- 8. <u>Warming Center at the Salvation Army</u>: **The Warming Center at the Salvation Army closed on April 30, 2021**. All remaining guests at the Warming Center were able to be transitioned to alternate shelter and housing locations. The Center served 104 individuals during its operations from January 28 to April 30.
- Senior Meal Delivery: Access to healthy meals is important to our senior population and the City has adjusted contracted services during the COVID-19 pandemic to ensure seniors can still access food while senior centers are not operating. The City's contracted partner ensured pickup and delivery of 376 meals for the week of 4/26 – 4/30/21.
- 10. <u>Rental Assistance Update</u>: The rental assistance portal is now open! **Residents may find** more information at <u>https://www.piercecountywa.gov/7142/Rental-Assistance</u>. The program provides up to 12 months of assistance dating back to March 2020 and serves households up to 80% of Pierce County Area Median Income. **Applicants may also qualify for utility assistance through the program**. The City's remains committed to reducing racial disparities in our service delivery and for this reason has a goal of providing at least 45% of the assistance to households headed by persons of color. In 2020, 78% of the households served by our emergency rental assistance program were households with the head of household identifying as a person of color. Through May 2nd, the City's funding has supported 54 households and provided \$265,347 in assistance. The City's Rental Assistance Fund at the Greater Tacoma Community Foundation has received 27 gifts totaling \$29,820.
- 11. <u>Hygiene Station Pilot at 8th and Yakima</u>: The City is currently operating temporary hygiene stations at 8th and Yakima on private property and I-705 and 'A' Street. These temporary stations provide restrooms, handwashing stations, trash removal and 24/7 on site security. Staff is currently engaged in conversations with Evergreen Tacoma about the implementation of an additional temporary station at 6th and 'L'/'M' Streets.
- 12. <u>Graffiti Removal</u>: City staff is currently working to enhance the Rapid Graffiti Removal program to address reported increases in graffiti incidences throughout the community. Staff is working to increase the number of available contractors for graffiti removal through recruitment of women and minority-owned small businesses and expansion of existing blight removal contracts that have the ability to remove graffiti. Staff will be presenting the new graffiti removal approach during the June 10, 2021 meeting of the Community Vitality and Safety Committee.

## SUMMARY:

The purpose of this memo is to provide a summary of topics and concerns discussed at the eight neighborhood councils and the Community Council of Tacoma during the month of April 2021. These items have been identified by the City Manager's Office liaison to each council as important or useful to bring to the City Council and City Manager's attention.

Questions regarding the Neighborhood Councils can be directed to the Program Coordinator at NeighborhoodCouncils@cityoftacoma.org.

## **TOPICS and CONCERNS:**

**Central Tacoma Neighborhood Council:** Metro Parks presented on the status and budget of park projects. MPT is exploring options to update People's Park and may partner with the NC to survey the community on preferred uses for the Heidelberg Sports Village project site.

**Community Council of Tacoma:** The board reviewed their 2020 annual report and 2021 action plan and discussed the topics of interest to each Neighborhood Council.

**East Tacoma Neighborhood Council:** The NC has expressed continued interest that the fields at Gault Middle School be reserved for community use after the sale of the property is complete. Katie Johnston from OMB presented to the NC on the American Rescue Plan Act.

New Tacoma Neighborhood Council: The NC did not meet in the month of April.

Northeast Tacoma Neighborhood Council: Stephen Atkinson of PDS conducted a Tideflats visioning session with the NC.

North End Neighborhood Council: The NC heard a presentation by Elliott Barnett about Home in Tacoma and sent a letter as part of the public comment process. They also had questions about how sheltering and hygiene station locations are selected, for which staff emailed background information to the NC Chair.

South End Neighborhood Council: The NC has expressed concern about the intersection at 84<sup>th</sup> and McKinley and has been in close contact with PW. They also unanimously approved a letter condemning acts of hate against the Asian American Pacific Islander community.

South Tacoma Neighborhood Council: The NC had record turnout to hear a presentation by NCS on possible temporary mitigation/stabilization sites.

## **SUMMARY & PURPOSE:**

A resolution directing the City Manager to bring forward a recommendation to the Economic Development Committee to allow reasonable permanent outdoor dining options in addition to sidewalk cafes, including parklets, and streateries, in time for the proposal to go into effect before the Curbside Café and Market Pilot program expires.

The resolution directs the City Manager to review all outdoor dining options across the City, including sidewalk cafes, parklets, streateries, and other options allowed during the COVID-19 pandemic, and consider how to reduce barriers to outdoor dining, including:

- Creating one point of entry for City permitting for all outdoor dining options,
- Reviewing restrictions based on size of sidewalk available outside of restaurants and proposing potential alternatives to remove barriers for these restaurants, and
- Considering how to reduce any other startup costs for restaurants.

When forming the recommendation, City staff should include outreach to a broad group of stakeholders, including the Downtown Tacoma Partnership, the Cross District Association of Tacoma, the Commission on Disabilities, and the Transportation Commission. These stakeholders should participate in the review of the future program considerations staff identified and shared at the April 27, 2021 Economic Development Committee meeting: parklet locations, program and design approach, race and social justice, community support, parklet operation and maintenance, accessibility, parking demands, cost to construct, competing City priorities, and staffing.

