- 5. Rental Assistance Update: LASA continues to administer the City's coronavirus rental assistance program. A total of 583 households have been served with awards totaling \$837,043.31. The lottery has closed for the year so final awards can be processed. The City is providing an additional \$1 million in COVID rental assistance in 2021 and the lottery will reopen early in the new year. The City's Rental Assistance Fund at the Greater Tacoma Community Foundation has received 24 gifts totaling \$28,320.
- 6. Warming Center Update: Over the past week, the Eastside Community Center Warming Center has operated at a capacity of 55 individuals staying overnight each night, with an average of an additional 18 individuals accessing daytime services. Site staff connected 5 couples with referrals to TEMS, and 2 other individuals received referrals to drug and alcohol programs.

Senior Meal Delivery: Access to healthy meals is important to our senior population and the City has adjusted contracted services during the COVID-19 pandemic to ensure seniors can still access food while senior centers are not operating. The City's contracted partner ensured pickup and delivery of 303 meals for the week of 12/21-12/24.

Pursuant to the City of Tacoma March 12, 2020, state of emergency proclamation in response to COVID-19, made in accordance with Tacoma Municipal Code Chapter 1.10., contract awards for purchases must be approved by the City Manager or designee.

#### RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY:

The Human Resource Department requests approval to increase CW2227892, to Gallagher Benefit Services, Inc., by \$200,000, plus any applicable taxes, to complete the Classification and Compensation Study. This increase will bring the contract to a cumulative total of \$540,000, plus any applicable taxes.

#### STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

 Encourage and promote an efficient and effective government, which is fiscally sustainable and guided by engaged residents.

#### BACKGROUND:

ISSUE: The purpose of the Classification and Compensation Study is to conduct a comprehensive classification and compensation study that will:

- Modernize our current compensation system, including developing potential alternative structures, evaluating and better defining our current market pricing strategies, practices and procedures to ensure we stay competitive to the market while maintaining equity across the organization
- Analyze and make adjustments in some areas of our current classification system that may not align with our organizational compensation philosophy
- Create a mechanism or model to tie pay to performance for certain classifications
- Establish controls that support long-term maintenance and integrity of the system

ALTERNATIVES: Given the timeline to complete this project, and the directive to complete the study, no other alternatives are available at this time.



#### **COMPETITIVE ANALYSIS:**

At this time, it is not practicable to conduct a competitive process, as the consultant, Gallagher Benefit Services, Inc. has performed a majority of the work on the initial contract and would be the only contractor able to continue the study without substantial duplication of work.

CONTRACT HISTORY: This contract was originally awarded to Gallagher Benefit Services, Inc. as a result of a request for proposal Specification No. HR18-0421F in February 2019. At that time it was approved under Resolution 40231. The contract was amended on April 1, 2020, placing a pause on the study in response to the COVID-19 global pandemic and increasing compensation by \$40,000 to pay for work already performed.

SUSTAINABILITY: Fiscal sustainability factors were considered in the extension of this contract by allowing the City to complete the remaining work in the most efficient manner by leveraging the previous historical and organizational experience the consultant possesses due to their extensive and detailed work thus far. This will allow the City to complete the study in the most seamless and efficient manner, hence resulting in a cost savings. Additionally, the impact on staff time and labor was considered, as bringing a new contractor on board would result in extensive additional internal staff labor.

#### RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY:

The Information Technology Department recommends a contract be awarded to SHI International Corp, Somerset, NJ, in the amount of \$3,300,000 plus applicable taxes, for an initial contract term of 3 years with the option to renew if agreed upon by both parties, for the purchase of software, most notably the City's Microsoft Enterprise Agreement renewal.

#### STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

• Encourage and promote an efficient and effective government, which is fiscally sustainable and guided by engaged residents.

