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



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
Landmarks Preservation Commission

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Background

- The Landmarks Preservation Commission is established by the City Charter and Tacoma Municipal Code (TMC) 1.42.
- The Commission oversees the establishment and regulation of landmarks, local historic districts, review of certain property tax incentives, heritage grants and annual awards.
- Tacoma's Landmarks and Historic Districts are regulated by TMC 13.06 and 13.07.
- The Commission also reviews certain demolition permits under TMC 13.12.570.
- · Advisory policy body to the Planning Commission and City Council.



Tacoma

Commission

- 12 of 13 positions are currently filled
- Positions: Architects (3), Professionals (4), At-Large (4), and Ex Officio (2)
- 3-year terms (Ex Officio terms are 4 years)
- Regular meetings occur 2nd and 4th
 Wednesdays of each* month (*only one meeting in November and December)
- Hybrid-format meetings, start at 5:30pm

- The Urban Design Board was established by City Council in 2024 within TMC Chapter 13.19 (Ord. 28966)
- Meets the third Thursday each month
- The Board has three core functions:
 - Review of Urban Design Project Review (UDPR) permits
 - Provide advisory input on matters related to urban design
 - Serve as educational resource and advocate for design excellence
