# **RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY:**

The Environmental Services Department recommends a contract be awarded to Northwest Cascade, Inc., Puyallup, WA, in the amount \$1,388,909.00, plus a 15 percent contingency, for a project contract total of \$1,597,245.35, plus applicable taxes, budgeted from the wastewater fund to replace aging wastewater sewer mains at various locations in Tacoma.

# STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

- Strengthen and support a safe city with healthy residents.
- Assure outstanding stewardship of the natural and built environment.

This project will replace aging wastewater pipes, structures, and side sewers. Roadways impacted by the proposed underground utility replacement work will be restored to existing or better condition. This work supports a safe city with healthy residents and assures outstanding stewardship of the natural and built environment of these neighborhoods.

### BACKGROUND:

This project will replace approximately 2,150 linear feet of wastewater sewer main, including side sewer laterals, cleanouts, and street restoration. The work will occur at multiple locations throughout the City of Tacoma.

ISSUE: The underground wastewater mains are reaching the end of their service life and are at risk of failure.

ALTERNATIVES: Taking no action would put the City at risk of future pipe failures, which may result in untreated wastewater overflowing into the Puget Sound. Pipe rehabilitation was also considered, but the mains are not in adequate condition to do so.



# COMPETITIVE SOLICITATION:

Request for Bids for Specification No. ES20-0149F was opened April 20, 2021. The project was advertised in normal publications. Two submittals were received.

Northwest Cascade, Inc. submitted a bid that resulted in the lowest evaluated submittal after consideration of Equity in Contracting (EIC) participation goals. The table below reflects the amount of the base award.

<sup>\*</sup>After evaluating the bid submitted by Rodarte Construction Inc., the EIC Office deemed it nonresponsive due to its failure to meet the EIC requirements listed below. At the time of the bid deadline, the Minority Business Enterprise (MBE) subcontractor listed was not MBE certified in the OMWBE Directory, which is a requirement of the EIC Program criteria as detailed in Chapter 1.07 of the Tacoma Municipal Code.

Pre-bid Estimate: \$1,454,515.00

The recommended award is five percent below the pre-bid estimate.

CONTRACT HISTORY: New contract.

SUSTAINABILITY: Replacement of these pipes will reduce the risk of failure, thereby reducing the potential for discharge of untreated wastewater into Puget Sound, resulting in a positive environmental impact.

EIC/LEAP COMPLIANCE: The recommended contractor is in compliance with the EIC Regulation requirements per memorandum dated April 22, 2021. The EIC requirements for this project are 6 percent for MBE, 4 percent for Women's Business Enterprise (WBE), and 10 percent for Small Business Enterprise (SBE). The EIC utilization levels of the recommended contractor, Northwest Cascade, Inc., are approximately 6 percent for MBE, 5 percent for WBE, and 10 percent for SBE. The Local Employment and Apprenticeship Training Program (LEAP) requirements are 15%.

Contract Amendment for Construction Costs - Jefferson & Hood Street Surface SUBJECT:

Water Interceptor Project, Specification No. ES17-0269F

# **RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY:**

The Environmental Services Department requests approval to increase Contract No. 4600013207, with James W. Fowler Co., Dallas, OR, by an amount of \$4,493,695.35, plus a 15 percent contingency, for a contract total of \$8,443,549.65, plus any applicable taxes, budgeted from the ES Surface Water Fund 4301, for construction of the Jefferson & Hood Street Surface Water Interceptor Project

### STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

- Strengthen and support a safe city with healthy residents.
- Assure outstanding stewardship of the natural and built environment.

This new surface water interceptor will provide additional capacity intended to help address flooding in the lower downtown area and provide additional capacity for growth. A reduced risk of stormwater flooding represents an improvement to human health and the environment.

# **BACKGROUND:**

ISSUE: Currently, during intense rain events, flooding can occur in various areas of downtown Tacoma. This flooding can result in property damage and disruption to traffic. Providing additional capacity to the City's surface water system in this area in the form of a new 60-inch diameter interceptor pipe will help address the current capacity limitations and also allow for future growth in the downtown area.