## **BACKGROUND:**

In 2020 Microsoft renegotiated their pricing terms on the NASPO Software VAR contract that the State Department of Enterprise Services uses to renew their Microsoft Agreement. During this renegotiation, the state lost a significant discount in the pricing terms. Because of this, the IT Department researched cheaper alternative contracts to renew the City's Microsoft Licenses with and the Sourcewell Cooperative agreement provides the best rates available to us and will save the City \$33,000+ over the 3 year term of the agreement. Besides Microsoft software, the Sourcewell Cooperative agreement has a collection of other software available for purchase at a similar discounted rate to the NASPO Software VAR contract. Having both the Sourcewell and NASPO Cooperative agreements in place for the City IT Department to purchase off of will provide the City the best opportunity to get the lowest prices on new software purchases.

ISSUE: The current need is create an open contract with SHI utilizing the Sourcewell Cooperative agreement number 081419-SHI to enable the IT Department to competitively price and procure software as the need arises.

ALTERNATIVES: The IT Department could use existing open contracts, such as the NASPO Software VAR contract with CDWG, however the pricing terms on this contract are less favorable and some of the software that the IT Department procures is not available on this contract. If the Sourcewell contract is not approved, the City would have to change vendors last



minute with our Microsoft renewal in order to get it completed before the current agreement expires, it would also cost the City at least \$33,000 more in licensing costs over the term of the agreement. In addition to costing the City more money on the Microsoft renewal, the City would also lose the ability to shop different contracts for the best rates on other software purchases and renewals, potentially costing the City more money.

#### **COMPETITIVE SOLICITATION:**

Cooperative Agreement Specification No. 081419-SHI was established by the state of Minnesota after solicitation number RFP # 081419 was opened on August 14, 2019. Fourteen submittals were received. Three vendors were selected.

Pursuant to the City of Tacoma March 12, 2020, state of emergency proclamation in response to COVID-19, made in accordance with Tacoma Municipal Code Chapter 1.10, contract awards for purchases must be approved by the City Manager or designee.

#### RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY:

The Public Works Department requests approval to increase Contract No. 4600013689, to Lawhead Architects PS, Bellevue, WA, by \$75,000.00, plus any applicable taxes, for additional design and construction administration services for the new Fire Station No. 5 in the Tideflats. This increase will bring the contract to a cumulative total of \$604,050.00.

#### STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

- Strengthen and support a safe city with healthy residents.
- Assure outstanding stewardship of the natural and built environment.

Planned and existing industrial development in the Tideflats has demonstrated a need for enhanced public safety services. This contract will provide for design services needed to construct a new purpose built modern fire station and support existing and future growth in the Tideflats and surrounding area.

## **BACKGROUND:**

Due to prior budget reductions and restructuring, three fire stations have been closed in the Tideflats and no permanent, active fire station is currently located in that area. Renovation of the existing station was studied and it was determined that a new fire station was necessary to meet the long-term needs of the Fire Department. Construction of the new Fire Station No. 5 began in February of 2020.

ISSUE: The lack of a fire station in the Port has negative impacts on the public safety of workers and businesses in the Tideflats due to increased emergency response times. This contract amendment will provide additional construction administration and design services for the new fire station located in the Tideflats due to unforeseen circumstances encountered during construction, including revisions to the sanitary sewer due to encountered groundwater and additional storm drainage design due to excessive surface water runoff. This amendment will contribute to construction being completed and ultimately enhance public safety services in the area.



ALTERNATIVES: The alternative is to not move forward with the proposed contract amendment, which could delay completion of the new fire station in the Tideflats.

**COMPETITIVE SOLICITATION:** Lawhead Architects PS was selected using the Architectural and Engineering (A&E) Roster.

CONTRACT HISTORY: The original contract was awarded on December 4, 2018, in the amount of \$529,050.00, which was approved by City Council Resolution No. 40173. The proposed contract increase will provide for additional design and construction administration services required for the construction of the new fire station.

SUSTAINABILITY: This project is targeting a Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) Silver Certification.

#### RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY:

Tacoma Police Department requests approval to increase CW2233113, Axon Enterprise, Inc. Scottsdale, Arizona by \$891,656.42, plus any applicable taxes, for the purchase of body worn cameras and supporting software. This increase will bring the contract to a cumulative total of \$969,611.60, plus any applicable taxes.

#### STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

• Encourage and promote an efficient and effective government, which is fiscally sustainable and guided by engaged residents.

