#### **UNFINISHED BUSINESS**

#### **REPORTS BY THE CITY MANAGER**

City Manager Elizabeth Pauli provided an update and expressed appreciation for City staffs efforts for taking care of the City and its residents during the recent holidays and snow storms, noting Public Works cleared areas around temporary shelter sites and provided salt to keep the sites safe and clear; Environmental Services placed additional garbage collection bins at the Lighthouse Activity Center (LAC) and altered the collection schedule to meet the increased need; the Tacoma Police Department responded to multiple requests for health and welfare checks for individuals in encampments; the Tacoma Fire Department assisted with assessing capacity for setting up the warming shelter at the LAC; the Media and Communications Office assisted with updating information for the public about warming shelter sites, the City's emergency response, activation of the LAC, and road clearing efforts; the Tacoma Office of Emergency Management secured and delivered supplies of face masks, gloves, and hand sanitizers to the LAC; Tacoma Venues and Events engaged in conversations about alternative warming shelter sites and other potential needs; and Neighborhood and Community Services contacted all funded shelter sites to assess their needs and provided additional blankets, water, and other supplies. She concluded by stating City outreach workers along with outreach workers from the funded service providers and homeless advocates were in the field during the severe weather encouraging people to accept offers of shelter and other services; the LAC served 50 individuals since its activation on December 26, 2021; and the LAC will transition into a winter shelter as of January 7, 2022.

#### COMMENTS AND COMMITTEE REPORTS OF THE CITY COUNCIL

Infrastructure, Planning, and Sustainability Committee

Council Member McCarthy, Chair of the Infrastructure, Planning, and Sustainability Committee, reported at the December 8, 2021, meeting, the Committee conducted interviews for the Planning Commission; the January 12, 2022, meeting, has been cancelled; and the next meeting will be held on January 26, 2022, at 4:30 p.m., through Zoom.

Mayor Woodards stated that COVID-19 case rates are rising, visit tpchd.org/gettested to view registration links and to set appointments for COVID-19 testing, due to the high demand for testing it may take longer than normal to get the test and receive the results, Pierce County opened up a temporary drive through testing site at the Washington State Fair Gold Lot, community members can obtain free at home tests from local libraries or request a free test to be delivered from Seattle Coronavirus Assessment Network, and medical offices and pharmacies offer free testing. She concluded by encouraging everyone to get the vaccine and booster shot, wash their hands, wear their masks, social distance, and to quarantine and get tested if symptoms arise; and reminded everyone the quarantine guidelines have changed from 14 days to five days.
