ITEMS OF INTEREST

4. **Encampment Outreach:** For the week of **February 13 - 27, 2026**, the HEAL team visited **24 locations**. This resulted in **51 (10 new, and 41 repeat)** individuals contacted and referred to community services; 7 individuals accepted shelter placement. 5. Neighborhood and Community Services (NCS) 2027-2028 Competitive Funding Process: **The Neighborhood & Community Services Department plans to release an application for 2027-28 contract funding in May 2026. The application period will close in June 2026, and funding may come from the following sources: General Fund, Mental Health & Substance Use Disorder (MHSUD) sales tax, Criminal Justice sales tax, Opioid Settlement, Affordable Housing, DOJ Justice Assistance Grant (JAG), Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), and Emergency Solutions Grant (ESG) funds. NCS will seek to fund programs that align with [Council priorities](#) and [NCS department goals](#).**

A review panel, including Commissioners from the Human Services Commission will review and rate applications and make recommendations for how to allocate the available funds. All funding recommendations will be subject to Council approval of the 27-28 biennial budget. NCS and Purchasing staff will host three pre-proposal meetings in May 2026 for interested applicants:

SUMMARY AND PURPOSE:

A resolution designating Garden Route, South Africa as a Sister City of the City of Tacoma and removing George, South Africa as Sister City as adopted by RES 33896.

COUNCIL SPONSORS:

Mayor Anders Ibsen, Council Member Jamika Scott, and Council Member Latasha Palmer

BACKGROUND:

In order to be considered for a Friendship or Sister City designation, a committee must be formed with members from both communities and a relationship must first be established. Once a relationship has been established, the committee can apply to the Tacoma Sister Cities Council for formal consideration of a relationship. Once approved by the Tacoma Sister Cities Council the application is then forwarded to the Mayor's Office for review of the materials for completeness and submits the recommendation to the City Council for consideration.

Unlike a new application, this change in relationship represents a strategic elevation of Tacoma's 28-year sister city relationship with George, South Africa. At the invitation of regional leadership within the Garden Route District Municipality (GRDM), applicants are requesting an expanding from a single-city relationship to a comprehensive district-wide partnership encompassing seven municipalities and over 630,000 residents along South Africa's southern coast. The Garden Route District serves as the coordinating government body for seven local municipalities, each with distinct economic strengths, cultural assets, and community needs that align closely with Tacoma and Pierce County's diversity and represents a new opportunity to engage Pierce County in people-to-people relationships.

Tacoma's Sister City relationship in South Africa began in 1997 when an interested resident-initiated communications with George. At the same time a George South Africa individual had approached Sister Cities International searching for a U.S. Sister City. Since establishing the relationship there have been numerous exchanges over the years including educational exchanges for students and government practices, donations of supplies for building and furnishing shelters and classrooms, books, uniforms, and sports equipment for school children, and more.

This expansion of the relationship will focus on a number of areas of exchange including Port City and maritime trade, tourism, golf and sports diplomacy, jazz, arts, and culture, and continued youth education and development. Additional details on these areas of exchange can be found in the attached materials.



As a part of transitioning this new relationship, this legislation requests formally removing George as Tacoma’s Sister City to follow best practice to have just one Sister City in each country. In April of 2024 as a part of their process, the Tacoma Sister Cities Council formally sunset the George Sister City Committee and transitioned to the Garden Route Sister City Committee in preparation for this transition. George hosted a delegation from Tacoma to celebrate the 25th anniversary of our Sister City partnership in 2023. During that time, Deputy Mayor Ushka and Melannie Denise Cunningham, Chair of the then George Sister City Committee, met with several representatives and the mutual decision at the time was to end the Sister City Relationship with George and expand it to the entire Garden Route of South Africa, of which George is part. A letter from the Mayor’s Office between these communities confirmed this intent later that year.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT/ CUSTOMER RESEARCH:

The Garden Route Sister City committee has done significant work to recruit local volunteers for this relationship and establish strong ties throughout Garden Route. They have engaged the Tacoma Sister Cities Council and other members regularly on this transition and have worked to publicize the relationship and opportunities to support as they are able.

2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES:

Equity and Accessibility:

Sister City relationships are established by Tacoma Sister Cities and supported by residents interested in maintaining the relationship. Often these are residents who may have come from the Sister City and want to establish a connection for those living in Tacoma with their home city and/or Country. These relationships and people to people exchanges create opportunities for cultural exchange and learning about other cultures for all residents of Tacoma through public events and volunteer opportunities.

Civic Engagement: *Equity Index Score: Moderate Opportunity*

Increase the number of residents who participate civically through volunteering and voting.