## **BACKGROUND:**

# This Council Member's Recommendation is Based On:

During the early phases of the COVID-19 pandemic, PDS and PW undertook several initiatives to assist the business community in addressing the impacts caused by the pandemic. In Phase 1 Stay Home, Stay Safe, the City introduced temporary Food Loading Zones and ADA parking stalls. In Phase 2 Safe Start, the City promoted the temporary Curbside Café and Market Program and existing temporary Sidewalk Café Program. The Community and Economic Development Department and Downtown Tacoma Partnership also partnered on the 8th Street Eatery that opened a street to pedestrians and customers.

Curbside café/markets, also known as streateries or parklets, are similar to sidewalk cafés but located in a parking space in the right-of-way. They function as an extension to an existing restaurant's seating area or retail store.

Curbside cafes/markets are permitted to be used only during the regular operating business hours of the host establishment. Private use of the public right-of-way typically requires entering into a formal agreement with the City; however, as a pilot program, this requirement was waived in an effort to support local businesses affected by closures related to COVID-19.

The intent of these pilot programs are to increase the capacity for businesses to comply with the requirements of Governor Inslee's Safe Start phased reopening plan. A permit for the Curbside Café and Market Pilot and Sidewalk Café programs can accommodate temporary structures such as tables, chairs, planters, merchant displays, and shade coverings.

The City of Tacoma has historically invested in the public right of way in ways that support additional outdoor commerce. Outdoor dining options have proven to be successful economic drivers that activate outdoor spaces across the City. However, a number of problems have been identified:

- Current permanent outdoor dining options have more barriers and higher costs than the temporary pilot options rolled out during the COVID-19 emergency.
- The temporary nature of the current pilot disincentives businesses from investing funds in outdoor dining infrastructure.
- While businesses speak highly of the City's permit staff, they have described barriers to finding the right permit information and have requested a smoother entry point.
- Spaces right outdoors of restaurants are sometimes ineligible for outdoor dining options due to minimal sidewalk space, slope of sidewalk, or other characteristics.

## **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT:**

Sponsors engaged with small business restaurant and owners, the Hospitality association, and business organizations like the Downtown Tacoma Partnership, to find opportunities to maintain operations during the COVID-19 pandemic. Outdoor dining options have been successful in increasing business and adding greater vibrancy to businesses, the industry has requested the City make outdoor dining options permanent.

## **2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES:**

## Equity and Accessibility:

All residents and visitors to the City of Tacoma rely on the public right-of-way to travel the City. Individuals with a mobility disability rely on unobstructed sidewalks for access. The Americans with Disabilities Act set standards for accessible design. While considering how to lower barriers on business to create outdoor dining spaces, this resolution directs the City Manager to include the City of Tacoma's Commission on Disabilities in outreach efforts and take care to ensure the City is accessible to all Tacomans.

## Economy/Workforce: Equity Index Score: Moderate Opportunity

Increase the number of diverse livable wage jobs.

Increase the number of infrastructure projects and improvements that support existing and new business developments.

Outdoor dining options will increase opportunities for local businesses to thrive in Tacoma, increasing employment opportunities for our residents. Making outdoor dining options permanent provides businesses the stability needed to make more costly infrastructure investments in outdoor dining.

Section 35.77.010 of the Revised Code of Washington (RCW) provides that the legislative body of each city and town prepare and adopt a comprehensive transportation program for the ensuing six calendar years and annually thereafter pursuant to one or more public hearings. The adopted program shall be filed with the Secretary of Transportation of the State of Washington.

Section 35.77.010 of the RCW further provides that each city will include in their comprehensive transportation program how they intend to expend the revenues for non-motorized transportation purposes. The program is necessary to allow the City to compete for and obtain state and federal grant funding.

According to Section 35.77.010 of the RCW, the draft program must be adopted no later than July 1<sup>st</sup> of each year. Revisions can be made to the proposed list at this time or in the future.

Staff is proposing the addition of thirteen (13) new projects to the draft program at an estimated total cost of \$68,864,494. The proposed list of projects to be added to the draft Program supports the goals and policies, as well as network priorities, outlined in the Transportation Master Plan. The Transportation Master Plan was adopted in 2015 and vetted through extensive public outreach. Staff is also proposing to remove seventeen (17) projects, which includes sixteen (16) completed projects from the draft program at a total cost \$67,197,145 and one (1) consolidated project at a total cost of \$11,000,000.

Staff provided a presentation to the Transportation Commission on the proposed list of projects to be added to and removed from the draft program on February 17, 2021, and a presentation on the full draft program on April 21, 2021. Additionally, staff provided presentations to the Infrastructure, Planning, and Sustainability Council Standing Committee on April 14, 2021 and April 28, 2021.

## PROJECT SUMMARY

Korean Women's Association plans to develop 81 units of affordable housing, plus 1 manager's unit, in downtown Tacoma at 15<sup>th</sup> and Tacoma. The project will include a 32 studio and 49 1-bedroom units. All units will be regulated at 50% of area median income, however many households will have incomes well below this level. Twenty-nine units will receive operating subsidy through the HUD 202 program and residents will pay 30% of their actual incomes for rent and utilities. It is also assumed that 35 of the non-HUD units will receive project-based Section 8 vouchers. KWA is working to provide a service center in the lower level of the building that will serve as resource center for seniors in the community.

## Target Population & Program Services

The project will provide deeply affordable housing for older adults and will include building design and services to support residents' ability to age place. The project will also set-aside units for frail elderly and for seniors who are Veterans. Onsite services and programs will be provided through a resident services coordinator. Residents will also benefit from access to the full array of KWA programs and services and the service center in the building.