In 2017 the City determined the progressive design-build contracting method offered significant advantages over the traditional design-bid-build (low bid) delivery method and was best suited to meet project goals. The City selected the design-build team of James W. Fowler Co. (contractor) and Kennedy Jenks (design consultant) to design and build the new surface water interceptor and new outfall in two distinct stages. In February 2018, James W. Fowler Co. was awarded and has subsequently completed Stage 1 of the Progressive Design Build contract which included engineering services necessary to advance the design to 60 percent.



Stage 2 work will include the final design and construction of the project and will be executed in two phases. This contract amendment will cover Phase 1 of construction, including procurement of long-lead time materials and equipment, including sheet piling, steel/concrete/fiberglass pipe, and rental of a microtunnel boring machine. A future amendment to authorize Phase 2 of construction is currently anticipated to be brought before the City Council for consideration in July 2021 and will be substantial in value, currently estimated in the range of \$20 million.

Since the COVID-19 pandemic began, prices of construction materials have risen. Due to these recent increases for materials such as, steel and concrete pipe, Environmental Services is requesting the 15 percent contingency to address market volatility.

ALTERNATIVES: The alternative is taking no action and not constructing this new surface water interceptor and outfall, thereby accepting the risk of continued surface water flooding and potential additional challenges related to surface water from future development in the downtown Tacoma area. If additional surface water capacity is not constructed, the risks will continue to increase over time.

**COMPETITIVE SOLICITATION:** This contract was originally awarded to James W. Fowler Co. as a result of Request for Proposals Specification No. ES17-0269F in December 2017 via Purchase Resolution No. 39943, in the amount of \$3,100,800.00, plus applicable taxes for Stage 1 Preliminary Services.

CONTRACT HISTORY: Contract Amendment No. 1 increased Stage 1 Preliminary Services by \$175,000.00 in August 2020, bringing the contract cumulative total to \$3,275,800.00, plus any applicable taxes. This proposed increase for Stage 2 Construction will be the second amendment to the contract with James W. Fowler Co, resulting in a new contract total of \$8,443,549.65, plus any applicable taxes.

SUSTAINABILITY: The construction of additional surface water capacity to help reduce future flooding represents the best solution with respect to potential impact on human health and environment.

EIC/LEAP COMPLIANCE: James W. Fowler Co. will be in compliance with the Equity in Contracting (EIC) Regulation requirements per the contract; to be met during the upcoming construction. The EIC requirements for this project are 8 percent for Minority Business Enterprise (MBE),, 3 percent for Women's Business Enterprise (WBE), and 10 percent for Small Business Enterprise (SBE). The Local Employment and Apprenticeship Training Program goal is 15 percent.

# **RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY:**

The Public Works Department recommends a contract be awarded to Tucci & Sons Inc., Tacoma, WA, in the amount of \$4,195,519.25, plus a 15 percent contingency, for a cumulative total of \$4,824,847.13, plus applicable taxes, budgeted from various departmental funds, for the construction of roadway improvements, sanitary and storm sewer upgrades, water infrastructure upgrades, curb ramp replacement, alley way access improvements, and curb/gutter repairs. This project also includes residential sidewalk replacements, slope stabilization for a portion of roadway on the western side of Norpoint Way, and guardrail replacement on Northshore Parkway.

# STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

- Strengthen and support a safe city with healthy residents.
- Ensure all Tacoma residents are valued and have access to resources to meet their needs.
- Assure outstanding stewardship of the natural and built environment.
- Encourage and promote an efficient and effective government, which is fiscally sustainable and guided by engaged residents.

The project will improve the roadway and utility infrastructure by rehabilitating driving surfaces for vehicles and bicycles, replacing curb ramps to meet ADA standards, replacing/upgrading existing water, storm sewer and sanitary sewer utility lines, installing new water, storm sewer and sanitary sewer utility lines where necessary, and replacing guardrail that was damaged from a car accident. Planting of trees is also a part of this project where feasible.

### **BACKGROUND:**

The citizens of Tacoma approved the Street Initiatives (Proposition A and Proposition No. 3) in November 2015, approving funding to repair and improve City streets. The 2015 Voted Street Initiative Fund 1085 was created and approved by the City Council under Ordinance No. 28344 on February 9, 2016. This fund provides for arterial street improvements, non-motorized improvements, and residential street repairs.