#### BACKGROUND:

The City awarded a contract to Axon Enterprise, Inc. in the amount of \$77,955.18, for the purchase of evidence cloud storage in December, 2019. This contract increase will facilitate the purchase of body worn cameras and supporting software as requested by the City Council. This amendment adds \$891,656.42, for a revised contract total of \$969,611.60.

ISSUE: The purpose of this project is to bring transparency to the public by placing body worn cameras on officers who are interacting with the community.

ALTERNATIVES: The city could request staff to do a separate competitive bid process. However, the Axon products meet the City's requirements and through use of the NASPO contract the City can buy those products at national discount pricing.

#### COMPETITIVE SOLICITATION:

The Washington State Department of Enterprise Services (DES) National Association of State Procurement Officials (NASPO) Contract No. 06316 is a competitively solicited contract. The City uses it through an interlocal agreement. This contract meets Tacoma's competitive solicitation requirements. All purchases from the city are eligible for the contract pricing of the DES/NASPO contract.



CONTRACT HISTORY: This contract amendment for body worn cameras and associated software is based on the Washington State Department of Enterprise Services Contract No. 06316 participating addendum with NASPO Contract No. OK-MA-145. The contract was originally awarded in 2017. The current contract term ends January 31, 2021, with renewals available through February 2, 2022.

Pursuant to the City of Tacoma March 12, 2020, state of emergency proclamation in response to COVID-19, made in accordance with Tacoma Municipal Code Chapter 1.10, contract awards for purchases must be approved by the City Manager or designee.

#### **RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY:**

The Tacoma Fire Department recommends a contract be awarded to SeaWestern, Kirkland, WA, in the amount of \$1,500,000 plus applicable taxes, for an initial contract term of three (3) years with the option to renew for two (2) additional one year periods for a projected contract amount of \$2,500,000, for the purchase of fire protection turnouts and department-provided uniforms.

## STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

• Strengthen and support a safe city with healthy residents.

The turnouts and uniforms provided under this contract ensure our firefighters have the safest clothing and fire protection turnouts to keep them protected on the job, thus better able to protect the residents and visitors of Tacoma.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

ISSUE: The Tacoma Fire Department (TFD) completed a wear test in 2018 to determine the best turnouts to keep our firefighters safe on the job. This test compared turnouts from four vendors through a series of standard operational tests as well as on the job testing by six firefighters. The results of the tests showed that the Lion turnouts shed water better, as well as were reportedly lighter and more breathable. In the operational evaluation, which included tests such as stair climbing, crawling, raising ladders, and rescuing; the results clearly showed Lion as the best performing turnout option, with the highest overall score compared to the other vendors. Currently, SeaWestern is the sole source distributor for Lion turnouts in the region. We have also been purchasing Lion uniforms as our standard department issue uniform for many years. SeaWestern is not the sole source supplier for the region for uniforms. However, both other distributors confirmed that they could not match or beat the NPPGov contract pricing that SeaWestern currently holds for these items. In addition to the discount that we will get from the NPPGov contract, the Puget Sound Regional Fire Authority contract has also allowed us to negotiate even lower costs.

ALTERNATIVES: The City could choose not to issue a contract to SeaWestern and we could complete our own solicitation. This would delay the purchase of needed equipment and uniforms, including for the current recruit class.



#### COMPETITIVE SOLICITATION:

NPPGov Specification No. 1915 was opened with a submittal deadline of January 24, 2020. The follow-on contract became effective April 13, 2020, with an initial expiration date of June 13, 2023, to include possible extensions through June 13, 2026. It is in the best interests of the City to utilize this pre-existing contract as it is for the brand of turnouts that the Fire Department have deemed best for our department and it provides reasonable pricing on both turnouts and uniforms without the cost to the City of completing our own competitive solicitation resulting in equivalent pricing.

CONTRACT HISTORY: The Fire Department had a contract for uniforms with Galls, before February 2020, and in 2019 made a one-time purchase request for turnouts from SeaWestern until we determined the next steps on contracts for both uniforms and turnouts.

