Work Release Program Overview Program Description

- From prison to community while:
 - Under DOC authority
 - In partial confinement
- Focus on reentry, transition, and stability by:
 - Finding/retaining employment
 - · Re-connecting with family members
 - Becoming contributing citizens
 - Learning/refining life skills such as:
 - Using public transportation
 - Shopping
 - Managing personal finances



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Work Release Program Overview Placement Criteria

- · Eligibility is an earned privilege
 - Good behavior and program compliance
- · Screening Criteria
 - Defined in law and established in policy*
 - · Trained staff identify participants based on identified risk and needs
 - · Multiple levels of review required to approve some cases
- Can be ineligible due to:
 - Misconduct
 - Outstanding legal issues
 - Community concerns such as:
 - Victim concerns
 - Prior failure or rules violations at work release
 - · Excess or serious pattern of criminal history
 - Heinous or notorious crime(s)

Work Release Program Overview Participant (Resident) Expectations

- Residents must:
 - Work, attend school or vocational training or transitional programming
 - Activities in the community are approved for personal essential business, employment, education, programming, and treatment
 - Contribute financially
 - Remain in the facility unless there is specific, prior written approval
 - Undergo frequent UAs for drug/alcohol use
 - Continue programming, treatment or therapy to address identified risk/need areas associated with criminal activity
 - Cooperate with monitoring and behavioral expectations in the work release facility, workplace and other locations in the community



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Work Release Program Overview Progression through Program

- Three phase program
- "Step down" approach
- · Gradual community access based upon:
 - Following <u>all</u> rules
 - An individualized case plan
 - Compliant time in the facility
 - Meeting individual case plan objectives

...in order to increase public safety.

Total benefits are the average benefits of the program, per-participant. This is the sum of the taxpayer and non-taxpayer benefits.

Taxpayer benefits are benefits that accrue to the taxpayers of the state of Washington through a variety of sources, including costs avoided in the criminal justice system and publicly funded health care costs avoided due to reductions in substance use.

Non-taxpayer benefits include benefits that accrue directly to program participants; benefits that accrue to others in society, such as the reduced costs to victims of crime from avoided crime; and indirect benefits, such as the value of a statistical life and the deadweight costs of taxation.

Chances benefits will exceed costs describes the "risk" of the investment. In our benefit-cost analysis, we account for uncertainty in our estimates by allowing key inputs to vary across thousands of scenarios. We run our benefit-cost model 10,000 times; this statistic shows the percentage of cases in which total benefits were greater than the costs.

Work Release Program Overview Engrossed Substitute Senate Bill 6157 (2007)

- In determining the county of discharge for an offender on community supervision, community custody, or community placement, the offender must be returned to his or her county of origin unless it is determined that returning the offender to that county would be inappropriate.
- County of origin is defined as the county of the offender's first felony conviction in Washington. If the department returns the offender to a location other than the county of origin, the department must notify the Local Law and Justice Council in writing.





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

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Work Release Expansion Project Work Release as a Resource

- **Data**: These counties have been selected due to their status as unserved or underserved areas based on court sentencing and prison release records and data.
- **Demand**: As of April 7, 2021, there were 1,395 male and 132 female incarcerated individuals who have been screened and approved for the Work/Training Release Program. These individuals are waiting for bed space to become available in their release areas.
 - Progress House Work Release has an approved wait list of 206 males and 14 females awaiting placement.



Work Release Expansion Project

Project History

- Legislative Report, Implementation Plan
 - September 1, 2019
- Formed Local Advisory Committees in King, North Central, Pierce, and Snohomish Counties
 - Started: October 2019. Paused due to COVID-19, May 2020.
 - Restarted: February 2021
- Request for Proposals (RFPs) to lease space for Work Release facilities preferably in the four counties listed
 - Publication: December 27, 2019
 - Due Date: February 13, 2020
 - 6 submittals total, 2 properties submitted in Tacoma that no are longer being considered (ie. zoning and cost prohibitive)
- Additional ongoing searches by DOC and LAC members to identify viable sites
 - One site in Tacoma currently being evaluated: 1007 Center St



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Work Release Expansion Project

Local Advisory Committee Expectations

- Act in the best interest of public
- Develop an understanding of the community's concerns and sensitivities
- Active engagement and regular attendance throughout siting process
- Accurate understanding of DOC's role, charge, and limitations
- Members agree to review proposed sites
- Reach an effective agreement on recommendations
- Advocacy for DOC program and site within your organization and with other community members
- Support work release program's mission and activities



Expansion Project Process/Timeline Site Selection Steps

1. RCW 72.65.220 Facility siting process

- When DOC has selected three or fewer sites for final consideration, DOC shall make public notification and conduct a public hearing in the local communities of the final three or fewer sites.
 - Provide for opportunities for written or oral comments and wide dissemination of proposals and alternatives.

WAC 137-57-060 Site selection

 After the preliminary public hearing and an initial review, the advisory committee shall submit its recommendations to the Secretary, and the Secretary may give preliminary approval to one of the recommended sites.



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Expansion Project Process/Timeline Site Selection Steps (continued)

RCW 72.65.220 Facility siting process

- An additional public hearing after public notification shall also be conducted in the local community selected as the <u>final proposed</u> site.
 - Provide for opportunities for written or oral comments and wide dissemination of proposals and alternatives.

4. WAC 137-57-060 Public notice, hearing requirements

- After the Secretary gives preliminary approval to a site, the Department shall either apply for or assist others in applying for any permits which may be required by local zoning laws with respect to the operation of a work/training release facility.
- After the required zoning permits, if any, have been obtained, and the Secretary has considered the comments expressed by members of the public during any zoning process or during the public hearing conducted by the Department, the Secretary may grant or withhold final approval of the proposed site.




Draft Workplan - Fifty (50) Beds Work Release Expansion Legislative Directive by June 2020 (8 Months)