ISSUE: The project's construction includes new roadway sections where existing road section failure exists, asphalt grind and overlay where feasible to maintain roadway surfaces, and curb/gutter repair as needed. The project also includes the construction of sanitary and storm sewer infrastructure upgrades, as well as water infrastructure installation and upgrades. Curb ramp improvements, alley way access replacement, and sidewalk repair where feasible will be completed as needed to meet ADA standards. This project also includes residential sidewalk replacement where damaged sidewalks have been reported to the City, slope stabilization for a portion of failing roadway on the western side of Norpoint Way, and guardrail replacement damaged by a car accident on the Northshore Parkway in Northeast Tacoma.

ALTERNATIVES: The alternative to performing the street restoration and improvements is to complete only minor repairs, which would not meet the intent of the voter-approved Initiative.

### COMPETITIVE SOLICITATION:

Request for Bid Specification No. PW21-0434F was opened April 13, 2021. 38 companies were invited to bid in addition to normal advertising of the project. Three (3) submittals were received.

Tucci & Sons Inc. submitted a bid that resulted in the lowest evaluated submittal after consideration of Equity in Contracting (EIC) participation goals.

CONTRACT HISTORY: New contract.

SUSTAINABILITY: The project will improve the City's infrastructure, and safety of residents by providing a new driving surface for motorized and non-motorized travel. ADA compliant curb ramps will also be installed as part of the contract addressing social equity factors, including mobility, as well as ergonomic and human health impacts. Utility installation, upgrades, and maintenance will ensure utilities are operating at current and future demands.

EIC/LEAP COMPLIANCE: The recommended contractor is in compliance with the EIC Regulation requirements per memorandum dated April 15, 2021. The EIC requirements for this project are Minority Business Enterprise (MBE) 9 percent, Women's Business Enterprise (WBE) 5 percent and Small Business Enterprise (SBE) 14 percent. The EIC utilization levels of the recommended contractor, Tucci & Sons Inc., are MBE 11.19 percent, WBE 11.72 percent, and SBE 14.61 percent.

# RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY:

The Environmental Service Department requests approval to increase Contract No. CW2237809 with General Mechanical, Tacoma, WA, by an amount up to \$350,000.00, for a projected contract total of \$3,590,351.61, plus any applicable taxes, budgeted from ES Solid Waste Fund 4200, to install collection truck block heater receptacles, electric vehicle charging stations and electrical conduits for future flame detection instrumentation determined needed during construction of the Compressed Natural Gas (CNG) Fueling Station Upgrade Project.

# STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

• Assure outstanding stewardship of the natural and built environment.

Solid Waste Management's (SWM) CNG Fueling Station Upgrade will create facilities to allow for the fueling of the Environmental Services Department (ES) conversion of SWM's collection system fleet from diesel fuel to CNG. Doing so will create an environmental benefit by reducing greenhouse gas emissions and supporting the use of renewable fuels for transportation purposes.

### **BACKGROUND:**

The original scope of this project was to install site improvements to support the City supplied CNG fueling equipment, generator and automatic transfer switch equipment. The project included construction of concrete pads, concrete raceways for new fuel pipe, tubing and electrical wiring, a new fueling station with metal building canopy, and fuel management system. In addition, the project construction will provide for improved lighting for fleet, on-site operations of the new equipment, the container maintenance facility and the removal of power poles in the vicinity of the project. The work is occurring at the SWM Recovery and Transfer Center.

The existing collection fleet block heater assemblies were built as part of the truck parking lot improvements back in 2013. During initial use, the existing system was found to not have sufficient capacity to adequately power simultaneously all the truck fleet block heaters. In addition, the existing configuration of the system provided four vehicle receptacles per support



post. Collection vehicles serviced by these block heaters parked on both sides of the fueling barricades requiring extension cords be draped over the barricades to plug in. The extension cord draping does not allow for a clear walking path in front of the truck for drivers to access their vehicles and is a tripping safety hazard. This additional work will provide for receptacles on both sides of the barricade eliminating the tripping hazard and the receptacle posts will be installed closer to the vehicle to allow for the walking path. The ability to safely use block heaters for the SWM collection fleet supports the Safety Culture initiative and reduces idle times for trucks during the cold months of the year, providing a reduction in fuel use and greenhouse gas emissions, and operational efficiencies.

