Dear Mayor and Council Members:

ITEMS OF INTEREST

- City Manager Elizabeth Pauli provides the attached approved Purchase Contract Awards for the week of July 26, 2021.
- 2. Public Works Director Kurtis Kingsolver provides a list of transportation infrastructure projects made possible by the voter-approved Street Initiatives Proposition No. 3 and Transportation Benefit District Proposition A in November 2015. This list provides funding, costs and schedules of all active capital projects within the Public Works Department. This project list is subject to change as new funding becomes available and progress is made. Public Works will provide updates on a quarterly basis.
- 3. Council Member Walker provides the attached **City Council Action Memorandum for an expenditure of \$5,500 to support the general market operation of the Eastside Tacoma Farmer's Market**.
- 4. Council Member Walker provides the attached City Council Action Memorandum authorizing the execution of a memorandum of understanding with Mayors for a Guaranteed Income (MGI) and United Way, establishing the responsibilities of the parties and confirming acceptance of \$500,000 in additional funding from MGI for a Guaranteed Income Demonstration in the City of Tacoma.
- 5. <u>City-funded Temporary and Emergency Shelter Performance:</u> The City posts weekly information about its Temporary and Emergency Shelter locations including current census, number of available beds and exits to housing. This information can be found at https://cms.cityoftacoma.org/NCS/City%20Authorized%20Emergency%20Shelter%20Sites/Weeklydataupdate.pdf and is updated weekly.
- 6. <u>Lighthouse Cooling Center</u>: In anticipation of warm weather, **the City is opening a cooling center at Lighthouse Activity Center (5016 A Street) Thursday, July 29 through Saturday, July 31.** The Lighthouse Activity Center is available 8:30 AM to 5 PM on weekdays and 1-6 PM on weekends to people needing relief from severe summer weather and reduced air quality events.
- 7. <u>Senior Meal Delivery:</u> Access to healthy meals is important to our senior population and the City has adjusted contracted services during the COVID-19 pandemic to ensure seniors can still access food while senior centers are not operating. **The City's contracted partner ensured pickup and delivery of 389 meals for the week of 7/19 7/23/21.**

8. Rental Assistance Update: The rental assistance portal is now open! Residents may find more information at https://www.piercecountywa.gov/7142/Rental-Assistance. The program provides up to 12 months of assistance dating back to March 2020 and serves households up to 80% of Pierce County Area Median Income. Applicants may also qualify for utility assistance through the program. The City's remains committed to reducing racial disparities in our service delivery and for this reason has a goal of providing at least 45% of the assistance to households headed by persons of color. In 2020, 638 households received assistance from the Tacoma Rental Assistance Program. Of those 638, 78% were households with the head of household identifying as a person of color.

In 2021, 62% of households served to date are headed by persons of color. The City has provided 295 households with \$2,158,923 in rental assistance and 500 households with \$519,601 in utility assistance in 2021. This emergency rental and utility assistance is available from the U.S. Department of Treasury for expenditure through September 30, 2022. The City's Rental Assistance Fund at the Greater Tacoma Community Foundation has received 28 gifts totaling \$30,820

- 9. Hygiene Station Pilot at 8th and Yakima: The City is currently operating temporary hygiene stations at 8th and Yakima on private property and I-705 and 'A' Street on WSDOT-owned property. These temporary stations provide restrooms, handwashing stations, trash removal and 24/7 on site security. The costs associated with operation of the station on WSDOT property is supported by the City's funding agreement with WSDOT to address encampments on WSDOT right of way and properties. Hygiene stations will remain in place through August while staff evaluates alternate shelter locations. If community members have questions or concerns about either of the hygiene station locations, they are welcome to contact 253-250-1766. and Tax & License customers and staff

Pursuant to the City of Tacoma March 12, 2020, state of emergency proclamation in response to COVID-19, made in accordance with Tacoma Municipal Code Chapter 1.10., contract awards for purchases must be approved by the City Manager or designee.

RECOMMENDATION SUMMARY:

The Planning & Development Services and Finance Departments request approval to increase Professional Services Contract CW2237725, to Selectron Technologies, Inc, Portland, OR, by \$475,000, which includes \$100,000 contingency for addition of future services, plus any applicable taxes, for contract term extending through July 23, 2025, for a new contract total of \$975,000, for the implementation of additional products of Atlas and SelecTXT for Planning & Development Services and deployment of an additional languages module to the existing IVR (Interactive Voice Response) solution for Tax & License.

