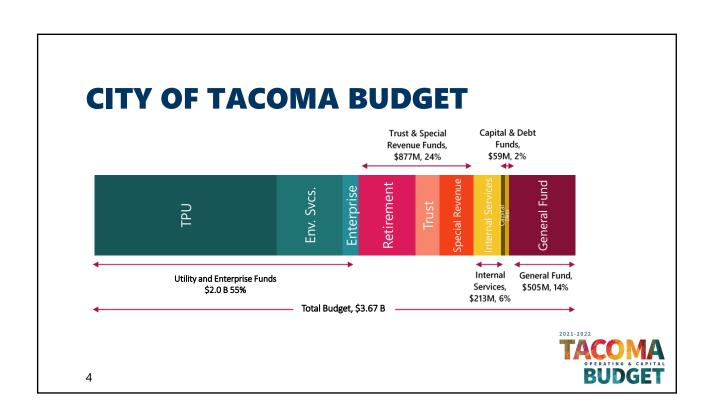

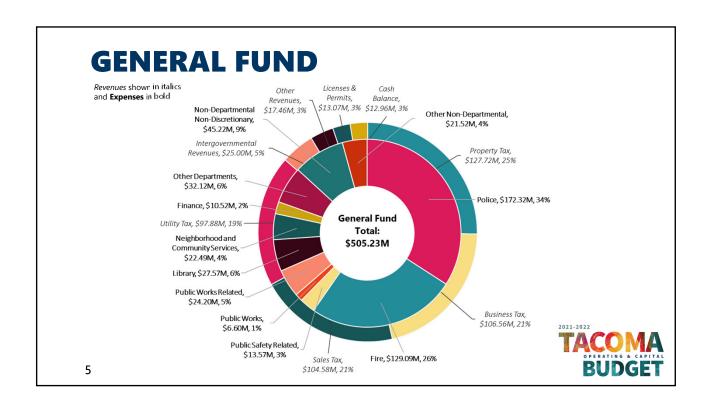
2021-2022 Proposed Budget

- Maintains financial sustainability
- Sets the structure for transformation
- Maintains equitable essential services
- Provides for response and recovery from pandemic impacts









PROPOSED BUDGET - CLOSING THE GAP

Address General Fund Gap of \$40M

- Reductions and Mitigations (-\$27.3M)
- Labor Costs Assumptions and Internal Service Charges (-\$4.5M)
- Updates and Redirects Revenues (\$6.5M)
- Savings From 2020 Reductions (\$12.9M)
- Enhanced Services (\$11.2M)



REDUCTIONS AND MITIGATIONS (-\$27.3M)

- Redirects Fire resources for deployment of in-house Basic Life Support services
- Reduces Police authority to spend on staffing Reduces fleet replacement and deferred maintenance programs
- Repurposes 2nd Floor Main Library for community organization use
- Reduces Municipal Court and Legal Department staff to align with caseload changes and efficiencies
- Pauses Innovative Grant Program
- Extends Senior Center closure to respond to COVID safety-related restrictions



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I-976 UPDATES

- Street Operations Adjustments
 - Revenue now available or projected:
 - \$2.9M in 2020
 - \$5.8M in 2021-2022
 - Revenues proposed to be used for
 - Street Rehabilitation \$5.8M
 - Non-Motorized \$0.5M
 - Traffic Signal and Streetlights \$2.0M
- Real Estate Excise Tax (REET) adjustments
 - Use I-976 for Traffic Signal and Streetlights Improvements \$2M
 - Use REET rather than General Fund for \$2M in Contribution to Streets Initiative

GENERAL FUND AMENDMENTS

- Library add funding in order to mitigate impacts to Library services (\$1M)
- Neighborhood Planning Program add one plan in 2021-2022 (\$480K, +1FTE)
- Opioid Coordinator City would match funds from Pierce County (\$120K)
- Gross Earning Tax Revenue Impacts Related to Changes in Rates (\$280K up)
- Downtown Retail Coordinator Continuation
- Clean & Healthy Work Program
- Continued Consideration of TPD Staffing Matrix Study
- BLS Alternatives: Delayed/Staggered Start of BLS and Restore all Engines for Biennium