As part of a grant with the Washington State Department of Ecology the City, through this contract, will be purchasing and installing electrical vehicle (EV) charging infrastructure for employee use. This work is to help accelerate the transition to zero emission vehicles by enhancing employee access to EV charging in the workplace. As part of the SWM Parking Lot Improvements constructed in 2019, electrical conduits were installed for future installation of three additional EV charging stations. This project will purchase and install three additional EV charging station equipment and install electrical wiring to provide the required power.

During construction of the project, our CNG design expert informed the project team of a future requirement to install flame detection and arrestor equipment on CNG time fill truck fueling stations. This project will install the required future conduits for future installation of the electrical wiring and instrumentation devices anticipated with the new rule.

**ISSUE:** The existing CNG fuel station does not have capacity for the existing and expanded fleet of CNG fueled vehicles. The upgrades are necessary to ensure the collection system fleet can be fueled to provide solid waste collection and disposal services for our citizens. These improvements are paramount to the continuity of operations of the fleet. A failure in proper facilities to fuel our vehicles could result in negative impacts to public health and safety.

**ALTERNATIVES:** One alternative is taking no action which could result in an increase in fuel use, greenhouse gas emissions and reduction in the operational efficiencies gained by the implementation of these additional improvements.

**COMPETIVE ANALYSIS:** This contract was originally awarded to General Mechanical as a result of a Request for Bids Specification ES20-0086F in August 2020, per City Manager Action Memorandum dated August 7, 2020, in the amount of \$3,240,351.61, plus applicable tax.

# **CONTRACT HISTORY:**

The original contract was awarded to General Mechanical on August 7, 2020, in the amount of \$2,700,293.01, plus applicable tax, plus a 20 percent contingency, for a cumulative total of \$3,240,351.61.

The proposed amendment would increase the contract up to \$350,000.00, for a projected contract total of \$3,590,351.61, plus applicable taxes, for requested changes to enhance the overall project improvements for safety, reduction in greenhouse gas emissions and other operational efficiencies that will be realized.

**SUSTAINABILITY:** CNG-fueled vehicles emit up to 20 percent less greenhouse gas compared to traditional diesel-fueled vehicles and result in a reduced carbon footprint, leaving a better Tacoma now and for future generations.

**EIC/LEAP COMPLIANCE:** General Mechanical will be in compliance with the Equity in Contracting (EIC) Regulation requirements per the contract. The EIC requirements for this project are 1 percent Minority Business Enterprise (MBE), 1 percent Women's Business Enterprise (WBE) and 2 percent Small Business Enterprise (SBE). The Local Employment and Apprenticeship Training Program (LEAP) goal is 15 percent.

Pursuant to the City of Tacoma March 12, 2020, state of emergency proclamation in response to COVID-19, made in accordance with Tacoma Municipal Code Chapter 1.10., contract awards for purchases must be approved by the City Manager or designee.

# **RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY:**

The Public Works Department requests a waiver of competitive procurement procedures and recommends that a contract be awarded to HDR Engineering, Inc., Bellevue, WA, for right of way acquisition services for the Madison District Green Infrastructure project, Historic Water Ditch Trail Phase III project, and Links to Opportunity Project, in the amount of \$551,896.72, plus any applicable taxes.

# STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

The three projects listed above align with the following strategic policy priorities:

- Strengthen and support a safe city with healthy residents.
- Ensure all Tacoma residents are valued and have access to resources to meet their needs.
- Assure outstanding stewardship of the natural and built environment.

Acquiring this service supports the three listed priorities by allowing the projects to proceed to construction. All the projects are corridor projects that will address one or more of the three priorities with either new sidewalks, streets, or trails.

# **BACKGROUND:**

# Madison District Green Infrastructure Project (Madison Green Project)

The Madison District Green Infrastructure project is a permeable pavement project retrofitting approximately 16 blocks of failing residential roadways between South 43rd Street and South 47th Street and between South Puget Sound Avenue and South Pine Street. With funding from the Department of Ecology (DOE), the neighborhood will receive new permeable streets and sidewalks including a shared use path, street trees, curb ramps, and upgraded utilities. There are a total of three (3) Temporary Construction Easements (TCE), nine (9) Temporary Construction Permit (TCP) parcel and thirteen (13) Shared Driveway Agreements (SDA) acquisitions for access, sidewalk, Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA), and driveway improvements.