STRATEGIC POLICY PRIORITY:

- Strengthen and support a safe city with healthy residents.
- Ensure all Tacoma residents are valued and have access to resources to meet their needs.
- Assure outstanding stewardship of the natural and built environment.
- Encourage and promote an efficient and effective government, which is fiscally sustainable and guided by engaged residents.

BACKGROUND:

Both Planning & Development Services and the Tax & License Division of Finance seek to further grow the tools available to staff and customers for easier and more efficient access to services.

In Planning & Development Services, inspection staff currently use a mobile app created and maintained by Accela for inspection management in the field. This app was included with the



purchase and annual subscription of Accela and has not worked consistently for staff since being deployed five years ago.

There currently is not availability for customers to manage their inspections by text. The only options available are an IVR option and online scheduling through the department's Accela permitting website.

Currently, the Tax & License IVR is presented to customers in the English language only.

ISSUE:

The connection between the current application and the Accela database will often get dropped requiring inspectors to reenter lengthy notes and inspection results frequently throughout the day. Further, the layout of the app is not customizable to how our inspection staff operate and is limited on what information from a permit is presented to the inspector through the app. Inspectors currently do not have an efficient way to manage the inspection workload and reassignment of inspections. The Atlas Inspections and Atlas Insight products will provide inspection staff with customizable web tools for quickly and efficiently managing daily workloads and communicating with customers.

SelecTXT provides an additional channel for contractors and homeowners to access their inspection data and complete inspection transactions for scheduling, rescheduling, and viewing results when, where, and how they want from their phone. This tool is also integrated with the Accela permitting platform.

Tax & License desires to enable the current IVR system to support additional languages for non-English language users. This feature would also translate all dates, numbers, ordinals and currencies to the selected language.

ALTERNATIVES:

The alternative to purchasing the requested services would be to continue using the existing systems.

For Atlas Inspection and Insight, the alternative is to continue using the existing Accela application with the aforementioned shortcomings.

For the SelecTXT product, the alternative is to not provide text messaging as a way for our customers to manage inspection requests. They would continue to rely on the Accela online customer portal or the call in IVR system.

For Tax and License IVR, the alternative is for English to remain the only supported language requiring outside resources for translation to the desired language.

CONTRACT HISTORY:

This contract was originally awarded to Selectron Technologies, Inc as a result of Request for Proposal Specification No. PL14-0447F in September 2014. Contract CW223772 was



executed on May 9, 2019. July 23, 2020, the City signed a Letter of Understanding expanding services to the Finance Department.

SUSTAINABILITY: Selectron Technologies, Inc provides digital solutions and integrated products to meet the demands of agencies like the City of Tacoma in providing a stable platform to convert existing processes into fully digital ones. Currently, many of our inspection staff print out documents, plans, routing sheets, and lists of inspections when heading out into the field because they are concerned about the reliability of the current app they use. This proposal would stand up a new, reliable inspection app to create a better digital experience and eliminate the need for back-up paper documents in the field. Further, the IVR being translated for four additional languages would provide a portion of customers with information they are seeking and remove the need for written translations.

The Public Works Department is pleased to provide the attached update to our capital projects planning document. The purpose of this document is to provide additional information regarding funding, costs, and schedules for active capital projects within Public Works. Updates include changes to project schedules and funding, the addition of new projects, and deletion of projects that are complete. The document lists projects in categories according to work phase with projects in design listed first, followed by projects in advertisement, construction, and closeout. The update also includes Public Works support services for Tacoma Rail projects, Neighborhood and Community Services projects, Community and Economic Development projects, and others.

This project list is a result of the residents of Tacoma approving the Street Initiatives (Proposition No. 3 and Transportation Benefit District Proposition A) in November 2015 to fund additional maintenance and improvements to transportation infrastructure. The project funding sources include Propositions A and No. 3, other City funds, grants, gas tax, and City utility funds. Several of the projects are currently funded for design only with construction funding sources to be determined.

Please note this is a planning document that is subject to change as new funding becomes available and as progress is made on capital projects, whether it be in design and/or construction. SUMMARY AND PURPOSE:

A resolution authorizing the use of \$5,500 from the Council Contingency Fund to support the general market operations of the Eastside Tacoma Farmer's Market.