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CAPITAL FACILITIES PLAN AND CAPITAL BUDGET

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CAPITAL OVERVIEW

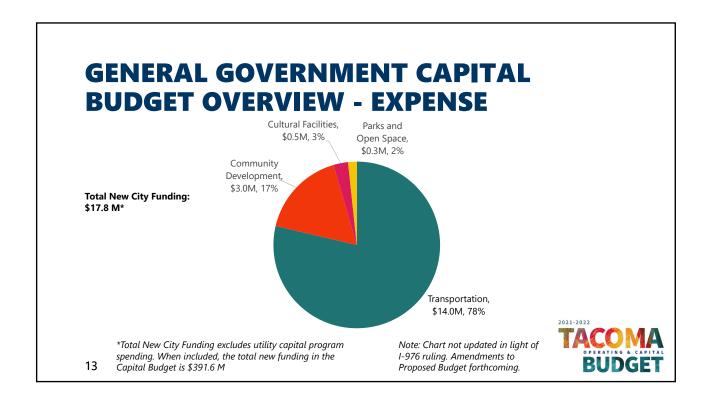
- Capital Facilities Program (CFP)
 - Planning document for desired capital projects in the next six year period
 - Includes confirmed and potential funding sources
 - 42 New Projects (23 Utilities Projects and 16 Transportation Projects)
- Capital Budget
 - Identifies confirmed new funding for capital projects in the upcoming biennium
 - · Sets appropriation authority for capital funds
 - Also indicates projects with previous appropriation





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GENERAL GOVERNMENT CAPITAL BUDGET OVERVIEW - FUNDING Gas Tax - Fund 1060, \$0.2M, 1% General Fund. \$4.8M, 27% **Total New City Funding:** REET 2, \$7.3M, \$17.8 M* 41% REET 1, \$5.5M, 31% Note: Chart not updated in light of *Total New City Funding excludes utility capital program spending. 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2021 PROPERTY TAX LEVIES



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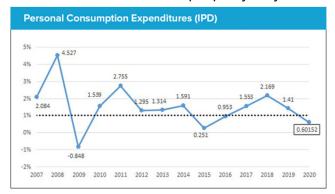
OVERVIEW

- Review Property Tax resolution & ordinances for 2021
 - Resolution Declaring Substantial Need
 - Four Ordinances to set the City of Tacoma's regular and EMS property tax levies (each levy has two ordinances):
 - Approves the total levy amount to be collected
 - Approves the percentage and dollar increase over the prior year's actual levy



SUBSTANTIAL NEED

- State law requires that the City Council declare substantial need to levy the full 1% increase in years when the Implicit Price Deflator is less than 1%.
- Without substantial need declaration, property levy can only increase by 0.6%





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REGULAR PROPERTY TAX LEVY

 The ordinances authorize the 2021 property tax levy at \$67.8 M, 1% increase over the highest regular levy

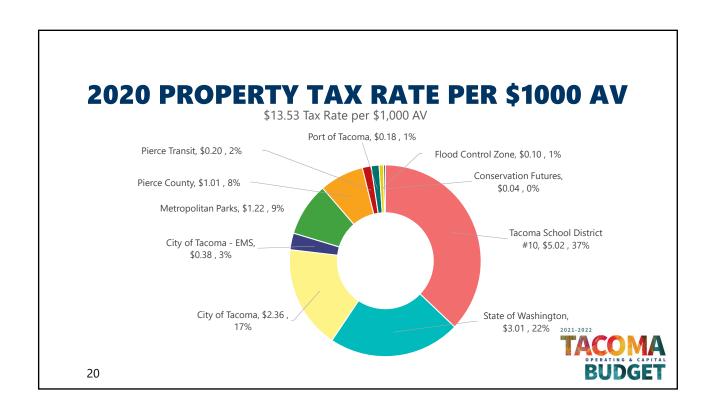
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EMS LEVY

 The ordinances authorize the 2021 EMS property tax levy at \$11.5 M, 1% increase over the highest regular levy