SUSTAINABILITY: Lion, who is the manufacturer of the selected turnout and uniform items, continues to make improvements to their Corporate Sustainable Policy, most recently in May 2020. Their updated policy requires that they cut wasteful energy usage by utilizing all LED lighting. They also pledged not to sell products that could be harmful to human health or the environment, and they do not use manufacturing processes that release harmful pollutants or toxic material. Lion also has a program to recycle used turnout gear where reconditioned gear is delivered to fire departments in third world countries.

#### RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY:

The Environmental Services Department requests a waiver of competitive procurement procedures and recommends a contract be awarded to LMK Technologies, LLC (LMK), Ottawa, IL, in the amount of \$750,000.00, plus any applicable taxes, budgeted from the ES Wastewater Fund 4300 and ES Surface Water Fund 4301, for cured in-place pipe (CIPP) liner kits, bulk liner material, launching devices, spare parts, system components and equipment for use in trenchless, non-invasive repairs to the Wastewater and Surface Water collection system.

#### STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

- Strengthen and support a safe city with healthy residents.
- Ensure all Tacoma residents are valued and have access to resources to meet their needs.
- Assure outstanding stewardship of the natural and built environment.
- Encourage and promote an efficient and effective government, which is fiscally sustainable and guided by engaged residents.

LMK liner materials and associated parts and system components help optimize the utilities infrastructure rehabilitation expenditures through the use of CIPP lateral renewal technology. CIPP involves curing liners directly inside the pipe. This method repairs damaged pipes with a liner that, essentially, becomes a new, jointless pipe within a pipe. This process renews deteriorating pipes efficiently, cost effectively and significantly extends the service life of the pipeline. This enables the City to achieve lasting best value results throughout the life cycle of our infrastructure, ensuring fiscal responsibility, safe and healthy neighborhoods, responsible stewardship of the environment and continued access for our ratepayers to a utility that continues to meet their needs.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

Environmental Services had a three-year Sole Source Waiver (4600012124) with a value of \$750,000.00. This waiver expired on February 28, 2020. Due to standardization of the process used by Environmental Services Sewer Transmission Maintenance crews and due to the dollar amount associated with this material and components, a new waiver is required.



ISSUE: LMK liner materials and associated parts and system components help optimize the utilities infrastructure rehabilitation expenditures through the use of CIPP lateral renewal technology. However, this material and system components are high in dollar value. In addition, they are proprietary in nature, thereby necessitating a sole source waiver. Once an entity, firm or organization builds on LMK's system, it is not financially feasible to switch to an alternative vendor.

ALTERNATIVES: Short of changing the entire support system that the utility has built around using LMK material, parts and associated components, which would be cost prohibitive, there is no viable alternative.

**COMPETITIVE ANALYSIS:** Waiver of competitive bidding requested due to Sole Source. LMK materials, parts and system components are proprietary in nature. The only liners that will function properly with the LMK liner sectional process is the LMK liner, which are proprietary to LMK Technologies, LLC.

CONTRACT HISTORY: New contract

SUSTAINABILITY: This process renews deteriorating pipes efficiently, cost effectively and significantly extends the service life of the pipeline. From a sustainability perspective, this enables the City to achieve lasting best value results throughout the life cycle of our infrastructure, ensuring fiscal responsibility, safe and healthy neighborhoods, responsible stewardship of the environment and continued access for our ratepayers to a utility that continues to meet their needs.

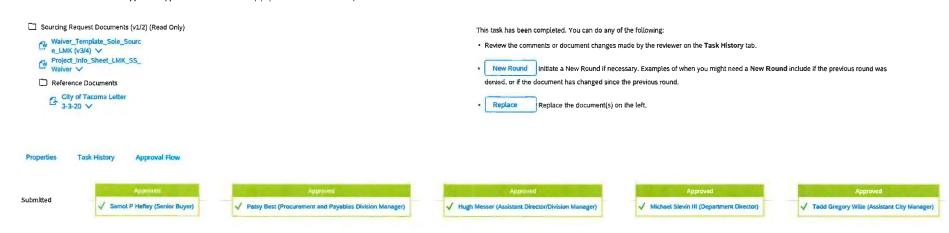

Pursuant to the City of Tacoma March 12, 2020, state of emergency proclamation in response to COVID-19, made in accordance with Tacoma Municipal Code Chapter 1.10., contract awards for purchases must be approved by the City Manager or designee.

#### RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY:

Neighborhood & Community Services (NCS) requests approval to increase the contracts to the providers listed in Exhibit A by the dollar amounts listed in Exhibit A, plus any applicable taxes, for various human and community services. The total increase for these contracts is \$18,322,620.

#### STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

- Strengthen and support a safe city with healthy residents.
- Ensure all Tacoma residents are valued and have access to resources to meet their needs.
- Encourage and promote an efficient and effective government, which is fiscally sustainable and guided by engaged residents.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

To provide stability for providers and ensure continued essential services for the Tacoma community during the COVID pandemic, NCS notified currently funded providers on March 17, 2020, that the City would not require a competitive process to receive funding for NCS contracted services in 2021. After assessing provider needs, and in anticipation of prolonged pandemic impacts, NCS determined that this approach would be carried forward through the 2021-2022 biennium.

NCS staff conducted a review of currently funded contracts and determined allocations for 2021-22 contracted services based on the following:

- Alignment with Council priorities and department goals
- Commitment to equity and transformation
- · Preservation of essential services
- COVID-19 response
- Projected NCS budget
- Program performance in the 2019-20 biennium

The City Council approved these allocations at the November 24, 2020 meeting (Resolution No. 40695). Following that action, NCS staff also negotiated scopes of work with Safe Streets



for the South East Tacoma Neighborhood Alliance (SETNA) and Seabrooks Too for e-Clmpact contract database services.

ISSUE: NCS is seeking approval to complete contract amendments for the contracts listed in Exhibit A.

ALTERNATIVES: Alternatives include either changing recommended allocation amounts or not approve allocations. Either of these alternatives would result in delayed contract start dates, which would impact services provided to Tacoma residents.

**COMPETITIVE ANALYSIS:** All contract amendments are being directly negotiated in order to provide continued essential services for the Tacoma community.

CONTRACT HISTORY: Contracts were originally awarded to the providers and programs listed in Exhibit A during the 2019-2020 biennium and are a result of previous competitive processes or direct negotiation waivers. (The only program that was not originally awarded during the 2019-20 biennium is Safe Streets – SETNA.)

Pursuant to the City of Tacoma March 12, 2020, state of emergency proclamation in response to COVID-19, made in accordance with Tacoma Municipal Code Chapter 1.10., contract awards for purchases must be approved by the City Manager or designee.

#### RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY:

Environmental Services requests approval to increase Contract No. 4600002026 with Pierce County Recycling, Composting, and Disposal, LLC, a Washington State limited liability company of which the business and affairs are managed by its Manager, Waste Connections, Inc., a Delaware corporation, Puyallup, WA, by \$6,000,000.00, for a cumulative total of \$26,000,000 plus any applicable taxes, budgeted from the ES Solid Waste Fund 4200, for organic composting services for an additional two years.

## STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

Assure outstanding stewardship of the natural and built environment.

Composting of organic waste provides a beneficial soil amendment product, extends landfill life, and reduces greenhouse gases, which all provide environmental benefits to the local community and surrounding areas.

#### **BACKGROUND:**

Environmental Services contracts with Pierce County Recycling, Composting, and Disposal, LLC composting services for organic waste collected by the curbside collections system and self-haul organic waste delivered to the Recovery and Transfer Center. The current contract for these services expires on November 30, 2020. Staff has been in negotiations with Pierce County Recycling, Composting, and Disposal, LLC to reach agreement on an extension of this contract, which is the second of two extensions. Significant cost increases due to regional capacity issues and other market forces have extended the negotiation process. Environmental Services intends to issue a competitive solicitation for a new long-term contract in the next two years due to the increase in rates and the regional changes that have impacted the markets and facility capacity.