# Historic Water Ditch Trail Phase III Project (Water Ditch Project)

The City is working to improve pedestrian and bicycle safety along the South Tacoma Way Corridor by restoring the six-and-a-half-mile Historic Water Ditch Trail. Phase three of the project between South Pine and South M Streets is one of the final links in the trail to connect South



Tacoma with downtown, the Tacoma Dome and the Thea Foss Waterway. There are a total of 22 parcels to be acquired comprised of fee Right of Way Dedications (ROW Deeds) and TCE acquisitions. Major improvements in existing or new right of way (ROW) will require leases or permits to remain.

# Links to Opportunity Project (LTO Project)

The Links to Opportunity Project was initiated in 2016 to actively engage the community in designing streetscape improvements along Sound Transit's Hilltop Tacoma Link Extension route, which runs along Martin Luther King Jr. Way between Division Avenue and South 19th Street. The scope of these improvements include sidewalks, lighting, street furniture, wayfinding signage, trees, and landscaping. The resulting streetscape design will enable safe access for all users including pedestrians, cyclists, motorists, and transit riders of all ages and abilities. There are a total of 63 TCEs to be secured/required to move site improvements out of the existing right of way allowing for construction of the project.

ISSUE: Real Property Services (RPS), a section within the Public Works Department, is responsible for managing all City rights of way and real property, including acquiring any necessary property rights for public works projects. The foregoing projects represent a significant increase in workload for existing staff and the project timeline does not allow hiring of additional temporary staff. Therefore, RPS requires additional contract right of way acquisition resources to adequately handle and manage the projects in a timely manner in order not to jeopardize project funding deadlines and construction schedules.

ALTERNATIVES: In the event the request for additional resource assistance is denied, in-house staff of two (2) will handle all acquisitions. However, schedules will be significantly delayed, funding may be at risk, and all other RPS work will have to be reprioritized.

# **COMPETITIVE ANALYSIS:**

Direct Negotiation was the method of procurement as allowed per City of Tacoma Purchasing Policy Manual and Tacoma Municipal Code 1.06.256 B. Grant deadlines, construction schedule, and insufficient staff to perform the work in-house to meet timelines were factoring considerations. Thus a direct negotiation is requested to contract with HDR Engineering, Inc. for ROW services on these projects.

In 2019, City of Tacoma utilized Pierce County Contract No. SC-103239 (Personal Services Agreement for on-call ROW acquisition services) to identify and select HDR Engineering, Inc. for City ROW projects. HDR Engineering, Inc. established that they are qualified, efficient, and timely in completing City ROW corridor projects and so the City continued to negotiate the scope of work with them until it was identified that the Pierce County contract would expire before this scope of work would be completed. HDR Engineering, Inc. was in on-going discussions on the foregoing projects and given project funding deadlines and construction schedules, it was determined that a direct negotiation with HDR Engineering, Inc. was the best way forward on these three projects.

In accordance with TMC 1.06.256 (B), Public Works Department, Facilities Management Division, Real Property Services Section requests a waiver of the competitive solicitation process and authorization to directly negotiate with HDR, Inc., Bellevue, Washington, for right of way acquisition and consulting services, for an amount of \$553,000.00 plus applicable sales tax.

Direct negotiation approval constitutes a waiver of further competitive solicitation for amendments to the subject contract provided that any such amendment(s) shall be signed by personnel as authorized in the Delegation of Procurement Signature and Approval Authority memorandum. Contract totals shall not exceed \$500,000 without City Council or Public Utility Board approval as appropriate.

**EXPLANATION:** Real Property Services requests authorization to enter into contract for right of way acquisition/consulting services for the following three (3) projects:

The Links to Opportunity (LTO) Project is a streetscape improvement project along Sound Transit's Hilltop Tacoma Link Extension route which runs along Martin Luther King Jr. Way between Division Avenue and South 19th Street. The scope of these improvements include sidewalks, lighting, street furniture, wayfinding signage, trees, and landscaping. The resulting streetscape design will enable safe access for all users including pedestrians, cyclists, motorists, and transit riders of all ages and abilities.

<u>The Madison District Green Infrastructure Project</u> is a permeable pavement project retrofitting approximately 16 blocks of failing residential roadways between South 43rd Street and South 47th Street and between Puget Sound and Pine Street. The scope of these improvements include new permeable streets and sidewalks including a shared use path, street trees, curb ramps, and upgraded utilities.