COUNCIL SPONSORS:

Mayor Woodards, Council Member Walker, Council Member Beale, and Council Member Ushka

BACKGROUND:

The Tacoma Farmer's Market operates on a slim budget and is dependent on thriving farmer's markets to sustain the robust and quality markets residents have come to expect. The Eastside Farmer's Market spends \$30,000 to operate each year - running June through August – and typically only earns about \$5,000 in revenue from vendor fees. This 2021 season has been particularly hard on the Eastside Farmer's Market and since the market opened in June has lost more than 50% of its vendors by mid-July. This loss in vendors translates into reduced shoppers at the market which has led to reduced revenue. This market is in a Census-designated Low-Income, Low-Supermarket Access neighborhood and the market provides an important option for shoppers with limited access to healthy and fresh food. The Eastside Farmer's Market is a crucial community asset benefitting residents living in a "low-opportunity" area of the City as designated by the City's Equity Index. The Tacoma Farmer's Market also accepts and matches EBT/SNAP benefits at all market locations, providing a valuable resource to residents with limited incomes.

Compounding the need for assistance, the Eastside Farmer's Market has historically been supplemented by the prosperous Broadway Farmer's Market that serves downtown patrons and relies heavily on daytime shoppers that would stop by on lunch breaks from work. Since the pandemic has sent many downtown workers to telework from home, this has led to reduced revenue at the Broadway Farmer's Market, which means less supplemental revenue for the Eastside Farmer's Market.

The \$5,500 Council Contingency Fund request will ensure the Eastside Farmer's Market will be able to sustain basic services through next year. Without the funding, the Eastside Farmer's Market will be less likely to provide activities at the market, provide fewer cooking demonstrations, provide fewer waived vendor fees when necessary to help struggling farmers, and would need to reduce the market's outreach and marketing campaign.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT/ CUSTOMER RESEARCH:

Several meetings have taken place between Council Members and the Tacoma Farmer's Market to understand the need and financial position of the not-for-profit. Those most affected by this proposal are the shoppers and vendors at the Eastside Tacoma Farmer's Market. The Eastside Market is located in a Census-designated Low-Income, Low-Supermarket Access neighborhood and is located in an area designated "very low" opportunity based on the City's Equity Index. As a small, local, non-profit, the Tacoma Farmer's Market has direct contact with vendors and shoppers and strives to serve their needs to create thriving markets.

2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES:

Equity and Accessibility: (Mandatory)

This proposal will reduce inequities and disparities to under-represented communities by providing financial support to a farmer's market located in an a Census-designated Low-Income, Low-Supermarket Access neighborhood and in an area designated "very low" opportunity based on the City's Equity Index. It will provide the opportunity for members of the Eastside community to attend and benefit from a thriving seasonal farmer's market in the neighborhood. The Tacoma Farmer's Market serves as a valuable resource to residents with low incomes by accepting and matching EBT/SNAP benefits at all market locations.

Economy/Workforce: *Equity Index Score:* Very Low Opportunity Increase positive public perception related to the Tacoma economy.

Livability: *Equity Index Score*: Very Low Opportunity

SUMMARY AND PURPOSE:

A resolution authorizing the execution of a memorandum of understanding with Mayors for a Guaranteed Income (MGI) and United Way, establishing the requirements and confirming acceptance of \$500,000 in additional funding from MGI for a Guaranteed Income Demonstration in the City of Tacoma.

COUNCIL SPONSORS:

Deputy Mayor Keith Blocker, Council Member Catherine Ushka, and Council Member Kristina Walker

BACKGROUND:

In June 2020, Mayor Woodards signed on to be a founding member of Mayors for a Guaranteed Income (MGI). She noted at that time that her participation was motivated by the potential to be connected to non-governmental funding opportunities for local demonstration projects. In November 2020, the City Council approved an initial Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) accepting \$100,000 in funds from MGI for exploration and/or design of a Tacoma guaranteed income demonstration.

Because Mayor Woodards is a founding member, MGI offered Tacoma's guaranteed income demonstration an additional \$500,000 in starter funds in December 2020 that could be distributed to participants selected for a guaranteed income demonstration in Tacoma. The attached MOU would confirm receipt of those funds.

In a presentation in Study Session on June 29, 2021, the City's key community partner in administering this work – United Way of Pierce County –provided an update on the work done since the initial MOU, including information on the design and implementation steps of a Tacoma guaranteed income demonstration. A context document providing an overview of demonstration design work is attached.