ISSUE: The purpose of this contract amendment is to provide continued customer valued organic waste processing services that are protective of the environment and maintain the lowest rates possible for customers.

ALTERNATIVES: Two alternatives were identified. The first was to allow this contract to expire and issue a new competitive solicitation for organic composting services. The competitive bid



process would extend past the end date of the current contract, leaving a gap in compost processing services. Organic waste collected in the interim between contracts would need to be landfilled. The second alternative was to enter into a piggyback contract based on the City of Seattle's contract with Cedar Grove Composting Inc., which has compost facilities in Maple Valley, WA. This would have resulted in increased hauling costs and increased greenhouse gas emissions from transport of the organic waste a further distance.

CONTRACT HISTORY: This contract was originally awarded to Pierce County Recycling, Composting, and Disposal, LLC as a result of Organic Composting Services, Specification No. PW04-0162F by Resolution No. 36303 in September 2004. The original compensation, payment, and contract timeline was a 10-year term in the amount of \$10,000,000, with two 5 year renewal options, subject to negotiation, requiring written Agreement of the parties, to be executed as amendment(s) to the Agreement. Amendments No. 1 and No. 2 were short-term extensions to the contract term to allow the first 5-year renewal to be negotiated. The first 5-year renewal was executed November 2015, and extended the contract until November 30, 2020, with the contract amount increased to \$20,000,000.

SUSTAINABILITY: Include an explanation of how sustainability factors were considered, per the Sustainable Procurement policy in section XXIV. A. of the Purchasing Policy Manual. Other options for organic waste processing services include landfilling, or hauling to other facilities further from Tacoma. All of the alternatives identified would result in a negative greenhouse gas impact, and therefore not preferred from a sustainability perspective.

EIC/LEAP COMPLIANCE: Not applicable.

This contract increase will be funded by Solid Waste rates.

DATE: December 31, 2020

### **BACKGROUND:**

Tacoma Arts Live (TAL) provides management services for performances at the City's theaters, including the Pantages, Rialto, Theater on the Square, and Jones Building. Due to the Governor's orders intended to mitigate the COVID-19 pandemic, no performances have been allowed in the City theaters since before June. As a matter of law, the City cannot pay when services are not rendered. The City ceased paying the approximately \$63,000.00 per month fee in June, but has been prepared to resume payment when services could again be rendered by TAL. Since June, City TVE staff have performed all day-to-day maintenance and operations work at the City theaters. TAL has contended that a management fee is due.

The management agreement with TAL expires December 31, 2020 and with the end of the current management agreement, the City's policies call for the issuance of an RFP for management services for the theaters to ensure a fair and equitable opportunity is afforded to any entities qualified to provide such services. TAL may respond to the RFP. TAL did not object to the RFP but requested a six-month extension of the management agreement. The City and TAL negotiated an Addendum to the Management Agreement to address all issues. The Addendum was fully executed December 30, 2020.

### SUMMARY OF ADDENDUM:

- **1. 2020 Retroactive Management Fee:** A retroactive base fee of \$5,000.00 per month as consideration for the very limited services that TAL could provide during 2020 under the COVID-19 pandemic restrictions.
- **2. Extension to June 2021:** A six (6) month extension of the TAL management agreement at the same base rate, during which extension the RFP process will occur. TAL may compete in the RFP
- **3. 2021 Increase in Base Fee:** A base rate during the extension, to \$12,500.00 in consideration of additional services TAL will provide during the 2021 extension.
- **4. 2021 Increase in TAL Services:** As consideration for the increase in fee, TAL will hold dates and contract shows, including an assignment clause in the event of a management change, through the end of 2021 for all users, and through the 2021-2022 season for Resident Arts Organizations (RAOs) including TAL, subject to the City's prior approval through the Tacoma Venues and Events Department ("TVE").

**5. Other Consensus Matters Outside Agreement:** Continue to recognize TAL as a Resident Arts Organization regardless of the outcome of the RFP. Existing booking and rate policies will be continued during the time frames contemplated in the Addendum.

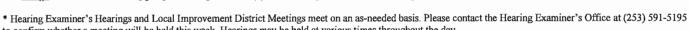
