated during the opening party at Normanna Hall in the hilltop neighborhood honoring AMOCAT awardees:

- Community Outreach by an Individual recipient: Jackie Casella (of Creative Colloquy renown)
- Community Outreach by an Organization: Tacoma Little Theatre
- Arts Patron: MultiCare Health System Studio Tours had record artist participation with over 80 artists at 47 locations. New for this year, the City of Tacoma assisted with two "community studios," one at Real Art Tacoma (music venue in South Tacoma) and Centro Latino, which increased representation of artists of color (particularly black and Latinx artists), young artists (such as Teens in Tacoma) and diverse art forms (zine-making with Blue Cactus Press and Write253, for example). From our survey from 21 artists, reported on average 150 visitors to their studios over the weekend and average of \$1,180 in sales. Highest reported visits and sales for one artist was 300 people and \$6500 in sales.

Environmental Services Department's Awards and Recognition Report November 8, 2018

- The City of Tacoma Environmental Service Department's North End Treatment Plant (NETP) and Central Treatment Plant (CTP) were recently awarded the NACWA Peak Performance Platinum Awards. Platinum Awards bestowed by the National Association of Clean Water Agencies (NACWA) recognize 100% compliance with permits over a consecutive five-year period. The NETP received a 20 year Platinum Award because the City hasn't missed any of the 29,040 reportable parameters to the Department of Ecology in the last two decades. The CTP received a seven year Platinum Award for 100% compliance on over 10,528 reporting parameters.
- The Environmental Services Department, Science & Engineering Division received the 2018 Innovative Stormwater Project Award for the East 40th Street Green Stormwater Infrastructure Project. The Pacific Northwest Clean Water Association (PNCWA) award recognizes and encourages projects that showcase innovative stormwater elements. Projects completed by PNCWA members that feature any of the following components are eligible: stormwater design innovation; urban habitat enhancement; water quality enhancement; public education and outreach about stormwater; integration and enhancement of social, economic, and environmental factors.
- Dan Eberhardt, Tacoma's TAGRO Program Supervisor, was recently recognized by a collection of regional environmental agencies as an outstanding leader at the 2018 BioFest Conference in Lake Chelan, Wash. Eberhardt was celebrated for his collaborative research approach, his proactive engagement with diverse audiences, and his efforts to implement a cost-effective, environmentally beneficial biosolids program in the Pacific Northwest. Eberhardt is known for his enthusiasm about his craft and for inspiring the next generation of biosolids leaders, both within the City and at local universities. This distinguishment is awarded in collaboration between the British Columbia Clean Water Association, Pacific Northwest Clean Water Association, Northwest Biosolids, Oregon Department of Environmental Quality and Washington State Department of Ecology. According to these agencies, Eberhardt and the TAGRO program have made significant accomplishments in the both biosolids technology and biosolids management practices.

These accomplishments are ones to be proud of and citizens should know that everything the Environmental Services Department does supports healthy neighborhoods and a thriving Puget Sound and leaving a better Tacoma for all.

INNOVATION PROJECT OVERVIEW

This project track helps cities work with residents to identify and test exciting new ideas that have lasting impact. With the yearlong support of a personal expert design coach, you will:

- Apply new innovation skills to one of your city's top priorities, including through a series of public tests.
- Rapidly prototype potential solutions for one of the City's most pressing challenges.
- Complete the program with at least five city staff equipped to spread these skills and build your city's capacity to innovate over time.
- Participate in virtual sessions for Mayors and Senior Leaders focused on actions leaders can take to promote these innovation skills, delivered by Harvard faculty.

Cities will take part in an introductory call and two-day kickoff event where they will learn more.