The Water Ditch Trail Phase IIIA & IIIB Project will improve pedestrian and bicycle safety along the South Tacoma Way Corridor by restoring the six-and-a-half-mile Historic Water Ditch Trail. Phase III of the project between South Pine and South M Streets is one of the final links in the trail to connect South Tacoma with downtown, the Tacoma Dome and the Thea Foss Waterway.

# JUSTIFICATION FOR DIRECT NEGOTIATION:

1. Explain why it's in the best interest of the city to waive the competitive solicitation process.



It is in the City's best interest to waive the competitive solicitation process in order to meet grant funding and construction deadline requirements for all three projects.

2. Is this purchase based on a previous competitive solicitation conducted by the City or other agency? If yes, provide the contract information, specification number, etc., and explain the relationship of this request to the previous contract.

Yes. This purchase is based on a previsous competitive solicitation conducted by Pierce County under RFP #1533 from which on-call Contract No. SC-103239 was issued to HDR for appraisal and acquisition services. This request to use HDR is based on past services provided by HDR to the City under the Pierce County contract, which showed consultant capability of meeting or exceeding contract and work expectations for corridor right of way acquisition projects.

3. Describe the screening efforts made to identify potential service providers.

City is relying on the competitive solicitation conducted by Pierce County under RFP #1533 from which on-call Contract No. SC-103239 was issued to HDR for appraisal and acquisition services.

4. Describe the efforts made to assure that the City is receiving the lowest or best price possible.

The cost estimates provided by HDR for the three projects have been compared to costs from previous corridor projects for right of way acquisition services and is in-line with previous contract amounts for level of work required.





# **SUMMARY AND PURPOSE:**

An ordinance amending TMC 6A.110 to eliminate the eight-year Multi-Family Property Tax Exemption (MFTE) in residential target areas completely designated "very high" opportunity based on the City's Equity Index, effective 90 days after adoption. Given the market-driven high demand for housing in Tacoma, the City does not need to offer incentives in "very high" opportunity areas that do not include affordability requirements because they are the most desirable places for developers to build. This proposal would create more affordable housing in the areas of the city that have historically been the most expensive to live – opening the doors to making even the "very high" opportunity areas a possibility for any resident of Tacoma.

# **BACKGROUND:**

Tacoma has one of the most competitive real estate markets for housing in the country.¹ After years of stalled housing development, the City is seeing much-needed investment and construction of large, multi-family housing projects in areas designated by the City Council as residential target areas for growth under the City's *One Tacoma* Comprehensive Plan. These residential target areas for growth are called Mixed-Use Centers (MUCs) and are identified in TMC 13.17.020. Tacoma has eighteen MUCs located throughout the city.

The City uses the Multi-Family Property Tax Exemption (MFTE) to encourage growth in the MUCs (see TMC 6A.110). Over the past five years, nearly 2,000 units have been added through this program, with another 4,300 units in the construction pipeline currently. The MFTE financially incentivizes development in these areas by exempting property taxes for eight or twelve years on the assessed improvements that create four or more additional housing units. The eight-year MFTE is the standard exemption with no affordable housing requirement, while the twelve-year MFTE requires that at least 20% of the units built be reserved for households that earn 80% or less than Area Median Income (AMI). AMI is published annually by the Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD). For the affordability requirement, the annual rents charged are to be no more than 30% of the 80% median income – rents are set by HUD each year.<sup>2</sup> While the City provides the tax exemption, this investment pays dividends over the life of the housing project and the City recuperates more than it invests through increased sales and construction taxes.

Even with these incentives offered for housing development, Tacoma continues to lack affordable housing for low-income individuals. According to the *Home in Tacoma: Housing Action Plan* (2021), in 2019 there was an estimated 7,159 households with incomes of less than 50% AMI, (or \$35,000 and less per year), that cannot find rental units

they can afford.<sup>3</sup> Of the 2,000 units created through the MFTE in the past five years, only 130 were required to be affordable. Of the 4,300 in the construction pipeline, only 264 will be required to be affordable. The City's highest opportunity areas, most notably those in the North End, are the most challenging to access for low and moderate income households. Opportunity is defined as a situation or condition that places individuals in a position to be more likely to succeed or excel. Affordable housing is needed across the city, but especially in areas where the wealth-gap is greatest and where opportunity is highest.