A small group of community leaders have continued discussion and community outreach, including multiple focus groups, to determine what elements should be included in the design of a Tacoma guaranteed income demonstration. Partners in this work have included Mayor Woodards, Council Member Walker, United Way, Sound Outreach (who administers the Center for Strong Families), Tacoma Urban League, Greater Tacoma Community Foundation, and Tacoma Housing Authority. A representative from the Washington State Department of Social and Health Services has also joined the work group to help inform how a guaranteed income might impact benefits received by participants and to align the demonstration efforts with the State's 10-year plan to dismantle poverty.

Design of the Tacoma guaranteed income demonstration, now known as "Growing Resilience in Tacoma" or GRIT, is also being informed by feedback from researchers at University of Pennsylvania's Center for Guaranteed Income

Research.¹ With assistance from the Center for Guaranteed Income Research, the lessons learned from a local demonstration would be aggregated with data from other validated demonstrations across the nation and inform state and federal policy work going forward.

Among the community leaders who have been engaged, there remains a shared goal to identify additional private or philanthropic dollars for the guaranteed income payments provided to participants in a Tacoma demonstration.

As defined by the national MGI initiative, guaranteed income is:

- A monthly, cash payment given directly to individuals;
- The payment is unconditional, with no strings attached and no work requirements;
- The additional income is meant to supplement, rather than replace, the existing social safety net; and
- It can be a tool for racial and gender equity.

We live in a time of pandemics and climate disruptions, and MGI holds the position that everyone deserves an income floor through a guaranteed income which empowers recipients to address their most urgent individual needs and provides a cushion for unpredictable expenses, external shocks, and volatility. This follows the foundational anti-poverty work pursued by Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. His speeches used the term "guaranteed income" and are foundational to MGI's work.

Early data from the Stockton Economic Empowerment Demonstration – where they are providing \$500 per month for 24 months showed that 40% of the funding was spent on food. That percentage has increased during COVID-19. Initial qualitative data reflect improved mental health, the ability to seek medical or dental care, and the ability to better show up for and support their children.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT/ CUSTOMER RESEARCH:

Community leaders engaged in this work have continued discussion and community outreach, including multiple focus groups, to determine what elements should be included in the design of a Tacoma guaranteed income demonstration. Community engagement will not end when GRIT begins - the experience of participants and data from the demonstration will inform future efforts to address poverty.

2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES:

Equity and Accessibility: (Mandatory)

This demonstration is intended to provide data on innovative solutions to address poverty and, thus by extension, the wage/wealth inequities across our state and nation. The U.S. is one of the wealthiest countries in the world but prosperity and well-being are not broadly shared. Nearly 40% of Americans cannot afford a single \$400 emergency, and rising income inequality is compounded by a growing racial wealth gap. The median white worker made 28% more than the typical Black worker and 35% more than the median Latine worker in the last quarter of 2019. At the same time, the median wealth of white families was more than \$100,000 while the median wealth of Black families was approximately \$10,000 prior to the coronavirus pandemic.

Additionally, women – particularly women of color – are the most likely to live in poverty. They are overrepresented in low-paying occupations, and are far more likely to lack access to sick leave and health care

benefits. When we look at these disparities combined, Black women are paid 66 cents for every dollar that is paid to white men, and Latinas make even less at 58 cents for every dollar white men make.

Recent research has indicated significant disparities when looking at the earnings for gay and transgender workers, and specifically for gay men and transgender women. Looking at data across 12 studies, the Williams Institute found that gay and bisexual men earn 10-32% less than heterosexual men that were similarly qualified. One study found that the earnings of female transgender workers fell by nearly one-third following their gender transitions.²

Livability: *Equity Index Score*: Moderate Opportunity

Improve health outcomes and reduce disparities, in alignment with the community health needs assessment and CHIP, for all Tacoma residents

Decrease the percentage of individuals who are spending more than 45% of income on housing and transportation costs.

Explain how your legislation will affect the selected indicator(s).

Income levels are directly linked to public health outcomes. "Poverty and low-income status are associated with a variety of adverse health outcomes, including shorter life expectancy, higher rates of infant mortality, and higher death rates for the 14 leading causes of death." Overall, the effects to the health and wellness of Tacoma's lower income earners have a collective impact on our health, behavioral health, education, housing, and social services systems. Using a guaranteed income to establish an income floor can reduce the need to spend public dollars in these areas that are crucial to residents' health and wellbeing.
