- During the month of February in recognition of Black History Month, Media and Communications has been highlighting local black-owned businesses, including the wine tasting room On Blended Knee ([OBK Winery](#)) and [Eudoras Bakery Cafe](#).
 - We’ve added a new **FAQ section to our Immigration Resources webpage**. We’ll continue to update this page with new information including resources, actions and testimony by the Mayor and City Council, and legislation that advances our priorities and interests on this important topic.
 - **Schools + Trees + You = Healthy Neighborhoods**. Join us on Saturday, February 21, 2026, from 9 AM to 2 PM to plant trees along key walking routes around Mann Elementary School. This is a kick-off event for our grant-funded **SafeTree Routes to Schools** project that aims to plant approximately 425 trees across four suggest walking routes in South End, South Tacoma, and Eastside neighborhoods.
 - **Learn CPR from Tacoma Fire Department** firefighters at Station 8!
Space is limited, so we require pre-registration through the "Tickets" link!
 - This community class is free for Tacoma, Fife, and Fircrest residents.
 - The class length is about three hours.
 - There is no age limit, but participants must be able to physically perform CPR for two minutes to receive a CPR card after completing the course.
 - The class covers adult/child/infant CPR, foreign body airway obstruction, and how to administer Narcan.
 - At the end of class, you will receive a TFD CPR card of completion.
 - This is not a certified first aid and health care provider class.

SUMMARY AND PURPOSE

A resolution authorizing a Council contingency fund expenditure of \$25,000 to sponsor the 5th Annual Citywide Block Party.

COUNCIL SPONSORS

Council Member John Hines, Council Member Jamika Scott, and Council Member Latasha Palmer

Council Contingency Fund Request: We ask for your support for a Council contingency fund expenditure of \$25,000 to sponsor the 5th Annual Citywide Block Party, hosted by True Vine Community Church.¹ The event is scheduled to take place in August 2026 at Cheney Stadium and will serve thousands of residents and families throughout Tacoma by connecting them to critical resources, including healthcare enrollment, housing support, utility assistance, employment services, and educational opportunities. In addition, the event will distribute thousands of backpacks and school supplies to local youth in need of assistance. True Vine Community Church expects about 5,000 people from across the city to participate.

- This free event is open to the public and designed to provide a safe and engaging environment where neighbors can connect, enjoy entertainment, and access valuable community resources and services.² The event is youth and family friendly, offering activities such as free face painting, multiple bounce houses, a petting zoo, and more. Families can also enjoy free food, live entertainment, and interactive experiences designed to uplift and inspire.

The City of Tacoma’s funding for the 5th Annual Citywide Block Party would help advance key priorities identified in the 2035 Strategic Plan, including improving perceptions of community safety, helping community members thrive, and increasing access to event experiences.³ True Vine Community Church will include top tier placement of the City of Tacoma logo on all major signage and promotional materials. City of Tacoma staff members will also have the option to host a resource table or booth at the event to interact directly with thousands of community members and families. Funding from the City of Tacoma would cover the Cheney Stadium rental fee, allowing a significantly increased capacity, accessibility, and overall event impact.

COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Council Member John Hines is receiving increased calls from community members and partner organizations asking for more support to nurture belonging and prosperity for all individuals, families, and neighborhoods.⁴ As one of the original supporters of the Neighborhood Planning Program, Council Member Hines has heard firsthand from community about the importance of ensuring equitable access to assistance and service programs, as well as building relationships and trust through joyful celebrations.⁵ Youth engagement is also a high priority for community members, who look to the City to provide a wide variety of programming support aimed at advancing education, violence prevention, and family support systems.

2025 STRATEGIC PRIORITIES

Equity and Accessibility: The 5th Annual Citywide Block Party is designed to welcome and celebrate all members of the community. By expanding this popular event to Cheney Stadium, True Vine Community Church aims to ensure all community members have equitable access to the festivities and an opportunity to engage with the vital resources and support systems that are available to them. Free activities for children also help ensure that families without childcare can attend.

Civic Engagement: *Equity Index Score:* Moderate Opportunity
Increase the percentage of residents who believe they are able to have a positive impact on the community and express trust in the public institutions in Tacoma.

Livability: *Equity Index Score:* Moderate Opportunity
Increase positive public perception of safety and overall quality of life.

Do not support the 5 th Annual Citywide Block Party.	Council would preserve the full amount of contingency funding for other priorities.	True Vine Community Church would need to find alternative funding and support, potentially reducing the scope and scale of the event and its community impact.
Support the 5 th Annual Citywide Block Party at a higher amount.	The Citywide Block Party could provide greater resources for community members.	True Vine Community Church has not requested funding above \$25,000 and sponsoring at a higher amount would further deplete contingency funds.






Vision Zero Cumulative and Trends