The Equity Index is a tool used by the City of Tacoma to identify disparities in the city based on census block group data. The Equity Index uses 29 indicators within five social determinant categories based on the Tacoma 2025 Strategic Plan to determine where the greatest community needs are located. Census block groups' score are labeled on a scale from "very high" to "very low." Areas with the highest opportunity are labeled "very high" and areas with the lowest opportunity are labeled "very low." Tacoma's Equity Index was generated by the Kirwan Institute for the Study of Race & Ethnicity for Tacoma's Office of Equity and Human Rights and is applied across all City Departments, including being considered in every legislative proposal.

Given the market-driven high demand for housing in Tacoma, the City does not need to offer incentives in "very high" opportunity areas that do not include affordability requirements because they are the most desirable places for developers to build. This proposal would create more affordable housing in the areas of the city that have historically been the most expensive to live. The analysis done in the *Home in Tacoma: Housing Action Plan* (2021) shows that high rent areas of the City can absorb mandatory inclusionary zoning requirements without compromising financial feasibility for developers.<sup>5</sup> This proposal does not address inclusionary zoning, but this analysis does suggest that if these "very high" opportunity areas can continue to thrive with inclusionary zoning requirements, then the removal of the eight-year MFTE in these areas will likely not deter development.

Currently, the only MUCs (or residential target areas) completely located in "very high" opportunity areas is the Proctor District and Point Ruston. These can be viewed by selecting the Equity Index layer on the City's public, interactive DART map.<sup>6</sup> A map showing the Equity Index and MUCs is included as an attachment to this proposal. MUCs with a portion designated "very high" opportunity but not completely "very high" opportunity, such as Westgate, are excluded from this policy.

# **COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT/ CUSTOMER RESEARCH:**

The City's relationships with housing developers is very important for the mutual success of the community and these key partners. Those developers most impacted by this proposal have been engaged and understand the need of the City to create more affordable housing units, this includes engagement with the Master Builders Association. Countless emails and phone calls with residents indicate the need for housing projects that better meets the needs of the neighborhood and to either require an affordability set-aside (as the 12-year MFTE option provides) or withhold financial incentives for housing developers in these "very high" opportunity areas. The policy was introduced at the North End Neighborhood Council in June 2021 and was well received.

# **2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES:**

Equity and Accessibility: (Mandatory)

This policy will reduce inequities by increasing the amount of affordable housing in high rent areas of the City, assuming housing developers choose to pursue the 12-year MFTE rather than no tax incentive. Even if housing developers forgo the MFTE and build market-rate housing, this benefits renters by taking some of the pressure off residents due to housing scarcity.

Livability: Equity Index Score: Moderate Opportunity

Decrease the percentage of individuals who are spending more than 45% of income on housing and transportation costs.

Improve access and proximity by residents to diverse income levels and race/ethnicity to community facilities, services, infrastructure, and employment.

# Explain how your legislation will affect the selected indicator(s).

This proposal will decrease the percentage of individuals who are spending more than 45% of income on housing and transportation costs by nudging developers towards taking advantage of the 12-year MFTE and including the affordable housing set-aside. This proposal will also improve access and proximity by residents to diverse income levels and race to community facilities, services, infrastructure, and employment by increasing the likelihood that affordable housing will be built in "very high" opportunity areas where these important amenities are readily available.

The proposal anticipates continued housing development in the mixed-use centers designated "very high" opportunity after passage of this ordinance. There are opportunities for the Community and Economic Development Department to present to Council when the Equity Index is updated in the future should there be any change in the mixed-use centers designated "very high" opportunity.

# STAFF/SPONSOR RECOMMENDATION:

Sponsors recommend passage of this ordinance authorizing the elimination of the eight-year multi-family housing tax exemption in residential target areas designated "very high" opportunity based on the City's Equity Index, effective 90 days after adoption. Applications filed for the MFTEs later than 90 days from the adoption of this ordinance shall adhere to the new rules.

# FISCAL IMPACT:

There is no direct cost to implement this ordinance. The fiscal impacts of the ordinance are unknown, however housing projects utilizing the MFTE during the exemption result in a net positive fiscal impact for the City in the form of increased sales tax, including construction sales tax.