INNOVATION PROJECT PROPOSAL

The need for inclusive public engagement, strong relationships, and proactive building of trust are high priorities for the City of Tacoma, particularly in the area of public safety. Evidence of rising police tensions can be seen across the country. More immediately, a recent community survey indicated that the City of Tacoma has a great disparity in perceived level of police service. Overall, 85% of residents indicated that they feel very safe or somewhat safe in our community. However, as the Police Chief recently reported, this sentiment is not shared uniformly across the City. Black residents are almost three times as likely to feel "not very safe" in Tacoma (29%) compared to white (10%) and Hispanic residents (4%). Additionally, based on other studies and qualitative data, the City believes that some segments of the community are under-represented and/or not reflected in this figure.

In recent years, we have had a number of high-visibility cases that have had differing impacts on various community groups. In the Black and Native American communities in particular, some events have raised community concern and challenged residents' trust in police services. Additionally, we have received ongoing questions more generally about level of service that aren't adequately addressed by current performance measures. Adequate staffing is important for maintaining public safety, but adding more officers alone does not address the full range of concerns being expressed by our residents.

How do we learn to define and measure what good services are for all of our residents? In a desire to revolutionize the way the City engages with its residents to solve adaptive leadership challenges, I would like to create a model of engagement for community-generated standards of service. This work would begin with public safety and police services and be grounded in the values of dignity and respect, creating greater capacity for constructive conversations throughout our community.

The Police Department, in partnership with the City's Office of Equity & Human Rights, has sought a great deal of public input and youth relationship building in prior years; however, this feedback has not yet been used to innovate how we provide and evaluate services. The story of police services and public safety has been dominated by a narrow focus on number of officers, total budget dollars, and response time. These measures are important, but they do not address the disparities in public trust and perceived service levels; develop the effectiveness of our approaches to serving a diverse community; or build the adaptability and innovation needed to be successful in modern times of fast-paced change and uncertainty. I believe that there is public demand to have a deeper conversation about how we define and measure public safety services, and this is the perfect opportunity to use innovation and inclusive citizen engagement to accomplish these goals while building a greater level of trust across all sectors of the community.

This work would seek community input to define what high-quality police services look like in practice and create new performance measure dashboards that show not just how quickly we are on the scene or how many officers we have on staff, but also provide us with feedback to improve the department's ability to equitably provide high quality of service wherever police are present in our community.

It is my hope that this new model of co-creating service standards won't just solve more problems more effectively, it will have the welcome side-effect of reinforcing the social fabric of our community and providing people with opportunities to feel purpose as they work on issues they care about.

Police services are a natural starting point both because there is an existing baseline of current perceived performance and because addressing service inequities and building public trust has the potential to help avert future crisis in our community. Once developed, I can see this model being used in nearly every area of city service provision moving forward.

Councilmember Ushka, Councilmember Hunter, and I ask for your support for the inclusion of the following item on the agenda at the earliest available meeting of the Study Session:

Consideration of a Council Contingency Request of \$6,500 to provide Tacoma residents with tools to address and manage the impacts of exploitation and sexual assault and direct staff to negotiate a contract with non-profit organization Rock, Paper, Scissors to provide the services described below.

BRIEF BACKGROUND:

The "Me Too" Movement, founded in 2006 by Tarana Burke, was created to address both the lack of resources for survivors of sexual violence and to build a community of advocates, driven by survivors, at the forefront of creating solutions that interrupt the sexual violence happening in their communities. The Me Too Movement became part of the national dialogue last October, when the related hashtag (#metoo) went viral, accompanied by the stories of women coming forward to share their stories of sexual harassment, violence, and assault. Since that time, the news has continued to be punctuated by stories of sexual assault and harassment at local, state, and national levels.

The Council Contingency Requests for \$6,500 would be allocated according to a proposal provided by the City Manager and Neighborhood and Community Services Director. The funding would provide up to 100 Tacoma residents with tools to address and manage the impacts of exploitation and sexual assault through a community event which will:

- Specifically target women who have dealt with sexual assault on the job, in the military, in school, or in church;
- Connect women, including survivors, in dialogue on prevention, intervention, and overcoming sexual assault;
- Provide access to community experts, such as psychologist, medical doctors, legal professionals, counselors, advocates, and survivors through panel discussion;
- Provide attendees with sexual assault and human trafficking resource guides and book; and
- Teach participants what to do when assault and abuse occur and how to manage the impacts.

