

RESOLUTION NO. 41787

BY REQUEST OF COUNCIL MEMBER RUMBAUGH

A RESOLUTION related to community services; directing the City Manager to seek partnerships with other agencies to identify a location and funding options to create a new low-barrier shelter site.

WHEREAS, despite funding constraints, the City remains deeply committed to connecting individuals experiencing homelessness to shelter and support services, focusing on sustainable solutions and pathways to permanent housing, and

WHEREAS the City recognizes the complexity and impact that homelessness and encampments have on communities, which is why our response to homelessness and encampment removals includes investment in community resources, including sheltering and food banks, outreach, and mental health services, and

WHEREAS the City's Homelessness Strategy includes low-barrier shelter sites, and the City Council appreciates the work of staff in constantly seeking opportunities and partnerships for increased shelter options, and this request allows the City to prioritize this effort in our homeless response with hopes in finding a more immediate solution, and

WHEREAS in 2025, Pierce County's annual Homeless Point-in-Time Count counted 2,955 people on streets and in shelters representing an 11 percent increase from the prior year with approximately 50 percent of individuals who reported a zip code identified as residing in a Tacoma zip code, however at the

same time 76 percent of sheltered individuals across Pierce County were in shelters in the City of Tacoma, and

WHEREAS the proportion of people engaged through outreach who ultimately secure shelter placements has increased from eight percent in 2023 and 2024 to the current placement rate for 2025 of 14 percent, but a majority still do not accept services, and

WHEREAS there are a variety of reasons people do not accept services, including a lack of interest in currently available options, as well as challenges with the restrictions in place on current sites, and a low-barrier approach is intended to be more attractive to individuals in need of shelter, and

WHEREAS as of the end of July 2025, the City saw a reduction of 199 beds supported by City funds, and this decrease occurred in June and July and included decommissioning the Forging Path site at 3561 Pacific Avenue, which had sheltered up to 135 individuals, and

WHEREAS the Forging Path site was a low-barrier site, and this low-barrier site not only provided safe spaces, but also demonstrably improved our communities and helped individuals move towards stability, and following Forging Path's opening, the Tacoma Police Department Crime Dashboard showed a 38 percent total reduction in crimes in the surrounding area (one-quarter mile radius) compared to the year prior, and



WHEREAS due to Forging Path's low-barrier operations, it served 295 people, with 66 individuals successfully transitioning to permanent housing as of May 26, 2025, providing evidence that a low-barrier approach is more attractive to individuals in need of shelter and prioritizes accessibility for those facing challenges like homelessness, mental health issues, or substance use disorders, and

WHEREAS while the City still maintains 100 low-barrier beds at the Stability Site, the Stability Site both has more requirements than Forging Path did and is not able to serve the same broad clientele, and

WHEREAS the City Council sees the need for a regional approach to the issue of homelessness that stretches far beyond the City's boarders, and in Pierce County government there is renewed interest in regional collaboration through the Unified Regional Approach to Homelessness, led by Pierce County and including 13 additional local jurisdictions creating an opportunity to harness this energy and collaborate on providing the most needed shelter services for our community prioritizing low-barrier shelters; Now, Therefore,



BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF TACOMA:

That the Council of the City of Tacoma hereby directs the City Manager to seek partnerships with other agencies to identify a location and funding options to create a new low-barrier shelter site, and the City Manager should provide an
