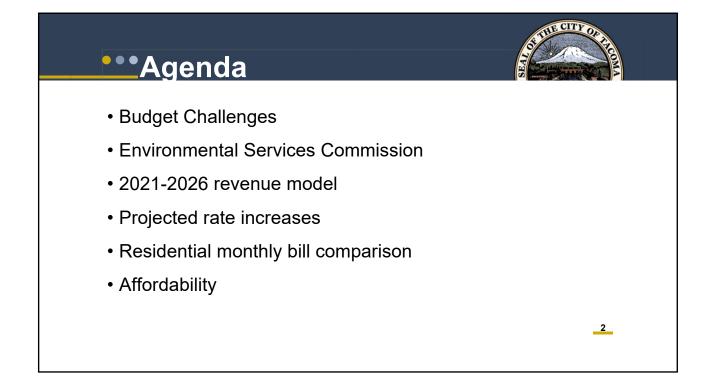
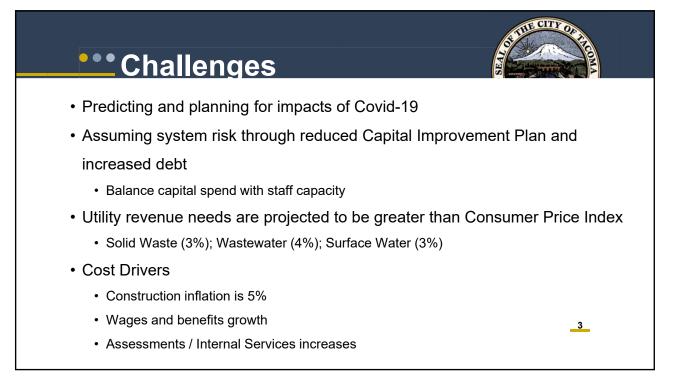


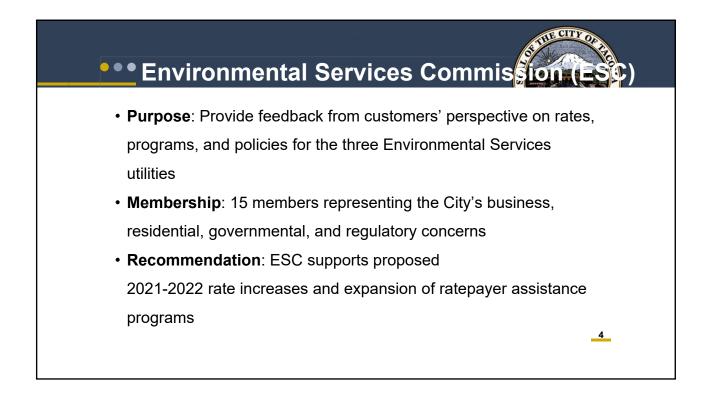

Solid Waste

The Commission supports adoption of Solid Waste revenue increases of 2.0% in 2021 and 2022. These increases are 1.0% less each year than projected in the previous revenue plan. This plan allocates 254 million for capital spending and operating spending including debt service) of \$135 million. The Commission feels this is an appropriate budget and funding level to mantain compliance with Solid Waste permit regulations and to support the long-term life-cycle health of the utility.

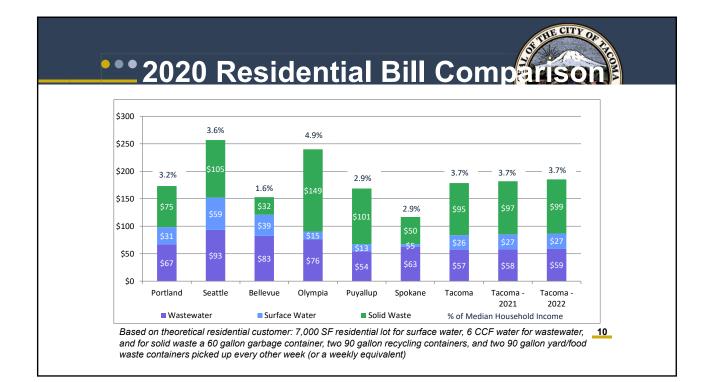

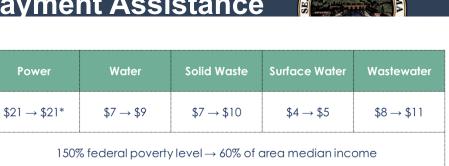

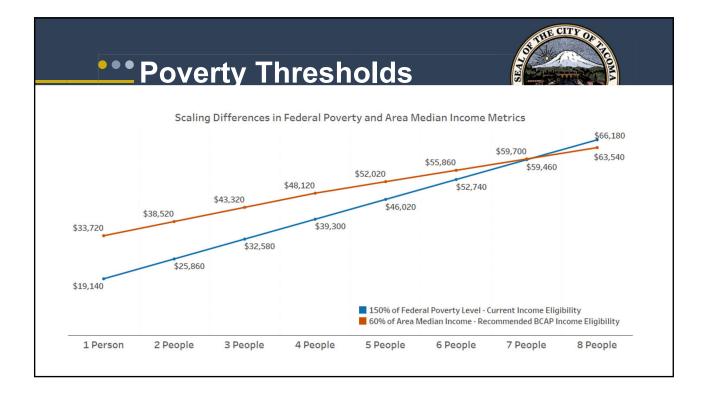
