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2021 SESSION OVERVIEW

- The 2021 legislative session is scheduled to begin Monday, January 11th and is a "long" session scheduled to last 105 days.
- · Potential special session in November
- Format (virtual v. in person) of session uncertain.
- The Legislature will adopt Operating, Capital, and Transportation budgets and consider policy issues.

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CITY'S LEGISLATIVE AGENDA

City's Policy Document and Support/Oppose/Monitor List

- The Legislative Policy Statement provides guidance to City staff and lobbyist on the hundreds of policy issues discussed during the legislative process that impact city business. It is reviewed every other year, and very lengthy.
- Last year, we created a Support/Oppose/Monitor list identifying various issues
 that may impact the City that we would monitor and potentially take a position.
 These are issues that we are not planning to lead, but we want to be engaged
 nonetheless.



· Together, We Will Change

Systemic Reform, including Criminal Justice Transformation Policies:

- Ensure an independent investigation and prosecution occurs on incidents involving fatal use-of-force and deaths that occur in police custody.
- Establish a statewide standard for police use-of-force.
- · Create a database to track police officer misconduct and removal.
- Reform the decertification process to include use-of-force violations.
- Establish an officer duty to intervene and report misconduct or illegal activity.

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*******RECOMMENDATIONS



Together, We Will Change (continued)

Systemic Reform, including Criminal Justice Transformation Policies:

- Require officers to receive regular psychological evaluations.
- Prohibit officers from resigning in lieu of any investigation.
- Review binding interest arbitration to enhance the ability for agencies to dismiss officers who are not helpful to the agency's mission or betray the public's trust.
- Enable local jurisdictions to effectively deploy body and dash cameras.



Responding to COVID-19 as Partners

 All levels of government must work together to find solutions to the budgetary challenges caused by the COVID-19 pandemic. As the Legislature grapples with how to address the state revenue shortfall, the City asks that cuts are not made to revenues shared with local governments, and that the State consider revenue replacement and/or revenue tools for local agencies facing significant shortfalls.

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****RECOMMENDATIONS



The Northwest ICE Processing Center

- The City supports the recommendations from the Washington State
 Department of Health to bring transparency, accountability, and oversight to the operations of the facility. *Pending*
- The City supports efforts to eliminate privately operated detention centers as an immigration enforcement option in Washington State.



Affordable Housing & Homelessness

- Funding for foreclosure and eviction prevention, including rental and utility assistance
- · Progressive local option funding tools dedicated to affordable housing
- Flexibility to utilize mental health sales tax revenues for capital purposes and for existing programs so that service providers can achieve the desired community outcomes
- Reform the multi-family property tax exemption (MFTE) to incentivize increased housing units in the urban core
- · Preserve and fully fund the Housing Trust Fund

· Capital Funding Requests

- \$3 million for the Links to Opportunity project along the Hilltop Tacoma Link Extension route
 - Project components: sidewalk design, pedestrian lighting, street furniture, wayfinding signage, bicycle facilities, local art, granite inscriptions and poetry, street trees, and landscaping
 - · Robust public engagement informed the project design