Expanding people to people relationships through Sister Cities provides additional opportunities for the public to get involved and support cultural exchanges, learning, and engagement with City programs.

The Mayor’s Office continues to manage the Sister City program and support the exchanges with all Sister Cities. By designating Garden Route as a Sister City staff will add this relationship to the working portfolio of the program. The Sister Cities Council and/or committee may also be invited to present to a Council committee or City Council in the future to update them on standing relationships.

We recommend adoption of this resolution to designate Garden Route as a Sister City of the City of Tacoma, and formally remove George as a Sister City.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY:

This is a follow-up to the System Development Charges (SDC) briefing to the City Council on February 10, 2026. In October 2025, City Council requested that Public Works (PW), Environmental Services (ES), and the City Manager’s Office (CMO) report on the up-front costs to build in Tacoma if proposed transportation impact fees and wastewater and stormwater system development charges were adopted. This following memorandum has been updated to include water system development charges and the adopted transportation impact fees.

The charts that follow present the stacking of all adopted and proposed impact fees and system development charges across Tacoma and five neighboring jurisdictions for an Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) / Detached Accessory Dwelling Unit (DADU), a 4-plex multifamily development, and an 8-plex multifamily development.

The full list of impact fees and system development charges assessed across the five jurisdictions includes the following. The combination of fees and charges adopted varies by jurisdiction.

Impact Fees

- Transportation
- School
- Parks

System Development Charges

- Water
- Wastewater
- Stormwater / Surface Water




Figure 1 ADU / DADU fee stacking




Figure 2 4-Plex multifamily fee stacking, uses Tacoma Water’s proposed final 2030 SDC rate at end of 5-year phase-in




Figure 3 8-Plex multifamily fee stacking, uses Tacoma Water’s proposed final 2030 SDC rate at end of 5-year phase-in

BACKGROUND:

PW and ES were jointly proposing that City Council consider adopting transportation impact fees and wastewater and stormwater system development charges in 2025. Additionally, Tacoma Water is proposing that City Council adopt a revised system development charge schedule. Transportation Impact Fees were adopted December 9, 2025, and will go into effect June 1, 2026. These are one-time fees assessed for new development that will help fund projects that increase the capacities of our transportation, wastewater, stormwater, and potable water systems. Given the increased density and accelerated population growth expected following the passage of Home in Tacoma, PW, ES, and Water consider it crucial to adopt new or updated revenue mechanisms to pay for the growth of these critical systems.

City Council concurrently recognizes the need to maintain and enhance housing affordability in Tacoma and seeks to ensure that the cost burden to develop in Tacoma does not exceed that of neighboring jurisdictions, which could disincentivize construction of new housing in Tacoma. City Council therefore requested that PW and ES research the total up-front costs to developers to construct the housing types that Home in Tacoma is likely to accelerate.

Examples Selected

The team identified representative examples of an ADU/DADU, 4-plex multifamily development, and 8-plex multifamily development within Tacoma. Using the attributes of these sites, the team calculated the total impact fee and system development charge costs proposed for Tacoma and currently assessed by five neighboring jurisdictions:

- Fife
- Federal Way
- Pierce County
- Puyallup
- University Place

These jurisdictions were selected due to their proximity to Tacoma, and in the case of all, except Pierce County, their comparable size to Tacoma.

The results of the analysis for impact fees and system development charges are shown above in the Executive Summary. In each case, Tacoma’s stacked costs are at or near the lowest compared to the other five jurisdictions.



Other Development Costs




Figure 4 Tacoma fee stacking including permitting fees and offsite improvements

There are other up-front costs for development in addition to impact fees and system development charges. Primary examples include *permitting fees and offsite improvements*. All five jurisdictions have general requirements that mandate some degree of offsite or frontage improvements. The process and amounts imposed for these cost categories vary widely by jurisdiction and according to many specific elements of the development type and site design. As such, it is difficult to provide an “apples to apples” comparison between Tacoma’s permitting fee and offsite improvement costs and those of other jurisdictions. However, as shown in Figure 4, the departments coordinated with the Planning and Development Services Department to identify typical permitting fee and offsite improvement costs for an ADU/DADU, 4-plex multifamily, and 8-plex multifamily development for Tacoma only.




Figure 5 Fee stacking across jurisdictions, with permitting fees and offsite improvements included for Tacoma only

Although permitting fee and offsite improvement costs are difficult to identify and compare for the other jurisdictions discussed in this memo, Figure 5 shows that even when these costs are included for Tacoma and omitted for other jurisdictions, Tacoma’s development costs are on par with neighboring jurisdictions.




