### ITEMS OF INTEREST

1. Interim City Manager Hyun Kim provides the attached document outlining progress on the **City Manager's expectations and workplan**.

3. City-funded Temporary and Emergency Shelter Performance: The City posts weekly information about its Temporary and Emergency Shelter locations including current census, number of available beds, and exits to housing. **This information can be found at:**  
<https://cms.tacoma.gov/ncs/weeklydataupdate.pdf>, and is updated weekly.  
Pierce County Human Services also uses the Homeless Management Information System to report daily availability throughout Pierce County. This information can be found at:

4. RAIN Center Seasonal Shelter: **The City of Tacoma and Tacoma Rescue Mission (TRM) have partnered together to open an additional temporary seasonal shelter in the City of Tacoma.** Tacoma Rescue Mission will operate a shelter at the RAIN Center (2304 Jefferson Ave) starting on **February 1, 2026, until the end of April 2026**. **This shelter will provide 65 beds during regular operation and 15 additional beds during inclement weather activations.** **The site will serve residents with 24 hours services including days services and access to food.** The program will also provide transportation for additional services to TRM main campus and the YMCA for showers.
5. Point in Time Count (PIT): **The 2026 Point in Time Count will be conducted on January 29 - 30, 2026, and data from this count is critical to local planning and funding for homelessness services.** During the Count volunteers interview people experiencing homelessness to find out information that will help us understand trends and learn more about community needs. The PIT includes both shelter and unsheltered individuals, helping to assess the overall scope of homelessness.

To support this effort, the City paused encampment removals from public property and rights of way two weeks prior to the PIT count, and the City will pause removals for one week following the PIT count. Encampment removals will resume the week of February 9, 2026. The City may still perform removals even during a pause when encampments are obstructing the right of way or rise to the condition of an immediate hazard.

6. Encampment Outreach: For the week of **January 19 - 23, 2026**, the HEAL team visited **19 locations**. This resulted in **32 ( 5 new, and 27 repeat)** individuals contacted and referred to community services; 1 individual accepted shelter placement.   - Paving on North 39th & North 41st Streets: Between Mason and Stevens Street is wrapping up! Citywide, we've already restored over 5,600 residential blocks and are on pace to complete more than 6,000 as part of Tacoma's Residential Restoration Program! This work is made possible by our amazing crews and your Streets Initiative I investment. Learn more about our progress at [tacomastreetinitiative.org](#).
  - Tacoma Mayor Anders Ibsen joined U.S. Senator Patty Murray, Tacoma Public Utilities (TPU) Director Jackie Flowers, TPU Board Chair John O'Loughlin, and the Muckleshoot Tribe to highlight a critical **\$190 million federal investment in our infrastructure**. The US Army Corps of Engineers will now have the funding to keep a project on track at Howard Hanson Dam that will improve salmon restoration efforts, enhance our long-term water security, and reduce flooding risk. While located outside of Tacoma and fed by the Green River, the Howard Hanson Dam plays a critical role in providing a steady supply of water to Tacoma. We're excited for the upgrades this vital piece of infrastructure will see!
  - An update on **the City Manager recruitment process** was provided during the January 27, 2026, City Council meeting. Community Members had the opportunity for public comment on the recruitment process following the presentation. - Congratulations to the **28 local organizations that received funding** to organize free public events in 2026! The City of Tacoma's Events and Recognitions Committee (CERC) recently approved \$90,000 in funding to help cover direct costs for these events. It's money that is directly reinvested in our community from a tax on food & beverages at events at the Tacoma Dome and Greater Tacoma Convention Center.
- Important reminder from [Tacoma Mobility](#) to leave 20 feet between your car and an intersection, and 30 feet if the intersection includes a stop sign, yield sign, or traffic light. This improves visibility for pedestrians and drivers and helps keep us all safe.

The Public Works Department is pleased to provide the attached update to our capital projects planning document. The purpose of this document is to provide additional information regarding funding, costs, and schedules for active capital projects within Public Works. Updates include changes to project schedules and funding, the addition of new projects, and deletion of projects that are complete. The document lists projects in categories according to work phase with projects in design listed first, followed by projects in advertisement, construction, and closeout. The update also includes Public Works support services for Tacoma Rail projects, Neighborhood and Community Services projects, Community and Economic Development projects, and others.

