- 4. <u>City-funded Temporary and Emergency Shelter Performance</u>: The City posts weekly information about its Temporary and Emergency Shelter locations including current census, number of available beds and exits to housing. **This information can be found**<a href="https://cms.cityoftacoma.org/NCS/City%20Authorized%20Emergency%20Shelter%20Sites/Weeklydataupdate.pdf">https://cms.cityoftacoma.org/NCS/City%20Authorized%20Emergency%20Shelter%20Sites/Weeklydataupdate.pdf</a> and is updated weekly.
- 5. <u>Senior Meal Delivery</u>: Access to healthy meals is important to our senior population and the City has adjusted contracted services during the COVID-19 pandemic to ensure seniors can still access food while senior centers are not operating. The City's contracted partner ensured pickup and delivery of **390 meals for the week of August 30, 2021 through September 3, 2021**.
- 6. Rental Assistance: The rental assistance portal is open! Residents may find more information at <a href="https://www.piercecountywa.gov/7142/Rental-Assistance">https://www.piercecountywa.gov/7142/Rental-Assistance</a>. The program provides up to 12 months of assistance dating back to March 2020 and serves households up to 80% of Pierce County Area Median Income. Applicants may also qualify for utility assistance through the program. The City remains committed to reducing racial disparities in our service delivery and for this reason has a goal of providing at least 45% of the assistance to households headed by persons of color. In 2020, 638 households received assistance from the Tacoma Rental Assistance Program. Of those 638, 78% were households with the head of household identifying as a person of color. In 2021, 62% of households served to date are headed by persons of color.

In 2021, the City has provided 410 households with \$3,002,844 in rental assistance (this is an Increase of 24 households and \$81,966 in assistance over last week) and 769 households with \$884,877 (this is an increase of 62 households and \$93,826 in assistance over last week). This emergency rental and utility assistance is available from the U.S. Department of Treasury for expenditure through September 30, 2022.

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The City's Rental Assistance Fund at the Greater Tacoma Community Foundation has received 28 gifts totaling \$30,820.

7. Planning and Development Services Director Peter Huffman provides the below schedule for the Tideflats Non-Interim Regulations review. On May 18, 2021, the City Council passed Ordinance No. 28759, approving an extension of the Tideflats interim regulations for up to six months, and referring proposed permanent regulations to the Infrastructure, Planning, and Sustainability Committee for review and recommendation to the full City Council no later than August 31, 2021. The Committee completed its review of the non-interim regulations at a special meeting on August 30, 2021.

**SUBJECT:** August 2021 Neighborhood Council Liaison Report

#### **SUMMARY:**

The purpose of this memo is to provide a summary of topics and concerns discussed at the eight neighborhood councils and the Community Council of Tacoma during the month of August 2021. These items have been identified by the City Manager's Office liaison to each council as important or useful to bring to the City Council and City Manager's attention.

Themes included presentations on the Climate Action Plan, visits by WA Speaker of the House Laurie Jinkins to several NCs, and presentations by Lutheran Community Services Northwest's dementia friendly programs. Three of the Neighborhood Councils did not meet in August.

### **TOPICS and CONCERNS:**

Central Tacoma Neighborhood Council: The Tacoma Area Commission on Disabilities presented updates on the status of the City's efforts to become more accessible to individuals with disabilities, including the celebration of the 64th and Pacific public works project, working with TPD on effective communication, and how to identify individuals with visual or physical disabilities. Lutheran Community Services Northwest presented on their work with the aging population with a focus on dementia and House Speaker Laurie Jinkins and Representative Jake Fey spoke about the 2021 State Legislative session and their four focus areas: responding to COVID, economic recovery, anti-racism, and responding to the climate emergency.

**Community Council of Tacoma:** Community Council reviewed progress of individual Councils and their bylaws. They also requested that Council members resume monthly attendance, as they had done on a rotating basis prior to COVID.

East Tacoma Neighborhood Council: The NC did not meet.

New Tacoma Neighborhood Council: The NC did not meet.

**Northeast Tacoma Neighborhood Council**: The Fire Department presented on recent fires at Schnitzer Steel and Council Member Thoms presented. Residents asked questions about trash around Tacoma, policing, encampments, and fireworks.

**North End Neighborhood Council**: The NC heard a presentation on the ammo tax survey and another on the City's Climate Action Planning process. They asked about Innovative Grants in 2022 and City services for individuals with mental health issues, with an emphasis on how the City is providing support to the houseless community.