We hope these dollars will begin to address the lack of resources available, acknowledge the deep impact that these traumatic events have on the lives of Tacoma residents, and provide support for residents who have experienced sexual assault or harassment. Additional information is outlined in the attached memorandum from staff.



Councilmember Ushka requested during the 10/16/18 City Council meeting that staff prepare information to support her request for funding that addresses the national concern around exploitation and sexual assault, and prepares Tacoma residents with tools to address inappropriate behavior.

Staff recommends the following proposal from Rock, Paper, Scissors, a non-profit organization. Upon your review and approval, staff will begin to negotiate the contract using Council Contingency funding.

Overview


Human Trafficking and Sexual Assault Awareness Event specifically targeting victims who have dealt with sexual assault on the job such as the military, the school system, and in the church. Rock, Paper, Scissors will teach participants what to do when an assault or abuse happens (prevention and intervention) and how to manage the impacts.

Goal

According to http://www.sexualassaultcenter.com/victims-survivors/ 1 out of 3 women report being sexually assaulted. Through the awareness event, Rock, Paper, Scissors proposes to reduce these statistics by providing prevention through awareness, as well as providing resources for those who have experienced this trauma.

Target population is 75-100 women to gather and increase awareness and action around the issue of sexual assault and human trafficking. The dialogue will be around prevention, intervention and overcoming sexual assault/human trafficking. The women present will consist of sexual assault survivors/ and or advocates that have a heart for targeting sexual assault/abuse.

Rock, Paper, Scissors will market to: 1) local businesses that support this topic or who want to get more involved, 2) local Colleges (UWT, UPS, TCC), 3) resource centers, 4) sexual assault centers, 5) Crystal Judson Family Justice Center, 7) transitional housing, 8) shelters, and 9)



churches. Rock, Paper, Scissors will pass out flyers, and use email and social media to RPS@rockpaperscissorsfoundation.org.

Rock, Paper, Scissors has handpicked phenomenal speakers and a dynamic panel made up of community experts; a psychologist, a doctor, and survivors of human trafficking and sexual assault.

The women attending, will not only be equipped and empowered but will receive the tools necessary to help transform their trauma and losses into personal growth, healing and a renewed sense of purpose.



Background:

This correspondence provides responses to two questions posed by Board Member Thoms during the Transportation Benefit District Governing Board public hearing on the proposed 2019-2020 TBD Budget and Spending Plan held on October 30, 2018.

Question Subject

1. Board Member Thoms asked for the amount of revenue generated by the \$20 vehicle license fee by year since the inception of the Transportation Benefit District (TBD).

2. Board Member Thoms also asked that staff work closely with developers and anchor tenants to partner and coordinate street improvements with them. He also asked that the Public Works Department (Public Works) inform TBD board members of future work in their districts so they can advocate partnerships.

Staff Response:

1. The TBD was formed on November 20, 2012, and the TBD Board authorized the collection of the \$20 vehicle license fee on November 27, 2012. Collection of the vehicle license fee began in 2013. The following table summarizes the revenue raised from 2013 through September 30, 2018.

2. When selecting streets to maintain for both the TBD and the Streets Initiative, Public Works staff works closely with the Planning and Development Services Department to identify opportunities to collaborate and partner with developers and or property owners. Public Works successfully partnered with the Tacoma School District on their Wilson High School, Stewart Middle School and Arlington Elementary projects. Public Works is currently working on a partnership agreement with the Tacoma School District to collaborate on their upcoming Birney Elementary project.

Public Works posts the capital projects and major maintenance projects on both the <u>Capital Improvement Projects</u> website and the <u>Tacoma Streets Initiative Dashboard</u>.