This project list is a result of the residents of Tacoma approving the Street Initiatives (Proposition No. 3 and Transportation Benefit District Proposition A) in November 2015 to fund additional maintenance and improvements to transportation infrastructure. The project funding sources include Propositions A and No. 3, other City funds, grants, gas tax, and City utility funds. Several of the projects are currently funded for design only with construction funding sources to be determined.

Please note this is a planning document that is subject to change as new funding becomes available and as progress is made on capital projects, whether it be in design and/or construction. 



In 2025, the City Council passed Resolution 41642, which created a new policy on commemorative flag displays at City Facilities. To request a flag be flown at City facilities that were not pre-approved as a part of the resolution, Council sponsors must either bring forward a resolution or a motion to request a flag be flown.

The Seattle Seahawks are a longstanding and unifying presence in the South Sound and throughout Washington State, with a fan base that spans generations and communities. In Tacoma, Seahawks fandom is deeply woven into the city's civic and cultural life bringing together residents, local businesses, neighborhood organizations, and families around a shared regional identity and sense of pride.

The request for a commemorative flag raising is prompted by the Seattle Seahawks' entry into the Super Bowl for the fourth time in franchise history, marking a significant regional milestone. The team's most recent prior Super Bowl appearance occurred in 2014, making this achievement particularly meaningful for long-time fans and for a new generation of residents who have experienced the team's impact on regional identity over the past decade.

A commemorative flag raising provides an opportunity for the City of Tacoma to recognize this achievement and celebrate the collective community connection it represents. Seahawks games and related events consistently generate community engagement, support local economic activity, and serve as informal gathering points that strengthen neighborhood ties across Tacoma.

Additionally, the Seahawks organization has a history of community investment and regional outreach, including youth programs, charitable initiatives, and partnerships that benefit residents throughout Pierce County. Recognizing the team through a commemorative flag raising aligns with the City's practice of acknowledging moments, institutions, and symbols that reflect shared values, regional pride, and community cohesion. This ceremonial recognition is intended as a one-time observance connected to a milestone achievement. This does not preclude any future flying of the Seahawks flags connected to another significant milestone and sponsored request.



Whenever a commemorative flag is displayed per the policy, it should be displayed at the following four locations:

- The Tacoma Municipal Building North (733 Market Street);
- The Tacoma Dome (2727 East "D" Street);
- The Tacoma Police Department Headquarters (3701 South Pine Street);
- The Tacoma Fire Department Headquarters (901 Fawcett Avenue).

The Tacoma Dome is proposed as the primary location for this commemorative flag raising because of its role as Tacoma's premier sports and events facility. Focusing the flag raising to the Tacoma Dome reflects the Dome's function as a regional sports and events venue and maintains consistency with the ceremonial intent of the request. City staff will make a good-faith effort to accommodate the request for flags at all locations, however, due to the short notice associated with the event, availability of appropriate flags may be limited.

Tacoma Venues and Events Staff will be the lead on procuring the flag for the Tacoma Dome from the Seahawks Organization and have already received commitment to provide flags. Staff as appropriate identified in the policy will facilitate the raising of flags at the Tacoma Dome.

**COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT / CUSTOMER RESEARCH:**

Formal community engagement was not conducted for this commemorative flag-raising request, as the action is ceremonial only. The Seattle Seahawks maintain broad and longstanding support within the Tacoma community, and the proposed recognition reflects a widely shared regional affiliation and community interest. The one-time flag raising is intended as a symbolic gesture acknowledging a moment of regional significance rather than a decision requiring public input.

**2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES:****Equity and Accessibility:**

The proposed commemorative flag raising aligns with the City of Tacoma's Equity Framework by supporting community belonging, shared identity, and inclusive civic recognition. As a ceremonial, one-time observance, the action does not create barriers to access, impose costs, or result in disparate impacts across communities identified in Tacoma's Equity Index. The recognition reflects a broadly shared regional moment that brings together residents across neighborhoods, cultures, and backgrounds in a way that supports social cohesion and inclusive civic participation.

**Livability: Equity Index Score:** Moderate Opportunity

Increase positive public perception of safety and overall quality of life.

**Explain how your legislation will affect the selected indicator(s).**

By celebrating a positive, shared community moment, the commemorative flag raising supports civic pride and social cohesion, which contribute to improved perceptions of safety and overall quality of life. Visible, unifying civic activities help reinforce a sense of belonging and shared stewardship of public spaces, supporting community well-being.
